# TMPM To Start Rapid-Rehousing

Beginning in the 2nd quarter of this year, The Meeting Place Mission will be undertaking a new program to serve the homeless and those at risk for homelessness in Burke County—Rapid Rehousing. This program is designed to assist individuals & families who are at risk of losing their

housing through temporary financial assistance and case management. The program is also equipped to assist those transitioning from emergency shelters and transitional housing into their own residence. The scope will be limited because this is a "trial year," but we have high hopes. The State DHHS will provide some reimbursement support for this initiative, but, as always, we will be leaning on our Compassionate Community to help us meet the important goals of serving those in need. We look forward to sharing the success of this program with you throughout the year.

We are also pleased to announce Appalachian State BSW interns, Mandy Edwards and Richard Pisano, and WPCC intern Whitney Conway have joined us this term. These students are doing an excellent job of learning and leading in the work we do here in Burke County. We are very proud of them!

In 2015—thanks to our many supporters—we served over 250 men, women, and children in our three programs. The success rate in 2015 for our transitional programs was 87%, more than 10% higher than the average in NC.

### From Homelessness to House Manager

In 2015, Ryan S. became a client of our Men's Transitional Program at Burkemont. In less than 7 months, Ryan transitioned from our Phase I program to our Phase II program, while continuing to maintain excellent grades as a degree-seeking student at Western Piedmont Community College. Because of Ryan's extraordinary efforts, we offered him the opportunity to become the House Manager for our program at Burkemont, providing support and encouragement to new men entering into our programs. Since Ryan's transition, our program has benefited from his tenacious work ethic and unique ability to connect with new clients. Ryan's story is a success story. And we continue to serve men in our community because of individuals like Ryan who are able to receive a "hand -up" and watch miracles happen in their lives. We are so proud of Ryan and all the men who have made great success in our Men's Transitional Program.
