2021 FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT FEBRUARY 21st 2021

Dear Friends, welcome to the celebration of the first Sunday of Lent. Last Wednesday, the faithful started off with the Lenten journey that will bring us to the celebration of the Easter glory. The Readings called upon us to render our hearts as a sign of returning to the Lord. It called upon us to be prayerful around this time of Lent following the example of Jesus – 40 days of prayer and fasting in the desert. It also called upon us to fast from whatever we deem sacrificial as we endeavor to seek holiness and self- discipline. The Lenten message also called upon us to be generous with God has entrusted to us in order to help our needy brothers and sisters.

Commenting on what to fast, Pope Francis maintained:

Fast from hurting and say kind words.

Fast from sadness and be filled with gratitude.

Fast from anger and be filled with patience.

Fast from worries and have trust in God.

Fast from complaints and contemplate simplicity.

Fast from pressures and be prayerful.

Fast from bitterness and be compassionate.

Fast from grudges and be reconciled and fast from words and be silent and listen.

Prayer activity can take many forms. It can be a Scripture reading and make a reflection or meditation upon it. It may be personal prayer. It can be Adoration before the Blessed Sacrament. It may be praying the Stations of the Cross or can be praying the meditating on various mysteries. So let everyone endeavor to find time and space to pray as a way of overcoming the spiritual enemy.

In the Gospel Reading Mk 1: 12-15 speaks of Jesus being led to the desert by the Spirit. He stays 40 days and nights in the desert praying and fasting. While in the desert Jesus encounters Satan. We are also told the presence of the wild life that stays harmless to Jesus. God is with Jesus and the Angels are there to minister to his needs.

For us gathered to celebrate this first Sunday of Lent, what message do we take home with us? As people called to serve God as his disciples, we need the help of the Holy Spirit for inspiration and guidance as we travel in this desert with all its difficulties and hardships. We need the help of the Spirit as we battle fiercer spiritual forces than the wild beasts.

On his triumphant return from the desert experience, Jesus launches his public ministry with a message and call; "Repent and believe in the Good news." Let us around these 40 days seek to reconcile with God and neighbor. Have a fruitful Lent.
