LOVE THY ENEMY



This week's reflection from Pastoral Patterns is very informative. It gives a few background facts to the Gospel (Matthew 5:38-48). When Jesus asked his followers to "offer no resistance to one who is

evil" (5:39), he is not really asking us to surrender to injustice. Rather he offers strategies that are "revolutionary" to break the endless cycle of offense-and-retaliation. This action is really meant to invite the aggressors to self-examination, even conversion.

In Jesus' culture, the left hand was hygienically considered unclean. "Turning the other (left) cheek" was meant to force the enemy to deliver an open-handed slap. Because such violence was permitted only between equals, the victim was portrayed as challenging the enemy with a statement of equality. In this way, the victim removed the intended humiliation that would have come with the slap. In addition, this action would also invite the enemy to reevaluate the whole concept of "status."

Jesus also changed the rules of lending and borrowing money. He instructed that if a creditor won a debtor's tunic or undergarment, the debtor should hand over his outer cloak as well. This would of course result in nudity in the courtroom, which would be a dramatic challenge to the "system's" fundamental injustice. This would thus create an opportunity to revisit such an accepted practice.

In those days, a Roman soldier was allowed to force a civilian in any of the occupied territories to carry his military gear for him. However, there was also a law that limited the distance to one mile. In effect, Jesus was teaching his listeners to carry the gear an "extra mile" thus exposing the soldier to potential disciplinary actions. This also would challenge the very legitimacy of such subjugation.

This shows why Gandhi and Martin Luther King, Jr, took Jesus' advice to heart. Both saw it not as being submissive but as being subversive, and a catalyst that could lead to a nonviolent transformation of evil.

These concrete examples effectively show that Jesus' command to love our enemies has little to do with "feelings". We have little control over our feelings. On the other hand, we can and should control our will. We may not love those involved, but as Jesus' followers, we must strive to turn the other cheek, hand over our tunic, and go the extra mile when the situation demands that we do so. It is not easy but the One who asks us to do so will give us the grace and strength to do it. Amen.


