Directors Statement

Over this fiscal year, Safe and Fear-Free Environment, Inc. (SAFE) has been slowly opening its doors from a long two-year pandemic. SAFE will continue to keep some of its protocols in place in the event that they are needed.

A big accomplishment for SAFE for FY2022 was our retention. We did not lose any key staff in full time positions over the year. SAFE staff worked hard throughout the pandemic, and continued to provide services to clients the best way that we could. There were times that we were uncertain about keeping our doors open due to several staff contracting COVID-19, but they pushed through and everyone pulled together even harder to keep our doors open. That really says a lot for the people who work here and their dedication to the clients they serve.

At our last Basic Orientation Advocacy Training (BOAT) in Dillingham a participant made a statement that the BOAT training needed to be expanded to the villages. So SAFE began planning village BOAT's. SAFE decided that we would not go into villages without being invited by the village. The first village based BOAT was planned for King Salmon in May 2022.

The Bristol Bay Native Association, Family Violence Prevention & Services Act Program in partnership with SAFE that provides funding dedicated to support emergency shelters and related assistance for victims of domestic violence and their children. This grant has had a great impact on our clients in the Bristol Bay regional. SAFE has been able to support local and community-based domestic violence program with technical assistance addressing emerging issues such as trauma-informed care, culturally specific domestic specific domestic violence services.

SAFE will be working and assisting regional upcoming and emerging shelters for our villages. This grant is able to assist with all the shelter supplies that are needed to open shelters and assist with operating costs.

SAFE staff would like to thank our current Board for all the support they have given to our clients, staff, and Bristol Bay, and we look forward to what is to come. Quyana, Thank you very much.







Safe and Fear-Free Environment Inc is a victim advocacy organization operating throughout the Bristol Bay region since 1982. SAFE works to prevent violence with a focus on interrupting sexual and power based violence in Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault situations. SAFE's service area includes Dillingham and the 33 villages and tribes with a population of about 8000. SAFE works in the traditional lands of the Yupik, Aleut, and Denaina people

IMMEDIATE SAFETY/SHELTER

A 16-bed shelter for victims of domestic violence and/or sexual assault or whose homes/living arrangements are unsafe due to violence and/or related abuse.

SART - Sexual Assault Response Team and CAC - Nitiput Child Advocacy Center (coordinated medical, law enforcement, prosecution and advocacy response to adult and child victims of sexual assault for immediate safety and intervention).

Assistance with protective orders and other law enforcement and/or court action and access to civil/legal representation.

Referral and assistance from village based staff, volunteers and interveners for safe shelter and emergency services.

Safety planning, safety checks and victim's safety monitoring.

SISTRs Support Group weekly talking circle

A 24-hour toll free crisis line monitored by trained staff and volunteers. Crisis Intervention information and referral.

Advocacy & Accompaniment (Individual) includes medical, public assistance, social services

Transportation to the shelter and medical, legal, and social services

Assistance and information on filing for Victims of Violent Crime Composition.

OUTREACH AND EDUCATION

Outreach services to all Bristol Bay area villages.

Personal safety classes for community schools, agencies, etc.

Training for community volunteers, agencies, employers, members of the faith community, law enforcement, health care providers, persons and groups that work with children, etc.

Training provided in advocacy, service provision and prevention of domestic violence, sexual assault, child abuse and neglect, abuse and neglect of vulnerable adults, sexual harassment prevention, crisis intervention, workplace safety, and village based interventions, including tribal court procedures for cases involving sexual assault and/or family violence and improving the health care system's response to domestic violence and sexual assault.


