SRCA Hosts Tucker Candidate Forum

Smoke Rise Community Association (SRCA) hosted a political event on February 8th highlighting the candidates vying for seats in District 1 in the newly formed city of Tucker. There will be three districts in Tucker and District 1 encompasses all of Smoke Rise. All three mayoral candidates, as well as the three candidates running for city council seats, had a five-minute opportunity to introduce themselves and their platforms. This was followed by an audience-generated Q & A session moderated by Pam Heisler, Vice President of SRCA.

Mayoral candidates include two residents of Smoke Rise: Frank Auman of Pheasant Run and Bruce Jackson of Princewill Drive. The third candidate vying for the mayor's office is Lorne Cheek of Shady Lane in Tucker.

Our district will be divided into Post 1 and 2 for the city council seats. Honey Van De Kreke of Mountain Creek Drive is running unopposed for the Post 1 vacancy. Two candidates face off for Post 2 - John Carr of Patriot Drive and William (Bill) Rosenfeld of Leatherstocking Lane.

Election Day is March 1st, the same day as the Presidential primary. Early voting began February 8th and concluded February 26th.

Over 300 neighbors attended the session which was held in the Fellowship Hall of Smoke Rise Baptist Church. The proceedings were videotaped in their entirety and are posted on the Smoke Rise Georgia 30087 Facebook page. What's Next for Tucker?

On March 1, the new government consisting of a mayor and six council people, two from each



district, will have been elected. They will have a lot of work to do as soon as the election is over. There are a lot of hours to be invested.

Much like setting up a new business, a couple of the first things to be done will be to get a phone number and communications set up, including email. First meetings are likely to be in borrowed conference rooms of banks, hotels, churches and other places as there will not yet be a city hall.

While the search for a city hall location may be important, it will not be the most important item on the agenda. All contracts for services that are contracted through the county will need to be drafted, negotiated and put in place to retain police, fire, water, sanitation and other foundation services.

Other services and hiring of employees to take care of the business of the city will not be long after that. Decisions will need to be made on a cost/benefit and needs fulfilled basis for hiring whether contract or city employees.

The city will need to establish banking relationships and set up accounts. Initially

the city will not have tax revenue and will have to work with the banks for operating funds. This is not unusual, and because the banks can see revenue after July 1, is usually not a problem.

A magistrate court will need to be set up and most likely be a traveling magistrate and court set up in temporary locations on a schedule rather than a permanent court. The case load initially will be light, but with planning and zoning being one of the Tucker City services, it will be needed before too long.

The new mayor and councilpersons will have a lot of work to do on the set up, the details and initial governance. Fortunately there are sources for training and assistance that will make it easier but not simple.

The county has already begun preparing a duplicate tax record for each property in the new city in preparation for billing and division of revenue. Should you do a search, you will see one record for Tucker (incorporated) and DeKalb unincorporated. These are duplicates, but needed until the city is officially operational.

An item of interest to note: the water department already recognizes the incorporation, and res-idents of the new city are no longer required to comply with the low flow compliance that only applies to unincorporated areas of DeKalb.

Homeowners selling are no longer required to change out fixtures prior to a buyer being able to get water service. This has long been considered an unfair item of compliance as with the exception for incorporated areas, the reason behind the compliance was negated.



Summit Residents Approve Pool Project; Elect Board Members

The Summit's recent Annual Homeowners Meeting featured committee reports recognizing 2015 achievements and plans for 2016. The treasurer's report by Al Pilkinton showed positive financial results for 2015, with a strong cash reserve fund. The residents approved the 2016 budget, including a \$25,000 project to resurface and re-tile the pool. Since 2003, the Summit has invested over \$100,000 in capital improvements, including a pool pavilion, resurfacing the tennis courts, building a retaining wall, installing electronic access system, adding a saline filtration system and now the complete pool restoration. The strong participation of Summit residents and consistent pool and tennis membership have created a solid financial base to support the improvements. The electronic entry system now allows members to take advantage of extended pool and tennis hours with the same secure access card.

The business meeting concluded with the election of board members for 2016. 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
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Jawbones vs Sawbones to Raise Funds for Side by Side Brain **Injury Clubhouse**

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




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SRES Collects Coins for Cancer Research

GSU Biobus Visits Smoke Rise Elementary School


Have you ever heard of a moving science laboratory? On January 29th and February 5th, the Georgia State University Biobus visited Smoke Rise Elementary. This "Biobus" is a traveling science lab sponsored by Georgia State University. GSU graduate students majoring in the sciences organize and teach the hands-on, minds-on lessons. Smoke Rise students participated in lessons on genetics. They planted squash seeds and compared the growth rate of seeds with mutated genes with seeds that had healthy genes. Math was incorporated into the lesson. Students created graphs to compare the growth rates of the plants. Models of DNA were used to show the structure of DNA, and in turn, the students were required to make their own models. In addition, the students extracted DNA from pea plants.

The students had a fantastic time, and the graduate fellows were very complimentary towards SRES students. SRES is looking forward to this continued partnership with GSU, which has provided enrichment to the STEM program and science curriculum.

STEM Capstone Project at SRES

Green Engineering and Sustainability is the S.T.E.M. capstone project for the students of Smoke Rise Elementary. All students have been studying water pollution and conservation. It's a Dirty Business; Illegal Dumping in Smoke Rise

Illegal dumping has become an increasingly large problem throughout our country. DeKalb County is no exception and has also fallen victim to this unpleasant fact. Offenders are tricky, often dumping late at night to avoid detection. What do they dump? Everything from garbage, discarded appliances, abandoned automobiles, construction and demolition debris, hazardous materials, and other waste. At best it's unsightly and at worst, it endangers our public health. Why do they do it? Most offenders don't want to pay the cost or

expend the time for proper waste disposal. However, those who are found guilty of illegal dumping can face up to \$25,000.00 in fines, or a prison sentence of up to two years, or both (depending on the type of material dumped, the quantity, and the number of prior offenses).

Some of you in the Smoke Rise area have noticed transportation crews digging along the



entrance ramp from Hugh Howell to Highway 78 West. This is the result of a Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) project that is now more than 75% completed. It stems from an investigation into the illegal dumping of dirt and debris at this Smoke Rise/Tucker area as well as other metro Atlanta sites. After all the mess has been cleared at Hugh Howell and Hwy. 78, GDOT says the contractor awarded the project, C&S Paving Company, will plant trees in an attempt to restore the area. The expected completion date for this project is March 31.

Shun L. Pringle, GDOT District Construction Engineer/Metro Atlanta, provided a statement from the Georgia Department of Transportation regarding this matter:

"The Georgia DOT has been informed that the GBI and the FBI have concluded an on-going investigation of illegal disposal of dirt/debris in DeKalb County. Georgia DOT has cooperated fully with all agencies involved in the investigation to ensure that those responsible for illegal actions are held accountable. As a result, the GDOT employees who were subjects in this investigation were terminated by the Department. We are appalled by the corrupt actions of these lone individuals that in no way reflect the hard work and commitment displayed by more than 4,100 GDOT employees. We will exercise all legal actions to recover the costs associated with cleaning up these sites and ensure that every effort is made to correct the damage to the impacted sites once the investigation is closed." If you see illegal dumping - or the results of illegal dumping - contact your local law enforcement agency to report violations. With the public's help, law enforcement and justice officials can more effectively prosecute dumping violators and work toward cleaning up our communities.

ANTHROPOMORPHISM – WHAT IS THAT?

The month of March contains National Wildlife Week, making it an excellent time to educate children about wild animals. Not only just simple facts what lives where, what eats what - but in particular, a lesson about (and against) anthropomorphism.

It is an unfortunate tendency of humans to ascribe our own qualities to animals. This is known anthropomorphism. We cast wild creatures as noble or ignoble, heroes or



villains, based on our own natures and biases. Take, for exam-

ple, the snake, considered throughout the Western world to be a wicked, crafty animal who always leads others astray, as in the Biblical story of Eden. Or The Lion King, in which one African predator is

portrayed as majestic and sympathetic, while another is cast in contrast as a cowardly, vile, "slobbering mangy stupid poacher." Sharks are mean, dolphins are nice. Mice are nice, rats are bad. There are countless more examples, but the point is, this is not reality. Animals are only animals, and have such qualities of good or evil to them, regardless of how beautiful they are or how disgusting their habits seem to us. Children, however, are even more likely than adults to believe otherwise, as it is media aimed at children that practices anthropomorphism the most.

This can be dangerous for both children and animals. A child who expects wild bunnies and deer to be sweet pets right out of Bambi may try to approach and touch them, and end up bitten or worse. A buck that is in rut can be deadly aggressive, as can a

while one certainly doesn't want opossums and coyotes sniffing around the garbage cans beside the house, it's also not right to try to harm the animal (who is only in search of a free meal) because it's not as sympathetically cute as other critters. If more people learned this at an early age, perhaps we would not have so many harmless shark species hunted for no other reason than that they are perceived as evil maneaters, when it fact only a few species are at all dangerous to human beings. In a world that is increasingly separate from nature, urban and suburban people become that much more inclined to believe such

myths, since they don't

encounter real animals as

much as humans once did.

Yet as urban and suburban

areas encroach farther and



farther into once-wild territory, these animals are now more likely to appear in our backyards - because we've invaded theirs!

Wild animals are simply that: wild. They don't behave like pets because they are good, nor deliberately seek to attack mankind because they are evil. They should be regarded with respect whatever their species, which is to say, left alone. If visitors from the woods drop into your yard, it's best that children learn this sooner rather than later. Don't try to pet the deer, don't run after the coyote with sticks, don't regard any creature as having traits that it simply does not, and leave them be. Instead, teach children about the REAL traits that animals have, so they have a better appreciation for what they are, rather than what we imagine them to

- •Melt 1 cup shortening (or lard) in a saucepan on very low heat.

There is a Georgia law that states that the county cannot assess your property (for property tax purposes) for the year following the year that you purchased the property higher than what you paid for the property. However, I see this law being routinely ignored by the taxing authorities. So, if you purchased your home in either 2014 or 2015 – take a look at your tax bill for the year following the year of your purchase - if your assessment is higher than what you paid for your property, it is an illegal assessment and you have the right to have it changed.

This law is statewide and applies to all county taxing authorities throughout the State of Georgia.

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Tax Preparation, Part II by Harry Strack

Last month I discussed some general thoughts on using a tax preparer versus filing by yourself. I also



discussed Obama Care and health insurance rules. This month I have a few sundry thoughts that might help when you work on filling out your tax forms. Hopefully, these thoughts will help you to be ready for that looming April 15th tax-filing deadline. And you might even save some money.

It's almost always better for married people to file a joint return as opposed to filing separately. If the couple would otherwise be entitled to claim child care and/or earned income credits, the credits cannot be claimed if filing separately.

Individuals who are claimed as dependents on other filers' returns have a special standard deduction rate and cannot claim the personal exemption of \$4,000. If a child has unearned income (interest, dividends, etc.) in excess of \$2,100, the tax is computed at the highest rate of the parents' return. The parents have the option of claiming the child's income on their returns.

Taxpayers can claim a standard deduction or itemized deduction, whichever is greater. If the standard deduction exceeds the itemized deductions, in some cases it may be more advantageous to elect to claim the itemized deductions. The state standard deduction is much less than the federal, and the reduction in state tax may exceed the increase in federal tax. Calculating both methods may result in less combined taxes.

If you receive a notice from the IRS or state concerning your return, be sure to immediately provide a copy to your preparer so that he can address the issue. Surprisingly, the taxing authorities are not always right. Don't automatically pay any penalty or interest you are assessed. There is a First Time Abatement program that may enable you to have the penalty waived if you have not had prior penalties on the same subject in the last three years.

Be sure to file your returns on time by the original or extended due date, even if you can't pay the tax. There are substantial increased penalties for returns filed over 60 days late.

Gifts not in excess of \$14,000 per person are not taxable to either the donee or donor. A married couple can make a gift of \$28,000 for any reason to an individual with no tax consequences.

The exclusion amount for gifts and estates is \$5,430,000 for 2015. There is no estate tax to a surviving spouse.

If you are 70½ years old, you can take tax-free distributions from an IRA of up to \$100,000 to a charity, eliminating the tax on the distribution.

I hope these suggestions help you as you try to navigate the often-confusing array of tax rules. Do not wait until the last minute to file your taxes and happy filing!!



Mountain Mums Meeting

After the brunch and business meeting, Lyle Collins, Smoke Rise resident and owner of Southern Trillium, gave the Mountain Mums Garden Club a great program called "Garden Photography". Clearly an experienced and enthusiastic photographer, he took us through dozens of photographs from his own garden, client's gardens and botani-

cal gardens around the country, showing us the characteristics of a good photograph.

Here are a few tips he shared with our group. These tips work with any camera.

1. The Best Light:
Morning or late
afternoon will give
the best pictures.
High noon is the
worst time of day
to take a picture
because things in

the shadow look black and contrast is very high.

- 2. Get your knees dirty: Don't be afraid to use new perspectives. Get low to the ground and look up when you are photographing a flower, etc.
- 3. Reflectors, polarizers and flashes can help with lighting issues.
- 4. The rule of thirds: Draw an imaginary 9 square grid over your picture. Align important objects of interest in the intersections of the squares. This causes the main subject to stand out.
- 5. Try before and after pictures of the same shot or scene.
- 6. Take garden photos at different times of the year.
- 7. Try garden specimen in a vase, take the vase outdoors and photograph against different backdrops... then crop out the vase.
- 8. Composition is important. Some subjects 'require' symmetry- like an Italian garden. Other subjects look best using the rule of thirds, or an unusual perspective.
- 9. While Lyle owns and uses a number of good quality cameras and lenses, he also suggested that photos from most cell phone cameras can be enhanced to get a more high-end picture. Two examples of free applications that can help with this enhancement are: photoshop express and adobe photoshop.

HODGE PODGE

I am a ranter. You already know this and I admire your eventempered and gracious acceptance of most of the malarkey that I put in this column. Sometimes I use you as my personal psychiatrist and I should be ashamed but I'm not. Here's what is a shame.....soup bowls that aren't microwave proof. This is a new century, right? A modern century, right? Isn't nearly everything ok for the microwave now? Except metal? Did the bowls say, "Don't under any circumstance get this bowl hot from any source warmer than melted ice cream?" NO. They had no warning. So I simply microwaved both the soup and the bowl itself to a virtual cauldron of what can only be called magma con carne. They are pottery bowls, nice and brown and lovely. They hide a dark secret of pain, disappointment and hot fingers. I actually should have looked on the bottom of the bowls first because - get this - the brand name was "Furio" as in furious: restrained energy - intensely violent. I created my own chili tsunami hydrogen bomb. So speaking of hot, I'm going with a sort of Cajun theme this month. I think March needs Etouffée and pecans and some zydeco music.

First is a Chicken Etouffée dish. Etouffée means "smothered", so you serve this over rice. It is a rather violent idea, actually.

Chicken Etouffée

2 chicken breasts, cut into small cubes

1 small onion, 1 green pepper and ½ cup celery, all finely diced (this is called the Holy trinity of Cajun cooking)

2 Tablespoons chopped green onions

½ Tablespoon minced garlic

1/2 Tablespoon Cajun seasoning (like Tony Chachere's®)

½ stick butter

2/3 cup flour

2/3 cup oil

2 cans chicken broth

Ok, sauté chicken in a little olive oil until done. Add onions, pepper and celery and cook until vegetables are soft. Add green onions, garlic, seasoning and butter. While this is cooking away, in another pan make your roux, using flour and oil. Cook over low heat until brown, about the color of a light brown paper bag. Don't let it get too brown. Add the roux to the chicken mixture and mix well. Add broth and cook about 30 minutes. Serve hot over rice.

Black-Eyed Pea Gumbo with Sausage

1 pound smoked sausage, chopped

1 onion, 1 green pepper and 2 cups celery, all chopped

2 cups chicken broth

2 cups water

4 cans black-eyed peas

2 cans Rotel®

1 can diced tomatoes with juice

2 cloves garlic, finely chopped

2 Tablespoons Cajun seasoning

Heat a little oil in a large saucepan and cook sausage. Remove it and add to the same pan the onion, pepper and celery and cook til they are soft in the oil left in pan. Add sausage back to pan with rest of ingredients. Bring to a boil, reduce heat to low and simmer 45 minutes to an hour. Add more water if you think it's too thick. Serve with rice and hot bread.

Turtle Bars

Crust: 2 cups plain flour 1 cup brown sugar

1 stick butter (use real butter)

Caramel layer: 2/3 cup butter (real stuff)

1 cup pecan halves
1/2 cup brown sugar

1 cup milk chocolate chips

Mix crust ingredients with pastry cutter or fork and pat firmly into ungreased 9x13 pan. Sprinkle pecans over crust. In a heavy saucepan, combine brown sugar and butter. Cook and stir constantly until entire surface begins to boil. Continue to boil for 45 seconds to 1 minute. Pour evenly over crust and pecans. Bake at 350° for 18-22 minutes until bubbly and golden brown. Sprinkle with chips and cool completely. This won't work with margarine. Ask me how I know.
