# STRASBURG

#### **POPULATION 418**

Strasburg today has a population of 418. Through it following the old Grand Prairie Trail, runs Route 129. (GN Editor note: SBI Route 129 originally ran from <u>Effingham</u> to <u>Windsor</u>. It was replaced by <u>Illinois Route 32</u> in 1936.) The business men of the town are: E.M. York, Clothing Store and Restaurant; G.C. York, General Garage; M.R. Storm, General Store; T.A. Weber and Sons, General Store; O.O. Kull, General Store; William Swigart, Garage, Gaylord Ulmer, Grocery; L.R. Hamm, Restaurant; J.A. Quicksall, Drugs and Jewelry; H.M. York, Barber; A.C. Duling, Blacksmith; Bryan Renshaw, Shoe Repairs; Alvin Kearney, Flour, Feed and Hardware; Louis Figge, Harness Shop; C.E. Bingaman, Cream Buyer; Martin Pipher, Lumber and Undertaking; Paul Rincker, Buyer of Poultry, Eggs and Cream; W.W. Engle, Hardware and Implements; C.C. Beck, General Store; F.F. Yakey, Elevator; F.H. Falk, Hay Buyer; Gilbert Ulmer, Hatchery; and John Biehler, Hatchery. The town has one newspaper, The Strasburg Herald, of which Frank Trainer is the editor. Strasburg's physicians are, Dr. W.F. Risser, and Dr. W.R. Schroeder. Oscar Green is the present mayor. It is interesting to know that most of the business men have been in business in the town for from twenty-five to sixty years.

#### **TELEPHONE COMPANY ORGANIZED IN 1900**

The Strasburg Mutual Telephone Company was organized in 1900 by Dr. W.F. Risser. Everyone in the exchange owns his own telephone, and the dues are \$4.00 a year. No more, no less. Gottleib Miller is president. Strasburg is proud of its fire department, which boasts a hook and ladder truck, gasoline engine, hose cart, and

other minor equipment. W.W. Engle is President of this department and A.C. Duling is chief. The Building and Loan Association of the town has a very remarkable record. Organized in 1894 with Dr. Amos

C. York its first president and Alf Allen, secretary, it has built half the town. During the whole period of its existence (forty years) it has had but one lone and solitary foreclosure. Its present officers are G.C. York, president, and George Kull, secretary.

The Strasburg Chamber of Commerce has been active in promoting the growth of the town and was a determining factor in bringing Route 16 through Richland township. Their fight to accomplish this objective was carried to the Governor's office before it was finally won. Dr. W.F. Schroeder has been president and chairman of the organization for the past ten years.

One of the first things to which the pioneers turned their attention was the founding of the church and school, and these two institutions are still of paramount interest to the community. There are now four churches in Strasburg: St. Paul's Lutheran church, Rev. L. Stuebe, pastor; Grace Lutheran church, Rev. G.A. Schimmel, pastor; Methodist Episcopal church, Rev. Guy W. Holmes, pastor; Baptist church, Elder Walter Miller, pastor.

#### HAS THREE SCHOOLS

Strasburg has three schools: The Strasburg District High School, The Strasburg Grade School, and the St. Paul's Parochial School. The High School has fifty-eight pupils; the Grade School has forty-three pupils. John DeLaurenti is superintendent of both the grade and high school. H.T. Jackson and Mrs. Merle Grant, and Superintendent DeLaurenti are the teachers of the High School, and Mrs. Lulu Y. Watts, Miss Opal Quigle, and Mrs. Bertha York, form the teaching staff of the grade school. St. Paul's Parochial School has ninety pupils. W.A. Kramer is principal and G.W. Breitwisch, his assistant. In connection with its schools Strasburg has an active Parent-Teachers' Association of which Lena Wilson is president, and Mae Young, vice president.

#### DWELLINGS KEPT IN GOOD REPAIR

The dwellings in Strasburg are, almost without exception, well painted, and in good repair. The city has encouraged the citizens to paint their houses pure while, and many have complied with this wish. At present all the brick walks in the town are being raised and re-laid.

Placid and conservative, Strasburg gives little evidence of being only sixty years ago a huddle of stores on the wild and desolate prairie. But here the people from an old country have conquered a new land and through all their toil, merry making, and hardship the golden thread of romance has been woven.
