Birdathon 2014

Congratulations to all on a successful Birdathon again this year. We especially thank our sponsors and counters without whom the Birdathon would not be possible. We appreciate your participation and support for our conservation and education endeavors. Thanks, too, for our hard-working members who handle the details--Jane Fowler and Berttye Barnhart who handled the mailings.

As of May 31, our total receipts and pledges were \$5,066. There may still be a few checks yet to come in this year. The money will go to chapter operations, Feather Lake Wildlife Sanctuary, Rio Bosque Wetlands Park, Audubon Texas and Second Chance Wildlife Rescue.

Our annual potluck for Birdathon was graciously hosted by Janet and Mark Perkins. A good group was present as species seen by at least one counter were tallied. A total of 160 species were seen, compared to 167 last year.

The winners for the highest number of species seen by an individual or party were John Kiseda and Richard Hermosillo with 119. Very good! The prize for the most money raised went to John Sproul.

The most unusual birds this year were the Varied Bunting (John S.) and the Least Tern (Richard and John K.). The Long-tailed Duck regularly seen before Birdathon near Rio Bosque Wetlands Park proved bashful and was not seen on count days, but the Lilac-crowned Parrots were seen in the Upper Valley.


AT FEATHER LAKE

A brief, intense storm on 19 April produced enough runoff to finally break the 6.5-month dry spell at our Feather Lake Wildlife Sanctuary. Water soon covered over half the basin, but it quickly soaked in.

By 23 April, Feather Lake was again dry. For the surviving trees at the lake, the brief flooding was welcome. Far better would be sustained flooding from above-average rainfall this summer. **C'mon, El Niño!**

Our next workday at Feather Lake takes place **Sat., June 7** starting at **8 a.m.** Not surprisingly, the April storm also washed more trash into the basin. The endless task of its removal will continue.

Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.

Notes from the Field

Aguirre Springs and Soledad Canyon Saturday, April 12, 2014

Thirteen of us traveled to Las Cruces and our first stop was the Farm and Ranch Museum where we had great, long looks at a **Great Horned Owl**.

From there we went to Soledad Canyon, a new area for us to go to. It's a beautiful canyon and a nice place to hike. We hiked a short distance. We had three **Towhees - Spotted, Canyon and Green-tailed**. We also had **Scaled Quail, Rock Wren and Lark Bunting**.

We then traveled down Butler Road where we stopped at the water tanks and saw several species of **sparrows**.

From there we traveled to Aguirre Springs, where we had **Black-Throated Sparrows, Plumbeous Vireos, White-crowned Sparrows and Turkey Vultures**.

We had just enough time to eat our lunch before the wind started blowing.

Memorial and Arroyo Parks Saturday, April 26, 2014

Twelve birders joined us early in the morning on a nice day. We had five warblers - **Virginia's, Townsend's, Black-throated Gray, Yellow-rumped** and lots of **Wilson's**. We had a **Western Scrub-Jay and Steller's Jays**, lots of **Western Wood-Pewees** and **Warbling Vireo**.

At Arroyo Park, we had **Cactus Wren, American Kestrel, Turkey Vulture, Swainson's Hawk** and an **oriole** that some people thought might have been a **Baltimore Oriole** (it had a completely black head).

Animas Creek lies west of Caballo Lake and contains the only Arizona Sycamores east of the Continental Divide. The **Brown-crested Flycatcher** nests here and we hope to see **Summer Tanagers, Yellow-breasted Chats** and **Cassin's Kingbird**. We will bird this area from the road.
