Dear Friends in Christ,

"No one has greater love than to give up one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you." (John 15:13-14, CEB)

These words are included in John's gospel as part of Jesus' address to those who shared his last evening with him, and this year they captured my attention more fully than in years past. Our celebrations of the Day of Resurrection across East Carolina will have been as wonderful and varied as the congregations and communities that make up our diocese. No matter how glorious our celebrations, however, the good news that God raised Jesus from the grave must be news that motivates us for the TRI journey ahead, through the season of Easter and beyond. ### Stewardship: Making a Planned Gift

O merciful Creator, your hand is open wide to satisfy the needs of every living creature: Make us always thankful for your loving providence; and grant that we, remembering the account that we must one day give, may be faithful stewards of your good gifts.

Book of Common Prayer, p 259

ost people don't have wills. More than half of the population ignore pleas to "write your will." And more than 50% of the adult population with college degrees do not have wills. The gift potential is tremendous. It has been reported that every week about \$100 million is left by people without wills. If more people wrote their wills and were aware that the church welcomed

bequests, churches would receive a share of this important resource.

The simplest way to make a planned gift is by naming Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in your will. A bequest is a meaningful way to support our parish without affecting your cash flow during your lifetime. Your attorney can include it when you prepare or revise your will or you can add a codicil at any time.

Life insurance is another way to make a sizeable gift to the church. For example:

- You can purchase a new policy and make the church the owner and beneficiary of the policy. This enables you to "leverage" your gift, ultimately making a much larger gift than otherwise possible. Contributions to your church to pay the ongoing premiums become tax deductible.
- You can make Holy Trinity the owner and beneficiary of an existing policy. The current value of the policy is tax deductible, as are future premium payments.
- You can make Holy Trinity a contingent beneficiary of an existing policy, or name the church to receive the proceeds the policy if the designated beneficiaries predecease the insured.



Also, the remainder value of many retirement accounts can be heavily taxed when left to friends and family, but pass tax-free to your church upon your death. Review with your attorney or financial advisor to learn if this is an appropriate gift for you.

Real estate or securities can be the source of your gift to Holy Trinity. Using a Charitable Life Estate Contract, for example, you can deed your home, vacation home, farm, ranch, or condominium to the church and retain the right to live on the property and/or receive income from the property for as long as you live. You receive an income tax deduction when the property is deeded to the church and normally avoid any capital gains taxes when making the transfer. Your inheritance and estate taxes may be reduced at the time of your death. Gifts of appreciated real estate or securities allow you to avoid capital gains taxes. It is important to transfer

the stock or real estate to the church prior to selling it. However, if the securities or real estate have decreased in value, you should sell the assets before making the gift, thus establishing a capital loss and a potential tax deduction.


Gifts of tangible personal property, such as jewelry, coins, works of art, automobiles, etc. may also be given to the church. You are responsible for setting an appraised value on the gift. Any gift over \$5,000 must be independently appraised.

A no-cost way to make a planned gift to Holy Trinity is by designating it the recipient of a bank account or security. You can instruct any financial institution in which you have an account or the holder of a security to place your asset in a trust (often called a Totten Trust or a Transfer upon Death Account) which will be transferred, upon your death, directly to Holy Trinity.

This allows you to retain complete control of the asset during your lifetime and to give the remaining asset to Holy Trinity upon your death. Most Totten Trusts can be created easily, using a form obtained from your bank, financial institution or the holder of the security.

A healthy and vibrant Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Hampstead will be built upon the legacies we leave today. Many of our Episcopal institutions exist because past generations cared so much about the future of the Episcopal Church and expressed their caring by creating planned gifts.

Please consider Holy Trinity when planning your will.

If you have no shoes to offer, a donation toward the shipping costs is a very important contribution. ### Help Spread the Word

ay is the month the Episcopal Church Women around the nation collect funds for the Church Periodical Club. The purpose of the Church Periodical Club is to spread



the written word throughout the world. Part of the money collected locally is for textbook grants to seminarians from our own diocese. Each parish in our diocese is contacted and asked to make a donation. At the February 2016 East Carolina Diocesan Convention, our four seminarians were given \$500 each and two diaconate students were given \$100 each in grant money that had been raised in our diocese. The remainder of the money each year is sent to the National Church Periodical Club for grants around the world.

This ministry with the odd name remains the same as when it was first organized more than 120 years ago, in 1888, by Mary Ann Fargo. Mrs. Fargo was the wife of Mortimer Fargo, a founder of the famed Wells-Fargo stage coach lines and a member of the Church of the Holy Communion in New York City.

She and her friends sent Bibles to the West on Wells-Fargo stage coaches.

Since those early beginnings, CPC has provided educational, spiritual, and liturgical resources to many communities within our nation and around the world. Today this agency also provides funds for audio and video tapes, as well as computer software.

CPC is supported solely through voluntary donations. Gifts from parishes, clergy, individuals, vestries and ECW's keep this important ministry alive.

During the month of May we will have baskets at the back of the church labeled CPC. Please donate freely by cash or check, made payable to Holy Trinity ECW.

Let's continue to support Christ's command: "Go, ye, therefore, and teach all nations..."
