Good afternoon Ms. Michaels,

Construction on Gessner Road between West Road and Beltway 8 will resume in early January 2023. Working with the new contractor, Harris County will continue to ensure a safe environment and minimize inconveniences to drivers along the road until construction is completed in about one year.

The project has been delayed since May when a previous company responsible for completing the roadway walked away. Since then, Precinct One has worked diligently with the Harris County Engineering Department to get the project back on track.

We are glad to see this project moving forward again. We thank the community for its patience and understanding during this unanticipated delay.



The WACKY World Of Wildlife



t's hard to imagine a world without wild animals but their populations are declining at rates unprecedented in human history. The World Resource Institute along with the United Nations Environment Programme estimate that between 150 and 200 wild species disappear *every day*. We rarely hear about these disappearances because most of them aren't publicized.

Thankfully, there are hundreds of national and international organizations and governments working to save wild animals and habitats.

With over 1.5 million species of animals on earth, including insects, one could spend a lifetime studying the uniqueness of each species and never come close to learning all there is to know.

Did you know?

- **L** Eagles have a grip 10 times more powerful than ours. They certainly wouldn't have a wimpy handshake.
- **2.** Vultures can smell a dead animal from more than a mile away. Sometimes I think I can, too.
- **3.** Raccoons don't wash their food. When the animals' paws are wet, their tactile sensory perception is dramatically increased and they are better able to identify the food. Compared to other animals, raccoons have 4 to 5 times more sensory cells in their paws.
- 4. The reason a flamingo has pink feathers is due to their diet of brine shrimp and blue-green algae. These foods contain a natural pink dye called canthaxanthin that cause the feathers to be pink. Wouldn't it be nice if we could change our hair color just by eating certain foods?
- **5.** Apparently, dolphins like to get "high." They deliberately handle pufferfish which causes the fish to release toxins as a defense mechanism. In high doses, these toxins can be deadly but in the right amounts, they act as a hallucinogenic. It seems the dolphins enjoy the experience.
- **6.** What animal do you think is the deadliest in the world? If you said the bear, tiger or shark, you'd be wrong. It's the mosquito. The World Health Organization reports 725,000 people

- are killed every year by mosquito born illnesses like Malaria, dengue fever and yellow fever.
- **7.** Goats have accents. Scientists used to believe that the calls of goats were determined by genetics. According to a United Kingdom study, animals with highly developed vocal abilities, are able to alter their calls to adapt to individuals and groups. Whales, dolphins and bats have this ability also.
- **8.** Cows are smarter than we think and emotionally they are very sensitive. Their intelligence is equal to that of dogs. A study from the University of Cambridge has shown that cows like to learn and show enjoyment by wagging their tails, running and jumping. In a test done by the University of Sydney, cows were trained to solve mazes. The tests revealed their decision-making and executive function abilities.
- **9.** What color are your chickens' ear lobes? White lobes produce white eggs; brown lobes produce brown eggs.

Masked bandits in your attic?

You're sitting in your recliner watching TV and you hear noises in your attic or walls. What could it be? What do I do? First of all, don't panic. Chances are you're dealing with critters and there are humane ways to get rid of these freeloaders. For this article, let's talk about raccoons which seems to be the biggest problem this time of the year.

The first thing you need to do is walk around your house and find out where the entry point is. The entry point is usually an unsecured grate, a hole in your siding or a small gap in a vent. Look for shredded paper or insulation on the ground around your home. This may help you find where they're getting in. Raccoons are very opportunistic and if there's a way to get in, they'll find it. By identifying the entry point, you'll know what you need to repair once they're gone. Make sure you get the critters out before you do any repairs.

Why have they taken up residence in your attic?

They are not evil animals, they're not there to cause you aggravation. During spring, pregnant raccoons are looking for a protected place to give birth. What good mother wouldn't do the same? Normally they will nest in a hollow tree trunk, cave or crevice but if they happen to find a way into your attic, the pregnant raccoon



will temporarily move in. My suggested solution to ridding your property of a mother raccoon and her babies is to do nothing. Yes, I said it – do nothing. When the babies are old enough, mother and babies will leave on their own. Be patient. It will take a few weeks. Now you need to repair the entry point or this will be a problem again in the future.

Encouraging them to leave

If you can't tolerate the thought of wild animals in your attic, there are some things you can do to encourage them to leave. These are very humane solutions and I highly recommend them.

- Mama raccoon is in your attic because it's a dark and quiet place for her and her babies. So, make it light and noisy! Making sure it's not a fire hazard, place a high wattage light in the attic. You can also try using a spotlight at the entry point if you know where that is. Now, place a radio in the attic tuned to a talk radio station. Music doesn't seem to bother raccoons but the sound of human voices has more of an effect. Play it LOUD. This may bother you for a day or two but you must be persistent for this to work.
- Smells. Depending on what website you're looking at, you'll find several suggestions on smells that will encourage raccoons to move out. One site suggests soaking rags in ammonia or apple cider vinegar, putting them in plastic bags with holes punched in the bag and placing them in the attic. Other sites suggest putting cotton balls soaked with peppermint oil in the attic. You can purchase something called raccoon eviction fluid but I can't youch for its effectiveness.

One site I looked at suggested an ultrasonic sound emitter. It emits a high frequency noise that only they can hear. Again, sounds good but does it work? I don't know.

I must emphasize, once again, to be patient! These tactics can take several days to work.

What NOT to do.

Do not set up a live trap. Raccoons can be dangerous especially if you are dealing with a mama. It's inhumane as well. When I worked at one of the wildlife centers in Houston, we heard horror stories about mama raccoons chewing off their own limbs to try to escape the trap and get to her babies. Trapping the mom and leaving the babies doesn't solve your problem. If you



trap Mom, you now have orphans that need to be taken to a wildlife center.

Remember, too, that Texas
Department of State Health Services
states that it is illegal for a person to
transport animals such as fox, skunk,
coyote or raccoon within Texas so
you can't relocate the trapped female
raccoon or the babies. Please note that
relocated raccoons will have to fight
with established raccoons for survival in
the new territory. For those of you that
think trapping and relocating animals
will help rid your property of critters,
relocating them solves nothing. New
ones will move in when one leaves.

Help is available

There are many exterminating companies out there that claim to be humane. BE VERY CAREFUL if you decide to hire one. Ask questions about what they do with the animals. Many of them kill the animals.

At this time of the year, please try to refrain from cutting down trees. Many trees are home to spring babies including birds, squirrels and raccoons. If you find yourself with animals needing help, contact a wildlife center or rehabilitator. Do not try to care for the animal yourself!

Overwatering houseplants can lead to... (GASP)

Fungus Gnats

Fungus gnats can become a problem in homes when houseplants are overwatered. Since this time of year can bring poinsettias or other plants into the home, watch out for fungus gnats.

Fungus gnat adults are small, black, long-legged flies with long antennae. Most adults are about ½ an inch but some can get up to ½ an inch. They are weak fliers and generally remain near potted plants, growing media, foliage or leaf litter.

Larvae or immatures, have a black head capsule and long translucent, whitish body without legs. They feed on organic matter such as mulch, compost, grass clippings, plant roots and fungi. When conditions are very moist, fungus gnat larvae can become abundant and may leave slime trails on media that look like trails left by snails or slugs.

While these gnats are a nuisance, they are easy to manage. Indoors, it is a good idea to use yellow sticky cards as a monitoring tool. Potato pieces may also be used as a monitoring tool for fungus gnat larvae. To do this, imbed a peeled potato cube into media and inspect the

underside of the potato and the media directly below it twice a week for fungus gnat larvae. Make sure to change out the potato cube to avoid other types of small fly problems.

To manage fungus gnat populations, work on reducing excessively moist conditions. Avoid overwatering and make sure that there is good drainage. Use a moisture meter or poke the soil with a finger to check to see if the plants require water.

Bacillus thuringiensis var.
israelensis or the nematode
Steinernema feltiae can be
applied in containers to
control larvae. Either spray
on the media surface or
apply as a soil drench.
Biologicals work best when
they are applied early in an
infestation. If a population is
already large, they may not provide
the control desired.

IMPORTANT REMINDER

Waste Management procedures for residents in Sections 1, 2, 3

COLLECTION DAYS

Collection days are **Mondays (trash)** and **Thursdays (trash and recycle)**.

The 96-gallon waste cart with green lid will be used for our normal trash and grass clipping bags. Loose trash bags or bags left by yard maintenance workers will no longer be picked up by the automated collection trucks unless they are inside the green waste carts. If there are too many loose bags to fit in the cart on normal collection days, they will be picked up on the bulk service day.

BULK SERVICE DAY

Bulk service day is the **second Thursday of each month**.

Acceptable Bulk Items

Acceptable bulk items include broken down and bundled moving boxes, old furniture, bagged grass clippings, leaves, branches and tree trimmings. Branches and tree trimmings that are tied and bundled should be no more than three inches (3") in diameter and four feet (4') in length and weighing no more than forty to fifty (40-50) pounds.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

- Your service carts must be placed at the curb to be serviced.
- Place carts 4 feet from obstructions (such as mailboxes and cars) and within 1 foot from the curb.
- Keep area around the service cart clear for easy access by collection truck.

Recycle bottles, cans, paper and cardboard.

- Keep food and liquid out of your recycling.
- No loose plastic bags.
- No bagged recyclables.

Please remember: in order to keep our neighborhood looking its best, do not put the barrels or bulk items out to the curb for pickup before 5:00 pm on the day before pickup is scheduled.
