ADMINISTRATIVE & PERSONNEL



The Administrative and Personnel Committee approved the Parish Nurse position, which was submitted by the Parish Nurse Task Force. Responsibilities of the Parish Nurse were developed from the congregation responses on the Parish Nurse Survey. The minimum qualifications will require someone who is a Registered Nurse with a current North Dakota license. The next step in the process is for Session approval at the March 28th Session meeting.

The Session requested that A&P review the church staff job descriptions in the FPC Operation Manual. The A&P Committee felt that job descriptions in the Manual should have a consistent format. A template will be developed by A&P that will be used for the church staff Position Descriptions in the Operation Manual.

COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS



The Scholarship Committee of First Presbyterian Church is pleased to announce the availability of a limited number of scholarships for our church community. To be eligible for consideration to receive a scholarship, a student must be an active member of First Presbyterian Church of Bismarck or must have been an active participant in the life of the church for at least three years. The awards are given for students at any level of study beyond high school. Four years is the maximum for receiving scholarships: these need not be consecutive years. Graduate students may apply for scholarships, providing they are within the four year maximum. Applications are available in the Narthex and for download from the front page of the church website at www.fpcbismarck.com. The

deadline to apply is May 15th, 2017.

PASTOR'S MESSAGE





Happy Easter to you! The Lord is Risen! He is Risen, indeed!

I hope for you an Easter celebration that is inspiring—and memorable—and energizing—and that gives your life and faith new direction...and new hope!

Did you realize that there is life-after-Easter? And, it is New Life, in fact? It is something more than the dutiful, reflective and disciplined learning of Lent. It is more than the "ordinary" days of living, day-in and day-out throughout other seasons of the year.

Life-after-Easter can be startling and surprising, sometimes perplexing and uncertain in its spirituality, but also amazing in its discoveries and incomparable in its joy!

Here are a few glimpses at life-after-Easter for Jesus' disciples:

"(On the road to Emmaus two disciples)...were talking with each other...Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him...When he was at the table with them, he took the bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Their eyes were opened, and they recognized him." (Luke 24:15, 30-31)

"(Back in Jerusalem)...While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them, and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' They were startled and terrified." (Luke 24:36-37)

"Jesus said to them, 'Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself." (Luke 24:38-39)

"While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering." (Luke 24:41)

"Then Jesus opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'It is written that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses to these things.'" (Luke 24:46-48)

From these vignettes of life-after-Easter for the disciples (that is, after Jesus' resurrection) - their experience was a mixture of uncertainty, fear, inattentiveness to spiritual things, and just plain inability to see beyond themselves—along with true recognition of Jesus, discovery, remembrance, and exhilarating joy.

Friends, be ready for all of the above to be a part of your post-Easter experience of life and faith as you journey forward day-by-day with the risen Christ! This continuing recognition, discovery and obedient service to Christ will happen:

- in your inner personal spirit;
- in your ongoing and new relationships with people in your life;
- in your response to a world around you seeming to need more principled and spiritual guidance every day;
- in your life together as a church, especially during the journey of a new pastor search; and;
- in your service to others and demonstration of faith that you exhibit in daily living.

All that we read that the disciples experienced following Jesus' resurrection you and I will experience also, uniquely in the ways we each live and walk with Christ. Yes, there will be uncertainties, and maybe fears along the way. But they will be far surpassed by new faith (stronger and deeper), and with new dimensions of knowing Christ, and of serving needs in our world.

Again, Happy Easter to you! And to all the days, and the excitement, and the joy that follows! David Reiter

What is Your Favorite Easter memory?

What is your favorite Easter memory? Lots of families will look back on delicious meals and family all around, while kids remember how much candy they got last year, or how they may have finally gotten a glimpse of the Easter Bunny. Hopefully, we're all able to look back on special worship experiences and think about what Jesus means to us, especially this story of His death and resurrection that we celebrate each year.

All this was celebrated when we hosted our Easter Egg Hunt here on Palm Sunday morning last year. Many families and kids were able to attend, and had a really fun time! Yes, I learned that you must always triple-check the crock pot cooking the night before, and that kids have very little patience when they know there are egg-fulls of candy all

over the church, but they almost sat still as we talked about Holy Week, and the story of what Jesus experienced after the celebration of Palm Sunday.

Easter is a special time in our lives, and a special time in the church. As special worships are being planned, and our building is preparing itself for extra people on Easter Sunday, the busyness often gets in the way of the specialty of the story, and of what exactly it is we are celebrating. While most people prepare spiritually for the events leading to Jesus' resurrection, church employees are preparing bulletins, planning special music, and making sure the toilet paper is stocked. It's an interesting dynamic, that isn't often seen by those that join us for that great Sunday morning.

There were three worship services every Easter at the last church I worked at. After working there for four and a half years, I had attended zero of them. Each year, our youth and families would host an annual pancake breakfast and we would arrive to church by 4 am to prepare the fresh-baked caramel roll, serve 400 people throughout the morning, and make sure to scrape all the pancake batter off the floor before we left. Each year, I'd tell myself to take a break, enjoy and celebrate this holy holiday, but I was never able to tear myself away from the work that needed to be done.

This past year was the first year I feel I was really able to celebrate Easter. Growing up, we never received Easter baskets full of treats, or thought the Easter Bunny was coming to our house. I remember Easter Sunday being like every other Sunday, except we came home to a bigger lunch than usual.

I wasn't kidding in last year's Easter Sunday's Children's message when I shared that 2016 was my favorite Easter memory. I was able to surround myself with family, not worry about Sunday School during worship, and actually think about what Jesus' life and death means to me-all while listening to the beautiful music provided by our Bell and Choral Choir, and Pastor Reiter's sermon about The Lord's Prayer. I look forward to another great Easter this year, celebrating the resurrection and life of Jesus Christ. Our Palm Sunday will offer another Easter Egg Hunt Celebration, and I won't have to scrape pancake batter off any floors...maybe we'll save that for next year.

Did you know?

At birth, an infant's brain is only 25% of the size of an average adult's brain. Incredibly, by age 3, a child's brain has grown to 90% of that an adult's brain. During infancy and early childhood, children are flooded with new experiences that impact their brain development. The first 3 years of a child's life offer parents and other caregivers an amazing opportunity to shape the child's growth and form healthy habits that will last a lifetime.

A child's brain develops based on early experiences at home. The more interactions a child has, the healthier his/her development will be.

Children who have a stable relationship with at least one caregiver learn at a faster pace, feel better about themselves, and make friends more easily.

PASTOR SEARCH COMMITTEE

Jim Skaret was approved as Chair of the committee and Ella Gutzke will serve as Vice-Chair.

DISCUSSION

Session continues to read and discuss "Spiritual Leadership for Church Officers". Marks of discernment: it is God-focused, requires faith and is communal. "At the center of the practice of discernment is the expectation that God's Spirit will lead us as we seek God's will."

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS (from meeting and committee minutes)

Outreach—Gladys Cairns, representing the committee, spoke about the work of the Missouri Valley Coalition for Homeless People. Session approved the yearly membership (\$50) for FPC to become a member. Kathy Wachter will serve as the voting member from our congregation. Gail Christianson and Gladys Cairns are new members of Outreach.

Administrative and Personnel—Session approved the Parish Nurse proposal and job description. Funds from the Lois Watts memorial will be used for the first two and one-half years. The committee will advertise for the part-time parish nurse and will serve as the search committee. The committee is pursuing having Wi Fi throughout the church.

Business and Finance—Income is above budget and expenses are below.

Stewardship—Part of the special Pentecost and Peace and Global Witness offerings will be dedicated to the outdoor learning center for the Child Care Center.



<u>April Fun Facts</u>

The 4th month of the year is an outstanding one!

When April arrives our hearts are usually full of thoughts of renewal and fresh beginnings. These are the days when the sun is shining...it may bring us April showers but the warm showers are refreshing and invigorating because we know the sunshine will return soon.

April is named for the Greek goddess of love, Aphrodite. The name for the month of April originally came from *Aprilis* which means to open.

The name *Aprilis* is very appropriate because in so many places the trees and flowers begin to bloom and go on to flower during the month of April.

Here are a few interesting things in the month of April along with some events that fall this month:

- Zodiac signs for April are Aries (3/21—4/19) and Taurus (4/20-5/20)
- The Daisy, which symbolizes innocence, and the Sweet Pea are the flowers for the month
- The diamond is the birthstone for the month of April
- Noah Webster copyrighted the first edition of his dictionary April 14th, 1828
- Leonardo da Vinci, Italian painter, sculptor and scientist was born April 15th, 1452
- William Shakespeare, the playwright, was born April 23rd, 1564. He also died in England in 1616.
- The United States Library of Congress was established April 24th, 1800.
- George Washington was inaugurated as the first President of the United States of America on April 30th, 1789.
- The Vietnam War ended on April 30th, 1975, when South Vietnam surrendered.
- April is one of only 4 months that has exactly 30 days, the others are June, September and November.
- April begins on the same day of the week as July every single year.
