


Bro. Wahl worked laying the foundation and plumbing.

CRY ALOUD, SPARE NOT

"Cry aloud, spare not, lift up thy voice like a trumpet, and shew my people their transgression, and the house of Jacob their sins." Isa. 58:1

During the past several weeks we have been made to think on the scriptures that tell us that in the last days many shall depart from the faith. That because iniquity shall abound, the love of many should wax cold. Paul also said that the day of the Lord would not come except there come a falling away first. I am sure Christians everywhere can see that we are in the midst of that falling away.

I have become much more aware of this over the last several months. The unconcernedness of many people that we have been dealing with about coming to church has made the scripture that heads this article much more important to me. Christ said that we must be the light of the world and certainly with the intense darkness of sin that our world is in today, the light of God must be allowed to shine brighter through our lives than ever before.

The commission Jesus gave to His diciples as recorded in Mark 16: 15, 16 is a calling that we must not and cannot forget or even take lightly. For truly it is the call to every child of God to evangelize the world. But the commission that Isaiah, the prophet of God, quoted here is one that should ring loud and clear in our ears today. Too many people, professing Christ, are crying aloud, but are sparing the truth of the gospel. They are lifting up their voices like a trumpet, but are failing to show God's people their transgression and need.

Let me bring my point home if I may I am very proud to be a part of this Apostolic Faith Movement. I hold very dearly the teachings of Sanctification, the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, Divine Healing, and all the other doctrinal points. I feel like we have the best way. But a few days ago I was told of a Baptist Church whose pastor and congregation have prayed through to the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, who are being used of God in the manifesta-

tion of the gifts of the Spirit, and I suddenly began to wonder if we might be committing the sin of taking for granted the blessed gospel that God has allowed this movement to see and enjoy for the last 68 years.

For certainly, if people who have not believed in this way are now knowing the manifestations of the Spirit of God, then shouldn't we who have known this way see much more of the work of the Spirit being done in our churches. But say, how many Apostolic Faith believers have failed to realize the need for seeking the Lord to attain a Spirit filled life? We should be leading the way in declaring the message of the hour. People of God, this is something to become concerned about-

Paul wrote to the Roman church, "And that knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep: for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand: . . ." Rom. 13:11,12. Are we living and working for God like people who believe in the second coming of Christ? Are we living like people who know about redemption and the rewards of a spirit-filled life?

Let us become awakened to the cry of Isaiah. Let us not be ashamed to cry aloud our belief of the sanctifying power of the blood of Jesus. Let us not be afraid to declare boldly that the gift of the Holy Spirit is for all who will accept Him and will pay the price to receive Him. God help us not to delay in telling Christian people of their need of having the revival fire of the Holy Spirit burning brightly in their lives every day.

Jesus said, "I must work the works of Him that sent me, while it is day: the night cometh when no man can work." John 9:4 Christ calls us to do even greater works than He did. John 14:12. I pray God will awaken us all to the gospel that He has committed to our keeping. That every Apostolic Faith believer who has not prayed through to the Baptism of the Holy Spirit will get un-

der a burden to seek God for this precious gift.

I wish to close with a scripture wherein David tells his ambition. "One thing have I desired of the Lord, that will I seek after; that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the Lord, and to inquire in His temple." Psa. 27:4

I am persuaded that THIS would bring a great outpouring of God's Spirit upon us.



YOU — THE TEACHER

ARTICLE IV

How mature are you? A person may be old in years and physically but immature in personality. Your personality is the sum total of qualities of body, mind, and character that make you an individual and different from all others.

Your personality is important and can no doubt be improved in one or more areas. To change a person must analyize himself...honestly. Am I irritable, impatient, argumentative, either shy or overly aggressive? Do I show enough enthusiasm? Is my appearance attractive? Am I sincere or it is a false front?

Physical appearance of the teacher is important to the students and affects their acceptance or rejection of him. All of the teacher's little whims or oddities such as being a vegetarian or not eating salt must be kept out of the teaching and kept in his own private life.

"A merry heart maketh a cheerful countenance, but by sorrow of the heart the spirit is broken." The Christian life is a joyous one; therefore, the Christian teacher is NOT to be a sour-faced person, patiently pious, and sacredly solemn, but happy and smiling. From Genesis to Revelation we read and are instructed to be happy and joyous. Now, this doesn't mean that we shouldn't have serious moments but our overall picture should be a happy one or something is wrong with our experience in God.

"See to it that you do not serve your pupils with cold victuals . . . Serve them hot and steaming, and

your pupils will have an appetite for yor instruction." (James a Garfield, U. S. Pres.) Your aim as a teacher is to set each pupil on fire to translate what he has learned into an enthusiatic Christian life. To start a fire you must have fire. Your passion should be to win for Christ just as many pupil as you can get into your class, then build them into earnest, working Christians who will remain faithful unto death.

Christ is still our example. The Bible tells us he grew in stature—physically. He knows each person's possibilities and each weakness. If we are sincere in asking He will help us improve. Too often we cover for our faults saying God made us this way and never try to improve in any way.

To settle into a mental rut and stay there is fatal to the success of the Sunday school teacher. Dr. Arthur Holmes says the human brain is capable of doing 50,000 times more than we ask of it. A teacher should consistently grow adding to his knowledge through wide reading. Christian Educational Magazines such as TEACH, CHILD EVAN-GELISM. SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNSELOR, are marveleous sources of teaching tips and articles of encouragement to Sunday School Teachers.

A teacher should be as a bridge or elevator which must be capable of supporting a far greater load than it is usually called upon to bear. A teacher's knowledge ought to extend far beyond the demands made.

The conscientious teacher is always learning. In our present time

of such increased knowledge and inquisitiveness on the part of students this is much more an essential characteristic than even just a few short years ago. We as God's people can't afford to be complacent in our Sunday School teaching as God is holding us responsible in giving out His word. Christ tells us not to be slothful in business (Rom. 12:11) and we firmly believe this involves all of our lives including the teaching of His word. If we fail to do our best, improve on our best to see not only that we give out His word but that it is also accepted by honest hearts, then we are slothful in the business of our Christian life.

Daily newspapers contain vital news for our day in relation to "the Last Days" in God's word. A walk down the street, through the woods


How Others Do it

or pasture can enrich our knowledge of human nature and God's handiwork. The Bible is the greatest textbook ever written whether in the field of science, psychology, history, salesmanship, or business administration. If you want to know what the Bible teaches, and if you want to live what the Bible teaches, just be a good Bible teacher.

As a teacher remember this: You make your appeal to your pupil in terms of the whole man—his intellect, as well as his emotions and his will. Through his mind you appeal to his nature. To do this, you must know as much as you can about him and the thing's he's interested in. YOU MUST BE ABLE TO TALK HIS LANGUAGE.

One reason why you as a teacher must be intellectually alert is that you have such a short time in which to teach. In one year your pupil spends less time in Bible Study class than the equivalent of two weeks in public school.

If you have even an ordinary mind it can be developed to a high degree. Education, however is not natural; it is acquired. By study, research and experimentation you can acquire knowledge. This is education. To be mentally capable as a teacher you are to develop your intellectual ability and add to your knowledge.

Wisdom, to you as a teacher, is more important than either intellectual ability or knowledge. Webster defines wisdom as the quality or state of being wise; knowledge of what is true or right coupled with just judgment as to action. A snyonym for wisrom is common sense. A Sunday school teacher ought to have god sound common sense.

A good evidence of wislom is a person's attitude. If he is well adjusted, that is if he is wise, he does not become upset over trifles, he has control of his words, actions and attitude at all times. He is the self-controled person, well balanced, sure of himself, and is what we call "a natural leader." If you are to be a good teacher you must strive to be wise. The best way to do this is to pattern yourself after Jesus, to

study Him, and to walk in His steps. This can only be done through the sanctifying of our lives through the blood of Jesus. Careful Bible study, meditation and much prayer will be helpful in achieving wisdom.

Even more important than our formal schooling is our spiritual status, love of and ability to get along with others, and devotion to our Lord, the cause for which we teach. Sunday school teaching is highly specialized and must not be fenced in by academic restrictions. Nevertheless, a teacher still ought to acquire as much education as possible (this can be self taught) along with the knowledge of how to use it wisely.

The high standards in public education are resulting in a demand that the Sunday-school teachers be better educated. Grammatical errors by the Sunday-school teacher are more obvious than in the past and cause the pupil to lose respect for the teacher. A good rule is this—watch your grammer!

It's not up to you to prove that you have the education needed to be a teacher, however, but to prove how good you are as a teacher by using wisely the knowledge that you have.

It may help you as a Sundayschool teacher to realize that your teaching is more important than that of your sister teacher in the public school. (1) Your purpose is more important . . . to help the pupil to live not only a better life here on this earth but to prepare for the hereafter. (2) Your source material is more important as the Bible is the most important textbook, the revelation of God's will and His special message for us. (3) Your superintendent (Christ) is more important. (4) Your responsibility is greater for if you fail, your pupil may be lost eternally.

Some of the dangers which face the drifter are: (1) complacency, the teacher who convinces herself that she knows enough, that she is doing all that needs to be done, ought to do one of two things: either quit or wake up. (2) Underrating the pupil, the pupil is the most important person in the school; don't underrate him, but give him the consideration to which he's entitled. (3) Fergetting the individual, if you are not alert you may think of teaching a class instead of teaching individuals. (4) Vagueness of purpose, not knowing why you're teaching each lesson . . . just drifting along with no definite purpose or aim for each lesson. (5) Procrastination, unnecessary and harmful delay reveals a mental and spiritual drifter.

(6) Ignorance, an education that was adequate five years ago is inadequate today, (7) Prejudices. To be prejudiced is to have an unfavorable opinion or feeling formed beforehand or without knowledge, thought, or reason. To be thus baised is to betray a lack of wisdom. (8) Tolerance. Tolerate that which is nonessential, but be intolerant where matters essential are concerned. (9) Boastfulness. To boast of your knowledge is to lower yourself in the estimation of your pupil. (10) Argumentative. To get a pupil to express an opinion is the teacher's goal, but to belittle that opinion is a terrible mistake.

To summarize our thinking of today let us remember that the better educated (even if it's self taught) teacher in the Sunday school will do a better job of teaching; I believe that the teacher who ceases to learn ceases to teach acceptably: I try to keep my grammar correct; I study the interests which concern my pupils so that I may "talk their language."; my teaching is of utmost importance; academic training is not as important as spiritual living in my success as a Sundayschool teacher, but I ought to have both; and I am wise in making use of the knowledge I have.
