Elisha Helps a Widow and Her Sons 2 Kings 4:1-7

The children you lead have had different experiences. Some kids may've had to rely on God's care to help them through difficult times, much as the widow and her sons did. Others may've never felt those types of serious needs. Regardless of their life experiences, all children can understand that God provides food, clothing, and housing. Use this lesson to help kids understand that God cares for them and they can care for others, too.

Elisha Helps a Widow and Her Sons

2 Kings 4:1-7

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Elisha the Prophet

Elisha was a prophet who ministered in Israel during the time of the divided kingdoms of Israel and Judah. Elisha's ministry spanned the reigns of four kings: Joram, Jehu, Jehoahaz, and Jehoash. And he was even consulted by Jehoshaphat, a king of Judah.

In 2 Kings 4:1-7, it is interesting to note that the husband who died had been from "the company of the prophets." During this time in Israel in which few people followed God, groups of people gathered to promote the worship of God, with older prophets acting as spiritual mentors to younger ones. Thus it is quite possible that Elisha was familiar with the widow and her sons.

It Seems Cruel, But...

Apparently the man who died had left significant debt. Though it seems cruel, Mosaic law provided that a creditor could force debtors or the children of debtors into slavery in exchange for unpaid debt. And even though the widow had just lost her husband, a creditor was apparently threatening to take her two sons.

The oil the woman possessed wasn't even enough to cook with. The Hebrew word for *oil* used here indicates that she had only a small flask of oil that was used for anointing, not cooking.

God's Creative Plan

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God didn't respond to the widow's need by having Elisha produce a bag of gold coins that would enable her to pay her debt. Instead, knowing that they had only a tiny bit of oil, Elisha asked her and her sons to gather jars from their neighbors to fill with oil. In this way, Elisha made the widow act on her faith in God. It would have been easy for the widow to refuse Elisha's instructions, fearing that the neighbors would think her crazy for asking for jars when they knew she didn't have anything to fill them with. But she was faithful in following the instructions that came from God through Elisha. And her faithfulness was rewarded!

The Jesus Connection

Jesus showed even more care and compassion for needy people than Elisha did. And as followers of Jesus, we can model the same care.

Having needs can lead us to greater dependence on God. How has God helped you with needs already? What needs do you need to commit to him now? Ask God for help to depend on him with your needs. You can write your prayer here.

Consistently use the same signal to announce a transition to the next activity. You could flip the lights off and on, use a train whistle, have a puppet rustling inside a bag, or sing cleanup songs. Keep it simple, consistent, and fun.

What You'll Do

As the children arrive, greet each one with a smile. When it's time to begin, use your signal to bring the children together in a circle. Begin the CD, and lead the kids in singing "Yay! We Love God" (track 2 on the CD) to the tune of "Pop! Goes the Weasel" Encourage the kids to join you in singing and doing the motions.

We've come to learn about God's love (hold hands and march in circle) And spread his love around. (continue marching) We've come to praise and give him thanks. Yay! We love God! (jump up)

(Repeat 2x.)

Say: ► GOD CARES FOR US. Let's sing a song that tells God that we'll trust him to take care of us, no matter where we go or what happens in life.

Play "Trust in the Lord" (Proverbs 3:5-6) (track 3 on the CD), and lead kids in singing. After kids have learned the words, encourage them to sing and do the motions in italic parentheses with you.

Trust in the Lord (trust in the Lord) (hold your hands together without interlocking your fingers)

With all your heart (with all your heart) (pulse clasped hands to the beat) And lean not on your own understanding (understanding); (lean to the right) In all your ways (in all your ways) (lean to the left) Acknowledge him (acknowledge him) (raise hands to the ceiling)

He will make your paths straight. (slowly lower hands, and point forward)

Once you begin that way, (take several steps forward) Don't you ever, ever stray; (take several steps backward while shaking head "no") You'll be on your way (walk in place, and slowly lift hands high) To an amazing life. (hold hands up and open wide) (Repeat.)

Say: We can trust God because we know that no matter what, SOD CARES FOR US. Let's talk more about how God takes care of all of us.



Patience, Please

What You'll Do

Have the children form a circle and sit down. Open your Bible to 2 Peter 3:9, and show children the words.

Say: Today's Key Verse comes from a book in the Bible called second Peter. Listen to what the Bible says: "The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. He is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance" (2 Peter 3:9). This means that God is patient, and he wants everyone to repent. Let's say that together.

Lead the children in repeating the simplified Key Verse with you: God is patient, and he wants everyone to repent (2 Peter 3:9).

Say: *Patient* and *repent*...those can be a couple of hard words to understand. But we can simplify them. First we'll learn what it means to be patient. Patient means to be able to wait for something to happen. *Repent* means to stop doing bad things. Let's find out more!

Close your eyes. Then wait patiently for a minute to pass. When you think the minute's up, raise your hand, but don't open your eyes. I'll call time when the minute's actually up. Ready? Close those eyes, and raise your hand when you think a minute has passed.

Use your watch to time one minute. Most children will raise their hands long before the minute has actually passed. After a minute, call time and let children open their eyes.

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Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was it like to wait for one full minute?
- Tell why you thought being patient and waiting for the minute to pass was hard or easy for you.
- What are other times that it's hard for you to be patient and wait for something?

Say: In our activity, the minute was longer than you thought it would be. It was hard to be patient and wait for the minute to pass. Sometimes it's hard to be patient, especially when we're waiting for something great to happen, like Christmas or a birthday.

But the Bible tells us that God never has a problem being patient. God wants us all to repent, or stop doing the bad things we do. And God is willing to be patient and wait for that to happen. Instead of getting mad and punishing us for all the wrong things we do, God is patient because he loves us. ► GOD CARES FOR US and is patient with us. Let's give God a great big cheer to thank him for loving us so much!

Lead kids in a round of applause and cheering for God. Then have kids repeat the Key Verse with you: **God is patient, and he wants everyone to repent (2 Peter 3:9).**

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BIBLE EXPLORATION

Theo's News

What You'll Do

Say: **Friends, it's time for Theo's News!** Have the children sit in a circle, and begin "Here, Theo" (track 4 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put the Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody!
Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today.
Theo: I hid it in the Surprise Box.
Teacher: Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today.
(Invite a child to open the Surprise Box, and have kids pass the small bottle of oil around the circle. Give children time to guess what they might learn from the Bible today.)
Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this cooking oil in the Surprise Box?
Theo: Well, because we need cooking oil to make many of our foods.
Teacher: Friends, what does your mom or dad use cooking oil for?
(Pause for kids to answer your question.)

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Summer Quarter

Theo: My mom and dad add oil to recipes for cakes or muffins, and we use oil to cook all kinds of food.

Teacher: You know, the Bible tells us about a widow and her two sons. **GOD CARES FOR US**, and God cared for the widow and her sons by doing something wonderful with oil. Let's listen to find out what God did!

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Elisha and the Widow

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to 2 Kings 4, and show children the words. Tell children that the Bible is God's special book.

Say: The Bible shows us how ► GOD CARES FOR US. The Bible tells us about a widow who lived with her two sons. Her husband had died, and she owed people a lot of money, but she had no way to pay the people back. Direct the kids to check their pockets for money. She didn't even have food to eat for the next week, so she asked Elisha for help. Elisha was a prophet, which means that he gave people messages from God. Have kids tell about a time they needed help.

Say: The widow asked Elisha for help, and Elisha asked the woman what she had in her house and how he could help her. She told him that all she had left that was worth any money was a little bit of cooking oil in a jar. We'll pretend that this colored water is the little bit of oil that the widow had. Hold up the pitcher with a small amount of colored water. Elisha told the widow to go to all of her neighbors and ask to borrow lots and lots of empty jars. Let's pretend to be the woman looking for jars, and let's look around our room for empty paper cups. Help the children find all of the hidden cups; then have them sit down in a circle, making sure that each child is holding an empty cup.

Say: After the widow collected lots of jars, Elisha told her to take her small jar of oil and pour oil into the borrowed jars.

Hold up the pitcher with just a small amount of colored water in it. Ask the children to guess how many of their cups you'll be able to fill with just the little bit of "oil." Then fill the cups with what you have in your pitcher. (You should be able to fill only two or three small cups.) Compare the actual results with the estimates.

Say: Hmmm. It looks like we could use some more oil—I'd like to be able to fill all of our cups, just like what happened in the Bible.



Bible Time: Elisha and the Widow Supplies

Bible

1 paper cup per child 1 large, clear pitcher with just enough water to fill 2 or 3 cups and another large, clear pitcher filled with water yellow food coloring 1 adult volunteer

Bible Time: Elisha and the Widow Easy Prep

Add yellow food coloring to water to make it look like cooking oil.

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Hide the cups around the room and arrange for a volunteer to come in with the full pitcher.



Have the volunteer bring in the large pitcher of colored water, and say, "It looks like we have some more cups to fill. Let me take care of you like God took care of the widow!" Then ask the children to estimate how many more cups can be filled with the liquid in the large pitcher of "oil." Pour the liquid into all of the remaining paper cups. Try to make sure you have enough to fill all of the cups (just like in the Bible).

Say: Just like [name of volunteer] took care of us and brought us more oil, God did a miracle and helped the widow! She had just a little bit of oil to start with, but God gave the widow enough oil to fill all of the jars! Elisha then told the woman to sell the oil and use the money to pay back the people she owed money to. She even had enough left over to buy food for herself and her sons. God sent Elisha to help the widow and her sons, and ▶ GOD CARES FOR US, too.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did you think when we didn't have enough oil? when more oil was given to us?
- How has God helped you when you've needed something?

Say: God helped the widow and her sons when they were in need. God helps us, too. Maybe we're sad and need some comfort, or hungry and need something to eat, or lonely and need a friend. God gives us people who love and care for us **because GOD CARES FOR US.** Let the kids come up one at a time and repeat the Bible Point as they pour the liquid back into the pitchers.

Say: Just as Sold CARES FOR US, just as he cared for the widow and her sons, Jesus also cared for people in need when he was on earth. Jesus healed people who were sick, he gave comfort and love to people who were sad or broken on the inside, and Jesus died for all of us so that we could be forgiven for all of the bad things we do. Jesus cared for people in need when he was on earth, and Jesus is caring for you today! Jesus loves you and wants you to care for people in need just as he did.

At the end of the Bible Time activity, set aside the supplies for use in the Center 3: "Estimating Oil" activity.

WEAVING FAITH

INTO LIFE

Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

Filling the Jar

What You'll Do

Set out washable markers, glue sticks, scissors, and craft sticks. Distribute the Lesson 1 pages from My Bible Playground, and have kids write their names on their papers with washable markers.

Say: ► GOD CARES FOR US. When the widow gave Elisha all of her oil, God filled her jars full of oil. Let's make a craft that can remind us of how God took care of the widow and how ► GOD CARES FOR US.

Have the children each cut out the oil shape on the student page and glue the shape to a craft stick. Help each child cut the slit on the jar on the page; then slip the craft stick and "oil" cutout through the slit from behind the page. Encourage kids to take turns retelling what happened with Elisha and the widow as they move the craft sticks and watch their jars fill with oil.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Tell about a time someone took care of you or helped you.
- How can remembering what happened to the widow help you the next time you need care?
- Who can you tell about God's love and care?

Say: God cared for the widow by giving her more oil than she needed. God cares for us by giving us family, friends, and so many blessings. Let's tell everyone that ▶ GOD CARES FOR US.

Oil's Well That Ends Well

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands. Form groups of four and gather each group around their bowl. Encourage children to work together to place several pieces of torn bread into each group's bowl. As they work, hand out an extra bowl for every group and tell kids not to put bread into this bowl.

Say: Today, our Bible lesson helped us discover how Elisha made sure that the widow had all the oil she needed—and then some! Oil was very important in Bible times. It was used to bake bread and to cook other good things. Today we also use oil to cook. One of the things we make with oil is salad dressing. The oil and spices

Ask:

- How does the oil help our snacks?
- How does God help us when we need it?
- Why do you think God cares for people in need?

CENTER 3:

Estimating Oil

What You'll Do

Say: ► GOD CARES FOR US. And God wants us to help care for others as well. But sometimes it can be hard to know just the right way to "pour out" our love and care to others.

Set out the pitcher of colored water and cups. Let children estimate how many of the containers they can fill with the liquid. (Have kids pour the water over dishpans to make cleanup easier.) Ask kids to name a way they can care for others each time they pour "oil" in a container.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why weren't we able to fill all the containers?
- Tell about a time you wanted to care for someone, but you didn't know how to help.
- How can God help you the next time you face a situation like that?

Say: God wants us to help and care for others. But sometimes it can be hard to know exactly what to do. When we face times like that, we can turn to God for help. Aren't you glad that ► GOD CARES FOR US!

CENTER 4:

God is Good!

What You'll Do

Say: Today we learned what the Bible says happened when God used Elisha to care for a widow and her family. God cared for the widow and her family when they were in need, and ▶ GOD CARES FOR US when we're in need, too. But sometimes when we're scared or hurting, it's hard to remember that God cares for us. That's why we're going to make "God Cares" jars—to help us remember that ▶ GOD CARES FOR US.

Set out the scissors, decorative items, glue sticks, and washable markers. Give each child a copy of the "God Cares Jar" handout, and have kids cut along the dotted line. Have kids fold their cutouts on the solid line and glue the sides of the jar together, leaving the top open. As the glue dries, have kids decorate the blank side of their paper jar with the supplies you laid out.

After they finish, have kids turn their paper jars to the side that says "God Cares!"

Say: This side tells what your family can do with the jar at home. Read the instructions to the children. This jar can help your family remember the times God has cared for your family in the past. And the jar can remind your family that ► GOD CARES FOR US always! Let's go ahead and put in one reminder now!

Have kids each think of a time God has taken care of his or her family and write or draw that memory on a slip of paper. Have kids place the paper inside the top of their jar. Encourage kids to show their jars to their parents, and to tell them about how God helped the widow and her family.

After the children have cleaned up the centers, bring everyone back to sit in a circle on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage children to share what they learned from the Bible today.

Also use this time to challenge kids in their faith. Encourage them to choose a Daily Challenge for applying today's lesson to their lives this week. Use this challenge for encouraging your children's growing relationships with Jesus.

Say: Today we learned that ► GOD CARES FOR US. I'd like each of you to choose a way that you can care for someone else this week.

Read these three Daily Challenge ideas for kids to choose from:

- Have your mom or dad help you go through your old toys. Donate the toys you no longer need to your school or church.
- Give your pet food and water each day this week.
- Have your mom or dad help you make a get well card for someone who is sick. Deliver it and remind that person that God cares for him or her.

Have kids each whisper in your ear or tell you which idea they've chosen, and then circle it on each child's My Bible Playground page. Make sure you choose a challenge as well and tell kids which challenge you chose. 



God Heals Naaman's Leprosy

2 Kings 5:1-16

The word *humble* will probably be new to most 5- and 6-year-olds, but they'll soon catch on to its meaning. Many kindergarteners are moving beyond the self-centered view of the world that so often pervades the early stages of childhood. They're learning that no person is better than another—we're all made by God. Remind the children that following God shows that we're humble. Use this lesson to help children learn to respect God as number one in their lives!

God Heals Naaman's Leprosy

2 Kings 5:1-16

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Victory for the Enemy?

As this passage begins, it's easy to be confused by the statement that the Lord gave victory to a commander in the army of Aram. However, it's unlikely that these victories were over Israel. Instead, they were likely victories of Syria (Aram) over the Assyrians who were threatening them. No doubt Naaman didn't recognize God's assistance at the time, but the writer of Kings did.

Young Girl Offered Advice

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At this time a peace treaty between Israel and Aram was in effect, but part of the border was in dispute. It was likely during one of these border skirmishes that the young Israelite girl was taken captive and became a servant in Naaman's household. This girl was aware of the miracles Elisha had performed, and she had faith that he could work a miracle in Naaman's life as well.

It's interesting that a slave girl from Israel was aware that God was working through Elisha, but that the king of Israel didn't think of Elisha when Naaman came to him for healing. The king of Israel saw only a deception designed to provoke a war between the two countries.

Naaman Struggled With His Pride

When Naaman left for Israel to see Elisha, he took about 750 pounds of silver and 150 pounds of gold. At current prices, that would equal over \$200,000 in silver and nearly \$3 million in gold! Naaman was prepared to pay well for his healing!

Even though Naaman was willing to pay so much money to be healed, initially he was unwilling to follow Elisha's instructions to rinse himself in the Jordan River. Naaman may have hoped for an instant, easy cure, but God apparently wanted Naaman to learn something from the experience. The Jordan was no doubt muddy, and God may have used this method to reveal Naaman's pride and test his faith. When Naaman's servants finally convinced him to humble himself and do as the prophet said, God healed him.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus set the prime example of humility, giving up his place in heaven and taking his place on earth as a relatively poor Jewish man.

What prideful things are you holding onto? Which of God's commands feels too "beneath you"? Ask God to humble you and help you follow Jesus' example, giving up anything you feel entitled to. You can write your prayer here.

Tip Consistently use the same signal to announce a transition to the next activity. You could flip the lights off and on, use a train whistle, have a puppet rustling inside a bag, or sing cleanup songs. Keep it simple, consistent, and fun.

What You'll Do

As the children arrive, greet each one with a smile. When it's time to begin, use your signal to bring the children together in a circle. Lead the kids in singing "Those Who Hope" (Isaiah 40:31) (track 6 on the CD). After kids learn the words, encourage the children to join you in doing the motions in parentheses.

Say: **GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM, and sometimes that means being patient.** Let's find out more about patience.

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Pass the Patience

What You'll Do

Have children form a circle and sit down. Open your Bible to 2 Peter 3:9, and show children the words.

Say: Our Key Verse comes from the book of second Peter in the Bible. Listen to what the Bible says: "The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. He is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance" (2 Peter 3:9). This means that God is patient, and he wants everyone to repent. Let's say that together.

Lead the children in repeating the simplified Key Verse with you: **God is patient, and he** wants everyone to repent (2 Peter 3:9).

Say: God wants everyone, including you and me, to turn away from the bad things we do. And God loves us so much that he's patient with us as we learn to follow him and do what he says. Let's play a game to help us understand what it means to be patient.

Have children form two single-file lines on one side of the room. Give the first child in each line a balloon. Say: **Each person will have a turn to place the balloon on his or her head and walk to the other side of the room and back without using your hands and without the balloon falling off. If the balloon falls off, you will just place it back on your head and keep going. When you return to the line, you will pass the balloon to the next person in line.** Make sure kids understand that the game isn't a race.

Start the game. Keep playing until everyone has had a turn.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was it like when you had to start fresh?
- To repent means to turn around and start fresh. Tell about a time you stopped doing something wrong.
- Why do you think God is patient with us as we learn to repent and obey him?

Say: In this game you had to be patient with yourself as you tried to keep the balloon balanced on your head. You had to walk slowly and not get upset if it fell off. After all, you're not perfect, and it was a hard thing to do. And you had to have patience with the other people in your line as they tried this new task, too.

That's kind of like how it is with God. We're not perfect, so we had trouble with this game. Since we're not perfect, we still do bad things even if we try to follow God all the time. But instead of getting mad every time we mess up, God helps us follow and obey him. ► GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM, and he's patient with us as we learn to repent and obey.



Theo's News

What You'll Do

Say: **Friends, it's time for Theo's News!** Have the children sit in a circle. Then begin "Here, Theo" (track 4 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put the Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody!

Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today. **Theo:** I hid it in the Surprise Box.

Teacher: Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today.

(Invite a child to open the Surprise Box, and have the kids pass the sealed container of muddy water around the circle. Give children time to guess what they might learn from the Bible today.)

Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this container of muddy water in our Surprise Box? **Theo:** Well, I heard that the Bible talks about someone who had to take a bath in some very yucky water!

Teacher: Friends, would you want to take a bath in water that looked like this? (*Pause for kids to answer your question.*)

Teacher: The man in the Bible didn't want to wash in the muddy water, but he followed God's instructions. **GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM**, too. Let's listen to find out

how God helped this man follow him! **Theo:** Have fun, boys and girls! **Teacher:** Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Naaman Is Healed

What You'll Do

Pretend that the doorway of your meeting room is the door to Elisha's home. Gather the kids on the opposite side of the room from the door. Open your Bible to 2 Kings 5, and show children the words. Tell children that the Bible is God's special book.

Say: The Bible tells us that ► GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM. Naaman was a man who was a great leader of many soldiers. Stand and pretend that you're Naaman's soldiers. Pause to let kids stand in a straight line.

Say: Naaman was a great leader, but he was very proud. Naaman always wanted to be first in everything. Stand up tall as you walk proudly to the front of the line. Lead kids in marching around the room, and then let them sit down.

Say: ► GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM. God wants to be our leader. God wants us to remember that *he's* the great one, not us. Well, even though Naaman was a great leader, he had two problems. First, (hold up one finger) he didn't know God; and second, (hold up two fingers) he was sick with a disease called leprosy. Leprosy is a disease that causes sores all over a person's skin. Let's pretend that we have sores on our arms. Put a few smudges of shaving cream on each child's arms. Put some on your arms, too. Have willing children talk about a time they were sick and what happened to them.

Say: Naaman's wife had a young servant girl who loved God. When the girl heard that Naaman was sick, she told Naaman's wife about the prophet Elisha who could cure Naaman. So Naaman went to Israel hoping that he would be healed.

Proud Naaman traveled to Israel with his horses and chariots to display his wealth. Chariots are like fancy wagons. Naaman thought he could use his great riches to buy healing for his body. Let's pretend to be proud, rich Naaman and go to Israel with all of our fancy horses and chariots. Prompt kids to walk tall and proud or pretend to ride horses. Lead them to the doorway of your room.

Say: ► GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM. God wants our hearts to be focused on him and thankful, not proud. Naaman was proud that he had beautiful horses and chariots and lots of money.

Finally, Namaan arrived at Elisha's house. Pause for the children to knock. **But Elisha didn't come to the door. He sent a messenger to tell Naaman to wash himself seven times in the Jordan River to be healed. Naaman couldn't believe**

that Elisha hadn't come to the door himself to give him that message! He thought that Elisha would come out to see such an important man as Naaman! Well, that made Naaman mad. "How dare Elisha not come out of his house to greet me!" he thought. "What a joke! And now he wants me to go wash seven times in that nasty water? No way!" Have the children stomp back toward the other side of the room.

Say: Sometimes following God means being willing to do things that we might not fully understand. Naaman's servants came to Naaman and told him they thought that if Elisha had asked him to do something impressive, Naaman would've done it. So why wouldn't Naaman try a simple thing like washing in the Jordan River? Naaman decided to follow God, and he washed seven times in the muddy water. Let's pretend to go to the river like Naaman and wash our arms.

Encourage kids to slowly count to seven as they bend down and pretend to go into the water seven times. When kids reach the seventh time, have them shout the number seven, and give them wet wipes to clean off all of the shaving cream. Then let the children share high fives. Celebrate that everyone is clean!

Fold the "God Heals Naaman" poster lengthwise, and show children the right side of the poster with the two men and the muddy water. Say: When Naaman followed God, he got better! The leprosy was gone! Naaman realized that he shouldn't have been so proud and that he should have followed God. Naaman thought, "God is greater than I am!" Have everyone repeat what Naaman thought. Naaman went back to Elisha and told him that he believed in God. ► GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM, too.

Show children the Naaman figure you cut out of the poster, and slide it though the slit.

Say: We're going to dip Naaman in the muddy Jordan River. Each time we dip Naaman, let's all say ways we can follow God.

Pass the Naaman figure around and allow each child to "dip" the Naaman figure in the river by sticking the figure through the slit in the poster and then pulling the figure down behind the river and then back up above the water. Each time Naaman is dipped in the water, encourage children to shout out ways that they can follow God in their life.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why is it hard for proud people like Naaman to follow God?
- What things can stop you from following God?
- What could you say to someone to help him or her follow God?

Say: God wants us to know how important he is, and not act like we're the most important ones. God is greater than everyone. ► GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM.





Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

Obedient Naaman

What You'll Do

Say: Naaman had leprosy, which gave him spots all over his body. Today's pages will help us remember what happened when Naaman followed God.

Set out white chalk and wet wipes. Distribute the My Bible Playground pages, and have the kids write their names on their papers with washable markers. Have kids form pairs and help each other retell how Naaman learned to follow God. Ask kids to use chalk to color "leprosy spots" on Naaman's arms. Then, tell how Naaman obeyed and washed in the river as kids use wet wipes to remove the chalk spots.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Explain why washing in muddy water would be easy or hard for you.
- Why do you think Naaman had such a hard time following Elisha's instructions from God?
- Why is it important to always follow God?

Say: At first, Naaman was proud and thought he was too great and important to do what God said. Later Naaman learned that *God* is more important than anyone else. God healed Naaman when he followed God. ► GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM, just as Naaman did.

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands.

Say: In the Bible passage, Naaman finally followed God by dipping in the Jordan River seven times. Before we make a snack to remind us of our Scripture, let's follow God by saying a prayer of thanks. Have children close their eyes and bow their heads.

Pray: Dear God, thank you for always knowing what's best for us. Thank you for being patient with us as we follow you. In Jesus' name, amen.

Give each child a cup of chocolate pudding and a spoon. Explain that the pudding represents the muddy Jordan River. Then give each child seven bear- or elf-shaped cookies. Tell kids that the cookies represent Naaman. Explain that before kids eat each of their cookies, you'll lead them in dipping their cookies in their pudding seven times. Count to seven for each cookie, and enjoy the treats.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did following my instructions make your cookies taste better?
- How did following God make Naaman's life better?

Say: God wanted Naaman to follow him. SOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM, too. God knows what's best for us, just as he knew what was best for Naaman. Let's try to remember to follow God all week and do what he wants us to do.

CENTER 3:

Hide and Find

What You'll Do

Tell kids to form a circle. Say: Great job following directions! Let's play a game that will help us remember that ► GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM and his directions.

Ask a willing child to be the Seeker and stand in a corner with his or her eyes closed. Say: While your eyes are closed, I'll ask someone to hide an object somewhere in this room. Everyone else will get to see where it's hidden.

Ask another willing child to be the Hider and hide the small object you brought somewhere in the room. Then have the Seeker turn around and try to find the object.

Encourage children to provide the Seeker with simple directions, such as "Walk," "Turn," and "Stop," to help him or her find the item. Once the Seeker finds the object, choose a new Seeker and a new Hider and continue playing as time allows.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was this game like for you?
- How did your friends help you?
- How was having the group help you like having God help you?
- Why do you think it's important to follow God's directions?

Say: It was much easier to win the game when you followed your team's instructions. ► GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM and that means following his directions. Let's remember to follow God in everything we say and do.



Seeing Spots

What You'll Do

Say: God healed Naaman. Naaman was sick and had spots all over his body, but God healed him. Let's make something that will help us remember what happened.

Give each child a copy of the "Naaman Outline" handout. Explain that the figure represents Naaman. Set out fine-tipped washable markers and let kids color clothes, hair, and facial features on their figures.

When kids have finished coloring their Naaman figures, go around the room and tape a sheet of wax paper on top of each child's Naaman page. Tape the papers together only at the top so kids can lift the sheet of wax paper.

Show kids how to look through the wax paper to see the Naaman figure underneath. Have kids each use a permanent marker to trace the outline on the wax paper page and then draw spots all over the wax paper figure.

Say: At first, Naaman wasn't willing to follow God. He thought he was too important to dip himself in the yucky Jordan River. But when Naaman finally let go of his pride and followed God's directions, God healed Naaman! Let's use our papers to see what that was like!

Lead kids in counting to seven, just as Naaman dipped himself in the river seven times. Then have kids lift the wax paper up to see Naaman's spots disappear! Encourage kids to use their pictures to tell their families about Naaman. Remind them that God wanted Naaman to follow him, and **GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM,** too.

Say: Say: GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM. Just as we counted to seven before lifting the wax paper, Naaman dipped himself in the river seven times. He showed that he wasn't afraid to follow God, and we can, too!

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Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

After the children have cleaned up their centers, bring everyone back to sit in a circle on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage children to share what they learned from the Bible today.

Also use this time to challenge kids in their faith. Encourage them to choose a Daily Challenge for applying today's lesson to their lives this week. Use this challenge for encouraging your children's growing relationships with Jesus.

Talk With Kids

Say: Today we learned that ► GOD WANTS US TO FOLLOW HIM. I'd like each of you to choose one of these Daily Challenges to remember how we can follow God.

Read these three Daily Challenge ideas for kids to choose from:

- Obey your parents when they ask you to do something you don't like to do.
- Help someone pick up toys, even if you didn't help make the mess.
- Take a bath without whining or complaining—remember that Naaman obeyed God and took a bath in the muddy Jordan River!

Have kids each whisper in your ear or tell you which idea they've chosen, and then circle it on each child's My Bible Playground page. Make sure you choose a challenge as well and tell kids which challenge you chose. Your commitment will inspire children and will give them an opportunity to see God at work in your life as well as in theirs!

Lead the children in singing "Help Me Follow" (not on the CD) to the tune of "Give Me Oil in My Lamp." After kids have learned the words, encourage them to sing and do the motions in parentheses with you.

Oh, dear God, please help me (point up)
To follow, follow, follow. (march in place)
Oh, dear God, please help me-today! (point to self; then nod head)
Hallelujah! (wave hands high in the air)

Oh, dear God, please help me (point up) **To follow, follow, follow.** (march in place) **help me follow** (point to self) **In all of your ways.** (hold hands out, palms up)


End the prayer by saying together, "In Jesus' name, amen."

Jonah Learns a Lesson

Jonah 1–3

M ost 5- and 6-year-olds have been told many times what are the right and wrong things to do. But many children may've never thought about the difference between following God's ways and walking away from God's ways in their own lives. Help your children understand that the wrong things we do are sins and, therefore, are not God's ways. We can know what God wants us to do by reading the Bible and following his instructions. Use this lesson to help children learn the importance of doing what God wants.

Jonah Learns a Lesson

Jonah 1–3

BIBLE BACKGROUND

The Setting

Nineveh was the capital of Assyria. The Assyrians were known for their power and cruelty, and it was because of their wickedness that God commanded Jonah to preach to them (Jonah 1:2). According to classical writers, Nineveh was the largest city in the world at that time, encompassing an area about eight miles in circumference. In addition, a group of four large cities in the area was also referred to by the name *Nineveh*.

The Conflict

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Jonah's reluctance to go to Nineveh may have arisen from fear for his own safety—no one likes the bearer of bad news! Or it may be because he feared that the people of Nineveh would repent of their evil ways and that God in his compassion would forgive them. Jonah may have selfishly felt that the salvation of the Ninevites would ruin his credibility as a prophet, since he had foretold their destruction. He also may not have thought it would be fair if God saved Nineveh since his own people, the Israelites, had been punished for their sins. Whatever the reason, it's clear Jonah had no interest in God's call.

Strange Salvation

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
Being swallowed by a fish would be traumatic, to say the least, but in this case the event was arranged by God to save Jonah's life. For in the belly of that fish, Jonah came to his senses and realized that he needed to obey God.

We don't know why the people of Nineveh responded so positively to Jonah's message. Perhaps God had prepared their hearts. Or maybe Jonah looked really odd after having spent three days in the digestive juices of a fish, and his journey shook them up. At any rate, God spared the Ninevites when they repented—until about 150 years later when God exacted judgment on them for returning to their evil ways.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus is often associated with Jonah, because he spent three days in the tomb just as Jonah spent three days in the fish. But he wasn't there for his own lack of following God—he was there for ours.

In what ways have you run from God? How can you follow him better this week? Talk with God about how you're like or unlike Jonah, and thank God for his faithful direction in your life. Ask God to help you follow him even if you don't like where he leads. You can write your prayer here.

Tip Consistently use the same signal to announce a transition to the next activity. You could flip the lights off and on, use a train whistle, have a puppet rustling inside a bag, or sing cleanup songs. Keep it simple, consistent, and fun.

What You'll Do

As the children arrive, greet each one with a smile. When it's time to begin, use your signal to bring children together in a circle. When it's time to begin, start the CD, and lead kids in singing "Yay! We Love God" (track 2 on the CD) to the tune of "Pop! Goes the Weasel" Encourage kids to join you in singing and doing the motions.

We've come to learn about God's love (hold hands and march in a circle) And spread his love around. (continue marching) We've come to praise and give him thanks. Yay! We love God! (jump up) (Repeat 2x.)

Say: Today's we'll learn about a man named Jonah who learned to \blacktriangleright DO WHAT GOD WANTS. God has plans for us, and he leads the way. I'll lead the way for you right now. Let's sing a song, and I'll lead you in doing the motions.

Begin the CD, and lead the kids in singing "The Plans I Have for You" (Jeremiah 29:11) (track 8 on the CD). Each time the children sing "plans," have them place their hands side by side and look at their hands as if they're reading a book. Have them show their "plans" to other children.

(Verse) "For I know the plans I have for you," Declares the Lord. "I know the plans I have for you," Declares the Lord. (Repeat.)

Timeout

What You'll Do

Sit in a circle with kids. Open your Bible to 2 Peter 3:9, and show them the words.

Say: Our Key Verse comes from the book of 2 Peter in the Bible. Listen to what the Bible says: "The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. He is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance" (2 Peter 3:9). This means that God is patient, and he wants everyone to repent. Let's say that together.

Lead the children in repeating the simplified Key Verse with you: **God is patient, and he** wants everyone to repent (2 Peter 3:9).

Say: To be patient means not to be in a hurry, but to wait for something to happen. To repent means to stop doing bad things. God is happy when we obey him. We can ▶ DO WHAT GOD WANTS. God wanted a man named Jonah to go to a city called Nineveh, but Jonah didn't do what God wanted. In fact, Jonah ran the other way! We'll learn from the Bible today about how God sent a big fish to swallow Jonah! God was patient and gave Jonah three whole days to be inside the fish and think about what he'd done. That's a long "timeout"!

Set out scissors, crayons, and a stapler. Give each child a copy of the "Jonah and the Giant Fish" handout. Have children color the pictures of Jonah and the fish and then cut out all the pictures. Have children staple the fish together, but leave an opening for the mouth so Jonah will fit inside. Help kids place Jonah inside the fish's mouth as a reminder of his "timeout."

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Tell about a time you got a timeout or had to think about something bad you did.
- What happened after you thought about that bad thing for a while?

Say: Usually, when God gives us time to think about something bad we've done, we feel sorry for the bad thing and we tell God we're sorry. Today, we'll learn what Jonah did when God gave him a timeout. God is patient, and he wants everyone to repent. We can say we're sorry and ▶ DO WHAT GOD WANTS!

Encourage kids to squeeze their fish to open and shut the fishes' mouths as they wait for Jonah to repent. Let kids have fun asking Jonah if he's sorry and if he's repented yet. Have kids take their fish home to remind them that God is patient, and he wants everyone to repent.

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Theo's News

What You'll Do

Say: **Friends, it's time for Theo's News!** Have the children sit in a circle. Then begin "Here, Theo" (track 4 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put the Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody!

Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today. **Theo:** I hid it in the Surprise Box.

Teacher: Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today.

(Ask a child to open the Surprise Box, and have the kids pass the spray bottle with water around the circle so the rest of the children can see it up close. Give children time to guess what they might learn from the Bible today.)

Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this spray bottle in our Surprise Box?

Theo: Well, you told me that today the Bible lesson has something to do with water. **Teacher:** Friends, what can we use spray bottles for?

(Pause for kids to answer your question.)

Theo: Things can get pretty wet if you spray them with water.

Teacher: That's right, and Jonah ended up getting wet in today's Bible passage. Let's find out what happened when Jonah had to decide whether he was going to ► **DO WHAT GOD WANTS!**

Theo's News Supplies

CD player Surprise Box (any box will do) Theo puppet spray bottle with water in it

Teacher Pack CD: "Here, Theo" (track 4)

Theo's News Easy Prep

Put the spray bottle with water inside the Surprise Box, and hide the box where it's easily accessible.

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Theo: Have fun, boys and girls! **Teacher:** Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Jonah

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Jonah 1, and show children the words. Tell children that the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Today, we're discovering how the Bible tells us to ▶ DO WHAT GOD WANTS. God told a man named Jonah to go to a city called Nineveh. God told Jonah to warn the people to stop doing bad things. Jonah didn't want to do what God told him to do, so he tried to run away from God. Give each child a boat ticket, and have the children sit together on the overturned table. Say: Jonah got on a ship that was headed away from Nineveh. Point out the signs to Nineveh and Tarshish, and show children that Tarshish is in the opposite direction from Nineveh. Say: God brought a storm that put the boat in danger. The wind blew and the waves splashed. Have kids tell about a time they were in a storm, and then have them pretend they are in a boat during a storm. Have kids rock back and forth in the make-believe boat as you spray them lightly with water.

Say: Jonah didn't even know about the storm. He was asleep in the bottom of the boat. The sailors woke Jonah and asked him why God sent this storm. Jonah knew it was because of his choice not to do what God wanted. God was trying to get Jonah's attention. Jonah told the men to throw him into the stormy sea, and then God would calm the storm. The men didn't want to throw Jonah into the water, but the storm kept getting worse and they were concerned the entire boat would sink. So they threw Jonah overboard. Have the children climb off the overturned table and pretend they're sinking. But as Jonah sank into the water, God sent a giant fish to swallow him. Have kids crawl under the table you covered with the blanket and pretend they're inside a giant fish. Jonah was in the belly of that fish for three days! Have kids act out what it would be like if they were inside a fish for three days.

Say: When Jonah was in the fish's belly, he said a prayer to thank God for saving his life. Jonah promised that he'd change his ways. Then God caused the fish to spit Jonah up on the shore. One at a time, have the children come out from under the table. Say: Once more, God told Jonah to go to Nineveh. This time Jonah obeyed God and went to talk to the people there. Have the children walk to the Nineveh sign on the wall and say, "Please stop doing bad things! Do what God wants!" Say: The people listened to Jonah, and they turned away from the bad things they'd done. And Jonah also finally learned to ▶ DO WHAT GOD WANTS.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in the discussion.

Ask:

- Why is it important to ▶ DO WHAT GOD WANTS?
- What are some things you know God wants you to do?

Say: Jonah had to go through some pretty scary things to learn to ► DO WHAT GOD WANTS. We can learn from Jonah and remember that God wants us to love others and to love God. The Bible helps us know what God wants us to do. We can also follow Jesus' example to help us obey God. When Jesus was on earth, he obeyed God and followed God's commands. Jesus loved God and wanted to serve and obey God.



WEAVING FAITH INTO LIFE

Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

Jonah's Journey

What You'll Do

Distribute the My Bible Playground student pages, and have the kids write their names on their papers with washable markers. Say: Jonah learned that the best way to go through life is to ► DO WHAT GOD WANTS. The maze on today's page is a good example of that.

Show children the paths on the student pages—the right destination (Nineveh) and the wrong destination (Tarshish). Have children use colored pencils to trace along the wrong path on their pages, and let children put frowning face stickers at Tarshish. Then let children each trace along the right path and stick a smiling face sticker at Nineveh.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did you find the right way on the page?
- What can you do to find out what God wants?
- How does God help you follow his ways?

Stuck Inside a Fish

What You'll Do

Have kids clean their hands. Explain that they'll prepare a snack and use it to retell Jonah's adventure. Give each child a pita bread half to represent the big fish and gummy bears to represent Jonah. Have children form pairs and use their snacks to tell their partners what happened to Jonah. Then have kids say a prayer, and let them eat their snacks.

Say: God loves us and he knows what's best for us. God knew it was best for Jonah to go to Nineveh. It made God happy when Jonah obeyed him and went to Nineveh. We can obey God and ▶ DO WHAT GOD WANTS, just as Jonah did when he finally went to Nineveh.

CENTER 3:

God's Way

What You'll Do

Say: Let's play a game to help us remember that we can b DO WHAT GOD WANTS.

Take down the Nineveh and Tarshish signs that you used during the Bible Time activity. Flip the signs over to show the Smiling Face and Frowning Face pictures of Jonah. Ask one willing child to be the Leader and hold up both pictures on one side of the room, and have the other children stand on the opposite side of the room. As the Leader holds up the picture of the smiling face (Nineveh), the other children may start crab walking across the room. When the Leader holds up the frowning face (Tarshish), children can stand up and start walking normally. Have the Leader alternate the two signs until all of the children have crossed the room. Then everyone can give high fives and say, ▶ "DO WHAT GOD WANTS."

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What made this game hard?
- Tell about a time it was hard to do the right thing.
- What helps you DO WHAT GOD WANTS even when it's hard?

CENTER 4:

Changing Ways

What You'll Do

Say: Jonah tried to run away from doing what God wanted. He disobeyed and ran the opposite direction. Sometimes we go the wrong way instead of doing what God wants. But we can always change our ways.

Hand a cup of water and one of the "God's Way Arrows" to each child. Have children say the following rhyme:

Jonah, Jonah disobeyed. God forgave him anyway.

Say: Jonah disobeyed by going the opposite direction from where God wanted him to go. These arrows represent Jonah going the wrong way. Jonah was swallowed up by a huge fish. Inside the fish, Jonah realized that the right thing is to \triangleright DO WHAT GOD WANTS us to do.

Have children hold their arrows on the other sides of their cups and look through their water at their arrow. Instruct children to slowly move the piece of paper away from themselves until they see a change. When they see the change (the arrow switching direction), tell kids to say the rhyme one more time.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What surprised you about the arrows?
- What surprises you about people disobeying God?
- Why do you think Jonah couldn't hide from God when he was trying to avoid obeying God?

Say: We see through this water, just as God sees into our hearts. In the Bible, Jonah learned to ► DO WHAT GOD WANTS. When we mess up and go the wrong way in our lives, we can tell God we're sorry and then ► DO WHAT GOD WANTS, too!





Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

After the children have cleaned up the centers, bring everyone back to sit in a circle on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage children to share what they learned from the Bible today.

Also use this time to challenge kids in their faith. Encourage them to choose a Daily Challenge for applying today's lesson to their lives this week. Use this challenge for encouraging your children's growing relationships with Jesus.

Talk With Kids

Say: Today we learned that we can ► DO WHAT GOD WANTS. I'd like each of you to choose a way you can do what God wants this week.

Read these three Daily Challenge ideas for kids to choose from:

- Help clean up after dinner.
- Make a nice card for your teacher.
- If you do something wrong, ask for forgiveness from God and from the person you hurt.

Have kids each whisper in your ear or tell you which idea they've chosen, and then circle it on each child's My Bible Playground page. Make sure you choose a challenge as well and tell kids which challenge you chose. 

Jonah Complains About God's Compassion Jonah 3:10-4:11

BIBLE BACKGROUND

Not Enough Change

From this passage, it's apparent that Jonah's experience in the belly of the great fish had changed his course of action, but it hadn't really changed his heart. Essentially he told God, "I told you so!" Jonah hadn't really wanted the Ninevites to be saved from destruction, but God saved them anyway, and that made Jonah angry.

Down in the Dumps

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Jonah had preached that Nineveh would be destroyed, so he may have felt that his reputation was at stake. He would have been glad to see Nineveh destroyed. When Jonah complained to God, God rebuked him, so Jonah went out of the city to wait and see what would happen to it.

God made the vine spring up with miraculous speed in order to shade Jonah. God also provided the worm that cut through the plant and caused it to die. Jonah was devastated by its destruction because he had appreciated the shade it provided. Now for the second time since Nineveh had been saved, he expressed a desire to die.

Great-Hearted God

God put up with Jonah's bad attitude throughout this whole episode. God spared Jonah's life when he disobeyed, and continued to provide for him even after Jonah expressed his anger toward God. God saved the people of Nineveh through Jonah's preaching. But Jonah only responded that it was unfair to save Nineveh. Jonah was selfishly concerned about the vine because it shaded him, but he had no compassion for the more than 120,000 people of Nineveh who needed God. And God didn't like it. When Jonah whined about the destruction of the vine—which God had miraculously provided—and said he wanted to die, God had enough!

The Point

Was God infuriated or brokenhearted when he spoke the words recorded in Jonah 4:10-11? After all that God brought Jonah through, God sorrowfully acknowledged that Jonah still hadn't gotten the point: God loves everyone, and he wants us to love them, too.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus showed love to a lot of people that other Jews didn't like. He shows us what it looks like to love everyone!

Who are some people you have a hard time loving? What can you do to share God's love with those people? Ask God to help you love everyone as he does. You can write your prayer here.

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KEY VERSE ACTIVITY

Be Patient!

What You'll Do

Form a circle with kids and sit down. Open your Bible to 2 Peter 3:9, and show them the words. Say: **Our Key Verse from the Bible says**, **"The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. He is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance" (2 Peter 3:9). That means that God is patient and wants everyone to repent. Let's say that together.**

Lead children in repeating the simplified Key Verse with you: **God is patient, and he** wants everyone to repent (2 Peter 3:9).

Say: We practice being patient when we calmly wait for something without complaining. I have some treats for you (hold up the treats), but you'll need to wait patiently before I give them to you. Put the treats aside.

Say: Repentance means being sorry for the bad things we've done and to turn away from those bad things and do what's right. So our Key Verse means that God is patient with us. God wants us to say we're sorry for the bad things we've done, and then he wants us to stop doing those bad things.

Let's play a game where we say our verse in slow motion. You'll need to be patient until the end, and then I'll give you the treats! Say the simplified Key Verse *very slowly* as you do these simple movements in slow motion.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Say: It's not easy to be patient. The more we want something, the harder it is to wait for it. We can thank God for his patience with us. ► GOD LOVES EVERYONE. He's patient, and he wants everyone to repent.

Now give kids the treat that they've waited so patiently to receive!

What You'll Do

Say: **Friends, it's time for Theo's News!** Have the children sit in a circle. Then begin "Here, Theo" (track 4 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put the Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody!
Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today.
Theo: I hid it in the Surprise Box.
Teacher: Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today.
(Invite a child to open the Surprise Box, and have the kids pass the Wiggly Worm around the circle so the rest of the group can see it up close. Give children time to guess what they might learn from the Bible today.)

Teacher: Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Jonah and the Vine

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Jonah 3, and show children the words. Tell children the Bible is God's special book. Say: **The Bible tells us that** ► **GOD LOVES EVERYONE.** Explain that the people of Nineveh had been doing bad things for a very long time. God patiently waited for them to be sorry for their sins and to change their ways.

Say: Jonah went to Nineveh and told the people that if they didn't say they were sorry for the bad things they'd done, God would destroy their city. Have kids shake with fear and look scared. The people believed God and said they were sorry they'd been bad. And they stopped doing bad things. Have kids give hugs to each other.

Say: ► GOD LOVES EVERYONE, including the people of Nineveh. God had waited for the people of Nineveh to stop doing bad things, and finally they changed. This made God very happy. Have kids give big smiles to each other. But Jonah wasn't happy. Have kids make grumpy faces and stomp around. He didn't love the people of Nineveh the way God did. He didn't want God to be patient and forgive them. So Jonah went outside the city and sat in the hot sun, waiting to see what God would do with Nineveh. Turn on the flashlight, and ask a few willing kids to sit in the light. Ask them to pretend to be Jonah sitting in the hot sun. Encourage kids to wipe their foreheads and pretend to fan each other.

Say: **God made a vine grow beside Jonah. The plant grew quickly and shaded Jonah.** Ask a few willing children to crouch down; then have them be the Vine and grow around the Jonahs. The children can shade the others by spreading their arms and blocking out the light from the flashlight.

Say: Jonah was happy that the vine gave him shade from the hot sun. But the next day, God sent a hungry worm to eat the vine. Let several kids slip the tube socks onto their arms and pretend to be Worms. The Worms can pretend to eat the Vines, and the Vines will wither and no longer block the light from the Jonahs. The Jonahs will again be sitting in the "hot sun" produced by the flashlight.

Say: Jonah cared about the life of a plant, but God wanted Jonah to care about the lives of all of the people and animals in Nineveh. ► GOD LOVES EVERYONE and God wanted Jonah to show love to everyone as well.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Tell about a time you wanted someone to get punished for doing something bad.
- Why can it be hard to forgive people?
- What can we do to show love to everyone the way God does?

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4 WEAVING FAITH

Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

CENTER 1:

Have a Heart

What You'll Do

Set out glue, scissors, and decorative trim. Distribute the My Bible Playground pages, and have the kids write their names on their papers with washable markers.

Say: ► GOD LOVES EVERYONE, but Jonah had a hard time understanding that. We know that ► GOD LOVES EVERYONE, and we can love others, too. It may not be Valentine's Day, but let's make valentines on our pages today to help us remember that ► GOD LOVES EVERYONE.

Have children use their fingers to trace around the hearts on the pages as they repeat the Bible Point: ► GOD LOVES EVERYONE. Tell kids that God also wants us to love everyone—people who love God and people who don't. Let children glue decorative trim around their hearts.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What does God do to show love to us?
- What can you do to show love to others this week?

Say: God loves all people. We can show God's love by helping people, by sharing, and by saying kind words. We can tell people that God loves them. ► GOD LOVES EVERYONE, and we can love everyone, too.

Sqiurmy Snacks

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands.

Say: God used a plant and a worm to show Jonah that ► GOD LOVES EVERYONE. We're going to make our own vine and worm snack to help us remember what happened in the Bible.

Form pairs. Give each child a paper plate, a plastic knife, a dab of cream cheese, a gummy worm, and a large pretzel stick. Have children use their snacks to tell what happened to Jonah. When they get to the part where God made the vine grow, have children spread cream cheese on their pretzel sticks. Before children eat their treats, lead them in a prayer to thank God for loving us. Then have children re-enact the worm eating the vine by taking bites out of their pretzel sticks.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why was it important for Jonah to go to Nineveh and tell the people about God?
- Why is it important to love people the way God loves them?

Say: God wanted Jonah to go to Nineveh because the people there didn't know about God. ► GOD LOVES EVERYONE. We can tell others about God, just as Jonah did!

CENTER 3:

Worm Reception

What You'll Do

Say: Jonah felt bad that the vine died, but he wouldn't have felt sorry if the people of Nineveh had died. He was mad that God took the plant away. He was also mad that God had forgiven the people of Nineveh. Show children the "Jonah Complains" poster. Encourage children to put leaves on the vine by pushing green tissue paper through the holes that you cut out.

Say: God wanted Jonah to love the people of Nineveh, but instead Jonah only felt anger. Even when God sent the vine to give Jonah shade, he still couldn't understand that ▶ GOD LOVES EVERYONE. Let's show how the worm ate away the vine. Have kids pull the green tissue paper out of the holes, and then have kids stick their fingers through the holes so they look like worms on the vine.

Jonah *walked* to Nineveh; he *stood* before the crowd. He told them to stop being mean and turn their hearts to God. The people *listened* to his words, and they began to pray; And Jonah *saw* the people turn away from evil ways.

Jonah *sat* in the hot, hot sun. God grew a plant for shade. The next day God sent down a worm to eat the plant away. This made Jonah very mad. He jumped up to complain. "Why did you let that nice plant die?" he stomped his feet and whined. God said, "You love a vine, but not a town...I tell you, this is true: I love all people everywhere—and, Jonah, so should you."

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why do you think it was hard for Jonah to love the people in Nineveh?
- What can we do to help people know more about God and his love?

Say: Jonah didn't like the mean things the people of Nineveh had done, but God wanted Jonah to love them anyway. ► GOD LOVES EVERYONE, and by being kind and telling everybody about God's love, we can, too.

God Calls Isaiah

Isaiah 6:1-8

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

The Setup

This passage describes God's call upon the life of Isaiah, yet it occurs in the sixth chapter of the book rather than at its beginning. From the earlier chapters, we learn that Judah's relationship with God was deplorable and that God's anger was burning against his people (Isaiah 5:25). We discover that Isaiah had a terribly difficult task ahead of him if he accepted God's call, because he would be preaching of God's displeasure and the coming destruction of Judah to a people who believed they were in line for God's blessings. These chapters also help to explain Isaiah's statement in today's passage that he lived "among a people of unclean lips."

The Holiness

In Isaiah 6:1-4, Isaiah describes the experience of witnessing the awesome holiness of God. In this passage, he attempts to describe a heavenly experience, but he has only earthly terms at his disposal. He says that the train of God's robe filled the spacious hall of the heavenly temple; this emphasizes the splendid magnificence of God's glory. Seraphs are a kind of angel not mentioned anywhere else in the Bible. The Hebrew root word for seraph means "burn," which may be related to the seraphs' purity in serving God. Their cry of "holy, holy, holy" emphasizes God's indescribable holiness.

The Glory

The shaking of the doorposts and thresholds and the smoke that filled the temple also describe Isaiah's experience of God's glory and power. All of this likely reminded Isaiah's Hebrew listeners how God's voice shook the earth and terrified the people when God gave the law at Mount Sinai (Exodus 19:18-19).


The Forgiveness

Isaiah knew that he was unclean and unworthy, but God prepared a cleansing for him. The burning coal was a symbol of both God's wrath and his forgiveness. The live coal didn't cleanse Isaiah; God did. Once his sin was forgiven, Isaiah demonstrated his faith in God by agreeing to serve God by speaking his message.

The Jesus Connection

Greater than a mere symbol of forgiveness like coal, God sent his Son, Jesus, to offer us forgiveness. It is through a relationship with Jesus that we have hope of one day being in God's holy presence.

How has God shown his holiness to you? How have you responded? Ask God to show himself to you more fully. You can write your prayer here.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible says, "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6). Let's say the Key Verse together. Lead the children in repeating the Key Verse and doing the actions with you.

Come, (motion to come with both hands) Let us bow down (bow at the waist) In worship, (fold hands in prayer) Let us kneel (kneel on the floor) Before the Lord our Maker. (raise both hands high) (Psalm 95:6).

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think it means to worship God?
- What are some ways you worship God?

Say: When we worship God, we tell him that he's the most wonderful, awesome Maker of us and the whole world! We can kneel and pray and sing, just as we've done today. ► GOD IS HOLY and we can worship him! Lead kids in repeating the words and actions to the Key Verse.

What You'll Do

Say: **Friends, it's time for Theo's News!** Have children sit in a circle. Then begin "Here, Theo" (track 4 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put the Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody!

Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today. **Theo:** I hid it in the Surprise Box.

Teacher: Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today. (Invite a child to open the Surprise Box, and have the kids pass the potholder around the circle so the rest of the children can see it up close. Give the children time to guess what they might learn from the Bible today.)

Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this potholder in our Surprise Box? **Theo:** Well, sometimes my mom uses this when she's handling hot things. **Teacher:** Friends, who has seen wood burning in a campfire or hot coals in a barbecue grill? (*Pause for kids to answer your question.*) **Teacher:** What happens to the wood or coal after it burns for a while?

(Pause for kids to answer your question.)

Theo: The wood or coal in a fire gets very, very hot.

Teacher: In today's Bible passage, you'll hear about a man named Isaiah who touched a hot coal and learned that **GOD IS HOLY**!

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls! **Teacher:** Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Isaiah

What You'll Do

Have the children clean their hands; then open your Bible to Isaiah 6 and show children the words. Tell them that the Bible is God's special book.

Say: The Bible tells us that \blacktriangleright GOD IS HOLY. *Holy* means perfect and without sin. God doesn't ever sin. God is perfect, wonderful, and awesome. \blacktriangleright GOD IS HOLY! Let's listen to what happened to Isaiah in the Bible when he found out how amazing God is.

Summer Quarter

Play "God Calls Isaiah" (track 11 on the CD). Lay the blanket or towel on the floor when prompted by the track, and have the kids sit around it. Pause the CD when prompted and lead kids in a prayer, having kids tell God something they're sorry for. The second time you're directed to pause the CD, you'll need napkins and chocolate cookies. Kids will touch the cookies to their partners' lips, and then give the cookies to their partners. Have the children set aside the cookies to eat at the end of this activity. At the end of the track, turn off the CD player, and discuss the following questions.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What makes it hard to be perfect like God?
- What do you think about the way God forgave Isaiah?

Say: ► GOD IS HOLY! When Isaiah saw God in heaven, he knew that ► GOD IS HOLY! Isaiah wanted to be forgiven, and he wanted to serve God. Let's tell everyone about our holy God who loves us!

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Say a prayer thanking God for the treats. Then let kids eat their cookies.

INTO LIFE

Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

On Bended Knee

What You'll Do

Set out scissors, washable markers, and glue sticks. Distribute the My Bible Playground pages, and have the kids write their names on their papers with washable markers.

Say: ► GOD IS HOLY, and the Bible says that we can kneel down before God to worship him. Have children cut out the legs at the bottom of their student pages. Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What does it mean that GOD IS HOLY?
- What other ways can we worship God?
- Why do we worship God?

Say: We worship God because > GOD IS HOLY! Praying on our knees, with our eyes closed and our hands folded, is one of the many ways we can worship God. We also worship God when we sing, obey our parents, and help others.

CENTER 2: Burning Coals

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands. Say: Let's make a tasty treat that looks like "burning coals" to remind us of the burning coal we heard about today in the Bible passage.

Have children form pairs and give each child a paper plate with two marshmallows and two pretzel sticks. Demonstrate how to poke the end of a pretzel stick into each marshmallow. Show kids how to hold the pretzel stick and dip the marshmallow into the chocolate syrup to make it look like a piece of coal. Then encourage kids to dip the top of the marshmallow into the red sprinkles so it "glows" like a burning coal! Let each child make two of the burning coal marshmallows.

Before children eat their treats, lead them in a prayer to thank God for being holy.

Say: The Bible tells us that GOD IS HOLY. That means that he's perfect. God has never done anything wrong, and he never will. God wanted Isaiah to give the people God's perfect messages. God wants everyone to know about him. Think of someone you can tell about God this week just like Isaiah bravely told Israel about God. End the activity by kneeling to pray. Ask God to help the children tell others about him, just as Isaiah did.

What You'll Do

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Based on Isaiah's description of God's temple, how big do you think God is?
- What's it like to know that God is bigger than all our problems?

Say: Isaiah knew that ► GOD IS HOLY. He saw God in the temple, and God's robe filled that enormous room. The temple shook and filled with smoke, and the angels sang about God's holiness. We know that ► GOD IS HOLY because we feel his love and see him reflected in all of his beautiful creation. The Bible tells us that ► GOD IS HOLY. Let's tell everyone about our awesome God!

Tinfoil Temples

What You'll Do

Say: In the Bible, we heard how Isaiah saw God seated in the temple. Isaiah explained how amazed he was at God's holiness. Explain that kids will be making pictures of temples to remind them of Isaiah's experience.

Give each child a sheet of construction paper. Set out crayons for them to share. Have children draw and color a temple on their paper. Tell them to include big doors on their temples near the bottom of the page.

While kids are drawing and coloring, go around the room and help each of them cut doors out for the temple. Then help kids glue their pieces of aluminum foil to the back of their pieces of construction paper. Demonstrate how to open and close the construction paper doors to see the shiny foil that represents God's holiness. Encourage children to finish their temples by gluing glitter and sequins onto the temple. After everyone has finished making a temple, gather in a circle.

Say: The temple that Isaiah saw was a beautiful place. Isaiah described many shiny, glittery things in the temple, as well as angels and the voice of God. The angels worshipped God and sang praises to him. ► GOD IS HOLY, and we can also worship God.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think of how Isaiah described the temple?
- What might you do if God invited you to the temple?

Say: ► GOD IS HOLY, and he deserves our worship. Take your temple pictures home with you so you can tell your families about what we learned about God today.

Josiah Promises to Follow the Lord

2 Chronicles 34

BIBLE BACKGROUND

The Boy King

Josiah began to rule Judah when he was only 8 years old, but he probably didn't rule by himself. Although his father and grandfather, Amon and Manasseh, were evil and cruel, someone had apparently trained Josiah in the ways of the Lord. Fortunately, he chose to follow in the footsteps of his great-grandfather Hezekiah and his ancestor David by obeying the Lord. When he became king, he was advised by others who were faithful followers of God.

Josiah's Reforms

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When he was 20, Josiah demonstrated maturity and wisdom far beyond his years as he began wiping out the places in Judah—and even in the northern kingdom of Israel—that were dedicated to worshipping idols.

When he was 26, Josiah decided to repair and restore the Temple, which had been turned into a house of idolatry by his father, Manasseh. It was during this cleansing that the Book of the Law was found. This was either the book of Deuteronomy or the entire five books of the Law, lost for years under the rule of kings who worshipped idols.

Josiah's Passion to Follow the Lord

Josiah may never have actually heard the words of the Law before this book was found. When it was read to him, he tore his clothes in grief over the sins of his people. He knew that God must have been terribly angry with the people of Judah and Israel.

Because Josiah humbled himself before God, God honored him and Judah. Josiah humbly read God's Word to the people. And before God and the people, Josiah vowed to return Judah to obedience to the Lord. God's Word revealed to Josiah the sins of his people, and it caused him to see what he needed to do to truly serve God. And what a change it made! For the rest of Josiah's life, the people of Israel "did not fail to follow the Lord."

The Jesus Connection

John 1 describes Jesus as the Word made flesh, and he changes our lives!

Consider this: How much do you read the Bible? What's good about your Bible-reading habits, and what needs to change? No matter what you have going on today, be sure to take some time to open God's Word and listen to God's voice. Then pray that God will change you because of what you read. You can write your prayer here.

Play "The Plans I Have for You" (Jeremiah 29:11) (track 8 on the CD). Lead the children around the room, and have them do actions such as walking on tiptoe, marching, or waving their hands high.

(Verse) "For I know the plans I have for you," Declares the Lord. "I know the plans I have for you," Declares the Lord. (Repeat.)

Quiet Worship

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Psalm 95:6, and show children the words. Say: **Our Key Verse from the Bible says: "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6). Let's say that together.**

Lead children in repeating the Key Verse with you: "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6).

Have kids talk about what they think worship means and ways they can worship God.

Say: When we worship God, we're showing that we love him and we want to praise him. We can worship God in many ways. We can worship God in loud ways, such as singing with each other, and we can worship God in quiet ways, such as praying and listening to the Bible. Let's practice worshipping God in quiet ways.

Set out the crayons and paper, and play "Those Who Hope" (Isaiah 40:31) (track 6 on the CD). If you have time, let the kids listen to other songs on the CD, too.

Ask kids to sit quietly, draw pictures of their favorite things, and then give thanks to God according to what the pictures mean to them. Encourage kids to listen to the CD and quietly sing their praise to God.

Bible Time: Josiah Cleans House

What You'll Do

Before you begin the Bible Time activity, tell kids to put on imaginary tool belts and pretend to be King Josiah's Workers. Open your Bible to 2 Chronicles 34, and show children the words. Say: ► THE BIBLE IS GOD'S SPECIAL BOOK. King Josiah knew how important it is to listen to what God said in the Bible.

Read aloud the following text while leading King Josiah's Workers in their roles as described below.

Say: Josiah was only 8 years old when he became king. That's only a few years older than you are now! Josiah was a good king who obeyed God. When Josiah grew up, he became a great king who obeyed and loved God. Place the "Josiah Reads God's Word" poster on the floor, and have children gather around it.

Say: King Josiah saw that there were lots of idols in his kingdom. Idols are statues that people worship. Let's pretend that these paper dolls are the idols that the people were worshipping. Place the paper dolls on the Temple floor in the poster.

Say: The people thought that the idols were more important than God. So King Josiah called all his workers together. Have kids stand at attention in a straight line and salute.

Say: **"We must get rid of all these bad idols!" King Josiah told the workers. "Smash them, crash them, smush them, crush them!" he called out.** Have the kids each take a paper doll and tear it up as they repeat the words: "Smash them, crash them, smush them, crush them."

Say: **"Stomp them, tromp them–God doesn't want them!"** Have the kids stomp their feet on the paper doll idols as they say, "Stomp them, tromp them–God doesn't want them."

Say: So King Josiah and his workers got rid of all the idols. When that was done, King Josiah needed his workers for another job. Have the kids stand at attention and salute. Point to the Temple in the poster. Parts of God's Temple were old and broken and cracked. So Josiah called for his workers. But this time he wanted them to build—not to tear down.

Say: **"Hammer up each board; we'll fix it for the Lord!" Josiah said.** Have the kids each glue a paper "board" onto the Temple in the poster as they say the words: "Hammer up each board; we'll fix it for the Lord!"

Say: **"Let's sweep and brush and get rid of this dust!"** Have the children pretend to sweep the poster with paintbrushes as they repeat the sentence: "Let's sweep and brush and get rid of this dust!"

Say: While the workers were busy fixing up the Temple, the priest found something very important. It was the Bible, which had been lost and forgotten for many years.
Pass the Bible around to the kids. As each child holds the Bible, have him or her say,
▶ "THE BIBLE IS GOD'S SPECIAL BOOK" and then pass it to the next child.

Say: The priest took God's special book to King Josiah. When Josiah heard the words in God's special book, he said, "We must follow these laws and do what God wants." Point to King Josiah and the crowd on the poster. Say: King Josiah called together all the people in his kingdom: the rich, the poor, his helpers—everyone. Have the kids form a circle around you as you hold the Bible. Say: King Josiah read the Bible to all of them and said, "This book is so important. I promise to follow God and keep his commands. Who else will also promise to follow God?" And all of the people said, "We promise." Then all of the people followed God, and that pleased God. Have the kids sit in a circle. Say: ▶ THE BIBLE IS GOD'S SPECIAL BOOK, and the Bible was important to King Josiah.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why do you think the Bible is so important?
- What could you tell others about the Bible, like King Josiah did?

Say: ► THE BIBLE IS GOD'S SPECIAL BOOK! King Josiah and all of the people promised to follow God all of their lives. Let's promise to follow God's Word, because it tells us about God's love and it shows us how to live.

INTO LIFE

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Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

CENTER 1:

Finding God's Word

What You'll Do

Set out white crayons and washable markers. Distribute the My Bible Playground pages, and have the kids write their names on their papers with washable markers.

Say: Your page looks like it has a Bible on it. On the page, it says ▶ "THE BIBLE IS GOD'S SPECIAL BOOK." Have children use a white crayon to draw things that remind them of the Bible, such as hearts or crosses, on the blank side of their student pages. Then have them use a washable marker to color over their crayon drawings. The ink from the marker won't stick to the crayon drawings, and their images will be revealed. Have kids fold their pages along the dotted lines—like Bible pages.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What happened when you colored over your picture with the marker?
- How can reading the Bible help us know what God wants?

Say: Coloring over your page with a marker helped you see the images you drew. Reading the Bible can help us see what God wants. ► THE BIBLE IS GOD'S SPECIAL BOOK. God gave us the Bible so we know how to serve him. God wants everyone to know that he loves us and sent us Jesus.

CENTER 2: Royal Roll-Ups

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands before they prepare their snacks. Set out paper plates, napkins, plastic knives, tortillas, softened cream cheese, and raisins. Allow each of the kids to spread a thin layer of cream cheese on their tortillas and then use raisins to form the first letter of his or her name. Or you could write words such as "God," "love," or "Bible" on a chalkboard or white board for the kids to copy on their snacks with raisins.

Say: When the priest found God's special book, it probably looked more like a scroll instead of the books we're used to seeing. Let's make our snacks look like scrolls. Demonstrate how to carefully lift up one end of a tortilla and roll it up.

Bible **Teacher Pack** Glider Bird (disassembled) Say: God loves us so much that he gave us a very special and important book. ► THE BIBLE IS GOD'S SPECIAL BOOK. God gave us the Bible so we can have everything we need to follow him. It makes God very happy when we follow his Word and tell others about him. Invite a willing child to pray and thank God for the snack. As they eat, have kids share ideas on how they can serve God. For example, they might say they can serve God by telling others about God, bringing friends to church, or helping friends learn to love God.

Directions for Life

What You'll Do

Have children form a circle and sit down. Then bring out the parts of the glider bird.

Say: **Hmmm...I wonder what this bunch of stuff will be when it's put together.** Let kids guess as you make a big show of trying to put the glider together—and not getting it right.

Ask:

What would help me know how to put this together?

Wait for kids to say "directions or instructions," and then bring out the directions. Show children how the directions help explain what pieces go where, and have a couple of willing children help you put the glider together. Hold up the completed Glider Bird.

Say: I wondered what those pieces were going to be, and I even worried a bit, but I didn't need to. These directions were here the entire time. The instructions were good; they helped us put together the Glider Bird.

Pass the Glider Bird around the circle and let each child inspect it. After the kids play with the glider, continue your discussion.

Say: King Josiah was worried about the people in his kingdom. He didn't know how to help them obey God and stop worshipping idols, but he knew how important true worship is to God. Hold up a Bible. ► THE BIBLE IS GOD'S SPECIAL BOOK. When King Josiah found God's special book, he realized that the Bible is like directions and could help him put together his kingdom in a way that would please God. God was happy that King Josiah promised to follow the Bible and the directions in it. King Josiah followed God's directions and helped his people do the same.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why were directions important for us when we built the Glider Bird?
- How can you follow the directions in the Bible?

Say: THE BIBLE IS GOD'S SPECIAL BOOK. We can follow the directions in God's Word to help us do what's right.

CENTER 4:

Cleaning Success!

What You'll Do

Say: The Bibles we have today look different from the Bibles in King Josiah's day. Instead of looking like a book, God's Word may've looked more like a scroll.

Use a newspaper to show children how parts of the Bible would have been written on paper and then rolled up and tied with a piece of string. Roll it like a traditional scroll by first rolling the paper down from the top and up from the bottom. The two rolls will meet in the middle. Then roll it into one tube to show kids an alternative style of scroll.

Say: Now let's try making our own scrolls that will help us remember about King Josiah.

Give kids each ½ of a newspaper spread to roll into their own tube scrolls. Once they've rolled the newspapers, secure each "scroll" in two or three areas with tape. Finally, at one end of each scroll, make several 6-inch cuts through all the layers of newspaper. Have kids give the newspapers a shake to loosen the layers.

Daniel's Friends Are Safe in the Fiery Furnace Daniel 3

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Daniel and Friends in Exile

When the people of Judah turned away from the Lord, God allowed Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, to defeat Judah. At that time, the invaders took a group of young hostages, the brightest and best Judah had to offer, back to Babylon with them. Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah were among the hostages. We know Daniel's three friends best by the names given them by the Babylonians: Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego.

Daniel's Friends Refuse to Bow to Idols

Nebuchadnezzar's name meant "Nebo, protect your servant!" The statue Nebuchadnezzar built was perhaps meant to represent the god Nebo. The statue was 90 feet high, but this measurement probably included a tall pedestal, and the statue itself was probably gold-plated, not solid gold. Nevertheless, it must have been an impressive structure, standing about as high as a 10-story building.

Despite an impressive statue that demonstrated the political power of the king, and under threat of death, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were willing to trust God. If God saved them, great! But even if he didn't, they were willing to die before they'd worship Nebuchadnezzar's idol.

Daniel's Friends Survive the Heat

The furnace the three were thrown into was likely used to fire bricks or to smelt metal. Certainly at its normal operating temperature—probably between 1,600 and 2,300 degrees Fahrenheit—survival inside such a furnace would be humanly impossible. But Nebuchadnezzar had the furnace heated seven times hotter than usual. It was so hot that the soldiers who threw Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego into the furnace died from their proximity to it! Even so, God saved the three trusting Israelites from harm.

We don't know for sure who the fourth person in the furnace was. Certainly it was a supernatural being, either an angel or possibly Jesus himself. Either way, God was there for them, blessing them for standing strong.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus can relate to the challenges we face as we stand up for God because he has experienced them— and much more.

Are you facing a situation in which you're challenged to stand strong for God? Do you feel ready for the challenge? Rely on him. Pray that he'll give you the strength to keep standing even when everyone around you bows to the pressure. When we stand up for God, he will help us, protect us, and reward us. You can write your prayer here.

Say: Today we'll learn that God gave Daniel's friends strength to face a tough time. The words of this next song come from the Bible. The Bible tells us that God's plans will prosper you, which means they will help you do well. It also says that God's plans are for good and not disaster, which means God's plans always result in God's glory. This song can remind us that God has a plan for our lives. As we sing it, let's remember that we can ► BE BRAVE FOR GOD! Lead the kids in singing "The Plans I Have for You" (Jeremiah 29:11) (track 8).

Many Ways of Worship

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What You'll Do

Form a circle with kids and sit down. Open your Bible to Psalm 95:6, and show children the words.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible says "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6). Let's say our Key Verse together.

Lead kids in repeating the Key Verse with you: "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6).

Say: There are many ways we can worship God. Have kids give examples of ways they can worship God. We can sing songs to God, we can pray to God, we can read our Bibles, and we can tell others about God. These are all great ways to worship God. Let's play a game to show some of the ways we can worship God.

Have children form four groups; a group can be as small as one person. Have the first group of children say the Key Verse together: "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6) as they pretend to play instruments or sing. Remind kids that singing or playing music is one way we can worship God.

Have the second group say the Key Verse together: "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6) as they get on their knees and fold their hands as if in prayer. Remind children that praying is one way we can worship God.

Have the children in the third group say the Key Verse together: "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6) as they hold open their hands like a Bible and pretend to read it. Remind children that reading God's Word is another way we can worship God.

The fourth group will say the Key Verse together: "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6) as they cup their hands around their mouths and pretend to shout to each other. Remind children that telling others about God is another way they can worship God. It's also a way they can ▶ **BE BRAVE FOR GOD.**

Point to each group in turn as a cue for the children to say the Key Verse and act out one way to worship God. Play the game several times, as time allows.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why do we worship God?
- What are some ways you can worship God at home?

Say: We can worship God in so many different ways. We worship God because God is holy, because God made all the world, and because God loves us. There are many reasons that we worship God, just as there are many ways to ▶ BE BRAVE FOR GOD! Let's say our Key Verse together one more time. Lead the kids in saying the Key Verse with you: "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6).

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Theo's News

Tip Make sure to use a safety match and not a "strike anywhere" match.

What You'll Do

Say: **Friends, it's time for Theo's News!** Have the children sit in a circle. Then begin "Here, Theo" (track 4 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put the Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody!

Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today. **Theo:** I hid it in the Surprise Box. **Teacher:** Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today.

(Invite a willing child to open the Surprise Box. Hold up the match so the rest of the group can see it up close. Give the children time to guess what they might learn from the Bible today.)

Teacher: Today we'll learn what happened in a fiery, red-hot furnace when three friends showed they could ▶ BE BRAVE FOR GOD.
Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!
Teacher: Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use. After Theo's News, put the match out of reach of children.

Bible Time: A Cool Time in the Furnace

What You'll Do

Have the children sit in a circle. Then open your Bible to Daniel 3, and show children the words. Tell children the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Today we're going to learn how we can ▶ BE BRAVE FOR GOD. Have the kids repeat the Bible Point after you. ▶ BE BRAVE FOR GOD! That was great! Now let's stand up when we say it! Lead the children in standing up as they repeat the Bible Point: ▶ BE BRAVE FOR GOD!

Ask:

How was it different to say the Bible Point while standing up instead of sitting down?

Say: We might have felt bigger and more like we meant what we were saying when we stood up. But just standing and saying the Bible Point is pretty easy. Today we'll learn about some friends who stood up for God when it wasn't easy at all. Ask three willing children to be Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, and have them stand in front of the group.

Say: Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were three friends who praised, worshipped, and loved God very much. But the king made a huge golden statue, and he told everyone to worship the statue. Invite a child to pretend to be the statue. Let the child stand on a child-sized chair, and have someone stand beside the chair to help with balance. Say: The king called the people together and told them that when they heard the music play, all of them had to bow down to the ground and worship the statue.

God wants everyone to worship only him. But the king wanted everyone to worship the statue. The king said that anyone who didn't bow down and worship the statue would be thrown into a blazing, red-hot furnace!



Bible Time: A Cool Time in the Furnace Supplies

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Bible table child-sized chair

Bible Time: A Cool Time in the Furnace Easy Prep

Set up a table near your Bible Exploration area.

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When the music played, what do you suppose happened? Almost everyone obeyed the king and bowed down to worship the statue. God doesn't want us bowing down to statues. Lead the kids in shaking their heads "no" and refusing to bow down. Ask:

Explain why you think worshipping a statue was a bad idea.

Say: Three of God's people—Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego—didn't worship the statue. Let's all cheer for Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego! Lead the children in cheering.

Say: Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego pleased God by not bowing down to the statue. But the king wasn't happy at all. He told the three men they had one more chance to bow down when they heard the music playing. But if they refused to bow down one more time, they would be thrown into a blazing furnace.

Have kids pretend to be somewhere really hot.

Say: The three friends said, "If you throw us into the fire, God will save us. But even if he doesn't, we want you to know that we'll never ever worship a statue, because that would make our God sad. We love God!" Have the three children say together, "We love God! We can ► BE BRAVE FOR GOD!"

Say: The king was absolutely furious, and he had his guards make the fiery furnace seven times hotter than usual! Ask two children to be Guards, and let them pretend to scoop hot coals underneath the table while the other children count to seven. Say: The guards tied up the three friends and threw them into the furnace. Tell the Guards to lead the three children under the table. Say: But the furnace was too hot for the guards! Have the Guards fall down. Have a willing child join the three under the table as the Angel.

Say: So the king sat back to watch the furnace, when suddenly he jumped to his feet in surprise! He said, "Look! I see four men inside the furnace!" And how many did we put in there? Have the children hold up three fingers. That's right! We only put three in there! But you know what? The fourth one was sent by God to protect the three friends.

The king went over to the furnace and said, "Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego! Come out!" Lead children in repeating the king's words. Say: And the three men just walked out. Have the three children come out from under the table. The Angel can also come out quietly from under the table. Say: The king looked at the friends. They looked okay, and they didn't even smell like smoke! The three men were not hurt in any way! Lead the children in cheering.

Say: And best of all, the king could finally see why Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego could EBBRAVE FOR GOD. They knew God would protect them. The king made a new rule: No one could say anything bad about the one true God!

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Lesson 7



Ask:

- What do you think of how Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were brave for God?
- Why do you think God protected the friends in the furnace?
- How can we ► BE BRAVE FOR GOD?

Say: We can ► BE BRAVE FOR GOD! We can obey God and tell others about him. Sometimes it might seem scary, but God will protect us, just as he protected the three friends.

Say: Daniel's friends showed they were brave for God when they were in the fiery furnace. Let's make ourselves reminders of what happened that day.

Encourage the children to each make a fire in the furnace by tearing off strips of the tissue paper, crumpling them around their pencil's eraser, and gluing pieces around the figures on their student pages. In pairs, kids will retell what happened to the three friends who were thrown into the fiery furnace. When they tell about the fourth person in the fire, have them each draw an extra person behind the friends on the page. Then have the children finish telling about what happened.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What surprised you most about the three friends?
- Tell about a time you had to be brave.
- When might you need to be brave for God?

Say: We can \blacktriangleright BE BRAVE FOR GOD. God is with us and helps us do the right thing, even when it's a difficult or scary thing to do. God will always be with us and makes us strong.

Be Proud! Be Loud!

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands. Set out ice-cream cones, a bowl of pudding, napkins, and spoons.

Say: You may have seen people use microphones. Microphones help make people's voices louder so that more people can hear what's being said or sung. When we use microphones, we want to help others hear what is going on. Let's make some microphones right now.

Let the children prepare edible microphones by filling their cones with pudding. Then have the kids take turns standing on a child-sized chair and saying something they love about God into their microphones. (Stand next to the chair to support the child who is on the chair.) After all the children have had a turn, say a prayer, and let the kids eat their treats!

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- How can we help others know about God's love?
- What things about God could you tell someone who has never heard of him?

Say: We can ► BE BRAVE FOR GOD by telling others about him. Remember that God is right here with you to help you be strong and brave.

Stand Up for God

What You'll Do

Direct children to the table you used during the Bible Time activity. Then cue the CD to "The Plans I Have for You" (Jeremiah 29:11) (track 8 on the CD). Say: **Let's join hands and stand in a circle around the table pretending it's the fiery furnace.** Choose where the opening to the furnace will be, and point it out to the kids.

Say: I'll ask one of you to stand by the CD player with your back to the other kids. That person will push the "play" button. As the song is playing, the rest of us will walk in a circle around the table. Then, the person closest to the CD player will pause the music whenever he or she would like. The person standing closest to the opening of the "furnace" will crawl under the table and say one thing that he or she believes about God, such as "God helps me be strong!"

If you have time, allow several children to pause and play the CD.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego show that they were brave for God?
- How was being in our pretend furnace like or unlike being in the king's furnace?
- What might you do to show others that you're brave for God?

Say: Just like Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, we can ►BE BRAVE FOR GOD by telling others about God. We can also ►BE BRAVE FOR GOD by doing what God wants and by telling others how much God loves them! And we can trust that God will help us be strong!

Fiery Folders

What You'll Do

Say: Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego refused to bow down and worship the king's statue—even when they were put into a fiery hot furnace. The flames burned all around their feet, but God wouldn't let the fire hurt them. Daniel's friends were brave for God and did what was right.

Give each child an open file folder and ask him or her to stand on it with one foot on each side of the fold. Use a marker to trace around both feet. At a table, let the kids

- Why do you think Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego weren't afraid of the king's furnace?
- What ways do you think God can use you like Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego?

Say: Being brave for God isn't always easy, but it's always right. God helped the three friends, and he promises to help us be strong and brave, too. Let's stand on our fiery folders and say, "I can ► BE BRAVE FOR GOD."

What You'll Do

After the children have cleaned up the centers, bring everyone back to sit in a circle on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage children to share what they learned from the Bible today.

Also use this time to challenge kids in their faith. Encourage them to choose a Daily Challenge for applying today's lesson to their lives this week. Use this challenge for encouraging your children's growing relationships with Jesus.

Talk With Kids

Say: Today we learned that we can ► BE BRAVE FOR GOD. I'd like each of you to choose a way you can be strong and brave for God.

Read these three Daily Challenge ideas for kids to choose from.

- Remind someone in your family that Jesus loves him or her every day, then give that person a high five or a hug!
- If you see children alone during playtime, invite them to play with you. Tell your new friends that Jesus loves them!
- Use your toys to act out what happened to Daniel's friends.



Have kids each whisper in your ear or tell you which idea they've chosen, and then circle it on each child's My Bible Playground page. Make sure you choose a challenge as well and tell kids which challenge you chose. Your commitment will inspire children and will give them an opportunity to see God at work in your life as well as in theirs!

God Protects Daniel in the Lions' Den

Daniel 6:1-23

BIBLE BACKGROUND

Daniel Faces Political Turmoil

Daniel was a highly respected adviser to King Darius. Daniel did such a good job as one of three administrators that Darius decided to set him above the others—above the whole kingdom, in fact. The other administrators didn't like that idea one bit, so they sabotaged Daniel. First they tried to find evidence that would discredit him, but they could find no corruption or negligence in his record.

So the officials resorted to deceit to derail Daniel, and they decided to do it on the basis of his faithfulness to God. They knew that Daniel wouldn't give up his faith for any king. They lied to Darius when they said that the royal administrators had all agreed to the edict. They knew that Daniel wouldn't have agreed had he been told about it.

The administrators thought they'd found a way to defeat Daniel, because in Medo-Persian law, once a law was issued by the king, it couldn't be changed. This was based on the idea that the king embodied the law. If a king made a law and then retracted it, there would be a contradiction in the law, which was unthinkable.

Darius Reluctantly Throws Daniel to the Lions

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When Daniel was found praying to God, Darius was trapped. Apparently there was nothing he could do to prevent Daniel from being thrown into the lions' den, and the king was distraught. As unlikely as it seemed that Daniel could still be alive the next morning, Darius was the first one to the den to find out if God had, indeed, saved Daniel. And he had!

There was no law prohibiting Darius from punishing deceitful schemers, so he had Daniel's accusers thrown into the lions' den. They were torn apart by the hungry lions before they hit the floor! Daniel's life of faith and his trust in God saved him from destruction and brought glory to God.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus promised that we'd face trouble in this world but that he had overcome it. We may be punished or ridiculed for our faith, but we know Jesus has the power to save us.

When Daniel's circumstances turned negative, he maintained a rhythm of thanksgiving and prayer. What are your hardships? What hungry lions do you face? What are you thankful for today? What do you need from God? Tell him! Ask him! You can write your prayer here.

Tip Consistently use the same signal to announce a transition to the next activity. You could flip the lights off and on, use a train whistle, have a puppet rustling inside a bag, or sing cleanup songs. Keep it simple, consistent, and fun.

What You'll Do

As the children arrive, greet each one with a smile. When it's time to begin, use your signal to bring the children together in a circle. Begin the CD, and lead the children in singing "Be Sure" (track 12 on the CD) to the tune of "The Farmer in the Dell." Encourage the kids to join you in doing the actions.

Be sure to wear a smile; be sure to wear a smile. (show big smiles) When you come to God's house, be sure to wear a smile. Be sure to greet a friend; be sure to greet a friend. (shake hands with others) When you come to God's house, be sure to greet a friend. Be sure to listen well; be sure to listen well. (sing softly with hands cupped behind ears) When you come to God's house, be sure to listen well. (Repeat from the beginning 2x.)

Say: In our Bible passage, God took care of Daniel. Let's sing a song and praise God for loving us and caring for us no matter where we go! Play "Trust in the Lord" (Proverbs 3:5-6) (track 3 on the CD).

Trust in the Lord (trust in the Lord) (hold your hands together without interlocking your fingers)

With all your heart (with all your heart) (pulse clasped hands to the beat) And lean not on your own understanding (understanding); (lean to the right) In all your ways (in all your ways) (lean to the left) Acknowledge him (acknowledge him) (raise hands to the ceiling) He will make your paths straight. Say: We can trust God for lots of things, including protection. Today we'll learn that GOD PROTECTS US.

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Bow and Kneel

What You'll Do

Form a circle as a group and sit down. Open your Bible to Psalm 95:6, and show children the words.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible says "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6). Let's say this verse together. Lead children in repeating the Key Verse with you. "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6).

Ask:

Why do you think we sometimes bow our heads or kneel down when we worship?

Say: Our Key Verse tells us that God wants us to worship him. We can praise God in many different places and in many different ways. Sometimes we sing our worship in church. Sometimes we kneel down beside our bed and pray words that tell God how much we love him. When we bow our heads or kneel down, we show God that he's important to us. Worshipping God by kneeling or bowing down shows on the outside what we're feeling on the inside.

Stand together in a large circle. Ask half of the group to bow and the others to kneel. Let the kids who are bowing say the first part of the verse, "Come, let us bow down in worship..." and then let those who are kneeling add the remaining words of the verse, "let us kneel before the Lord our Maker." Let them switch positions and say the verse together again.

Then, with everyone standing in a circle, play a quiet version of Duck, Duck, Goose. Let one child walk around the outside of the circle and tap the others on the shoulder saying, "Bow, Bow, Bow..." When he or she taps someone and says "Kneel," have that child kneel down quickly and give a reason to praise God. The child who's kneeling may then take a turn walking around the circle, tapping the other kids and saying "Kneel." Play the game until each child has had a turn to kneel and praise God.

Say: Because we worship God in our heart, we can worship him anytime and anywhere. Let's say our Key Verse together one more time. Lead the children in saying the Key Verse with you: "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psalm 95:6). We worship God and we know that ► GOD PROTECTS US.

BIBLE EXPLORATION

Theo's News

What You'll Do

Say: **Friends, it's time for Theo's News!** Have children sit in a circle. Then begin "Here, Theo" (track 4 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put the Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody!

Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today. **Theo:** I hid it in the Surprise Box.

Teacher: Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today.
(Invite a child to open the Surprise Box, and have the kids pass the baby doll around the circle so the rest of the group can see it up close. Give the children time to guess what they might learn from the Bible today.)
Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this baby doll in our Surprise Box?
Theo: Well, parents protect and care for their babies.
Teacher: Friends, what are some things parents have to do to protect and care for a baby?

(Pause for kids to answer your question.)

Theo: Wowzers, that's a lot of things to do!

Teacher: Just as parents protect their children, ► **GOD PROTECTS US,** too. God protected Daniel when Daniel was thrown in with some hungry lions. Let's find out how God protected Daniel.

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Daniel in the Lions' Den

What You'll Do

Set out crayons and washable markers. Hand each child a paper plate. Then open your Bible to Daniel 6, and show the children the words. Tell children that the Bible is God's special book.

Say: The Bible tells us that ► GOD PROTECTS US. Have kids repeat the Bible Point after you. Before we begin today's Bible Time, imagine the biggest, meanest, hungriest lion you can think of. Got it? Now draw the face of that lion on your paper plate the best you can. As the kids draw their lions, say: We're drawing lions today because God protected Daniel when Daniel was thrown into a den with some mean, hungry lions!

Daniel didn't do anything wrong to get in trouble. In fact, he got in trouble because he did everything right! Everybody say, "Daniel loved God." Pause for the kids to repeat the sentence. Everybody knew that Daniel loved God—even the king. Daniel was talented, and the king gave Daniel an important job. But the rest of the king's men said, "The king is a fool! Daniel can't rule!" Lead the children in repeating those words.

Say: So the king's men came up with a plan. They had the king agree that everyone must pray to *the king*, not to God. If anyone broke that rule, they'd be thrown into the lions' den. Everyone say, "Oh, my!" Pause while the children respond.

Say: Was Daniel worried? Not a bit. He knew that ► GOD PROTECTS US. Daniel prayed to God just as he always did. This time when the king's men were spying on Daniel, they caught him breaking the new rule. Everyone say, "Oh, no!" Pause while the children respond.

Say: The king's men told the king that Daniel prayed to God. The king was very sad to hear this news, because Daniel was special to him. But a rule's a rule! There was no way that the king could take back his rule. Daniel had to be thrown in with the hungry lions.

Play "Hungry Lions," (track 14 on the CD) and have the kids hold up their lion faces and follow along with the narrative. Let the kids use crayons to draw big Xs over the lions' mouths as directed on the CD.

Show children the "Daniel in the Lions' Den" poster.

Say: Let's draw pictures on this poster of the ways that you want God to protect you. Encourage each child to use a marker to draw a picture on the poster to represent his or her answer to the question: "How would you want God to take care of you?"

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

- What surprised you most about Daniel's experience?
- Tell about what you drew on the poster.
- Why do you think God wants to protect us?

Say: ► GOD PROTECTS US, just like he took care of Daniel. Whenever we feel afraid or worried, we can pray to God and tell him about our problems, and God will always protect us in the way that's best!

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Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

In the Lions' Den

What You'll Do

Set out markers, muffin tin liners, and glue sticks. Distribute the My Bible Playground pages, and have the kids write their names on their papers with washable markers.

Say: God protected Daniel while he was in the lions' den by shutting the mouths of the lions. Let's decorate our pages to help us remember how God protected Daniel.

Encourage children each to glue a muffin tin liner "head" onto the large lion's face on the student page. Let kids each draw the lion's face inside the liner and put an X sticker over the lion's mouth.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why did God protect Daniel?
- How has God protected you when you've been worried or afraid?

Say: ► GOD PROTECTS US, no matter what we're going through. We can tell God our worries and trust that he'll protect us. When we show others that we trust in God, they'll know that God will protect them, too!



What You'll Do

Set out bagel halves, cream cheese, raisins, pretzel sticks, plastic knives, napkins, and plates. Have kids clean their hands before they prepare their snacks.

Say: The lions wanted to make a snack out of Daniel, but God protected him by shutting the lions' mouths. Let's make a snack out of the lions to remind us of God's protection.

Have kids each make a lions' head by spreading cream cheese on a bagel half and putting several pretzel sticks around the bagel to look like a mane. Then let the kids add raisins as eyes and noses. Tell the children to each make an X with two pretzel sticks where the lion's mouth would be to remind the children that God protected Daniel in the lions' den and closed the lions' mouths.

Say: God protected Daniel by closing the lions' mouths. ► GOD PROTECTS US, too, by giving us a place to live and people who love us. Let's thank God for our snacks and for his protection!

Invite a child to pray, and then let the kids open *their* mouths and eat the snacks!

Form pairs. Say: **Today, we're going to pretend to be pets. In each group, one partner will act like a dog, cat, or some other pet. The other partner pretends to take care of and protect their new pet.**

Let children pretend together to brush, feed, walk, and protect and care for their new pet in other ways. After a few minutes, let partners switch roles to allow everyone a chance to care for and protect a pretend pet.

Say: When we protect and care for our real pets, we learn what it means to love something that needs our help. God gives us family and friends who love, protect, and care for us. God loves us, and ▶ GOD PROTECTS US!

Safe in the Den

What You'll Do

Say: ► GOD PROTECTS US every day, no matter where we are. When Daniel was in the lions' den, God sent an angel to protect Daniel. Let's make our own lions to remind us of how God protected Daniel.

Give each child a foam cup and coffee filter. Set out the markers, tape, and scissors. Have kids cut a hole in the center of their coffee filters large enough to fit over the mouth of their cup and tape it in place. (If kids are having trouble cutting out the middle of their coffee filters, show them how to fold the coffee filters in half and cut semicircles from the middle.) Help kids each position their filter over a cup and tape it in place. Let kids color the cups and filters like a lion, adding eyes and whiskers on the filter and a closed mouth and a nose on the cup bottom to complete the lion's face.

Form pairs for kids to tell each other what happened to Daniel when he continued praying to God. When they get to the part where God shut the lions' mouths, have kids cover their lion's mouth.

Say: The lions didn't scare Daniel because he trusted God. We know \blacktriangleright GOD PROTECTS US, too. Sometimes God uses other people to help protect us, and sometimes God might even use an angel. We don't always see the ways God is protecting us, but we know that God is always with us. And if we're ever afraid, we can pray.

What You'll Do

After the children have cleaned up the centers, bring everyone back to sit in a circle on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage children to share what they learned from the Bible today.

God Promises to Restore Israel After the Exile Jeremiah 29:4-14

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Jeremiah's Tough Career

Jeremiah's ministry outlasted five Judean kings, and he witnessed numerous political wranglings as leaders who ignored God attempted to save Judah from destruction through alliances with Egypt and Babylon. Eventually he witnessed the fall of Judah to Babylon in 587 B.C., and died in Egypt a few years later.

Jeremiah prophesied that doom would befall Judah if the people didn't return to the Lord. He was persecuted because he spoke words from the Lord that people didn't want to hear. But he was faithful to God's call in spite of his increasingly difficult circumstances.

Letter to the Exiles

Jeremiah 29:4-14 is part of a letter to the people of Judah who'd been taken into exile in Babylon. Jeremiah instructed the exiles to settle in, work toward the good of their captors' city, and even to pray for Babylon! This was likely greeted as another

unwelcome message from the unpopular prophet.

The "prophets and diviners" Jeremiah mentions were probably false prophets who had been turning Judeans away from God or lying about the amount of time in the exile. Jeremiah knew that the 70-year exile would be a time for Judeans to turn back to God in trust.

Jeremiah's Glimmer of Hope

Jeremiah 29:10-14 offers hope, a promise of restoration. Why did the Judeans have to remain captive in Babylon for 70 years before experiencing this restoration? Perhaps it was because an entire generation had to live and die in exile because of the sins of its ancestors. Or maybe it was because 70 years equaled the number of sabbath years that the people had disobeyed God by not letting the land rest (see 2 Chronicles 36:21).

Even as his people were dragged off to Babylon, God had marvelous plans for them—plans that included hope and a future. If the people would call upon God and seek him with all their hearts, turning from the evils of idol worship, then the Lord would restore them to their land.

The Jesus Connection

If we live in a growing relationship with Jesus, we fix our eyes on him and seek him no matter what.

Tip Consistently use the same signal to announce a transition to the next activity. You could flip the lights off and on, use a train whistle, have a puppet rustling inside a bag, or sing cleanup songs. Keep it simple, consistent, and fun.

What You'll Do

As the children arrive, greet each one with a smile. When it's time to begin, use your signal to bring the children together in a circle. Say: ► GOD CARES FOR US and he has good plans for us. Let's celebrate God's good plans by singing "The Plans I Have for You."

Play "The Plans I Have for You" (Jeremiah 29:11) (track 8 on the CD). Each time the children sing "plans," have them place their hands side by side and look at their hands as if they're reading a book. Have them show their "plans" to other children.

(Verse)

"For I know the plans I have for you," Declares the Lord. "I know the plans I have for you," Declares the Lord. (*Repeat.*)

(Chorus)

They are plans to prosper you And not to harm you, Plans to give you hope and a future. They are plans for good and not disaster. Why? Because he tells us so. (Repeat from the beginning.)

Say: This song reminds us that God knows us, and that he has a plan for us. That's one way we know that ▶ GOD CARES FOR US. Today we'll learn about some of the different ways God cares for us.



KEY VERSE

Listening to Prayers

What You'll Do

Have the children form a circle and sit down. Place the audio recorder in the middle of the circle. Open your Bible to 2 Chronicles 7:14, and show children the words.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible says, "If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land" (2 Chronicles 7:14). That means that if we pray, God will hear us. Let's practice our Key Verse together. Lead children in repeating the simplified Key Verse: If we pray, God will hear us (2 Chronicles 7:14).

Say: God heard Jeremiah pray in a place called Judah. He also heard his people pray in the faraway country of Babylon. God will hear us wherever and whenever we pray. Whether we pray during the day or at night, if we pray when we're alone or with friends, if we pray when we're happy or when we're sad—God will always hear us when we pray. God promises to always listen to us. We're going to use this audio recorder to record our prayers. Then we can listen to them again and remember that if we pray, God will hear us.

Help kids take turns recording a one- or two-sentence prayer each. Offer suggestions such as praising God, saying thank you to God, asking for God's help, or praying for someone else. Record and play back each child's prayer one at a time. Ask the children who are waiting or have already had a turn to fold their hands and bow their heads, listening quietly during the prayers.

While most children enjoy using an audio recorder, some may feel shy about recording their voices. Encourage these children to simply pray aloud without using the recorder or to pray silently. Then proceed with the next child's turn.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- When can you pray to God?
- What do you like to talk to God about?

Say: By recording our voices, we can listen to our prayers. Of course, we can't answer our prayers; only God can do that. When God listens, he knows who's praying. God knows what each of us needs and God knows how to help each of us, too. God will answer us in the very best way because ► GOD CARES FOR US. Let's practice our Key Verse together one more time. Lead the children in saying the simplified Key Verse with you: If we pray, God will hear us (2 Chronicles 7:14).

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BIBLE EXPLORATION

Theo's News

What You'll Do

Say: **Friends, it's time for Theo's News!** Have the children sit in a circle. Then begin "Here, Theo" (track 4 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put the Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody!

Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today. **Theo:** I hid it in the Surprise Box.

Teacher: Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today.
(Invite a child to open the Surprise Box, and have the kids pass the envelope around the circle so everyone can see it up close. Give the children time to guess what they might learn from the Bible today.)
Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this envelope in our Surprise Box?
Theo: Well, I love to receive letters!

Teacher: Friends, what do you like about getting mail?

(Pause for kids to answer your question.)

Teacher: In the Bible, God's people were worried about their future. But they received an exciting letter from Jeremiah that showed them that ► **GOD CARES FOR US.** Let's find out what the letter said.

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Jeremiah's Letter

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Jeremiah 29, and show children the words. Tell children that the Bible is God's special book.

Say: The Bible tells us that ► GOD CARES FOR US. God's people had disobeyed God, so God allowed others to take his people to faraway cities. God's people had to live far away from home. Have children form several groups, and send each group to a different area of the room. Make sure that groups will be able to hear you as well as see Jeremiah sitting at the table. Say: Now God's people were separated from each other—some even from their friends and families. Have children tell about a time they've been away from home and what that was like for them.

Say: God's people missed their home. But God's prophet Jeremiah wrote a letter to the people to give them hope and to remind them that God cares for his people! God told Jeremiah what to write. Let's listen.

Place your open Bible on the table, and ask your volunteer to sit there. Play "A Letter From Jeremiah" (track 16 on the CD) while your volunteer pretends to write. When the track ends, your volunteer can slide "Jeremiah's Letter" between the pages of the Bible, give the Bible to you, and is free to leave. Gather the children together in one group for a group hug. Have the children sit in a circle; then hold up the Bible with the letter in it.

Say: Jeremiah's letter is in the Bible! We can read his encouraging letter any time. Show the kids the words in the book of Jeremiah.

Show children the "Jeremiah Shares God's Promise" poster. Point to Jeremiah on the poster. Have kids name things from Jeremiah's letter that encourage them.

Say: God wanted his people to follow him. That is what God wants for you, too! Hand each child a sticky note, and distribute crayons. Say: Let's draw pictures of things God said he wanted for his people. Encourage children to draw the pictures and stick them on the poster.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did you hear in Jeremiah's letter that shows how much God cared for his people?
- What does God do to show that he cares for you?

Say: Jeremiah told the people that even though they were far from home, God hadn't forgotten about them. God promised to bring them together again one day. The very best way that God cared for all of his people was by sending Jesus to earth to save us and give us life forever with him in heaven! It's so amazing how much ► GOD CARES FOR US!

WEAVING FAITH

Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

Deliver the Letter

What You'll Do

Distribute the My Bible Playground student pages, and have kids write their names on their papers with washable markers. Give each child four of the "Rough Road" strips, and then point out Jeremiah on the page.

Say: The groups of people around Jeremiah represent God's people who were far from home. The Bible passage told us how Jeremiah sent a message from God to those people to show God's care for them. Let's make pathways on our pages to show how Jeremiah's message from God traveled to the different groups of God's people.

Help children each glue the "Rough Road" strips between Jeremiah and the four groups on the page to represent the paths that Jeremiah's letter traveled.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- How is the way we share good news with our friends different from the way Jeremiah shared God's good news?
- Why is it important to tell others that God cares for them?

Say: Jeremiah's letter must've made God's people feel better. They were probably happy to know that one day they'd all be together again. God cared for his people then, and ▶ GOD CARES FOR US now!

Veggie Blessings

What You'll Do

Ask children to clean their hands while you set out plates. Ask one child to pray and thank God for providing food.

Say: When God's people were taken to live far away from their homes, God told them to build new homes and plant gardens to grow food. They planted fruits and vegetables. God wanted the people to settle down and trust God to take care of them.

Invite children to examine and identify the vegetables. For example, you might help children tear the lettuce leaves apart and taste them. Or you might show children how to open pea pods and taste the uncooked peas inside. Encourage the kids to sample whatever vegetables they wish.

Children this age may already have strong opinions about certain vegetables. Encourage kids to sample what they wish during the "Veggie Blessings" activity, but don't force them to try something they resist. Seeing friends trying new things will often encourage hesitant children to try, too.

If kids have vegetable gardens at home, ask them to tell their friends what they grow.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why do parents encourage kids to eat their vegetables?
- Why do you think God wanted his people to plant gardens in Babylon?

Say: God wanted his people to plant gardens because he knew they'd be in Babylon for 70 years. Telling people to plant gardens was one way God cared for his people while they were away from home. He provided good food for them. When we work in gardens or eat vegetables, we can remember that ► GOD CARES FOR US.

Nehemiah Seeks God's Forgiveness

for Israel Nehemiah 1:1-2:9

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Bad News Broke Nehemiah's Heart

The events described in this passage occurred 90 years after the first large group of Hebrews had returned to the land of Judah. And 70 years had passed since the Temple in Jerusalem had been rebuilt. In addition, about 12 years had passed since Ezra had begun to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem and had returned to Jerusalem with a large contingent of men, women, and children, as well as excellent funding from the king. It appeared that God was working to restore his people, just as he had promised through Jeremiah and other prophets. Thus Nehemiah was surprised to hear from his brother, Hanani, that Jerusalem still lay in ruins. And that news grieved Nehemiah greatly.

Nehemiah Responded and Acted Wisely

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Nehemiah's initial response wasn't to run to the king for help; rather, he turned to God in prayer. Nehemiah's mourning and fasting demonstrated to God and to those around him how sincerely he cared about the situation in Jerusalem. Nehemiah confessed the sins that he and his ancestors had committed against God.

Then he turned to the king. Nehemiah must have done a good job as cupbearer: Artaxerxes was king for 40 years before dying of natural causes. But even for someone in Nehemiah's trusted position, coming before the king was a scary proposition. And Nehemiah was boldly asking for two enormous favors: permission to make the trip and the king's assistance in making it. Even after having prayed for days, Nehemiah silently said a quick prayer to God before making his request.

Nehemiah's Faith and Risk Paid Off _____

Nehemiah's prayer was answered abundantly. Artaxerxes gave him the time off he needed, letters assuring safe passage through lands along the way, and a guarantee of building materials. In addition, the king gave him and his entourage an escort of officers and soldiers on horses! When Nehemiah prayed and humbled himself before God. God answered.

The Jesus Connection

Sin damages our lives and pulls us from God. But Jesus gives us a path to seek God's forgiveness.

Tip Consistently use the same signal to announce a transition to the next activity. You could flip the lights off and on, use a train whistle, have a puppet rustling inside a bag, or sing cleanup songs. Keep it simple, consistent, and fun.

What You'll Do

As children arrive, greet each one with a smile. When it's time to begin, use your signal to bring the children together in a circle. Begin the CD, and lead the kids in singing "Let's All Praise God" (track 18) to the tune of "Take Me Out to the Ballgame." Encourage the kids to join you in doing the motions.

We're so happy to be here; (sway from side to side) We're so happy we came! (sway from side to side) Open our Bibles, (hold hands together, palms up, like a book) And clap our hands! (clap once) We're so happy we can hardly stand. (act as if you're falling; then stand up straight)

So, we'll sing, sing, sing for our Jesus, (cup hands around mouth) And maybe we'll play a game. (pretend to bat a ball) We'll all shout, laugh, clap, (clap once) And praise God! Let's all praise God's name! (wave hands in the air) (Repeat 2x.)

Say: Today we'll learn what happens when ► WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY. Let's praise God by singing "Those Who Hope." When you sing the words "hope in the Lord," turn in a slow circle like you're turning to God to pray.

Begin the CD, and lead the children in singing "Those Who Hope" (Isaiah 40:31) (track 6 on the CD).

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Whose Voice Is That?

What You'll Do

Turn the table on its side. Then have children form a circle, take two big steps back, and sit down. Open your Bible to 2 Chronicles 7:14, and show children the words.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible says, "If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land" (2 Chronicles 7:14). This means that if we pray, God will hear us. Let's practice the Key Verse together. Lead the children in repeating the simplified Key Verse with you: If we pray, God will hear us (2 Chronicles 7:14).

Tell kids that you'll ask one of them to sit behind the table and slowly whisper the simplified Key Verse—If we pray, God will hear us—three times in a disguised voice. Make sure kids' eyes are closed, and discreetly ask a child to hide behind the table and begin speaking in a funny voice.

Ask kids to guess who's behind the table. When they guess correctly, have kids open their eyes as the child comes out from behind the table and rejoins the others. Then mix up the circle, and have kids close their eyes again. Make sure kids are spread out so they can't hear the person beside them stand up if that person is chosen. Choose another willing child to sit behind the table.

Continue playing the game, but start adding more than one person behind the table speaking at the same time, first with two, then with three kids at a time.

Ask:

- What made this game harder?
- What's it like knowing that God hears every single person's prayers?

Say: Our Key Verse says that if we pray, God will hear us. It doesn't matter how many people are talking to God at the same time. God always hears us, no matter who we are or where we are. And when we do bad things, ▶ WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY through prayer. It's great to know that God's always listening, and we can always tell God we're sorry.

3 BIBLE EXPLORATION

Theo's News

What You'll Do

Say: **Friends, it's time for Theo's News!** Have the children sit in a circle. Then begin "Here, Theo" (track 4 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put the Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody!

Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today. **Theo:** I hid it in the Surprise Box.

Teacher: Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today. (Invite a child to open the Surprise Box, and have the kids pass the music player around the circle so everyone can see it up close. Give the children time to guess what they might learn from the Bible today.)

Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this music player in our Surprise Box? **Theo:** Well, you can listen to a music player and hear people talking or singing. **Teacher:** Friends, have you ever listened to a radio? What do you like to listen to on the radio?

(Pause for kids to answer your question.)

Teacher: We can listen to the radio, and God listens to us when we pray. Today we'll hear about a man who told God he was sorry. Let's find out what happened! **Theo:** Have fun, boys and girls! **Teacher:** Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Nehemiah Seeks Forgiveness

What You'll Do

Gather the kids in a circle away from the boxes and blocks. Open your Bible to Nehemiah 1, and show the children the words. Tell children that the Bible is God's special book.

Say: The Bible tells us that God is glad when ► WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY for doing things that are bad. A man named Nehemiah knew this important truth. Nehemiah was an important helper to the king. One day, some family and friends came to Nehemiah with some bad news about God's people who'd been scattered far away from home. The men told Nehemiah that the exiles had finally returned to Jerusalem, but the city was a mess. The wall around the city was broken down and the gates were burned. If the city didn't have any walls around it, bad guys could get into the town.

Lead the kids to the side of the room where the blocks and boxes are scattered around. Have children sit near the mess.

Say: Nehemiah was very sad, and it made him think about all the bad things he and his family had done that made God sad. Have kids talk about a time they did something they knew was bad and needed to apologize.

Say: Nehemiah knew that ► WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY when we do bad things, or don't do the things God wants us to do. He prayed to God asking for forgiveness and help to rebuild the wall. Let's take a moment to silently think about things we've done that might not make God happy. Allow time. Nehemiah prayed and told God he was sorry for the bad things he'd done. Let's take a moment to silently pray. You can tell God you're sorry if you want to. Give kids a moment before moving on.

Say: The king noticed that Nehemiah was sad, and he asked why. Nehemiah was afraid to tell the king because people weren't supposed to share their problems with such an important person as a king. Have kids think about a time they were afraid, and then have them pretend to tremble in fear.

Say: Nehemiah turned to God when he was afraid. He said a quick prayer asking God to give him the strength to talk with the king. Have kids talk about who they can talk to when they're afraid.

Say: God gave Nehemiah the courage to tell the king about the broken-down wall in Jerusalem and to ask if he could go help the people rebuild the city. The king allowed Nehemiah to go—he even gave him supplies for the project, and he sent people to protect Nehemiah as he traveled!

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Tell about a time that someone apologized to you for something they did.
- Why do you think God wants us to say we're sorry when we do bad things?

Say: Nehemiah knew that God wants to hear us ask for forgiveness. Nehemiah also prayed to God when he was sad, when he was afraid, and when he didn't know what to say to the king. The Bible says that Jesus also turned to God when he was on earth, even though Jesus never had to say he was sorry. He lived a perfect life. Jesus came so we could be forgiven when ▶ WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY.



WEAVING FAITH

Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

CENTER 1:

Post-It Prayers

What You'll Do

Distribute the My Bible Playground pages along with several sticky notes for each child, and have the kids write their names on their papers with washable markers. Point out the picture of the refrigerator on the student pages.

Say: Many people put notes on their refrigerators to remind them of things they need to do. Let's make our own refrigerator notes to remind us of reasons to pray to God.

Have kids use the markers to draw a prayer concern (such as a sick family member) on at least one of the sticky notes. On another sticky note, have kids draw something they enjoy to remind them to thank God. Finally, have kids take a third sticky note and draw a picture of Nehemiah next to a crumbled wall.

Say: These notes can remind us that > WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY. Have kids stick the notes to the fridges on their student pages.

Go around the group and have kids pray silently or out loud for their prayer concerns.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What's it like knowing you can talk to God?
- Why is it so important to tell God we're sorry?

Say: When you go home today, ask your parents to put your page on the refrigerator as a reminder of how we can pray to God. Remember that the sticky note with Nehemiah on it can remind us that ► WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY.

CENTER 2: Prayerful Trail Mix

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands. Hand everyone a cup. Say: Let's make trail mix to help us remember what happened to Nehemiah. As kids go along, they need to make sure they don't fill the cups completely so they can mix all the ingredients together at the end. Help children put O-shaped cereal in their cups and say: Let's pretend these round treats are the stones that made up parts of the walls around Jerusalem that had fallen down.

Have kids put a few sour gummy worms in their cups. Say: **Nehemiah told God he was** sorry. When we have sour or bad attitudes and do bad things, it's important for us to remember that ► WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY.

Have kids add the chocolate chips or raisins to their cups. Say: **Nehemiah prayed to God, and God blessed Nehemiah. Let's use these sweet treats to remind us to thank God for the sweet blessings he gives us.**

Have kids place their hands over their cups and gently shake up the ingredients. The children can say a prayer of thanks and then enjoy their tasty treats!

Say: The Bible says that Nehemiah told God the bad things he and his family had done. When we do things that are bad, ► WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY, too.



Center 2: Prayerful Trail Mix Supplies

Sit with children in a circle. Say: When Nehemiah heard about Jerusalem, he was very sad. He thought of all the ways he disobeyed God. He told God he was sorry. When ► WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY, God forgives us and no longer remembers the bad things we've done.

Draw a few simple faces in pencil on a sheet of paper. Give each child a piece of Silly Putty, and demonstrate how to transfer a picture by pressing the Silly Putty over a face. Show children how they can stretch the putty to create different facial expressions. Let kids create angry or mad faces with the putty. Then have them each squeeze the Silly Putty into a ball to erase the picture.

Give kids a few minutes to transfer and erase several of their own pictures, and then read aloud Psalm 103:2-3.

Say: The Bible tells us that when > WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY, God forgives us for disobeying him.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- When God forgives us, how is that like erasing our sins?
- What's it like knowing that when God forgives us, he doesn't remember the bad things we did?

Say: Nehemiah told God the bad things he and his family had done. Like Nehemiah, ▶ WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY. Like the images on the putty, when God forgives us, he erases our sin.

CENTER 4: Near to Hear

What You'll Do

Say: Before modern hearing aids, people who needed help hearing used ear trumpets. People would hold them to their ears so they could hear what people were saying. Today, we're going to make our own ear trumpets.

Set out the cups, scissors, crayons, and stickers. Help children carefully cut a hole in the bottom of their cups. Show children how to take their two cups, holding them so that the bottoms touch, and tape the cups together. Then have children use stickers and markers

to decorate the outside of the cups. Encourage the children to form pairs and try out their ear trumpets. Have one partner put one end of the trumpet to his or her ear and let the other partner whisper the Bible Point \rightarrow "WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY"—into the other cup. Point out how well they can hear each other even when they whisper.



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Have the partners tell each other that they can turn to God and pray anytime.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did your homemade ear trumpet affect your hearing?
- What does God need in order to hear us?
- What are some times you like to talk to God?

Say: We can talk to God at any time and in any place. God is always near to hear our prayers. When ► WE TELL GOD WE'RE SORRY, God will always hear us!

Nehemiah Rebuilds the Wall

Nehemiah 2:11-6:19

BIBLE BACKGROUND

Scoping Out the Opposition

Nehemiah 2:10 hints that the task facing Nehemiah would not be easy. At least two of the leaders of people living near Jerusalem—Sanballat and Tobiah were unhappy about Nehemiah's plans. They didn't want anyone to help the Israelites.

Nehemiah inspected the wall in secret because he wanted to keep his intentions to himself until the time was right to reveal them. He already knew about the opposition of Sanballat and Tobiah, but he didn't know if other opposition existed, even within the city of Jerusalem. After conducting an exploratory examination of the ruined wall, he gathered the Jewish officials and told them of his plan, of God's blessing, and of the king's help. And they were ready to start building!

A Series of Challenges

After the work began, it wasn't long before opposition arose. Sanballat, the governor of Samaria, just to the north of Jerusalem, mocked the Jews. Tobiah, probably the leader of the Ammonites just to the east of Jerusalem, stood beside Sanballat in his opposition.

The secret of the Jews' early success in rebuilding the wall is revealed in Nehemiah 4:6: "the people worked with all their heart." When the wall was about halfway rebuilt and the gaps were being closed, Sanballat and Tobiah met with other enemies of the Jews and plotted their next steps. The Jews responded by praying and posting guards. Half the men worked, as the other half—well-armed—stood guard.

From within the wall, another problem lurked: impoverished Jews in need of loans were being further extorted for more money. Nehemiah quickly rectified the situation. The final opposition to the rebuilding came in two phases: first an attempt to draw Nehemiah out so that he could be injured or killed, and then an attempt to deceive him into showing fear and weakness by hiding in the Temple. Both attempts failed, and the rebuilding continued.

Despite the challenges, the wall was rebuilt in only 52 days! The people had accepted Nehemiah's goal, and God helped them overcome the challenges along the way.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus was never one to shy away from challenges. He was constantly challenged by religious authorities, and he met those challenges head-on.

What challenges are you facing? How do you need God's help to face them? Read Nehemiah 6:9. Then pray that God will strengthen you as you combat the challenges in your life. You can write your prayer here.

Say: Today we'll learn that Nehemiah had God's help to rebuild the broken-down wall in Jerusalem. Just as God helped Nehemiah, the Bible says that ▶ GOD HELPS US! Let's sing "The Plans I Have for You" as we get ready to learn more about Nehemiah.

Lead the kids in singing "The Plans I Have for You" (Jeremiah 29:11) (track 8 on the CD). Each time the children sing "plans," have them place their palms side by side and look at their hands as if they're reading a book. Have them show their "plans" to other children.

(Verse) "For I know the plans I have for you," Declares the Lord. "I know the plans I have for you," Declares the Lord. (Repeat.)



Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Nehemiah Rebuilds

What You'll Do

Gather with kids near the piles of blocks. Open your Bible to Nehemiah 2, and show the children the words. Tell children that the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Today, we're discovering how God helped Nehemiah and how ► GOD HELPS US. Nehemiah was worried about his people and sad that the wall of the city was broken down. Point to the blocks on the floor. Back then, a city needed big, strong walls for protection from invaders. What do you think your house would be like without any walls? Allow time for discussion.

Say: Nehemiah told God he was sorry for the wrong things he'd done and asked God for help. God answered Nehemiah's prayers, and the king allowed Nehemiah to go to Jerusalem to help rebuild the city wall.

Show kids the "Rebuilding the Wall of Jerusalem" poster. Say: In today's Bible passage, we'll hear about how Nehemiah and his friends trusted God to help them as they rebuilt their city's walls. Let's pretend that we're working with Nehemiah and the people. Let's turn this jumble of blocks into a nice, strong wall. Encourage kids to use the small blocks to build a very tall wall on top of the wall on the poster. As kids work, ask them to tell about a time they had a lot of work to do and needed help getting all of it done.

Say: The people may've thought, "Oh, what a lot of work!" But they must've been excited, too, to finally rebuild their city. And the people knew that it could be done

Play "Nehemiah Rebuilds the Wall" (track 19 on the CD). Encourage kids to build as they listen to the rhyme. When the track ends, have the kids finish building the wall on the poster.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Explain why you think Nehemiah could or couldn't have built the walls without God's help.
- Why does God help people?
- What does God do to help you?

Say: Nehemiah and God's people had a big party and celebrated when they finished building their wall for God. Our wall looks great, too! Whether we're building a wall, doing chores at home, or helping a neighbor do yard work, we can learn from Nehemiah's example how to trust God to help us. We can pray to God for help because we know ► GOD HELPS US!

Lead everyone in clapping and cheering for their well-built wall!

WEAVING FAITH

Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. What You'll Do

Set out the cleaning supplies. Say: Nehemiah saw the need to rebuild the city walls to protect Jerusalem. He asked God for help and started finding ways he could get involved. We can do things to help others, too!



Esther Saves Her People

Esther 2–9

BIBLE BACKGROUND

Esther Becomes Queen of Persia

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Xerxes, the Persian king, wanted to replace his queen, whom he'd banished from his presence because she had disobeyed one of his commands. Esther was one of many young virgins brought into Xerxes' harem to be considered for the position. Esther didn't reveal to anyone that she was a Jew. Chosen by the king as the most attractive of all the women brought before him, Esther was made queen.

Commercial and legal affairs were conducted at the king's gate. The fact that Esther's cousin Mordecai sat at the king's gate indicates that he held a high position in Xerxes' government. In his station there, he overheard the plot to assassinate the ruler. After reporting the plot to Xerxes through Queen Esther, Mordecai definitely attained a position of favor with the king, but apparently he was given no reward at the time.

Haman's Evil Plot

Mordecai's refusal to bow before Haman probably stemmed from his insistence on worshipping God alone. He wasn't about to let Haman, an Amalekite and a descendant of ancient enemies of the Jews, take the place of God. Haman apparently hated all Jews and loved to wield the power of his high position in Xerxes' government. When Mordecai refused to bow to him, Haman decided to wipe out all the Jews in the kingdom.

Esther and God's People Fast

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When Esther realized what the king's decree meant, her response was to fast and to have all the Jews in the city fast as well. Though prayer isn't mentioned here, the intent of the fast was to seek God's favor and direction. It may seem an easy task for Esther to stand up and tell the king of Haman's plot, but she risked her life by approaching the king uninvited. After Haman was hanged, there was still a problem: The edict to kill all the Jews couldn't be withdrawn. However, Xerxes commanded Esther and Mordecai to write a new decree allowing the Jews to defend themselves. Esther was obedient in serving God where he had placed her, and God used her actions to preserve his people.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus said that he came not to be served, but to serve (Mark 10:45). And he wants us to do the same! How is God calling you to serve him? In what ways do you feel ill-equipped for the role? Talk to God about your calling to serve, and ask him to help you clearly see that everyone—including you—can serve God. You can write your prayer here.

Say: As we ► SERVE GOD, we can trust that God will guide our ways. God loves us and helps us know the best way to serve.



We Do Good Works!

What You'll Do

Form a circle with kids and sit down. Open your Bible to Ephesians 2:10, and show children the words.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible says, "For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do" (Ephesians 2:10). To "do good works" means that God created us to serve him. Let's practice the Key Verse together.

Lead the children in repeating the simplified Key Verse with you: **God created us to do good works (Ephesians 2:10).**

Ask: What are some good works you've done? Allow time for kids to respond.

Say: God created us to do good works, such as helping others and loving others. Let's sing a song to remind us that we were created to ► SERVE GOD by doing good works.

Sing "Do Good Works" (tracks 20 and 21 on the CD) to the tune of "The Mulberry Bush." Encourage the kids to sing the words and do the actions. The words for track 20 follow;

track 21 is an instrumental version of the same song so you can sing new verses using some of the children's ideas of good works.

This is the way we do good works, (hold out hands, palms up) Do good works, do good works. This is the way we do good works That God made us to do. (raise hands up; then point thumbs to chest)

This is the way we hug a friend, (hug someone) Hug a friend, hug a friend. This is the way we do good works That God made us to do. (raise hands up; then point thumbs to chest)

This is the way we help at home, (pretend that you're dusting furniture or sweeping the floor)

Help at home, help at home. This is the way we do good works That God made us to do. (raise hands up; then point thumbs to chest)

(Repeat from the beginning.)

Say: God made each of us, and we're all special! *Works* is another word for actions. God created us to do good works and to ► SERVE GOD. We can show God how much we love him by doing good works that please him.

Say: **Friends, it's time for Theo's News!** Have the children sit in a circle. Then begin "Here, Theo" (track 4 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put the Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody! Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today. Theo: I hid it in the Surprise Box. Teacher: Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today. (Invite a child to open the Surprise Box, and have the kids pass the scepter around the circle so the rest of the group can see it up close. Give the children time to guess what they might learn from the Bible today.)

Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this stick in our Surprise Box? **Theo:** Well, it's not just any stick; it's a special stick!

Teacher: Friends, what do you think this special stick could be used for? (Pause for kids to answer your question.)
Theo: I think this would make for a great stick to play fetch with.
Teacher: Today, we're learning what the Bible says about a woman named Esther who married a king. Even though Esther was the queen, she couldn't speak to the king unless he asked for her and reached out with his scepter. (Have Theo "point" with the scepter.)
Theo: A king's scepter is a long stick that's sometimes made of gold and has fancy carvings and jewels on it.

Teacher: Now let's listen to the Bible and hear how God used Esther to do some good works for his people. We'll also talk about ways we can ► **SERVE GOD**.

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use. Set the scepter aside for use in the Bible Time activity.

Bible Time: Esther Saves the Day

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Esther 2, and show the children the words. Tell children that the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Today we're learning that we can ► SERVE GOD, just as a woman named Esther served God in the Bible. Each time you hear someone say *queen*, place your hands on your head to make a crown and say, ► "SERVE GOD." Demonstrate how to make a circle with your thumbs and pinkie fingers touching, and place the "crown" on your head.

Play "Esther's Story" (track 22 on the CD), and have kids make the crowns and respond to the story as they listen to it. (Each time *queen* is said on the CD, there's a brief pause so that the children can respond.) Follow along with all of the motions from the CD, pausing the CD as directed while kids tell about times they were afraid.

Afterward, give one child the scepter from Theo's News, and have him or her pretend to be the King or Queen. Have the King or Queen stand on the far side of the room while the other kids stand on the other side of the room. When the King or Queen holds up the scepter, kids can walk forward. When the King or Queen holds the scepter down, the other kids will stop. When children arrive at the other side of the room, they can each say one way they can ► SERVE GOD. Continue until all children have crossed the room and have said one idea. If time permits, choose another King or Queen, and play again.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What could've happened if Queen Esther was too afraid to serve God?
- What incredible things could happen if you ► SERVE GOD?

Say: God made Queen Esther to do special things. God made each of you to do special things too, and you can ► SERVE GOD!



WEAVING FAITH

INTO LIFE

Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

CENTER 1:

Esther and the Scepter

What You'll Do

Distribute the My Bible Playground pages, and have kids write their names on their papers with washable markers.

Say: Esther may've been nervous about risking her life by talking to the king, but she knew she could ▶ SERVE GOD. Let's decorate the king's scepter on our pages as a reminder of how Esther served God and saved her people.

Give kids glue, markers, and glitter, and let them decorate the scepters on their student pages. Have children share what they remember about Esther and how she served God.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What surprised you about what happened to Esther?
- What are some ways you can ► SERVE GOD at school?

Say: Each one of you is so special to God! And even though you'll probably never get to stand before a king, you can ► SERVE GOD at your school, at home, and with your family and friends. You can be kind and loving and tell everyone about God!

Food for a King and Queen

What You'll Do

Set out plastic knives, plates, slices of cheese, and crackers. Say: **Today we're going to** pretend we're kings and queens, and we'll have a royal meal together.

Set out adult-sized shirts for kids to wear as pretend robes, and let them make crowns by cutting a crown design out of the construction paper and taping the ends together.

Say: The name *Esther* means star. In honor of that, we're going to have star-shaped snacks.

Have children clean their hands, and help them cut similar-sized small squares of cheese. Demonstrate how to put one square on top of another, offset to look like a star. Let them make several stars and put the stars on crackers. Encourage children to do good works by serving one another the snacks they've made. Say a prayer of thanksgiving, and let children enjoy the snacks they've been given.

Say: God created us to do good works, and you all served God by making special snacks for each other. You were all stars today, just as Queen Esther was a star in her time! You can ► SERVE GOD every day, just as Esther served God.

Move to the Scepter

What You'll Do

Say: Let's play a game to help us think of ways we can ► SERVE GOD and do good works, such as hugging a neighbor, patting someone on the back, and telling people that God loves them.

Choose a willing child to be a King or Queen by giving the scepter from the Theo's News activity to that child. Have the King or Queen hold up the scepter and say one good work for the other kids to do immediately, such as "Hug as many children as you can," "Pat other children on the back," or "Say 'God loves you' to other children." As long as the scepter is up, the kids will continue to do that good work.

When the King or Queen lowers the scepter, everyone stops. Then he or she will choose someone to take his or her place for the next round. The new King or Queen will hold up the scepter and say another good work for all of the kids to do. If you have time, continue until all of the children have had a chance to be the King or Queen and hold up the scepter and say good works for the other kids to do.

Talk With Kids

Ask:

- What made it easy or hard to come up with ways to ► SERVE GOD?
- Explain if you think being your size and age makes it easy or hard to
 SERVE GOD.

Say: God used Esther, a normal girl, to save the Jewish people. Esther may not have been what comes to mind when you think of a hero, but because she was willing to ► SERVE GOD, she was able to save God's people. Like Esther, we can always be on the lookout for different ways to ► SERVE GOD!

A Guiding Star

What You'll Do

Say: Esther's name means star. People once used the stars in the night sky to show them where to go. They'd find a star, or group of stars, to help guide them in the right direction. When we look for ways to ► SERVE GOD, there are people who can help guide us in the right direction. They're like our guiding stars!

Ask children to each cut the center out of a small paper plate. Then have them staple two ribbons to the bottom of their circles so they resemble award ribbons. Tell the children to decorate the top of this award with star drawings, glitter glue, and stickers. Explain to children that Esther had a family member who helped guide her to do the right thing, just as they have parents to guide them. Have children present these awards to their parents as a thank you for being a "guiding star" in their lives.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What are some ways your parents guide you?
- How can God use you to guide or help other people?

Say: Today, the Bible taught us how God used Esther to save her people. God uses your parents to help you and to guide you, too. And we can ► SERVE GOD by helping others!

Center 4: A Guiding Star Supplies

Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

After the children have cleaned up the centers, bring everyone back to sit in a circle on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage children to share what they learned from the Bible today.

Also use this time to challenge kids in their faith. Encourage them to choose a Daily Challenge for applying today's lesson to their lives this week. Use this challenge for encouraging your children's growing relationships with Jesus.

Talk With Kids

Say: Today we learned that we can ► SERVE GOD. I'd like each of you to choose a way you can ► SERVE GOD this week by helping others.

Read these three Daily Challenge ideas for kids to choose from.

- Have your mom or dad help you save pennies this week, and then give them to a local charity.
- Smile at someone who seems sad.
- Call a friend or relative who lives far away. Tell the person that Jesus loves him or her and so do you!

Have kids each whisper in your ear to tell you which idea they've chosen, and then circle it on each child's My Bible Playground page. Make sure you choose a challenge as well and tell kids which challenge you chose. Your commitment will inspire children and will give them an opportunity to see God at work in your life as well as in theirs!

Royal Prayer Chair

What You'll Do

Cover a chair with a blanket to make a "royal chair." Give each child an opportunity to sit on the chair while other kids take turns praying for the child. Kids could pray, **"Thanks, God, for using** [name of child] **to do your good works."** After each child who wants to participate has had a chance to sit in the chair, close by having the kids fold their hands and bow their heads while you say the following prayer.

Dear God,

Thank you for creating Queen Esther to do good works and save the people. Thank you for using each of us to serve you and to tell others about you. In Jesus' name, amen.

Job Remains Faithful in Suffering

Job 1:1-2:10; 42:1-6, 10-17

F ive- and six-year-olds have had different experiences with sadness. Unfortunately, some children may've experienced great suffering, even at a young age. Some kids may've experienced physical suffering through injuries or illnesses; other children may've experienced emotional suffering through the divorce of their parents or the death of loved ones. Be sensitive to what's going on in your children's lives. When giving examples of trials and sufferings, be as personal as you can *without* using names or causing embarrassment. Use this lesson to assure your children that God loves us and helps us when we're sad.

Job Remains Faithful in Suffering

Job 1:1-2:10; 42:1-6, 10-17

BIBLE BACKGROUND

Job Is Tested

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In the book of Job, Satan came before God and claimed that Job, a righteous and extremely wealthy man, remained faithful to God only because he had been blessed by God. Satan suggested that Job would reject God if all Job had was taken from him. God allowed the test, and Job was stripped of everything: his wealth, his family, and his health. Three friends tried to comfort him but ended up criticizing and blaming him instead. All the while, Job insisted on his innocence and refused to turn against God. In the end, God spoke to Job and chastised Job as well as his three friends for the fallacies in their arguments.

Job Asks God the Eternal Question: Why?

When Job lost his family, he didn't hesitate to express his grief. He didn't lose his faith in God, but he expressed human emotions. And his words indicated that he knew God was in charge and was worthy of praise even in the midst of suffering. Even when he lost his health, Job "did not sin in what he said" (Job 2:10). He simply questioned why God would allow such suffering to be inflicted on an innocent man.

God spoke to Job, answering Job's questions with a series of questions that underlined how little Job knew about God (Job 38–41). Job had begun to question God's righteousness and love. God silenced those doubts, but also made it clear that he owed no one an explanation for the reasons for Job's suffering.

Job Believes

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Realizing that God hadn't turned against him, Job was willing to accept that God had a reason for allowing him to suffer, even though God never revealed that reason. Job was relieved to discover that God still cared about him and was with him through all he had endured. And the restoration of Job's wealth along with the blessing of a new family demonstrated to Job that God had not abandoned him.

The Jesus Connection

In his Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5), Jesus said, "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted." We're blessed when we suffer because then we can experience Jesus' hope all the more clearly.

When have you suffered, and what part did hope (or a lack of hope) play in that suffering? What's an area of pain in your life right now? Ask God to use it to reveal more of himself and his hope to you. You can write your prayer here.

Say: Today we'll learn that SOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD. Let's sing a song and praise God who gives us strength in tough times.

Lead the kids in singing "Those Who Hope" (Isaiah 40:31) (track 6 on the CD). Encourage the children to join you in singing and doing the motions.

Teacher: Let's listen to the Bible to find out how God helped Job when he was hurting. **Theo:** Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Faithful Job

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Job 1, and show children the words. Tell them that the Bible is God's special book. Say: The Bible tells us how ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD. God's book tells us about a good man named Job who worshipped God. Job was rich and he owned lots of animals. He had lots of sheep and camels and donkeys and oxen. Put some cotton balls by the poster. Job also had many servants (place more cotton balls by the poster) to help take care of the animals, and to help his wife and their 10 children.

Bible Time: Faithful Job Supplies

Job knew that God had blessed him, and Job gave God the credit for his success. Explain that the cotton balls beside the poster represent God's blessings for Job. But Satan, the devil, wanted to test Job. Satan thought that if Job lost all his blessings, then he'd stop worshipping God. But God knew that Job would believe in God no matter what. So Satan tested Job.

Say: One day, a messenger came to Job and told him that all of his oxen and donkeys had been taken away. Let each child remove a couple of cotton balls to represent the animals that were taken away. Turn the poster over so Job's sad face is showing.

Say: Later, someone else came to Job to report that lightning had burned up Job's sheep and servants. Pause and let each child remove several cotton balls to represent the sheep and servants.

Say: Then another person told Job that his camels had been stolen. Let each child remove a few cotton balls to represent the camels that were taken away. Make sure all of the cotton balls have been removed.

Have kids talk with someone next to them about a time they were really sad.

Say: I'm sure Job was sad and discouraged. But the Bible tells us that Job believed in God and put his hope in God. Job knew that ▶ GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD. Job wasn't feeling a physical hurt, like a stubbed toe or a skinned knee. Job was hurting in his heart—he was sad. God comforts us whether we're hurting on the outside or in our hearts.

The most difficult suffering that Job faced was the loss of his children. A messenger told Job that a terrible wind had blown down the house that Job's children were in. Pause to let kids remove the blocks with the pictures of Job's children from around the poster. The blocks should remain someplace accessible for later use in this activity.

Say: Throughout all of these terrible things, Job continued to believe in God. Job knew that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD. Unfortunately, Job's troubles weren't over. Satan caused terrible sores to appear on Job's body. I'm sure Job didn't have bandages like we have today, but we're going to use our bandages to remind us of the many sores that Job had on his body. Let the kids stick bandages on the poster.

Have kids talk about a time it felt like everything was going wrong in their lives.

Say: People told Job to stop believing in God because of all the bad things that had happened to him. But Job knew that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD, so Job kept hoping in God and loving God. And do you know what God did? God healed Job's sores. Turn the poster over to show a smiling Job with no bandages. Say: God gave Job even more money and more animals than before. Let the children put back the cotton balls and add even more cotton balls. Say: And God gave Job more sons and daughters. Let the children place the blocks that show Job's children on the poster again.



Bible Time: Faithful Job Easy Prep

Fold the poster in half, and lay it down with Job's happy face showing.

Separate the "Job's Children" cards, and tape each one to a block so they can "stand" around the poster.

Say: Job praised God for his blessings. No matter what bad things had happened in his life, Job put his trust and hope in God.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Tell about a time you were hurting.
- What did God do to help you when you were hurting?

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Say: Although many sad things happened to Job, God was with him the whole time. ▶ GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD, and we know that God is with us, even in bad times. God loves us and will help us when we're sad.

WEAVING FAITH

Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

CENTER 1:

When I Hurt

What You'll Do

Distribute the My Bible Playground pages, and have the kids write their names on their papers with washable markers. Give the kids each an adhesive bandage.

Say: **Use the markers to color in the person on the page to resemble yourself.** Allow kids time to finish their drawings, and then have kids talk about different things in life that can make them sad and things that hurt on the outside.

Say: The next time you're sad, remember that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD. Let's stick a bandage on our drawings of ourselves to help us remember that.

Center 1: When I Hurt Supplies

Remove the Lesson 13 pages from each My Bible Playground student book.



Talk With Kids

Ask:

- How does a bandage help you when you're sad?
- What are some ways God helps you when you're sad?

Say: Throughout Job's trials and hurts, he still trusted God. When we have problems, we can talk to God about our problems and ask God to take care of us because ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD.

Sweet 'n Sour Living

What You'll Do

Have kids clean their hands and form pairs. Give each child a paper plate and some toothpicks. Then give each child four pieces of fruit. Ask kids to sample one piece of fruit, and have them describe to their partner how it tastes. Pass around the bowl with granulated sugar and allow each child to put a piece of fruit on a toothpick, dip it in the bowl to lightly coat the fruit, and then pass the bowl on to the next child. Pass around the lemon-lime drink mix bowl, directing children to very lightly coat their fruit with this topping. Finish by passing around the bowl of powdered sugar for kids to each dip their last piece of fruit in. Ask a willing child to pray, thanking God for the snack.

Say: We're going to eat our fruit to help us remember a little more about Job's life. First, pick up the fruit you dipped in sugar. This is a reminder of Job's sweet life at the beginning. Try it. Have kids talk to their partners about how it tastes. Pretty good, right? Job's life was pretty good, too.

Now pick up the second fruit and try it. Have kids talk with their partners about the taste. Remember how Job's life had some bad things happen? He didn't like what happened, and it seemed like his life had turned sour just like our fruit.

Let's try the last fruit. Have kids talk about the taste. Do you remember what finally happened to Job? Job's life had turned sweet again. In fact, it was even sweeter than before.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why do you think Job's life got even better after all his difficulties?
- How does God make our life better when we're sad?

Say: The fruit underneath didn't change its taste, even though we used different toppings. The outside changed, but not the fruit inside. Job had good and bad

Center 3: When You're Feeling Sad Supplies

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CD player **Teacher Pack** CD: "When You're Feeling Sad" (track 23) things happen to him, but he didn't change his attitude toward God, even though he didn't know things would ever get better. Remember, ▶ GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD.

CENTER 3:

When You're Feeling Sad

What You'll Do

Say: Job knew even when bad things are happening that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD. When we're sad, we know we can always trust God to help us, too. Let's sing a song to help us remember what we're learning today.

Play "When You're Feeling Sad" (track 23 on the CD). Have kids follow you in doing the motions.

When you're feeling sad, (walk around with a sad look) When you're feeling sad, (walk around with a sad look) Hope in the Lord, (point to the sky) Yes! And be strong! (flex muscles) (Repeat 2x)

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did Job show that he was strong for God when his life was sad?
- How does God help us be strong in sad times?

Say: Sometimes when we're sad, we walk around with a sad look on our face. It's normal to be sad, but we can remember that God will help give us the strength to keep going. ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD.



Rainbow Me

What You'll Do

Hand each child one sheet of white paper. Have children use pencils to divide their papers into four squares. Then ask them to use a different color of crayon to completely fill each square on their papers. (One square will be red, one yellow, one green, and one blue.)

Hand each child another sheet of white paper. Have children fold these in half, from top to bottom, then once again, from left to right. Tell children to draw a circle using crayons on the folded paper. Help children cut the circles out of the middle of their folded paper.

Because the papers are folded, with one cut they'll each have four equal circles. Tell children to draw their own smiling faces in each of the four circles, trying to make each face look the same. As kids follow along, demonstrate how to glue a face in the middle of each different color block on the first piece of paper.

Say: Sometimes good things happen to us, and sometimes bad things happen to us. Even when we have bad things happen to us, like Job did, we can still love and praise God. We need God even more when we're sad or hurt because he takes care of us.

Look at your picture. Even though the background changed, your picture didn't. Our situations in life may change—we might be happy or sad or angry or excited but we can always show how much we love God, and that will help us stay strong.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- When have you felt sad or hurt like Job did in the Bible?
- Why do we need God to help us in bad times?

Say: We may have hard times that we don't understand, but we know that God always loves us no matter what happens, and we love God no matter what happens, too. ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD.

What You'll Do

After the children have cleaned up the centers, bring everyone back to sit in a circle on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage the children to share what they learned from the Bible today.

Also use this time to challenge kids in their faith. Encourage them to choose a Daily Challenge for applying today's lesson to their lives this week. Use this challenge for encouraging your children's growing relationships with Jesus.

Talk With Kids

Say: Today we learned that SOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD. I'd like each of you to choose a way you can ask God to help you when you're sad.

Read these three Daily Challenge ideas for kids to choose from.

- If you or someone else has an "owie" this week, ask God to help the owie feel better.
- If you're sad or feel all alone this week, talk to God—he's always with you.
- If you're mad, upset, or sad this week, draw a picture of what's upsetting you and talk to God about it.

Have kids each whisper in your ear to tell you which idea they've chosen, and then circle it on each child's My Bible Playground page. Make sure you choose a challenge as well and tell kids which challenge you chose. Your commitment will inspire children and will give them an opportunity to see God at work in your life as well as in theirs!

"Stick With God" Prayer

What You'll Do

Give each child an adhesive bandage. Tell children that they'll stick the bandages on their hands or clothing during the prayer.

Say: You may wear the bandages home to remind yourselves that SOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE SAD.

"Stick With God" Prayer Supplies

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1 adhesive bandage per child



Lead children in the following prayer.

Dear God, Thank you for taking care of us in good times (make a happy face) and in hard times. (make a sad face) Help us to stick with you when we're happy and when we're sad just like you always stick with us. (stick the bandage on your clothes or hands) In Jesus' name, amen.

Weaving Faith at Home
