Lewis currently serves in the Colorado Legislature representing the 64th District and serves on the Colorado House Agriculture, Livestock & Natural Resources Committee and the Colorado House Public Health Care & Human Services Committee. She has spent much of her time and resources working to agriculture interests and to preserve property rights. Lewis has received numerous special awards and recognitions by property rights' organizations.
