GENERAL RULES

- 1. **TRAFFIC REGULATIONS**: Absolutely no parking on roadway. Any person obstructing any fire lane, drive or street with any vehicle will be requested by the police to remove the vehicle immediately. Failure to do so will result in expulsion from the grounds and/or arrest. PARKING IN FRONT OF EXHIBIT BUILDINGS, EXHIBITS, GRANDSTAND, AND MIDWAY CONCESSIONS WILL NOT BE TOLERATED. AMPLE PARKING SPACE IS PROVIDED FOR ALL VEHICLES. SPECIAL AREAS HAVE BEEN DESIGNATED FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS, CAMPERS, EMPLOYEES AND OFFICIALS. ALL VIOLATORS WILL BE TOWED AT OWNER'S EXPENSE.
- 2. RECREATIONAL AND OTHER VEHICLES: No person shall be allowed to bring or use upon the Fairgrounds, any motor scooter, motorbike, motorcycle, coaster sled, skateboard, roller skates, rollerblades, bike, ATV, golf cart or diminutive vehicle upon the Fairgrounds during the period of the Fair without the approval of the Fair Board. Such policy does not include wheelchairs or other medically necessary devices or vehicles to be used by Fair Board directors in their duties.
- 3. **TRAILERS**: Livestock trailers must be parked in designated area. Violators will be towed at owner's expense.
 - After unloading livestock, check with superintendents for instructions on parking trailers.
 - Parking is prohibited in the livestock area between 2 pm and 9 pm Monday through Saturday. (Only exception is for loading and unloading livestock.) Vehicles in violation will be towed at owner's expense.
- 4. **GROUNDS REGULATIONS:** No outside coolers, cans, or bottles will be allowed on the Fairgrounds except for the use by campers in the campgrounds. Coolers, cans and bottles will be confiscated at the gate. Proper clothing must be worn on Fairgrounds. Patrons must wear shoes and shirt, or risk expulsion from the grounds.
- 5. **ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES:** Alcoholic beverages, except as may be used by campers in the campgrounds, will be permitted only in the beer barn and grandstand areas and must be purchased from vendors on the Fairgrounds.
- 6. **PETS:** Absolutely **no pets**, including any type of animal, shall be allowed on the Fairgrounds during the period of the fair without the approval of the Fair Board. Animals for the handicapped are excluded. **This includes the campgrounds.**
- 7. **SOLICITATIONS:** Solicitation of any type, including the distribution of trinkets, flyers, pamphlets, baubles, or other merchandise or material shall not be allowed without having been requested or invited to do so and approved by formal action of the Northeast Missouri Fair Board.
- 8. **VAGRANCY:** Vagrancy is not allowed on the grounds.
- 9. **OVERNIGHT:** Persons staying on the grounds overnight must present a ticket or entry pass when asked to do so by the Fair Board.
- 10. **SMOKING:** NO SMOKING in livestock barn by order of the City Fire Marshall.
- 11. **CLAIMS FOR INJURY:** No claims for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted, nor suit instituted or maintained against the NEMO Fair, or its officers or their agents, representatives, volunteers, or employees. If any damage, loss, or injury to person or property shall be caused by reason of any neglect or willful acts of any persons, firm, or corporation or their agents, representatives, volunteers, or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on said fairgrounds, or occupying a space thereon the NEMO Fair shall, in no manner, be responsible therefore, and in case it be subject to any expenses or liability all persons causing same or liable therefore, shall indemnify the said NEMO Fair.

UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES WILL THE NEMO FAIR BE RESPONSIBLE FOR DEATH, THEFT, DAMAGE, OR INJURY TO ANY PERSONS, ANIMAL, ARTICLE OR VEHICLE.

- 12. **RESERVATION OF RIGHTS:** The NEMO Fair Association Board of Directors reserves the right to do the following:
 - a. Reject any entry.
 - b. Continue, discontinue, or cancel the fair due to bad weather, unfavorable, or unavoidable conditions.
 - c. Suspend, amend or add general rules/regulations without notice.

INDIVIDUALS VIOLATING ABOVE POLICIES WILL BE REQUIRED TO LEAVE FAIRGROUNDS.

Camping Rules and Procedures

- 1. Camping spots not paid by March 31st will be released to the general public. Reservations may be made by calling Jim Keim at (660) 341-5310. PAYMENTS: Must be mailed to P.O. Box 287 Kirksville, MO 63501, Jim Keim: 17151 West Lone Pine Dr., Queen City, MO 63561 or brought to the Fair Office by Appointment.
- 2. Camping spaces will be numbered and specific spaces may be requested. Campers will be assigned a numbered space and must be parked in that assigned space.
- 3. The camping rate will be \$160.00 (30 amp campers).
- 4. Campers moved onto the grounds before July 17, 2022 will be assessed an additional fee of \$20.00.
- 5. Campers must be removed no later than 5:00 P.M., July 25, 2022 or additional nights can be purchased at \$20.00 (30 amp) and \$25.00 (50 amp) per night. Pets must be removed by July 18, 2022.
- 6. No stock trailers are allowed in the campgrounds unless equipped as campers. All stock trailers must be parked in the designated area or they will be towed at owner's expense.
- 7. You may purchase 1 extra tag for \$20.00. Vehicles parked in the campgrounds **MUST** have a hang tag or be subject to towing at the owner's expense. **NO REPLACEMENT HANG TAGS WILL BE PROVIDED**.
- 8. No advertising, sales, flea markets, solicitations, etc., shall be allowed in the campgrounds without prior approval by formal action of the Fair Board.
- 9. Campers are responsible for rules concerning the campground under General Rules. Please contact Jim Keim at (660) 341-5310 with any camping questions when on the Fairgrounds.
- 10. Campers or anyone going to the campgrounds must use **Gate 2 from 12 pm 11 pm ONLY**. **Gate 1 from 11 pm Noon the following day.**

PETS: ABSOLUTELY NO PETS, INCLUDING ANY TYPE OF ANIMAL, ARE ALLOWED IN THE CAMPGROUNDS DURING THE PERIOD OF THE FAIR. NO DOGS WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE CAMPGROUNDS STARTING JULY 19, 2022.

RECREATIONAL & OTHER VEHICLES: No person shall be allowed to bring or use upon the Fairgrounds, any motor scooter, motorbike, motorcycle, coaster sled, skateboard, roller skates, roller blades, bike, ATV, golf cart or diminutive vehicle during the period of the Fair without the approval of the Fair Board. Such policy does not include wheelchairs or other medically necessary devices or vehicles to be used by Fair Board Directors in their duties.

POOLS: DUE TO INSURANCE LIABILITY, ABSOLUTELY NO POOLS OF ANY KIND WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE CAMPGROUND.

- **GROUNDS REGULATIONS:** No outside coolers, cans, bottles will be allowed on the Fairgrounds except as may be used by campers in the campgrounds only. Coolers, cans and bottles will be confiscated at the gate. Proper clothing must be worn on Fairgrounds. Patrons must wear shoes and shirt, or risk expulsion from the grounds.
- **ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES:** Alcoholic beverages, except as may be used by campers in the campgrounds, will be permitted only in the beer garden and grandstand areas and must be purchased from vendors on the Fairgrounds.




The Comancheros

Friday, July 22, 2022 Opening for Little Texas

Richard Young, from The Kentucky Headhunters, says The Comancheros are "ZZ Top goes Star Wars."

The Comancheros are known for bringing to the stage some of the highest energy performances in the business. They bottled up that fury to produce their first full length release, "Heavy & Western," followed by "Too Old to Die Young Now." Now Richard Young, of the infamous Kentucky Headhunters, produced "Memphis to Mexico" which releasing 11/12/2021.

Playing non-stop since 2015, they've stormed the stage with Randy Rogers, The Cadillac Three, Drake White, The Steel Woods, Alabama, Whiskey Myers, Blackberry Smoke, and the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band. These experiences have sharpened their spurs and inspired the band to create a sound that exemplifies what it means to be a modern-day cowboy: heavy and western.

Little Texas

Friday, July 22, 2022

As part of the Young Country movement of the early '90s, Little Texas were responsible for shaking up the country music world with a new, energetic sound that fused the look and attitude of modern rock music with traditional country themes and styles, bringing a much appreciated bolt of life into the genre. For their efforts, country fans the world over richly rewarded the band, buying up over 7 million of their albums, while critics showered them with 3 Grammy nominations plus honors from both the Academy of Country Music (Vocal Group Of The Year) and the Country Music Association (Album Of The Year).

Their first radio release in 1991, "Some Guys Have All The Love," became a Top-10 hit, as did their next single, "First Time For Everything." After the album First Time For Everything was released, five singles reached the top of the charts. The second album, Big Time, truly was the big time for Little Texas.

The sophomore release, which has sold more than three million copies to date, spawned three No. 1 singles -"What Might Have Been," "God Blessed Texas" and "My Love" - and captured the group's first CMT Award, a Billboard award, a Radio & Records award and their first Grammy nomination.

Early in their career, Little Texas was designated as an arena act. They first signed on as an opener on an arena tour headlined by Clint Black. Later, they traveled with Travis Tritt and Trisha Yearwood on a tour sponsored by Budweiser. After that, they were on their own, with Crown Royal, singing to packed arenas across the United States and Canada. During this time, the band played a part in Common Thread: The Songs of The Eagles, which later earned their first Country Music Association trophy for "Album Of The Year."

The group's cover of "Peaceful Easy Feeling" charted well; albeit, without an official release, and with that, Little Texas broke another record in country music history: three different songs on three different charts with three different lead singers, all at the same time. It is a feat that has never been repeated since by any band. The year 1994 also brought the lineup an Academy of Country Music Award for "Vocal Group of the Year."

Little Texas released their Kick A Little album, and their first true arena-headlining tour began, supported by Keebler and newcomer Tim McGraw with opening act BlackHawk. The tour and the album were huge successes, highlighted by shows in Detroit and Minneapolis, where they sold out the arenas just days after their heroes, The Eagles, had played the same venues. The tour continued on through 1995, finishing as the fifth largest-grossing tour of the year, and over the course of '94 and '95, the band received two more Grammy nominations and released Little Texas-Greatest Hits.

After the self-titled Little Texas album was released, Little Texas, the players, needed a break following years of performing a relentless concert schedule. Thus, at the end of 1997, each member went his separate way, opting to spend time with family and friends, and work on individual projects.

Says bassist-vocalist Duane Propes: "At that point it was time for our loved ones to have us back for a while. It all happened for a reason."

In 2004, the multi-platinum band's four original members—Propes, Porter Howell (lead vocals and lead guitar), Dwayne O'Brien (vocals and rhythm guitars) and Del Gray (drums) rebuilt the franchise with a completely new sound and they couldn't have been happier to be back on tour and bringing fans what they do best.

"Everybody still has a 'What Might Have Been,' there's always a 'First Time For Everything,' and folks still want to 'Kick A Little,' so we decided to take the party back on the road," shares Propes, referring to the group's continued rotation at radio and generations of both old and new fans that keep the band playing their classics and putting out new music.

In summer 2007, Little Texas returned to the airwaves, country charts and music video playlists with an album titled Missing Years. In typical Little Texas style, the band broke the rules yet again, choosing to unleash TWO new albums within the span of a month, including the band's first live album, The Very Best of Little Texas: Live & Loud.

Currently, the lineup's on the concert circuit celebrating its official 24th year on the radio since their first single, "Some Guys Have All The Love," hit the airwaves in 1991. The music the band has generated over the years is timeless, and has been featured on hundreds of television programs and sporting events including Good Morning America, American Idol, Don't Forget The Words, America's Got Talent & HBO's "True Blood," while "God Blessed Texas" has been the theme music for the Texas Ford Dealers commercials since 1998.

This year, Little Texas is breaking new sonic ground with the release of their 8th album, Young For A Long Time. Undoubtedly the band has never sounded more confident, as the chorus of the titular lead off track proudly declares, "Don't you know by now we've got this down / That Friday night fire still hasn't gone out / We got a rock solid life and a rock n' roll state of mind / We were born to run / So sit down, son / We'll show you just how it's done / 'Cause we've been young for a long time." The musicianship has only improved with age as well with Porter Howell truly coming into his own as the band's lead vocalist in addition to his dazzling lead guitar work, and backed by the always solid playing of drummer Del Gray. "Young For A Long Time pretty much runs the gamut of everything we've ever done, plus takes us down some new roads as well," Propes continues, "the vocals are there, the guitar work is there, the party songs are there, the 'make you cry' love songs, the songs about Texas. We even dive off into swamp rock and torch music, so each song has a totally different fuel behind it."

"The four of us appreciate each other and still have a ball on stage," says drummer Gray of the band's chemistry on stage after all this time. "There is a comfort level that happens to us when we play together that can only happen with 20-something years of experience."

Country music recording artist, Jason Brown, has performed for hundreds of thousands of music fans across the Midwest. It is because of their continuing support, his dedication to the fans, and his loyalty and love for the music industry that Jason Brown is one of country music's up and coming, innovative artists. Jason Brown has charted 5 songs consistently on the Billboard and MediaBase

Country Charts. "Momma Was A Rebel," "Touchdown," "I'd Love You To Hate Me," "You Don't Play Fair," and "We're All In The Same Boat". Brown has performed with country's leading artists including Blake Shelton, Rascal Flatts, Trace Adkins, Alan Jackson, Gary Alan, Luke Bryan, The Band Perry, Chris Young, Lee Brice, Randy Houser, Easton Corbin, and Little Big Town, to name a few.

Jason Brown was born in the heart of the Midwest; three miles outside of Pella, Iowa, from a bloodline of truck drivers, coal miners, and farmers. Like others in the Midwest, on Sunday mornings the family got together and would go into town for church. At the age of four, this is where his Grandma Ruth heard a voice. She knew there would be one there, she was just waiting for the right time; A voice she helped Jason discover and develop sitting with him at the piano after the farm chores were done. Jason recalls the first two songs he sang in front of a crowd on stage were "It Is No Secret" and "I've Got A Mansion Just Over the Hilltop." Gospel and traditional country songs, to this day, are some of Jason's favorite songs to sing. Jason says, "It takes me back to my family and the church members singing. When I was younger there was always a gospel hymn or country song playing or being sung."

Being raised in the country and working with his grandpa on the farm made country music the natural fit. By the age of six, Jason was singing whenever he could. At the age of 14, Jason and his brother moved to Corpus Christi, Texas with their mom. It wasn't long until Jason was singing in south Texas and touring with his church youth group through Texas, Arizona, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Georgia, and Florida during the summers.

After a few years in Texas, Jason then moved to Pleasantville, IA to live with his dad and started touring the Midwest fair circuit thanks to Beth Hunter and the Jim Dandy Band. This was the start of Jason's love of being on the road meeting and performing for Country Music fans. After a year of learning some of the ropes, Jason fronted his first band, Country Persuasion. Throughout the years he fronted other bands such as Harvest, Stormfront, Big Rig, and Red Rock. Jason says, "I'll remember every single person I have been in a band with because I carry a small piece of every one of them with me. Each one, in their own way, bad or good, helped me become the person I am today and helped me get to where I am." During the Red Rock days, a gentleman named Steve heard Jason and believed he could help him go to the next step. Jason burst onto the Iowa Country music scene with the release of his "DREAM" album. Numerous hit singles on Country music stations built a broad and loyal fan base throughout the Midwest that has continued to turn out to hear him sing at fairs and festivals as well as more intimate venues.

With continued focus, Jason is building on the foundation of his debut project. Whether backed by a full band or with just a guitar, Jason's songs combine equal parts musical and vocal excellence: proclaiming a love of all things Midwest. "This is an amazing journey that has brought me to an amazing place in my life, I've found a respect for other artists I've never had before. I thank God for the talents and responsibilities he's given me and the power of how a song can change a person's life. I see some of my friends winning awards and such and I am so happy for them. If we make it there someday that would be great, but to me, the best reward for what I do is finding that perfect song that tells the story of how I'm feeling or says what I want to say. It's a lot of hard work, with long hours and tremendous sacrifices at times, but it's what I love, it's who I am. As long as my family and fans keep singing along with me, I'll keep singing with them," Jason says.

Easton Corbin

Saturday, July 23, 2022

Easton Corbin has been gracing stages with his memorable baritone and unique blend of traditional and modern country music for more than a decade. The Florida native, who boasts two No. 1 singles with "A Little More Country Than That" and "Roll With It," embarks on a new musical chapter with his recent signing to Stone Country Records. Corbin teams with industry veterans Benny Brown, Paul Brown and Jason

Sellers as the label's flagship artist.

Corbin says he and Music Row mainstay Benny Brown initially met and bonded over their mutual love of traditional country music. No stranger to the writing room himself, Corbin has penned songs with Sellers ahead of signing with the independent label. The singer, who has spent several years as an independent artist following nearly a decade with Mercury Nashville, says he's in a great position being Stone Country's flagship artist.

"They let me do what I want to do and let me be me, which is very important," the singer says.

Corbin's neotraditional sound shines through on "I Can't Decide," his debut single for the label. Soaring pedal steel and ear-grabbing fiddle accompaniment combined with a driving beat, plucked guitar rhythms and Corbin's warm baritone further accentuate the up-tempo song.

Corbin wrote "I Can't Decide" three years ago with producer Wade Kirby and esteemed songwriters Ashley Gorley and Rhett Akins. The singer, who American Songwriter has praised as "one of those rare, glorious voices that was made for singing country," has been performing the song on the road since he wrote it and says "I Can't Decide" always grabs the audience's attention.

"I immediately knew it was something special," he says. "It's very contagious. I love the melody; I love the lyrics and to me it just feels like a hit."

Label boss Brown thought the same. "Benny is very involved and ['I Can't Decide'] rose to the top," Corbin says.

Corbin describes Brown as "a song guy," and it was Brown who suggested the singer team up with Kirby and Derek George as producers. "They bring a fresh sound," Corbin says of co-producers Kirby and George.

The Florida native continues to write with longtime producer Carson Chamberlain as well as Kirby, Shane Minor, Adam Craig and Wyatt McCubbin, who he penned the romantic wedding song "Marry That Girl" with. Corbin says the past three years have allowed him to focus more seriously on writing music and finding the message he wants to convey to listeners on his forthcoming project.

"It's about being authentic and that's what I try to shoot for when I write or record," he says. "I keep one foot in traditional and one foot in the modern and marry those two. That's really been my motto through the years."

And he's had a successful time doing so. Throughout his career, Corbin has amassed seven top 10 singles and three American Country Awards. Named Billboard's 2010 Top New Country Artist, Corbin has never shied away from his traditional roots with Your Big Sky complimenting his "unapologetic and unwavering traditional country sound." His self-titled debut album was named Country Breakthrough Album of the Year by iTunes Rewind Best of 2010 while American Songwriter has complimented the singer's "warm, smooth-as-gravy-southern drawl."

Along the way, Corbin hasn't forgotten his roots. The young boy who grew up listening to Merle Haggard and Hank Williams with his grandparents remembers where he came from.

"I do love traditional country music," he says. "That's what drew me to country music."

As Corbin embarks on his next chapter with Stone Country Records, the singer promises to honor those roots and says "I Can't Decide" is just a taste of what's to come.

"I think it's a good mixture of the traditional and modern," he says of the upcoming project. "It's a good mixture of that up-tempo, midtempo, a few ballads here and there. That song is a good representation of what's coming. I'm really fired up about this brand new opportunity."



NEMO Fair Grand Marshalls for 2022 are Gaylen and Cindy Hill



Gaylen was born and raised in Humpreys MO in Sullivan County. He spent his youth riding horses all over the county with his best friend Jimmy Tipton. Gaylen was a member of the Humphreys 4H club and credits that as the best experience he ever had! His club produced outstanding beef cattle and they qualified to show multiple years at the Interstate Beef 4H Show in St Joe, MO. It was a highly competitive end of year cattle show representing top producers from 4 states including Missouri, Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska. The stockyards would shut down for an entire week for the show.

It was because of his experience in 4-H he knew he always wanted to be a Veterinarian. He graduated from the University of Missouri in 1965 with a BS in Agriculture and in 1967 with a Doctor of Veterinarian Medicine (DVM). Cindy graduated from the University of Missouri in 1963 with a BS in Food and Nutrition. They moved to Kirksville in 1967 where Gaylen has practiced medicine for the past 55 years devoted largely to farm animals. He claims the best part of his job was the people he worked for and the animals he worked on. Cindy became a Registered Dietician in 1968 and served Adair County for over 50 years including 15 years managing the WIC program.

Gaylen and Cindy served as leaders of the Challenger 4-H club in Kirksville for many years where all four of their kids (David, Curtis, Gayla, John) were members. They also served as beef and food project leaders to lots of 4H members. Cindy oversaw the clubs freshly squeezed lemonade stand during the NEMO fair each year. Photographs must be matted and the photographers name, address, and current phone number must be listed on the back. Photographers that are 18 and younger should enter the student class. Photographers over 18 must enter the adult class. Ribbons will be awarded for all participants. Champion and reserve champion ribbons will be assigned for best of show as well as in each class. The NEMO Fair board supports artistic expression but reserves the right to take down or refuse any photograph from entering that is deemed lewd or inappropriate in any way.

A professional/semi professional class is available for anyone receiving payment for picture. Only three (3) entries per class per exhibitor.

LOT A Kute Kid Class

Child photographed must be three years or under at the time taken.

LOT B Black and White

Photographs in the category must only have black, gray, and or white tones.

LOT C Sepia

The photograph must be a sepia tones or antiqued. Photographs must be predominantly brown and white.

LOT D Landscape

Examples in this category would include: sunsets, ducks on a pond, etc.

LOT E Photojournalism

Journalism-style photographs should be entered in this class. War images, news images, and documentary style wedding photography are all prime examples of this style.

LOT F Digital/Special Effects

All digitally altered photographs must be entered into this category. This category also includes hand oil-painted photographs.



LOT G Still Life/Art

All photographs in this class must be of inanimate objects. Examples include buildings, flowers, etc.

LOT H Wildlife/Animal







This individual may not have been awarded a blue ribbon for his/her project, but was willing to put heart into all they do. The person should be willing to learn lessons from failures and continue to strive to do better.

Rodney Scott MEMORIAL 4-H AWARD

This annual award is made possible by the family of the late Rodney Scott. Rodney was a past member of the Novinger Town and Country 4-H Club, as well as a club leader and a member of the Northeast Missouri Fair Board. Rodney enjoyed working with the young and old at Fair time.

Roy E. Jackson MEMORIAL ADAIR CO. 4-H AWARD

Description: This annual award was made possible by the family and friends of the late Mr. Roy E. Jackson, a past president of the Northeast Missouri Fair, a community leader, and a dedicated and enthusiastic person with high ideals for young people.

Eligibility: Any bona fide 4-H member who has an exhibit in the Northeast Missouri Fair.

Award: An annual plaque, donated by family and friends to be presented at the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale.

Score Card: Part I: A: Sportsmanship and courtesy during the Fair - 25 points. B: Friendliness, pleasant attitude during the Fair - 25 points. C: Enthusiasm of the Individual during the Fair - 25 points.

Part II: The 4-H member who has done the best with what he/she had to work with. This could very likely include a white ribbon exhibit, but a blue ribbon boy or girl who displays qualities of the above in Part III: 25 points.

Selection: Selection of award recipients to be made by a silent committee who will observe 4-H members throughout the Fair each year.

The Myron Propst MEMORIAL COMMERCIAL AWARD

The Myron Propst Trophy will be awarded to the outstanding commercial display, either indoor or outdoor, on Friday evening in the commercial building. A plaque with the winners names will also be presented to the NEMO Fairboard and to Mr. Jason Dimmitt for the Vo-Tech School.



General Livestock Rules & Regulations

- 1. Entries must be entered online at nemo.fairwire.com by July 6, 2022 at 11:59 pm. Entries will be accepted after this date at the fair office until check-in. Double fees will be collected. The NEMO Fair Association states that a Season Pass or Day Pass is required for admittance to the fairgrounds.
- All 4-H and FFA classes at the NEMO Fair will follow guidelines set forth by the Missouri 4-H Youth Development Program. For a complete listing of all rules and regulations please see the 4-H and FFA section in the 2022 Missouri State Fair Catalog. Some rules may be superseded by rules in this book.
- Articles or animals will not be placed on exhibition unless entered in the Superintendent's Book and entry tag (if required) attached.
- 4. All entries are to be in place at times and dates specified in schedule.
- 5. The superintendent in each department will be responsible for assigning space and arranging exhibits, and their directions must be followed. If you are in the wrong area/pen you must move and must clean the pen.
- 6. Exhibitors must accompany their animal/exhibit to the Fair, care for them, and exhibit them. If this regulation cannot be followed, a letter of circumstance must be submitted to the 4-H July Council Meeting. Superintendents may permit another 4-H/ FFA member to show an animal in case of illness or physical handicap.
- Home raised entries must have been born, raised and owned by the 4-H/FFA exhibitor or immediate family (Defined as mother, father, grandparents of the exhibitor or legal guardian) as part of the exhibitors project.
- Uncontrollable animals or animals which the exhibitor cannot handle alone may be disqualified by the Superintendent and required to leave the ring and/or grounds.
- In cases where a member has more than one animal in a class another 4-H/FFA exhibitor must show the second animal.
- 10. Minimal assistance is allowed by another 4-H/FFA exhibitor at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- 11. Showmanship classes will run oldest age category to youngest. There will be no master showmanship classes; exhibitors will not be required to advance to next age category after winning in their category. (ages as of 1/1/2022; 14 and over, 11-13, and 8-10 for beef, sheep, swine, poultry and goat)
- 12. Unless otherwise stated, no exhibitor will be allowed more than two (2) entries in an individual class and one (1) entry in a pen class in the beef, sheep, swine, poultry, rabbit, bucket calf, goat

- departments. Each exhibitor will be limited to four steers regardless of breed.
- 13. Each exhibit shall be owned by the exhibitor and shall represent work accomplished in a project in which the exhibitor was enrolled during the past year. A written statement by the leader, stating that the exhibit is bona fide work, must accompany each exhibit, if requested by the Superintendent.
- 14. No red ribbon entries for championship.
- An Adair County 4-H & FFA Show will be held as well as a NEMO Fair 4-H & FFA Show.
- 16. Believing it is in the best interest of all 4-H/FFA exhibitors to maintain a reputation of integrity and to present a wholesome and progressive image, 4-H and FFA members are expected to conduct themselves according to the best traditions of their respective organizations. Inappropriate conduct (drinking, stealing, vandalism, and indiscreet behavior) WILL NOT BE TOLERATED. Any violation of this rule will be grounds for disqualifying the exhibitor and/or livestock involved. Further, any premium monies earned will be forfeited.
- 17. All non-exhibitors will be expected to vacate barns by 12 midnight each evening.
- State Health Regulations will apply to all livestock entries, unless specified otherwise.
- 19. Exhibitors are not permitted to show the same breed in both 4-H and FFA. For example, if an exhibitor shows Chester White hogs in 4-H, he/ she cannot show Chester White hogs in FFA, or if an exhibitor shows market steers in FFA, he/ she cannot show market steers in 4-H. Animals are designated (4-H or FFA) at the time of entry and may not be switched to another division after entries have been received prior to the Fair.
- 20. The Adair County Fair states that any exhibitor (4-H/FFA) may only show in one county fair as "in County" in one calendar year. If violated, the exhibitor will accept the punishment set forth by the Joint Fair Committee.
- 21. 4-H members may exhibit only in projects in which they are enrolled in the current 4-H year.
- 22. All exhibitors must clean their pens before they will be released by Superintendent. If pens are not cleaned, NO MONITORY awards will be given until the pen is clean and superintendents can deny entry into the fair the following year.
- 23. Missouri Show Me Quality Assurance (MSMQA): By June 1, 2022, all 4-H exhibitors enrolled in food animal projects including beef, sheep, swine, dairy cattle, meat and dairy goats, rabbits, and poultry must complete the appropriate level of MSMQA certification to be

- considered an exhibitor in good standing in that project.
- 24. If the fairgrounds office doesn't have a copy of your SMQA card you are not allowed to show.
- 25. Treatment of animals (livestock): Failure to properly care for livestock will be grounds for dismissal at superintendent's discretion. No medication can be administered unless by veterinarian. Sick animals will be asked to leave.
- 26. If you are in the same immediate family and you only have 1 animal per child you will be assigned same pen as sex of animal allows.
- 27. NO FITTERS RULE: All animals are to be groomed by the 4-H or FFA exhibitor with assistance from immediate family or other 4-H or FFA exhibitors only. (Immediate family is defined as father, mother, brothers, sisters, step-parents, step-siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles and legal guardians of the exhibitor.) All animals will be groomed in the barns or immediately adjacent to the barns. If a Fitter or a person other than specified in above statement helps prepare the animal for the show ring in any manner, the child's animal and the child will be DISQUALIFIED and asked to leave. Fitter will be asked to leave.
- 28. All Exhibitors must display a stall card that includes exhibitor name and club name.
- 29.All registration papers must be in hand. No electronic copies will be accepted.

<u>Judging</u> - Competent judges have been secured for all departments.

- 1. No one shall act as judge for any class in which he or she is exhibiting.
- 2. A judge, at his/her discretion may withhold any or all awards if an article or animal in his/her judgement is not worthy of award.
- Decision of judges shall be final subject only to protest for good reason and under the procedure hereinafter described under the heading "Protest".
- 4. Anyone attempting to interfere with the judges during the adjudication, or publicly expressing disapproval in the area or grounds of decision of the judges, shall forfeit any or all awards and be excluded from further competition.
- Protest ALL PROTESTS MUST BE MADE IN WRITING to the Joint Review Board. The protest should include the reason for the alleged ineligibility and the rule governing the case must be noted. All protests must be signed. Such protest must be filed with a Joint Review Committee by or before 8 a.m. the day following the date the award is made.

Liabilities of Exhibitors

 In no event shall University of Missouri Extension, Adair County University Extension Council, University Extension Staff or Adair County 4-H

- Council, its officers, directors or members be held responsible for any loss or damage to the property of person or exhibitor or other persons while on the fairgrounds whether said loss or damage shall arise from accident or any cause whatsoever.
- Entry form will serve as agreement that you understand and accept responsibility for following all guidelines and understand that failure to do so will result in dismissal from event or activity.

Release of Exhibits - With the consent of the division superintendent, exhibits may be released only in the event of an extreme emergency, or for the purpose of attending a conflicting show by showing the proper papers. Failure to comply will mean automatic forfeiture of all awards due to exhibitor.

Breeding beef classes may be available for the following breeds: Angus, Chianina, Hereford, Limousin, Maine Anjou, Shorthorn, Simmental, All Other Breeds, and Crossbred/Commercial. Other breed classes may be available depending on number of entries in that breed. Must be 5 head per breed, per gender to show as breed class.
- 5. Breeds will be shown in alphabetical order by breed with crossbreds showing last.
- Each exhibitor shall parade his/her animal when requested to do so by the Superintendent in charge.

- 2. All rabbits being shown must have a permanent tattoo for identification in the left ear (preferably 2 or more letters/numbers long). This number is used to ID the rabbit on the entry form.

GENERAL RULES

- Each exhibitor shall be required to wear the official 4-H/FFA t-shirt of the Fair and their assigned exhibitor number at the time of all judging events.
- 2. Items made by 4-H members should reflect the skills they have learned in their 4-H project during the current program year, the needs and interests of the 4-H'er, and quality workmanship. Use the 4-H project literature and the "Clover" for exhibit ideas and criteria. "4-H is an out-of-school education program. Consequently, articles made in school under the supervision of teachers and on which students receive school credit do not qualify as 4-H project work. This is a duplication of credit for single effort and to a large extent, prevents 4-H from achieving its full objectives."
- Exhibits are displayed at the risk of the individual 4-H/FFA member. The 4-H staff, FFA staff, University Extension Council or staff and NEMO Fairboard are not responsible for loss or damage to items.
- 4. Only Adair County 4-H and FFA exhibitors may advance to the State Fair. Exhibits must be of blue ribbon quality to advance to the State Fair or to receive awards. Members are limited to two exhibits in the State Fair 4-H Building.
- 5. The number of exhibits per class that Adair County may enter is printed in bracketed numbers in the class listing. Those exhibits from outside Adair County will have had the opportunity for state fair evaluation in the home county of the exhibitor.
- 6. 4-H members may exhibit only in projects in which they are enrolled in the current 4-H year. Items exhibited must be made in the current year and must be the work of the 4-H member submitting the exhibit. Scrapbooks made in projects other than class 315 will be displayed in the Library at the State Fair. Notebooks, recipes, binders should not accompany any exhibit.
- A member may enter up to three exhibit items per project. <u>Each item must</u> be registered at nemo. fairwire.com. <u>Registration Deadline is July 6</u>, <u>2022 by 11:59 pm.</u> Late entries will be accepted at the fair office until check-in time. Double fees

- will be collected.
- 8. The following items will be accepted/displayed at the Missouri State Fair in the Library which allows fairgoers to touch and examine the items: notebooks (three ring binders only) with county, region and youth name on spine, posters (flat only; do not fasten items to the poster), see additional poster rules in #9, file card systems. These items will be accepted from any project. Youths who exhibit notebooks, posters, or file card systems should understand that their exhibit will be handled.
- 9. Where the exhibit list states "any item made", the 4-H member may display any item made in that project. This includes notebooks, file cards, photo displays, posters or educational displays. Regardless of project, the following dimensions must be used. Items which do not comply with size or other specifications will not receive a ribbon. Do not attach any items to an exhibit such as notebooks, pictures, etc.
- <u>Posters</u> No larger than 14" x 22", flat only, do not fasten items to the poster, except photos and colored paper.
- <u>Photo Display</u> Full State Fair guidelines and definitions are provided at the following link http://4h. missouri.edu/go/events/statefair/photoguidelines. pdf.
 - * All photos should be mounted on a 8" x 10" mat board, photographers may mount the photograph to the mat board using an acceptable adhesive designed for permanent mounting of photographs.
 - * A color single window mat (sometimes referred to as a frame) is acceptable, but not required.
 - * Photos can be mounted either horizontally or vertically with no writing or labels on the mat board.
 - * Photo stories must consist of no more than 4 photographs.
 - * To protect exhibits from dust and moisture, photos must be placed in a clear photo bag available at the Adair County Extension Center. Do not put in a bag that's folded over, they are difficult to fit in the state fair display.
 - * Exhibits not meeting these guidelines will not be judged, displayed, or receive ribbons.
 - * Photo Editing Photo enhancing is permitted. Photo Altering is not permitted. Please see full state fair guidelines for definitions and examples of each.
- Educational Display A new product is now available to make educational displays easier to construct. The size is 18 inches in height, 6 inches in depth and 12 inches in width. When it opens and stands it has 6 inch sides and a 12 inch back. Must include three-dimensional items and stand-alone. (Posters with items taped to them do not qualify as an educational display. Science fair

display boards are too large.)

- Entomology or Geology Display Boxes Box must be exactly no more than 18" long x 24" wide and 3 1/2" deep to fit in display racks at the Missouri State Fair. Plexiglas or plastic covers are preferred. No handles or knobs. Boxes are displayed in upright racks. For MSF, only 1 box per exhibitor will be displayed.
- Working Models These exhibits should show how things actually work (cutaway-sections of motors or computers) or can be used to help people identify parts such as parts of a motor or computer. Many times these exhibits are considered "hands-on" and can be handled by visitors. Working models should require floor space no larger than 14" x 22".
- Decorated Cakes No real cakes. Forms or pans are required. Must only use Royal Icing, Rolled Fondant or Commercial Product (i.e. DAPP) that will harden and preserve the decorated cake. Butter crème icing or tube/gel icing will not be accepted. Cake boards will not exceed 1" margin on each side of cake pan or form. Cakes must not exceed 13" in height or at the base (includes board).

<u>Scrapbooking</u> - Exhibits should be only 1 page 1 side representative of the complete scrapbook.

- * No full books.
- * Size not to exceed 12" x 12".
- * All pages must be in clear protective sleeve or clear zipper bag. Do not frame.
- 10. Perishable items such as food, vegetables, crops, and home grown items will not be returned after the Missouri State Fair. Edible vegetables will be donated to a charitable organization.
- 11. The assigned point value must be used unless approved by the 4-H Superintendent.
- 12. No early removal or check-out of exhibits is permitted. Exhibits which are removed before release times will not be awarded ribbons.
- 13. All dresses and similar items to be exhibited on hangers must be entered on hangers.
- Shooting Sports exhibits should contain no live ammunition and arrow points should be removed.
- 15. If a member is unable to exhibit his/her project, that member must have requested, in writing, permission from the 4-H & FFA Fair Committee to exhibit in absentia by <u>June 25</u>. Exhibits to be entered must be accompanied by written approval from 4-H & FFA Fair Committee.
- 16. Large/heavy objects, projects with glass, etc., may not be able to be shipped to the Missouri State Fair. Items too large for display in the 4-H Building will not be accepted for exhibit at the Missouri State Fair, but one photo of the item, no larger than 5 x 7, will be accepted. Photos are not a substitute for bringing or mailing exhibits.
- 17. Conference Judging: All 4-H exhibitors will confer

with the judge in that project area while the judge examines the project. Entry and judging will take place simultaneously from 8:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. on Monday, July 18 in the 4-H & FFA Building. Please follow the schedule below. Exhibitors will pick up T-shirts at the NEMO Fair office in the Multi-Purpose building. Enter 4-H building through the North Doors for Judging. Entry is allowed up to 30 minutes prior to a club's scheduled judging time. The building will close at 1:00 p.m. or as soon as judging is completed, and will remain closed until all State Fair items and awards have been selected and project displays finalized. All exhibits (including State Fair items) will be released Sunday, July 24, between 7 am-9 am. State Fair & ribbon winners should be ready to have a picture taken on Wednesday (time will be posted in building.). All exhibits not picked up by 9 am will be thrown in the trash.

- 18. Exhibit Tags must be picked up at the NEMO Fair Office and must be filled out and attached to exhibit prior to entering building on judging day.
- 19. All building awards and ribbons are only given to Adair County exhibits.
- 20. See MO State Fair Building guidelines for country cured hams and bacon selected for state.

- 1. Hams in this class must consist of hams that have been cured country style.
- 2. Ham weights accepted from 10 pounds to 22 pounds, inclusive.
- 3. Top FFA ham overall (Adair County exhibitors only) will be eligible to sell at the livestock sale.
- 4. The number of entries shall not exceed 2 per person.
- 5. Hams in this class will be divided by weight after they are entered into the show by the Superintendent to equalize class size.
- Commercial hams in this class will consist of whole hams with bone in and may not be cut or sliced. Hams shall be cured mildly and may or may not be tenderized. This class is considered to consist principally of pumped hams.
- 7. To maximize the member's learning experience, members showing in youth classes are encouraged to do their own project work. The parent and child should decide how much the member is able to do on their own, but having someone else totally do the work for the member is inappropriate.
- All hams in this class must be USDA inspected either at the origin or at the end of processing. Verification of inspection should be available upon request.

- Projects built to be used as one unit should be entered as one entry and not entered separately. (Ex.: Trailer ramps should not be entered separately from the trailer if the trailer is being exhibited.)
