14th Sunday Ordinary Year C Luke 10:1-12, 17-20



“At that time the Lord appointed seventy-two others whom he sent ahead of him in pairs to every town and place he intended to visit. He said to them, "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest. Go on your way; behold, I am sending you like lambs among wolves. Carry no money bag, no sack, no sandals; and greet no one along the way. Into whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this household.' If a peaceful person lives there, your peace will rest on him; but if not, it will return to you. Stay in the same house and eat and drink what is offered to you, for the laborer deserves his payment. Do not move about from one house to another. Whatever town you enter and they welcome you, eat what is set before you, cure the sick in it and say to them, 'The kingdom of God is at hand for you.' Whatever town you enter and they do not receive you, go out into the streets and say, 'The dust of your town that clings to our feet, even that we shake off against you.' Yet know this: the kingdom of God is at hand. I tell you, it will be more tolerable for Sodom on that day than for that town." The seventy-two returned rejoicing, and said, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us because of your name." Jesus said, "I have observed Satan fall like lightning from the sky. Behold, I have given you the power to 'tread upon serpents' and scorpions and upon the full force of the enemy and nothing will harm you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice because the spirits are subject to you, but rejoice because your names are written in heaven."

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Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

14th Sunday Ordinary Year C Luke 10:1-12, 17-20

You want us to do what? Jesus calls 72 disciples to take up a mission charge in today's gospel and He sends them out with..... "no money bag, no sack, no sandals"(Luke 10:4). Understandably, they may ask, "Jesus, how far do you think we are going to make it?" To flash a head a little, when they return afterward, we are going to hear that "The seventy-two returned **rejoicing...**" (Luke 10:17). Everything works out fine, and they even recount mission successes to Jesus! Amazing! Jesus sends them out with no supplies and no preconceived marketing plan, except to announce "*Peace to this household*" (Lk 10:5), and the '*The kingdom of God is at hand for you*' (Lk10:9), along with some ministry to the sick. Sounds like Jesus sends them out to simply strike up some relationships and spark interest in 'the Kingdom of God'. Like an advance team that breaks and softens the ground, readying it to receive the good seed later, the disciples seem like a warm up act to introduce Jesus. The fact that Jesus sends them out with no gimmicks, no cash, and no sacks of goodies indicates that the Kingdom message is not about 'Stuff'. No, it is more personal than that. It sounds like it is about meeting people and making connections- peaceable ministry finding similarities and creating bonds among people. Jesus talks to them about 'entering homes' and 'eating whatever is served' which tells me that Jesus wants His followers to mingle, mix and minister to people in His Name serving however they can. There is no prepackaged program to apply, but simply meet and work with people and introduce at any opportunity the good things of God's kingdom. Church people call this a 'ministry of presence'. Living among people and exerting a soft impression of goodness within communities to stir interest in Jesus' teaching by their humble neighborly service and compassionate works. I recently read a history of the foundation of the Trappist monastery (Thomas Merton's home) in Bardstown Kentucky. After an initial enthusiasm, as the really hard work of building a settlement showed no apparent fruit (declining health of monks and no recruits), one of the abbots wrote that if nothing else came of their lives, then at least the community had seen the witness of a hard labor joyfully entered into with eyes on an otherworldly prize. He said that bonds were created among the local slaves serving on neighboring farms and the monks themselves. A side effect of the monks willingly taking on such a simple and hard life, increased the esteem and dignity of the slaves working on local farms among the county (this was pre-1860's USA). Great personal honor and deep spiritual living was found in such a life of labor. So, in the gospel Jesus sends out the disciples to go and speak to people about the Kingdom and do whatever work and service they could to each person they met along the way. Ministering to the sick is specifically mentioned, so I imagine some disciples took up work cleaning, visiting and sitting on call with the sick and their families. Jesus is teaching a style of ministry that calls for 'showing up and offering to do whatever needs doing' all the while ready to talk about God's Kingdom and share the reason for your joyful good work-Jesus! What else can be made of Jesus' instructions to go out with nothing but the Name of Jesus and God's Kingdom on your lips? Jesus is telling them to go visit towns and villages, settling a while and working in whatever field or home needs help. When the opportunity arises due to people's questions or interest, then share with them talk of the Kingdom and your own faith in Christ. Reminds me of the story about the missionary who settled in a little town, and after several years someone asked him "When are you going to start preaching at us?" and He answered, "I've been announcing my message, since the first day I arrived-not in long speeches but in my lifestyle." His simple dedication to a life of prayerful concern for others and service to their needs in every way he could find to help others: that was a powerful, yet gentle witness to Christ (the 'lamb among wolves' approach--Luke 10:3).

But also, many people are struck by the repeated emphasis on 'peace' in this passage. Jesus calls for a 'pacifist' presence. His disciples emanate 'peace' through their interactions with others. From Jesus' instructions to appear as 'lambs among wolves', to not drag along with them any 'threatening-looking' supplies (sacks- of weapons), to the avoidance of returning 'retaliatory' responses to rejection, Jesus is calling His followers not to add any more hostility to an already hot-headed society. Jesus desires disciples in His company that lower the temperature of society by their interactions with people, and help bring about more peaceable relations among everyone. Later, Paul will call for the same 'cool, calm' relations among the church when he writes in Romans 12:18 "If possible, on your part, **live at peace with all**". There is great missionary witness value of such a 'peace-loving' example, as Hebrews 12:14 says "**Strive for peace with everyone, & for that holiness without which no one will see the Lord.**" So, yes, simply being a positive & peaceful person (a 'peace-maker'-Matt 5:9 and 'peace-bringer'-John 14:27) can help bring people to Christ! So, again as always, Peace, Fr Brian
