## **BLACK HISTORY CELEBRATION**

On February 17, 2009. Stayner Heritage Society held its fourth Black history celebration. This year, Ann and Ron Harrison,, were guest speakers. Although they are residents of Orillia,

they both have roots in the Queen's Bush/Owen

Sound Black History story.

Ann's ancestors, the Lawsons, escaped from slavery in Maryland, and travelled, through the Underground Railroad to the Queen's Bush area (approximately where Kitchener stands today). Her family has been involved in the Civil Rights Movement since the beginning and her cousin, Dr. Fred Lawson, stood with Martin Luther King Jr., on the balcony of the motel the day he was killed. Ron's great-grandfather escaped from slavery in the Everglades in Florida and traveled through the Underground Railroad to "the farthest destination on the Underground Railroad from the United States", which turned out to be Owen Sound!

For many years, Ron's family operated the quarry in Owen Sound and many of the heritage buildings existing today in that area were built with stone from the Harrison quarry. In fact, Owen Sound was founded by the black families who arrived there and later, greeted the first white sailors who found haven in the Sound nearly 200 years ago.

This was an educational evening for those in attendance who heard many more stories during the fellowship and refreshment time.

All present agreed that we have definitely added to our list of friends as we explore the history of our area.

# **SHOWCASE EVENT - CLEARVIEW TOWNSHIP**

Stayner Heritage Society was invited to be part of Clearview Township's Health & Leisure Showcase Event, February 28, 2009, which allowed folks to experience what Clearview has to offer.

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# Featured in this edition is a well-known Stayner personality , Dr. Bill Ives.

At 81 "and a half" years of age, family physician Dr. Bill Ives shows no intention of laying down his stethoscope. Born and raised in Stayner he has lived his whole life in the town of 3100, embodying over 50 years of medical service not only to his local, but also to a global community. "It's the best feeling anybody can get," he enthuses, "when they're able to serve or do something for others. It's that giving of yourself."

Though he claims to be 'semi-retired', his current curriculum vitae speaks otherwise. As advisor physician for the local nursing home in Stayner, he tends to a case load well in excess of 40 patients. ("I think the average age is 88. I have a couple of sweeties who are over 100," he notes, adding wryly, "it makes you feel young.") He is also inhouse physician for the Salvation Armies addiction rehabilitation program at Hope Acres, and has been since the facility first opened in 1967. And he continues to trek annually to South America, which he has done for 23 years, to minister medically to impoverished villagers in the mountains and jungles of Equador. On one hand he is the quintessential small-town family doctor who has delivered three generations of his local community, while on the other he is a shining example of extra-community thinking - of going beyond the boundaries of his local medical practice to work with those in other communities that are 'continents apart' both figuratively and literally from us.

His focused commitment to the Hyppocractic oath is coupled with a poignant wisdom not found in medical textbooks. "Lots of the time my best medicine is to be an ear. The biggest problem now is , and always has been, that people are lonely. That's the commonest disease going. If you can just sit and listen, it always amazes me how often a patient will say 'thank you so much, I feel so much better,' when I haven't done a darn thing!" An energetic bundle of common sense, of community commitment - he's been a board member of the Clearview Communitty Theatre from 'the "get-go" - and of a delightful if practical irreverence ("We have six churches too many," he says of Stayner's seven. His perscription: "If we could put all the people in one and just rotate the ministers....it would probably be a good thing for everybody"). Ives himself attends chapel once a week at Hope Acres of his own accord, then goes to church on Sundays "as penance".

His annual volunteer treks to Equador are spent working alongside local doctors helping the poor who have little or no access to medical care. Typical of his mentoring nature he has brought with him over the years on these missions "about 40 to 45 people from Stayner and the Creemore area," many of whom were high school students learning valuable life lessons. "They find the people are so grateful - even if they can't do something for them, they're still grateful. They come back enlightened". Of his own Equadorian experience he says simply, "They give me far more than I give them." Humility aside, this doctor;' healing powers go far beyond the medical.

...After reading the Dt. Ives story, I felt I must add my reminissing as well.

As you may know, I lived next door to Dr. Ives until I was 16. I would wander over as a small child (not telling anyone at home I was going) with my latest mess of poison ivy. He would kindly tend to me and send me on my way with a small bottle of calamine lotion with a cork in it.

I was often over to see his flower gardens, goldfish pond and lily pond; also MaryCatherine's "play house" that had a couple of cots and orange crate furniture.

I can never recall being sent home or restricted in any way in my wanderings. I did know, however, the back garden where the "glads" were was off limits. (I'm not sure how I got that message!)...Now, the occasional night when I have trouble falling asleep, I will start at the front of the property and...imagine the whole property from the traffic at the front to the gardens and ponds at the back...What a nice way to go to sleep.

I remember him doing surgery on brother Eric, on our kitchen table. Eric had a nasty cut from a discarded stove pipe while snow sleighing down our hill. We were all shoo'd into the front room and told to stay there! I remember the smell of ether. When I was a teenager and at Pete Oehm's "Dollar Store" on Christmas Eve, the Lighthouse men would come in extolling the virtues of Dr. Ives, buying gifts for him and asking us to wrap them nicely...Shirley (Dickey) McLeod.
