### FROM YOUR FOCUS EDITOR:



# BOOK REVIEW BY SUZANNE MURPHY - Valley Springs Book Club

Varina by Charles Frazier Publish date: HarperCollins, 2018

### First Lady of the Confederacy

Charles Frazier commented he would never write another Civil War novel after he finished Cold Mountain, but he couldn't keep that promise. His newest effort is a portrait of the woman who, according to his interpretation, may have most regretted the terrible war that very nearly tore a new nation—"conceived in liberty"— apart forever. Varina Davis, wife to Jefferson Davis, could be a mirror image of Mary Todd Lincoln in their personal suffering and loss of husbands who traded their life to preserve conflicting cultures—Lincoln to assassination and Davis to isolation and notoriety.


Using an imagined reunion of Varina Davis with a man named James Blake at a retreat in Saratoga Springs where the elderly woman lives quietly with her bitter memories and sorrows, the author writes a fascinating historical fiction. James Blake, who does appear in the historical record, a six-year-old slave, seems to have been rescued by Varina Davis and taken home to live in the household in the position of a sibling among the Davis children.

Blake's actual origins and relationship to the Davis family are sufficiently muddy, allowing Frazier to concoct a series of meetings between these two individuals, serving as a vehicle for narrating Varina's history as interviews rather than a chronology. The character James has a raft of questions for "V"-as she is referred to-and the conversations around these questions have qualities of a family history, exaggerations or not-quite-truths to cushion painful facts.

Loss has been the hallmark of Varina's life. Her lament is that she never asked for the place she held in the horrific bloodbath of the War Between the States. While she has no actual impact on the events themselves. she is witness to it all and married to a key player in the destruction of the South. Varina repeats that all she wanted was a stable marriage, even though her husband was more than twenty years her senior, and family.

It might be difficult to imagine Davis, who would become the president of an imaginary country, as the man who attracted the romantic attention of lively, dark-eyed Varina. From the very beginning of their marriage, he was absent frequently, feeding the fire of his political ambition, leaving Varina stranded and longing for the cadaverous embrace of this man of haggard appearance and scarecrow dimensions even in his well-nourished years.

While the novel is a fiction, historical subjects of the conversations between V and Blake did occur. Sherman's rampage through Georgia is depicted in burning detail. In the dark days as Dixie is driven to its knees, V's flight with her children from Richmond resonates with the terror so many experienced in



their own attempts to escape a landscape of ruination and lawlessness. "The last four years had made a whole generation of young boys—who ought to have been going to school and learning a trade... – into slit-eyes killers with no more tell of emotion than an old riverboat faro gambler."

Frazier also spends time with Jefferson and V in their later years when withdrawn to Biloxi, Mississippi, an old couple who has spent most of married life apart.

The person of Mary Chestnut, long-time friend of V and prolific biographer of the Civil War (her account was a rich resource for Ken Burns' documentary The Civil War) makes several appearances in the story. And that wicked Oscar Wilde shows up for a pleasant evening at the Davis' dinner table; Jefferson has nothing much to say to the young reprobate (perhaps strait-laced Davis had an inkling of the trouble Wilde was courting) and he excuses himself early from the table, so V delights in the witty conversation she thirsts for in her isolation from the wider world.

While this story is the narrative of a woman who suffered much and rationalizes she was not the master of her destiny even before she took up residence in the Grey House as its First—and Last—Lady, it is an entertaining version of the very real personal cost of war on people literally caught in the cross-fire of men whose ambition threatens the very foundations of a nation.


**The Miniaturist** by Jessie Burton Publish date: HarperCollins, 2014

In the sixteenth century, the Dutch Republic was a trade powerhouse, as formidable as France and Britain in its wide-ranging colonization of non-European lands, especially the exotic Indonesian islands. The City of Amsterdam enriched itself beyond belief with its control in goods distribution throughout the Continent. Amsterdam's social history evolved through a unique set of circumstances that propelled the Dutch Republic's economic rise as well as its disastrous downfall. The Republic essentially became the world's biggest financial institution ruled by an oligarchy that organized an economy with strict regulations that also shaped social life—the guilds that guaranteed stability in every trade, from bakers and silversmiths to butchers and merchants, also suppressed innovation and opportunity.

Author Burton recreates this world with the character of Nella Oortman, an eighteen-year-old country girl whose fresh beauty has captured the attention of Johannes Brandt, arguably one of the wealthiest traders in the City. Their marriage, though hastily arranged, is a stroke of luck since her alcoholic father has just died, leaving a widow and three children without a guilder. Nella will always have what is most prized in Dutch society, stability and a roof over her head Although the ceremony is brief and she does not have a wedding night because Brandt prefers to hop on a ship for a business opportunity, the girl thinks little of the delay since that was not an unusual occurrence in those times. However, when she journeys alone and arrives at the Brandt residence in Amsterdam, the household and its inhabitants prove to be more puzzling. Brandt's spinster sister Marin is frightening in her religious fervor, Cornelia the maid freely expresses her opinion with impudence, Brandt's man Otto, purchased from slavery, is dark with mystery, and husband Johannes is absent both in body and spirit. Nella cannot find the source of whispered conversations that torment her sleep, and nobody else seems disturbed. Every time she asks a question, she meets vague replies, so she takes up eavesdropping, practiced by every other member in the household.

Mysteries begin to grow at a rapid pace, and Nella becomes more agitated. When Johannes returns from his trip, instead of taking her into a loving embrace, he purchases for Nella an elaborate cabinet house, a cold excuse for his indifference and a preposterous gift for a new wife. Nella tries to make the best of a bad situation,

and hires a miniaturist. sight unseen, to create furnishings and people to take their place in this exact miniature replica of the very house she occupies. Packages containing tiny additions to the house begin to arrive, frightening Nella because they become clues to events that very soon come to pass, events that a stranger could not possibly know. She frets that she is an actor in a play, and the miniaturist is writing



the horrifying script. Nella does not succumb to fainting fits and hysteria, however, but uses her wit and a growing curiosity to make sense of these conundrums.

Burton renders a background rich with Dutch social customs, descriptions of dress and foods, making the story itself a fascinating study on a personal level of a time of unlimited wealth and greed. Although the tulip craze that collapsed the economy is not part of the storythere is only a riddle of the difference between a tulip and a turnip—the fragile business transaction of a sugar crop from Surinam hints at the insane pace of trade in a world of sailing ships and paper ledgers.

The waft of exotic spices in the foods and perfuming the flesh of characters is a direct counterpoint to Amsterdam's canals, the stinking waterways that serve as the streets and laps its noxious fumes so close to the finest residences of the wealthiest burgomasters in Europe.

The mysteries are dark and tightly woven in this gem of a story, an intriguing glimpse at the uneasy underside of this time and place. A startling contrast to Dutch artist Vermeer's capture of light and orderliness on the canvas. Beware, a skirt of blood, chaos, and paranoia all figure into a story which should have been so genteel and immaculate.
