HIGH SCHOOLS BIG ISSUES IN TWO ELECTIONS

Dorval Gardens New Principal Is N.J. Keeland

N. J. Keeland, vice-principal at Northmount High School, will succeed H. A. Simon as principal at Dorval Gardens elementary school when schools resume after the summer vacation.

Mr. Simon, who has been principal at Dorval since the school opened 10 years ago, is retiring at the end of the current term.

Two other local appointments announced last week by the Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal are Miss B.J. Macdonald, a Lachine High School teacher, who becomes vice-principal of Mount Royal High School, and Mrs. H. M. Cooper, a teacher at Summerlea School, who becomes a supervising assistant.

All appointments take effect in September.

Protestant Tax Up In Lachine Dorval Island

Protestant school taxpayers on Dorval Island and in Lachine will have to pay more for the 1962-3 school term as a result of property revaluations.

Dorval Islanders will pay 10 per cent more and those in Lachine 15 per cent more. Both are among 17 Montreal Island municipalities to be charged increases which range up to 150 per cent in Town of Mount Royal.

City of Dorval residents are not affected by the change.

Protestant School Board chairman John Rowat said the increases are essential.

Council Faces Group Claiming Tax Error

A deputation from Thorncrest avenue and Westwood avenue in northern Dorval, packed City Hall last Friday to air a grievance over delay in readjusting improvement tax bills.

Mr. Henry Cavill, speaking for the group, said their claim against the assessment had been accepted by the former council at the end of its term, but that the present council had not acted upon it.

He claimed that they had been overcharged since 1953, that the matter had, they thought, been finally settled at the beginning of 1961, but they were still being charged with the same assessment.

If they had not "kept on their toes", he alleged, maybe this would go on indefinitely and the matter would be "sideswiped again".

It was agreed that a three-man committee from the area meet with the finance commission, headed by Ald. Gordon Glencross, to discuss it.

Ald. Glencross said it was all new to him and time must be given to council to read all the correspondence and other papers so that it could familiarize itself with the problem.

The deputation was further told that an adjustment would be made if their claim was a right one.

Dore, Lupien Seek RC Vote: Five Protestant Candidates

Two elections of vital importance to Dorval parents are scheduled to be held next Monday, June 11. One is for a vacant seat on the Dorval Catholic School Commission, the other is for two vacant seats for the Protestant School Commissioners for Lachine.

The others are John Pitcairn, of 24th. avenue, Lachine, who is seeking re-election, Willard A. Ellis, of 42nd. avenue, Lachine, J.B. Hopkins, LaSalle and Nicholas Micholuk, of 12th. avenue, Lachine.

claim the backing of the Home and School Associations of Dorval Gardens, Courtland Park and Surrey Gardens.

They also claim delays in building a much needed high school for Dorval to take the overflow of students crowding Lachine High School.

The majority of the present school commissioners, on the other hand, believe that with additions being made to Lachine High this summer, accommodation will be sufficient to meet all the demands of the area.

This will be the first time in 15 years that an election has been held by the commission, and if Mr. Betts a TCA director of passenger traffic is elected, the first time Dorval has had two seats on the Commission.

For Dorval parents, whether property owners or tenants, the polling booth is at Dorval Gardens School; for Lachine voters, booths are to be placed at John Grant High School.

Big Issue With RC Commission

There are two candidates in the running for the one seat on the Dorval Catholic School Commission vacated by Lorenz Decare.

They are Gilles Doré and Jeap Lupien.

At stake is one major issue—construction of the long-discussed and long-promised Dorval High School on Elmridge Golf Course.

Mr. Doré seeks to join Dr. Peter Paré, chairman of the commission, and commissioner John Audette.

Lauson, who are committed to construction of a co-educational high school. The school would accommodate French speaking and English speaking boys and girls in separate classrooms, with central facilities including laboratories, gymnasium and swimming pool available to each group.

Mr. Lupien says Quebec has yet to pass the plans and has proposed amendments to it. He says he will co-operate with Quebec and meet their requirements. He also says he is not against a bi-ethnic school.

He claims he is for a secondary school immediately and will work to promote better understanding between the parents, the teachers and the school board.

Mr. Lupien added that he wishes to see religious teaching orders retained in the school system.

Elections for members of local school commissions are of particular importance to all parents. On their decision rests the composition of an important body charged with the education of our children.

This year new regulations have been passed which give the electoral lists a wider range. Now, whether you be a property owner or a tenant, you may be eligible.

A property-owner, whether he has children or not may, along with his wife, vote. The tenant of an apartment or a house, and his wife may, if they have children under 18, also vote.

Quebec Provincial Government,, realizing the importance of school commissions, has made this change believing that parents of all school-children must have a say.

HURRY, HURRY, HURRY!

According to a news despatch from Ottawa published in Montreal's two English newspapers, Federal grants totalling \$2,292,221 have been made to nine municipalities to aid in construction of sewage treatment projects.

Dorval, which has been knocking this problem around for several months now, has until March, 1963, to apply for a grant, obtainable when work gets under way. In other words, 10 months remain if it hopes to get a big slice of the cost from the Federal Government and another payment from Quebec. The balance is payable with a low-cost Federal loan.

Ten months is not long. In that time plans, which last month were authorized to be sent to the appropriate senior government departments, must pass expert scrutiny, while no doubt there will be other red tape to unravel.

Judging by unofficial comment, however, it would appear that the big stumbling block to the site on Dixie Island is the causeway, which residents in the area and Mayor John Pratt, have protested, for this a special Bill will have to be passed in Parliament.

It is to be hoped that all these delays will not mean that the City will, in the end, have to pay the full shot.

JOHN PRATT REPORTS FROM OTTAWA

Last week I dealt with the subject of the Technical and Vocational Training Assistance Act, and I would like to continue with this report.
Courses Offered
 Courses offered in these schools are at three broad levels:

The secondary school level, for persons who have completed elementary school and are continuing in the school system. In these programs at least one half of the students' school time is devoted to technical, vocational or commercial courses designed to prepare students for entry into employment. These are usually offered in technical and vocational high schools or composite high schools.

The post secondary school or institute of technology level, for persons who have graduated from secondary school or have an equivalent qualification in mathematics, science and other subjects.

The trade or occupational training level, for persons who have left the regular school system. These are available for the employed, unemployed, apprentices or other adults.

Federal-Provincial Training

The federal - provincial agreements developed under the Technical and Vocational Training Assistance Act provide for training programs in nine broad areas. In addition to the capital assistance for new buildings, alterations, additions and equipment outlined above, federal assistance is also provided to the

provinces for operational costs of these facilities and the various programs associated with them.

Vocational High School Training

Subject to funds voted by Parliament, the Federal Government will contribute \$15,000,000 over the six years of the agreements towards the operational costs of vocational secondary school programs.

Distribution of federal funds consists of an initial sum to each province and the territories and the balance of the annual allotment divided according to the percentage of persons, 15 to 19 years of age inclusive residing in each province or territory, in relation to the Canadian total in this age group. In no case will the federal contribution exceed 50 per cent

Council Sits Overtime Deals With 27 Letters

Dorval Chamber of Commerce, which last month passed a resolution urging City Council to "proceed with all possible despatch with the construction of a sewage disposal plant", will be advised that the project is proceeding as planned.

Aldermen at Friday's meeting of council were read a letter from the Chamber urging action to allow the city to take advantage of the Federal and provincial grants

It was pointed out that the next stage in Dorval's sewage disposal plans has already been taken.

The Chamber's letter was one of 27 read at the Council meeting ranging from ragweed control and fund raising to traffic control and more objections to changes in the city's re-zoning by-law. They took up close to two hours of discussion.

On ragweed control, Montreal Ragweed Control Association was given the city's blessing in its efforts to get Quebec to spray Highway No. 2.

Of its own program for ragweed control, a report is to be given at an early meet-

ing of Council outlining the extent of the city's 1962 ragweed control programme.

Council also discussed a proposed Montreal Metropolitan Commission plan to report on the taxi industry, covering 15 miles beyond Montreal's limits.

Ald. W. Milson, seconded by Ald. J. Macdonald, moved a resolution, sought by the city's west-end taxi owners, to oppose this move. They were supported by Ald. J. B. Goodfellow, Ald. Raymond, Glencross and Sansom, however, voted against and were joined by Mayor Pratt, who broke the tied vote.

Those against the motion, while agreeing that the city's

Memberships may be obtained in person at the Dorval Recreation Association Golf Course Club House, or by mail, Box 45, Valois.

Because Ballantyne Pool has been opened three weeks ahead of schedule the hours have been restricted to two to eight p.m. and swimming is limited to members until after the June 23 opening of Surrey Gardens and Walters Park Pools. During the regular pool season guests sponsored by members may obtain tickets by the swim or by the day at the pools.

Federal Contract Let For Wharf Repairs

A \$29,202 contract has been awarded by the Federal Department of Public Works to Danis Construction Inc., of Ste. Anne de Sorel, Que., for wharf repairs at Pointe Claire.

The firm submitted the lowest bid of five. Work is scheduled for completion within nine months.

The repairs to the existing public wharf will include construction of a steel sheet piling wall, enclosing the headblock, for a length of approximately 242 feet. The wharf is located on the north shore of St. Louis Lake at Pointe Claire.

Pratt Lists Achievements Promises Continued Effort

John Pratt, M.P. for Jacques Cartier-Lasalle, kept up his tremendous pace this week.

Daily rounds of coffee parties, campaign meetings, train stops, radio and TV appearances were topped off with an afternoon visit to the Ste. Ann's Veteran's Hospital on Friday night.

The busy Mr. Pratt took time out to make several important points:

The Trans-Canada Highway, rapidly being completed is a Federal-Provincial project, with the Government of Ottawa paying over half the total cost. In Jacques-Cartier-Lasalle the Federal Government is pouring over seven million dollars into the Highway which will greatly improve access to this region, particularly the North Shore communities of Dollard, Ste. Genevieve, Roxboro and Pierrefonds.

The overpasses that will cross the new Highway in this county are at Ste. Marie, St. Charles, St. Remi and St. John's, and cost a total of \$1,308,000. All work is underway, and Ottawa has contributed 54% of the cost.

Referring to one opponent's remarks that the Liberals had passed all these projects, Mr. Pratt said: "Passed is right—they passed right over such important projects as the Trans-Canada highway and the Airport, Navy Depot, Canal Bridge in St. Pierre, level crossings, post offices, the CNR Hump Yard and a host of others. Not one of these items was completed under the Liberals in 22 years of power. In five years, everyone of these major projects has been pushed ahead, most are already completed, and many more major projects are in the planning stage or better still, actually committed such as the new bridges at the west end of the Island - all of which will be more than 50% paid for out of Federal funds.

One opponent unwittingly has shown how little he knows about Federal, Provincial or even private matters. Rock has claimed that the Place Ville Marie is a Federal project, initiated and organized by the Liberals. As every-

body else in the county knows, the Place Ville Marie is a commercial project, financed entirely by Private Capital. The fact that it stands on CNR land only means that the Government Railway will get an income from this privately owned and operated commercial enterprise in the City of Montreal.

With the campaign moving into the closing stages, the Conservative member is on the go night and day. Many more meetings are planned - coffee parties, meeting trains, and rallies in the Shopping Centres are but a few of the items on the timetable.

Referring to his challenge to Mr. Rock of last week that he prove one specific statement, Mr. Pratt said, "To this moment (Sunday, June 3rd), Mr. Rock has not seen fit to answer the challenge. I know he can't prove his statement, and it only goes to underline the fact that his whole campaign has been based on misleading statements fired in all directions at once."

"My campaign has been based on the facts," stated Mr. Pratt. "Facts which show that a great deal has been done in this county in five years. Facts which show that I have kept my 1958 promises. I have been the Member of Parliament for all the people of Jacques-Cartier-Lasalle. I shall continue to work for all the residents of this riding."

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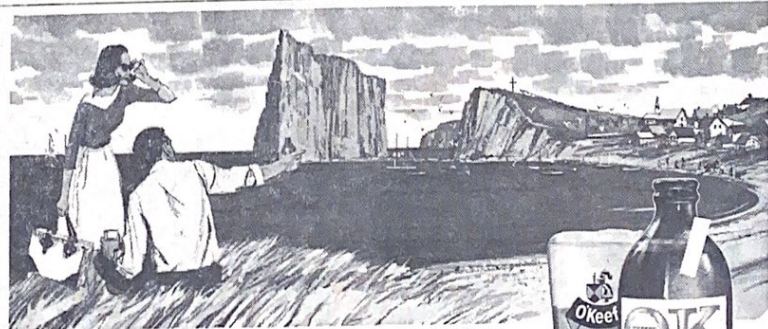
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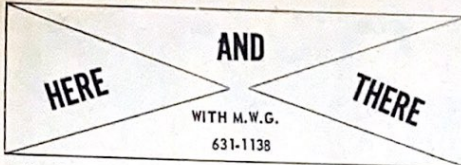

In accordance with by-law No. 365 of the City of Dorval, kindly take note of the following:

ARTICLES CONCERNING BICYCLES

- Art. 44 - It is forbidden to ride any bicycle on any sidewalk of the City or in any part of a park or playground, except with a special permission of the City.
- Art. 45 - It is forbidden for two persons to ride together the same single seated bicycle.
- Art. 46 - Every person riding a bicycle shall have at all times full control of his vehicle through the pedals and the handle bars.
- Art. 74 - It shall be unlawful for any person travelling upon any bicycle, motorcycle, coaster, sled, skates, skis or or any toy vehicle, to cling to or attach himself, or such a vehicle, to any other moving vehicle upon any street.
- Art. 78 - Bicycles shall be provided with lamps or reflectors at both ends.

This by-law will be rigidly enforced immediately.

ECOLE SECONDAIRE PRINCIPAL SUGET DANS LES ELECTIONS DE DORVAL

Les parents catholiques de Dorval iront voter lundi le 11 juin, pour élire un nouveau membre sur la Commission des Ecoles Catholiques de Dorval. C'est la première fois que locataires auront droit de vote. (mari et Deux candidats sont en lice, M. Gilles Doré et M. Jean Lupien.

En plus de choisir un commissaire les parents se prononceront pour ou contre la construction de l'école secondaire, sujet controversé.

M. Doré est appuyé par le Dr. Paré, président de la Commission Scolaire et par les commissaires Audette et Lauzon, qui forment l'équipe que a appuyé le projet de l'école secondaire. 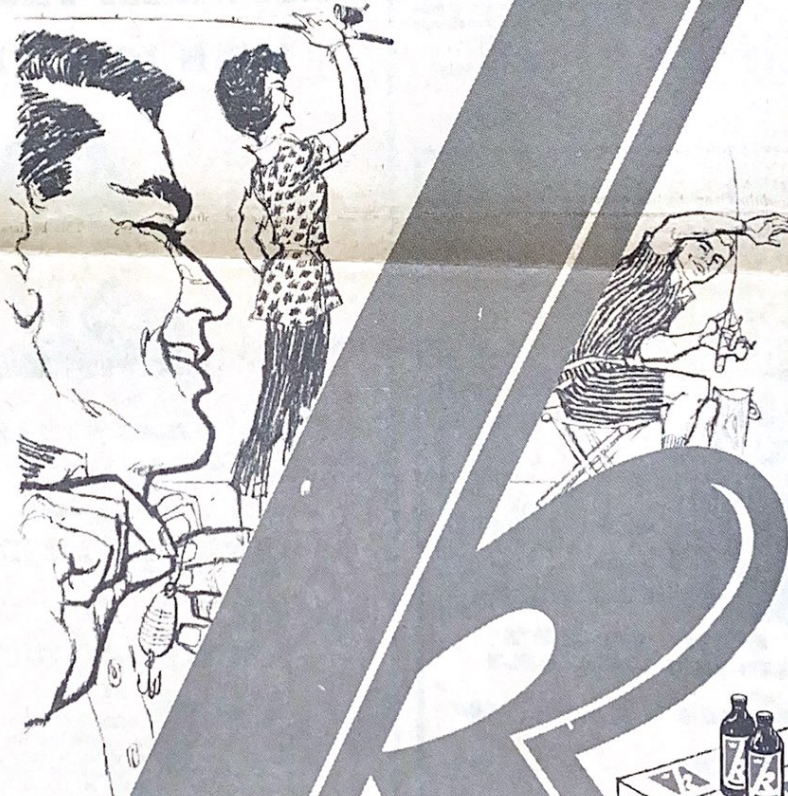

Last year a new postal station was authorized by the Post Office for the City of LaSalle.

This refers to my Minister's letter of the 2nd August, 1961, dealing with the proposed establishment of a Postal Station in the city of LaSalle.

Your reply dated 21st Au-

gust, 1961, stated that you had checked with His Worship, Dr. Maurice Lacharité, Mayor of LaSalle, and he had informed you that the proposed site in the vicinity of Lafleur Street, near Clément or Jean Milot Streets, was satisfactory in every way.

A firm decision has been made to proceed with the establishment of a Postal Station in the city of LaSalle. The exact location will, of course, depend upon the availability of a suitable site and/or premises in the general area mentioned above.

The question of a suitable building to house this Postal Station has been referred to the Department of Public Works, and you may rest assured that we will proceed with this project as quickly as possible.
