MAKING GOD PROUD



We often ascribe to God our human emotions. In a way, that's good because it helps us in our relationship with God. So, since we human beings are proud when our friends and loved ones, for instance our children, perform very well (minus our envy and jealousy), we know that God is also proud of us when we, not only do what we are supposed to do, but do well, or excel. So, in the Gospel today,

from Matthew 3:13-17, after Jesus insists, humbly, that He too must be baptized to "fulfill all righteousness", His Father, Our Heavenly Father, is overjoyed and exclaims: "This is My beloved Son, with Whom I am well pleased."

In all we do, may Our Heavenly Father and Our Lord Jesus always, or at least most often exclaim, "That's my son/daughter, with whom I'm so pleased."

We have it in us to make God proud at all times. "My grace is sufficient for you" (2 Cor 12:9).

Be sure to say "thanks" to them. When we complement people, we encourage and empower them to do even more.

ORDINARY TIME OF THE YEAR

With the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord, we come to the end of the Christmas Season. If we have not done so already, we will reluctantly return to our daily, often monotonous routines: school, job, games, meetings, volunteer work, and whatever keeps us occupied from week to week. The snow, bone chilling weather, and icy, slippery roads will not make it any easier.

Spiritually and liturgically, we also return to what we call the Ordinary Time of the Year. It is the time of the year that doesn't have any major celebration. This year it begins on Monday, January 13th, and breaks off on Tuesday, March 4th, when the Lenten Season starts.

To help us gain a better and fruitful understanding of this period, I want to share an article I found in the Ordo. I hope it helps.

Wasted time is not a prized commodity in American society. We are a people ruled by the clock. Time is money because time is to be filled with purposeful controlled activity which is productive of things which can be sold. We are convinced that we must be in control of time. The last thing the productive American would want to do is waste time playing around with realities that do not produce a saleable commodity.

But the Creator of heaven and earth is described by the scriptures as the original and the best of players. Creative activity is playful, and creative people do not feel that what they do is a job. Creative people also have a sense that their creativity and all that they fashion in the creative spirit are gifts they have received.

This period we call the Ordinary Time is not very ordinary at all. Ordinary Time, the celebration of Sunday, is the identifying mark of the Christian community which comes together, remembering that on the first day of the week the Lord of Life was raised up and creation came at last to completion. Sunday as a day of play and worship is a sacrament of redeemed time. How we live Sunday proclaims to the world what we believe about redeemed time now and for ever.

What happens in our churches every Sunday is the fruit of our week. What happens, as the fruit of the week past is the beginning of the week to come. Sunday, like all sacraments, is simultaneously a point of arrival and departure for Christians on their way to the fullness of the kingdom. This is not ordinary at all. This is the fabric of Christian living.




PARISH BIBLE SHARING / STUDIES

THE NAME "JESUS"



Among the Hebrew people, one's name also said something important about one's character and history. The name "Adam," for example, meant both "man" and "dirt," showing both what Adam was and what he was made from.

In the case of our Lord, "Jesus" meant "God saves" in Hebrew. The name was doubly appropriate, since Jesus was both fully God and fully human, and died to save all from their sins. This choice subtly displayed both the nature of Jesus and the mission of His life. Ironically, "Jesus" was actually a very common name for boys during this time. In having such a common name with so profound meaning, Jesus also communicated that His mission was not only for the great, the wise and powerful, but also for the common and humble throughout the world.





Every season has its own safety challenges, but winter presents some that can have life-changing consequences.

Here are some timely reminders:

- 1. Inspect space heater cords before using and keep children and pets away from any units in use.
- 2. Make sure that furnaces, fireplaces, and wood stoves are venting properly and install at least one carbon monoxide detector in your home.
- 3. Keep a winter emergency kit (blanket, flashlight, water, snack bars, road salt, emergency flares, bright colored flag, shovel) in your car.
- 4. Shovel safely: don't overexert; do a little at a time; when using power equipment keep scarves, coats, and winter clothing away from machinery.
- 5. If confined to home, do some simple indoor exercise each day to maintain mobility.
