THIS DATE IN HISTORY

Jan 19, 1961	Outgoing president Dwight D. Eisenhower warns incoming President John F. Kennedy that
	Laos is "the key to the entire area of Southeast Asia" and might require direct intervention
	of U.S. combat troops

Jan 12, 1962 U.S. Air Force launches Operation Ranch Hand, a "modern technological area-denial technique" designed to defoliate the roads and trails used by the Viet Cong. U.S. will dump an estimated 19 million gallons of Agent Orange, named for the color of its metal containers over 10% to 20% of Vietnam and parts of Laos in the years between 1962 and 1971. The herbicide has a small proportion of dioxin, a chemical that is considered a carcinogen which is dangerous to human beings.

Paratroopers from the 173rd Airborne Brigade and Australian troops conduct Operation Jan 1-8, 1966 Marauder, a search and destroy operation in Hau Nghia Province, III Corps.

In Operation Crimp/Buckskin, a massive search and destroy operation in III Corps, U.S. Jan 8-14, 1966 forces from the 173rd Airborne Division and other elements of the 1st Infantry Division, supported by troops from Australia and New Zealand, converge on the "Iron Triangle," a stronghold area northwest of Saigon. The Allied forces uncover and destroy a huge tunnel

network before pulling out of the area.

Jan 6-15, 1967 The U.S. 1st Battalion, 9th Marines, and South Vietnamese Marine Brigade Task Force Bravo launch Operation Deckhouse V, which includes amphibious operations in Kien Hoa Province in the Mekong Delta, located 62 miles south of Saigon.


President's Message:

Let's make 2019 a banner year in the areas of Veteran's Assistance and raising the communities' awareness of who we are, what we did years ago and what we stand for now!



The National Museum of the United States Army

A great Army deserves a great museum. The National Museum of the United States Army will serve as the capstone of the Army Museum Enterprise and provide the only comprehensive portrayal of Army history and traditions. The Museum will celebrate the selfless service and sacrifice of over 30 million men and women who have worn the Army uniform since 1775. The Museum will be a technological marvel incorporating the latest advances in museum exhibits while providing advanced educational opportunities that will capture the attention of visitors old and young. As the Army's national landmark, the Museum will honor United States Soldiers—past, present, and future—and provide an interactive educational experience explaining the Army's role in creating and defending our nation, as well as the Army's social initiatives and contributions for more than 240 years. The Museum will be located on 84 acres at Fort Belvoir, VA, less than 30 minutes south of our nation's capital in Washington, D.C. The main building will be approximately 185,000 square feet and display selections from the Army Art Collection, artifacts, documents, and images. The vast majority of these rare and priceless artifacts have never been seen by the American people. The Museum will welcome an estimated 500,000 to 700,000 visitors every year. The Korean War Veterans Memorial commemorates the sacrifices of 5.8 million Americans who served in the U.S. armed services during the three year period of the Korean War. In an effort to better convey the extent of the ultimate sacrifice of the U.S. servicemen, Congress authorized the addition of a "Wall of Remembrance". It will be etched with the names of 36,574 Americans who mad the ultimate sacrifice, as well as those wounded, Missing in Action or Prisoners of War.
