

#### **New Exhibits**

We have a number of exhibits in the planning stages for the coming year that we can tell you a little about now. It's too early for pictures or illustrations, but here's a little information on what we're thinking.

- 1. Newton Seed Store/Campbell House will be inside the Ag building on the east wall. We'll have a number of artifacts from the store plus use pictures and graphics to give a feel for the house that was inside.
- 2. Wittemberg Church and the Underground Railroad will be the subject of an exhibit on the lower level, next to our Civil War artifacts. Larry Hurto was recently successful in getting the church added to the National Underground Railroad Registry.

We'll also be completing some displays already started, including our grouping of photos, by decade, on the backside of the Herman Deaton Bas Relief, and the additions to the military room (see below).


#### After the Brief Business Meeting

#### Learn All About the Newton Nite Hawks from the Quarterback Himself

Baxter native Stan Allspach was the quarterback for the Newton Nite Hawks throughout the '70's and will be giving a presentation on their 1977 European Tour. The Nite Hawks swept the 5 game series with the Chicago Lions and were awarded the championship trophy.

The late Roger Spiess willed the trophy to the museum and it will be on display during the presentation.

Besides winning the trophy, the Nite hawks and Lions became the first two pro teams to play American football in Europe.



This small display was recently added to the wall as you enter the Washing Machine Center of the World exhibit. The 1906 Newton Businessmen's Association publication shown credits George Parsons as being the Father of Newton Industry.

The Jasper County Historical Society is pleased to introduce the new members of the Board of Directors, which were elected at our Annual Meeting, October 26, 2014.





#### From the last issue - Another Newton Washer



These cards, picturing a Westbrook washing machine, were brought in several months ago. I have been unable to find any information on the company and would appreciate any information anyone might have on this washer from Newton.

Larry Hurto provided the answer to my question.

From the Newton Journal, December 4, 1907: A new washing machine will soon be put on the market by its inventor, Mr. Lee Westbrook of this city. Lee and his friends are very jubilant over the outlook and we all hope their expectations are realized. No company will be organized [sic] until the machine has been given a thorough test. If they stand the test given, The Westbrook Washing Machine company will be incorporated. The machine involves new principles which we will not attempt to explain, further than to say it forces the water and soap through the clothes by a sliding and spring-pressed motion. It is claimed that it runs easier and does better work than any mhchine [sic] put upon the market.

We haven't yet found any evidence of the company being incorporated.
