Third sunday of ADVENT Jn 1:6-8, 19-28

A man named John was sent from God. He came for testimony, to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He was not the light, but came to testify to the light. And this is the testimony of John. When the Jews from Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to him to ask him, "Who are you?" He admitted and did not deny it, but admitted, "I am not the Christ." So they asked him, "What are you then? Are you Elijah?" And he said, "I am not." "Are you the Prophet?" He answered, "No." So they said to him, "Who are you, so we can give an answer to those who sent us? What do you have to say for yourself?" He said: "I am *the voice of one crying out in the desert, 'make straight the way of the Lord*,'" as Isaiah the prophet said." Some Pharisees were also sent. They asked him, "Why then do you baptize if you are not the Christ or Elijah or the Prophet?" John answered them, "I baptize with water; but there is one among you whom you do not recognize, the one who is coming after me, whose sandal strap I am not worthy to untie." This happened in Bethany across the Jordan, where John was baptizing.

Dear St. Pius & St. Anthony Churches.

Who is who? The gospel of John, is the one unique bird among the four gospels (Really--John's symbol is the eagle). It is a deep (or a-lofty) and rewarding study in itself. I love how John the evangelist talks about John the Baptist. We might easily get confused at times, asking, "Is John talking about himself or about the other John?" Not to get more confused but when I was a kid, I had a friend named 'John-John'. We might think that about today's gospel! John and John! Who is who? You can bet I favor such repetitions being a 'Johnson' myself! And I hear just that question posed to the Baptist himself today's reading, as he is being asked "Who are you?" (John 1:19) John might have said, 'If we had time, Oh, don't I have a long drama to share with you about my naming!" Remember Zechariahs' 'muting' and Elizabeth's surprise 'naming' of John by the miraculous direction of the Angel! (Luke 1:59-64)

Yet, on a related scriptural note, it is easy in the Bible to be mixed up about who is being talked about, as there are so many repetitious names, such as multiples of James, Judas, Simon, Mary and guess what, John too! Well, in John's gospel, interestingly, the Baptist John is never called "the Baptist", like in all the other gospels (example--Matthew 3:1 saying "John the Baptist"). It's like the gospel writer John made a decision, "There will only be one John in this gospel"-like only one sheriff in this town. So the humble evangelist doesn't name himself at all, except as maybe the 'witness' writing these things ("This is the disciple who is testifying to these things and wrote these things, and we know that his testimony is true" John 21:24). The evangelist remains unnamed to give the whole stage to John the baptizer. Some have suggested that the evangelist was a disciple of the Baptizer before Jesus came along (John 1:37). So in this fourth gospel, John the son of Zechariah who performed baptisms is only called 'John' but his importance is reinforced by being identified 'John' some 22 times (John 1:6, 15, 19, 23, 26, 28, 29, 32, 35, 40; 3:23, 24, 25, 26, 27; 4:1; 5:33, 35, 36; 10:40, 41, 41)."

So maybe you want to ask, how does this gospel ever get the title 'according to John'? Well, this 4th gospel does have another interesting character named the 'beloved disciple' (Jn 13:23-26, 18:15-16, 19:25-27; 20:1-10; 21:1-14, 20-24). And this 'beloved' character always finds himself paired up with Peter in the John passages of 13:23-24; 18:15-16; 20:2-9; 21:1-8, 15-23. But we also, find such a partnering of Peter and 'John' in other parts of New Testament like Luke 5:8-10; 22:8; Acts 1:13; 3-4; 8:14-25; and Gal. 2:9. So it's likely that this 4th gospel writer is taking measures to humbly not be named himself and get confused with the more important John who baptizes. Also, keep in mind the Baptist's role as forerunner/messenger of the Messiah! But if these examples of 'quoting the bible on itself' is too convoluted, we can take comfort in the historical record of the earliest successors of the apostles-the first bishops such as Sts Clement of Alexandria, Irenaeus, & Tertullian (all three living in mid-late 100's), who attest to 'John' as the title for the 4th gospel (also the 1st church historian Eusebius also records this in the 300's). So what does all this mean? It is reasonable to accept that a 'John' is writer of this 4th gospel. But does it matter? Well, the gospel writer who doesn't want us to name him, is more interested in the message of salvation and testifying to the 'Light' which is Jesus.

SO, my main point in all of this, is a line from today's Gospel: John 1:6-7 "*A man named John was sent from God. He came for testimony, to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him.*" This applies to <u>both</u> 1)the baptizer and 2) the evangelist-writer. They both testify to Christ, each in his own way: John Baptist by actions and practice, and John Evangelist by words and prayer. They are both humble servants. They both reflect good discipleship by simply glorifying the Son of God, not themselves. As John 3:30 says about the example of all good disciples, "He-Christ must increase, and I must decrease!" So, while we humans get mixed up at times, feeling in the dark about who is who, or what is what, the good news is that God knows exactly who we are and what we need. God is clear, radiant light in this dark, dark world of ours. We keep our eyes on His light, praying and working for its increase! That is Advent. We long for and wait patiently for this true light to appear! And His name is 'Jesus'! Peace, Fr. Brian

<u>Another Saint in Time of Plague:</u> St. John of God (born 3-8-1495 died 3-8-1550)

We need our hospital workers! In honor of all nurses, doctors, aides on the floor and lab technicians, we pray for you, and thank you! One patron saint of hospital workers is St. John of God, so I wanted to introduce him as a great saint for us in this pandemic time.

St. John (João Duarte Cidade) in Montemor-o-Novo, Portugal, to poor but very devout Christian parents (André Cidade and Teresa Duarte). Mystery surrounds what led to it, but at nine years old he disappeared from his family farm and ended up homeless on the streets in a town near Toledo, Spain. There was speculation that he was kidnapped or wandered away from home, caught up among some traveling merchants in a caravan. He was eventually taken in by a local farmer to shepherd the farmer's flock. St. John was a responsible and diligent worker, impressing the farmer so much that he offered one of his daughters in marriage to John. St John felt a call to serve as an infantry soldiers and so he joined an army of the Holy Roman Emperor Charles V. He was part of an engagement with some French forces, and his troop was victorious. Afterward, St. John was put in charge of guarding some sized spoils and somehow the inventory was ransacked. John was held responsible and jailed with a possible sentence of death. A senior officer familiar with John's piety intervened to spare his life. He left the service and returned to shepherding work for local landowners. His religious fervor increased over the next years and moved him to travel to Africa to seek the release of Christian slaves being held by the Moors. He sought to work in place of slaves, or to outright ransom them from their captors. Later, he moved back to Gilbraltar Spain and began a book and pamphlet business distributing catechism and devotional materials about Catholic saints and teaching to villages and towns, at little to no cost for them.

Around 1537, St. John of God was said to have heard a beloved priest named St John of Avila preach. He was overwhelmed with feelings of unworthiness and began practicing extreme penances. Part of his intense religious experiences in this stage of his life was a vision of the Infant Jesus who gave him the name John of God (the name that remained his title the rest of his life). He gave away all of his possessions to the poor, while he himself lived in the streets offering public displays of penitential mortification and flagellation. Many people suspected he was insane, because of his self-imposed holy deprivations. A friend persuaded the priest John of Avila to intervene and speak with John of God. Fr John of Avila convinced St. John of God to offer a more positive and constructive witness to religious life by working among the suffering sick. John of God took a pilgrimage to a local shrine to Our Lady of Guadalupe and the Blessed Mother appeared in a vision to him revealing that he needed to begin a ministry of health care to the sick. He returned to Granada, and rented a house he used as a hospital to bring in the sick off the street to care for them. He asked for help from area doctors and priests to donate their time. He grew a band of helpers, and his house became a 'hospice center'. His group became known as the Order of Hospitallers. He gave the strong leadership example of sacrificial and selfless work tending to the needs of anyone suffering from any disease (even local plagues). Because he would often lose his shirt by giving it to the naked poor, a nearby Bishop of Tuy ordered that his religious group of hospitallers must adopt a uniform habit that became their permanent religious garment. His compassionate care led him to often mediate fights and disputes. Two of his most ardent followers in the earliest days of the Order of Brother Hospitallers were two publicly sworn enemies. St. John of God had reconciled them by his prayer and mediations, and won them over to convert to his medial cause! One of them later named 'Peter the Sinner', was commended by John of God to succeed him leading the Hospitallers after John's death. Many miracles and heroic labors are attributed to John of God. The greatest is the report of him saving all of the patients of the Grand Hospital in Granada during a devastating fire. Before the burning building collapsed, John led all the patients out, carrying the crippled himself, going back into the flames and out again many times unscathed.

St. John of God, tended to widows, orphans, the poor, homeless and unemployed who were always left out of the health care system. Near his end, it was reported that he developed pneumonia, after a heroic attempt jumping into a lake to save a drowning boy. His injury worsened, and health declined until he died shortly afterward on March 8, 1550 in Granada. Pope Leo XIII declared him the patron saint of hospital workers, nurses, doctors and attendants. St. John of God, pray for and protect our medical care friends.

Watch for our wonderful Advent Traditions:

1) Advent Wreath-Filled with symbolism, the wreath helps us keep time marked as we await the Coming Savior. The evergreens signify continuous life (our ever-living God). The green sprigs, like laurel wreaths, represent Christ's 'victory' over death and sin. The circle shape, having no beginning nor end, represents the eternity of God, who was, is and will be always. The four candles, represent the four weeks or generations of waiting from Adam until the birth of our Savior. The three purple represent the royalty of Christ, Lord of all History, and the rose candle signifies the flesh and suffering of our Eternal King for us!

2) Jesse Tree: Named after Jesse who was the Father of King David. One prophecy in the book of Isaiah, says, "A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit" (Isa 11:1) A branch is a sign of new life and new beginnings on a tree. Jesus is this anticipated new branch on the family tree of Jesse/David. Originally Jesse trees were a pictorial demonstration of salvation history told in images like stained glass windows functioned before there was widespread literacy. Today, Jesse Trees are used as an Advent Calendar, introducing another special scripture personality once a day until Christmas. This family tree of Jesus has ornament symbols for His ancestors such as an apple for Adam, ladder for Jacob, staff for Moses, Star for David, a scallop shell for John the Baptist and a lily for Mary.
