Echinoids live in the sea. Their name is derived from echinos (Greek) which means 'hedgehog'. They are also called sea urchins ('urchin' is an old word for a hedgehog). You can understand their name when you look at a live sea urchin (left). It is covered in spines. However, these spines drop off easily, so the fossils only have the skeleton, called the 'test'.

Think Rocks

We had to have our boat trailer weighed at a certified public scale for registration purposes. The Rock Solid Stone Center on the Hernando County side of County Line Road not only has a public scale but it also has a full scale size Brontosaurus standing next to the office that looks surprising similar to Barney Rubble's house. As we were gaping at the enormous repli-

ca, Peg spotted a large rock not far from its big foot. One side of the naturally tumbled stone was well cov-

ered with several light blue, elongated, columnar crystals or kainite. While Peg was in the office asking about the price her find, I moseyed around the rock storage area, looking at the steel baskets, pallets, and crates of various landscaping stones. That's when I saw a wooden crate half full of the most peculiar rocks I've ever come across. Small individual chunks of light colored, sharp-edged and finely layered rocks were cemented together with a minimal amount of black to brown, once-molten lava. The density of these rocks was roughly half of what one would expect. There was no way that I could leave the premises without one of those beauties.

The price of what I assume is lava breccia was fifty-three cents a pound, so I paid \$9.40 including tax for the seventeen pound piece. Peg paid \$16.58, including tax for her fifty three pound specimen. Buying a rock is nowhere nearly as satisfying as finding one, but there is no way we could resist adding these sizable "finds" to our collection.



- Dave Letasi reminded members to sign up for the trip to the Museum of Natural Science in Gainesville, FL in May.

- Michele Evans made a motion to adjourn the meeting, Dick Drum seconded the motion and it passed by all.

January 24, 2016 Board Meeting Minutes 7:10pm - 9:15pm

Board members present: Dorwin Skinner, Melodye Steverson, Mike Stone, Rovie Alford, Dave Letasi and Judith Birx. Ralph Barber and Janet Wheeler were absent.

- The Board meeting began with a discussion of advertising ideas for our annual gem show. Suggestions included; The Five and Dime Magazine, Scene Magazine, the Spring Hill Newsletter, The Flyer, WWJD radio station, an electric sign on US 19, putting up a large sign on US19 for at least a week prior to the event, putting stacks of flyers at various locations, informing other Florida rock clubs and advertising in their newsletters, and informing schools and colleges.
- It was decided to also pursue monetary grants from Hernando and Pasco counties to fund more advertising.
- It was determined that the club needs one person to be an advertising chairperson, to oversee this aspect of the show. We will ask for a volunteer from the membership.
- The idea of inviting more vendors was discussed, whether to have more and how to contact them.
 This is under consideration and will be developed more at the next board meeting.
- The board decided that our gem show needs more for attendees to do and see. We will pursue the idea of expanding into the other available rooms in the facility and setting up activities and displays for education and entertainment. Dave Letasi has vol-

- unteered to give lectures in one room, and we are considering ideas for the other rooms, such as the gem mine and the fluorescent mineral display.
- We would also like to set up a mineral identification station in the center of the show room with displays and members using microscopes and their knowledge to help attendees identify any rocks and/or fossils they bring with them. The Board of Directors (BOD) has several other ides and will develop them over the next months.
- The dwindling treasury of the club was discussed and the BOD decided to bring it to the membership at our next monthly meeting. The fact that our annual dues do not cover the cost of the building use for meetings for a year is a problem that is escalating and must be addressed.
- Solutions were suggested and will be investigated. Mike Stone brought up Amazon Smile, where members could sign up and purchases they make on Amazon would generate income for the club. Dave Letasi made a motion to look into signing up for Amazon Smile, Dorwin Skinner seconded, and it was approved by the BOD. Also, signs will be created and placed around the room during meetings to remind members to donate for snacks and pay for using the machines. Raffles and fifty-fifty drawings will be held regularly and Chinese auctions will be held quarterly. This will be discussed at our next membership meeting.

February Rock Talk News

At our January club meeting one of our new members Mr. John C. Motzer Sr. brought in several wonderful vertebrate fossils for identification. John was collecting fossils in east central Kansas and came across the remains of the Ice Age peccary called Platygonus. He recovered a beautiful hoof core and anklebone as well as a fragmented upper arm bone. This flat headed peccary is well represented as fossil remains in North America but was recently discovered living in a remote area in South America. The remains of Platygonus are found in caves and sinkholes in Florida. They were a common prey of saber cats, having been found as skeletons together here and in Texas. Thanks John for bringing these to our attention.

Last week Rovie Alford helped Gary Spurlock load our club's fossil panel exhibit into the 1885 Rail Road Depot Museum in Brooksville for display. I hope you all have a chance to visit the museum and see our exhibit, especially during Heritage Day Festival on Feb 28. Great work Rovie and thank you for coordinating this exhibit for our group. I'm sure it will generate interest in the educational work the Withlacoochee Rockhounds provides to our community.

Last week I happened to catch the latest episode of Mysteries at the Museum Dinosaurs on the History Channel. I was amused by one clip where the host Don Wildman was walking on the Dinosaur Bone Wall at Dinosaur National Monument in Utah with Dr. Daniel Chure, their senior paleontologist at the site. I happened to meet Dr. Chure at a dinosaur symposium in 2000. We were studying the first feathered dinosaur fossils from China on display for the first time for the scientific community in America. Daniel worked on the new Abydosaurus sauropod skull found near the monument. It was prepared for research in their fossil lab. During a fossil trip I made to Utah I visited the museum and their staff allowed me to see it while it was being worked on as well as a new type of Allosaurus skull.



Adjustable Chuck for Dremels

Many of us have a Dremel motor tool to use at home or when out to a class or workshop. The one thing that makes this tool much more productive is the addition of an inexpensive option, an adjustable chuck.

The basic motor tool as sold typically comes with a collet chuck. This means you have to use a wrench to change every tool bit, you have to switch collets to use different shaft sizes (3/32 or 1/8 inch bits), and you can't use ordinary drills at all - only the special ones that have a 3/32 shaft.


A simple and inexpensive (\$12) adjustable chuck solves all of this. It's available in most large local hardware stores or model-making outlets. Tightening the chuck is done easily by hand to any size shaft. No key is required.

Identifying Unmarked Solders

There are several ways to mark your sheet or wire solders, but suppose you forget and have a couple that you can't identify. The answer is to compare the melting temperature of the unknown with that of a known solder. What I do is take a thick scrap of copper or nickel and arrange several solders on it. Ideally, I have a sample of easy, medium, and hard known solders surrounding the unknown solder. Then I heat the plate from the bottom and watch the order in which the solders melt.


