HWQAC VISITS JEFFERSON PROJECT SITES

On Thursday, March 12, 2015, the Steering Committee of the Hague Water Quality Awareness Committee (HWQAC), headed by Al Rider, traveled to Lake George and Bolton to get a first-hand look at the Jefferson Project, a collaboration between the Fund for Lake George, the RPI Darrin Fresh Water Institute (DFWI) and IBM.

The group met in the morning with Corrina Parnapy, Water Quality Outreach Coordinator of the Fund, who discussed some of the scientific results that have come from 30 years of monitoring Lake George. She also showed a video of the underwater topography of Lake George, created last year as part of the Jefferson project. Corrina told the group that the three primary threats to the water quality in Lake George are invasive species, rising salt levels and declining water clarity due to fertiliz-

ers, stormwater runoff and pollution from failing wastewater systems. One statistic that was glaring is that salt levels in Lake George have tripled in the last 30 years. The Steering Committee then visited the facilities at the DFWI, where site manager David Diehl, provided a tour of the labs and explained the work being done by scientists there. As part of the tour, the group also visited the new Kelly Data Visualization Lab, where they had the chance to view more information on the Jefferson project.

2015 HIKE-A-THON REGISTRATION OPEN

The early-bird registration period is now open for the Lake George Land Conservancy's (LGLC) third annual Lake George Hike-A-Thon, set for Sunday, July 5, 2015. The event is free, and until April 30 registrants will receive a free event t-shirt. Registrations must be made online through the Hike-A-Thon website <lakegeorgehikeathon.org>.

The Hike-A-Thon is a one-day event created to showcase LGLC's parks and preserves around Lake George as free public resources, and to promote a healthy, active lifestyle and appreciation for the outdoors. Hikes take place simultaneously all around Lake George, culminating with aerial photography of each group by helicopter.

There are three new sites for 2015, and one additional hike at an old site, for a total of 12 hiking options. The new sites are Anthony's Nose, in Putnam; Terzian Woodlot, in Hague; and the Pinnacle, in Bolton Landing. Amy's Park, a preserve in the back woods of Bolton, will host two hikes this year – in addition to the popular easy hike to the property's beaver pond, a more challenging hike will be led to its southern boundary to a scenic viewpoint overlooking Lake George.

The LGLC is currently seeking Hike-A-Thon volunteers. A large crew of volunteers is needed to help lead hikes and keep things running smoothly on the ground. TOWN BOARD MEETING – 3/10/15

Supervisor Edna Frasier and Town Board members Marty Fitzgerald, II, Steve Ramant, Rudy Meola and Ginger Henry Kuenzel were all present.

A moment of silence was held for Bea Jordon, Richard Bolton, Virginia Chalmers and John Baker.

Art Steitz noted that there had been an incident at the Town Shed and one person had been sent home for two days without pay before anyone talked to the individuals involved. No further details were given and neither the Board nor the Highway Superintendent acknowledged any concern.

Mike Cherubini reported on the activities for the Hague Chamber of Commerce. He noted the Hague Winter Weekend went well although the chili bake-off had low attendance. The Polar Plunge and related activities raised over \$5,000 for the Vermont Children's Hospital. The Chamber is continuing to work on various marketing materials. He said that there may be money available for anyone using broadband for business.

Chris Navitsky reported on a \$10,000 grant from the Fund for Lake George on sewer upgrades for the Town. They are working with Cedarwood Engineering on the use of the money ~ probably for the mixer.

Alice Patchett reported that the sewer pipes on Overbrook Lane were frozen. Linda Baker informed Alice because they both have homes up there. Their pumps were pulled and OK Sanitary pumped them out. Alice requested that the issues on Overbrook Lane be addressed before next year and that there be better communication to the neighborhood from the sewer plant.

Alice also asked what was being done to take care of the issues of the areas where ice had formed on the main roads from runoff. Highway Superintendent Smith said that the ice was the result of frozen culverts which the State should be cleaning out. He has to follow State regulations but he noted that he does have his guys go out and check them each day and put more salt on the road as needed. Councilman Ramant noted that next season they may have to look a little harder at it.

Under the Committee Reports:

Buildings & Grounds/Community Center/Enhancement: Councilman Fitzgerald reported that another letter had been received from the DEC. They want more testing and to have the pipe replaced from the building to the underground oil tank. Fitzgerald thinks it might be better to have an above ground tank. Councilwoman Kuenzel asked to have the possible mold problem in the Community Center addressed.

Highway: Highway Superintendent Smith reported that all vehicles are up and running but they are shorthanded with only five men currently working. Councilman Ramant raised a question about the logging off Fly Brook Road which is using part of this Town road. They will check with ZEO Clark.

Museum & Historian: Councilwoman Kuenzel reported on meetings with the Historical Society and Historian and programs and exhibits they are doing.

Planning/Zoning/Stormwater: Councilman Fitzgerald suggested that maybe we are at a point where we should use a consultant to work on the Comprehensive Plan. Councilwoman

Kuenzel noted that there are no recent minutes or report from the Committee. Supervisor Frasier said she wants to wait to let them get a survey out.

Sewer District #1 & 2: Supervisor Frasier said that the new WWTP trainee, John Sheehan, is getting training. Councilwoman Kuenzel reported on another meeting of the Sewer Asset Management Committee and noted that minutes are available. They have identified a list of priorities - financial viability, product quality and infrastructure stability and are working with Cedarwood Engineering to get the list of assets.

Under Unfinished Business the Board:

Approved the Park Staffing proposal which would see the Town Beach closed between 1:30 and 2 pm so both lifeguards on duty can take their lunch break at the same time causing less disturbance at the waterfront.

Decided to keep the launch fee at \$15.

Requested that the Code Revision Committee review a suggested change to the Town Code with reference to changing the wording from a sticker being "displayed" to "affixed to car" and removing language which is no longer in use such as "yearly permit."

Approved a policy on appointment and hiring which will be put with other policies of the Town Board.

Heard from Supervisor Frasier that the previous Monolith contract is defunct because National Grid's lines won't take what we generate. She is waiting for more information on a pooled energy program and will discuss it next month.

Approved use of the Visitor Center by the Senior Citizens to store items for the Memorial Day White Elephant sale from April 8 to May 22, 2015 and for the Senior View Café from May 31 to June 8, 2015.

Passed a resolution in support of Senate Bill 2387-2015: Amending real property tax law in relation to authorizing fire districts to impose special assessments against otherwise tax exempt real property.

Passed a resolution in support of Senate Bill 1914-2015: Amending general municipal law and town law relating to authorization of fees and charges for emergency medical services when provided by an ambulance squad that is part of a fire company.

Appointed Michele Gautreau as an alternate to the Board of Assessment Review.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS – 2/26/15

Chairman Robert Goetsch, Jon Hanna, Lindsay Mydlarz, Ray Snyder, Chris Navitsky and Maureen Cherubini were all present. Linda Mury was absent.

CAPE COD VILLAGE CLUB, INC. (43.13-1-31) NYS Rte. 9N (TR1)

The Association requested a variance to subdivide a 2.93 acre parcel into a .37 acre parcel (with a clubhouse) and a 2.56 acre vacant association parcel. A motion was made to allow the variance with the condition that only one building right go with the 2.56 vacant parcel. The Board approved the variance 4 (Goetsch, Hanna, Mydlarz, Cherubini) to 2 (Navitsky, Snyder).

DOCKSIDE LANDING MARINA (26.17-2-27) 9130 Lakeshore Drive (TR1)

The Board approved a request for another two year extension of their March 24, 2011 ZBA approval for a staircase and retaining wall to be constructed within the frontline setback of their property. The last extension granted is due to expire on March 24, 2015. The staircase is required, by NYSDOT, to access an approved crosswalk.

PLANNING BOARD – 3/5/15

Chairman Dick Frasier, Bob Whitaker, Martin Fitzgerald, Dan Belden, Pam Peterson and Judy Gourley were present. Mike Cherubini was absent.

LOON LAKE MARINA (25.4-1-37) Decker Hill Rd (SCUZ)

The Board gave a Type I Site Plan approval for a Boat Storage Facility on a 18.19 acre parcel. The boats will be stored on the natural grass field. (note: SCUZ is a special commercially zoned area.)

MATHEWS (93.8-1-20) 24 Bass Bay Rd (TRIR)

The Board approved, 5-1, a referral to the Zoning Board of Appeals of an application to construct a five foot high stone seawall along the lakefront to contain an erosion problem on a steep slope.

PACALA (76.16-1-7.3) 17 Spruce Mountain Rd (TRI)

The Board approved an application to install a half bath in the second story of a proposed garage. They intend to use the second story as a recreational/artisan room for family.

DIED: Richard E. Bolton, 88, of Little River, SC and formerly of Hague, NY, on February 19, 2015 after being surrounded by his loving family.



Born in Hague, NY on February 2, 1927, he was the son of Harry B. Havens and Pauline Bolton. In 1935 he was adopted by his grandparents, Richard J. and Mame Bolton. Richard was a 1944 graduate of Hague High School, Champlain College in 1949 and Siena College in 1951.

The following quote from The Congressional Record was written by his good friend, Hon. Gerald B. H. Solomon. "If you can't imagine Washington without it's monuments, you can't imagine Hague without the presence, inspiration, and steady hand of Dick Bolton."

Richard was an employee of International Paper Company for 29 years, retiring as a department superintendent. He still found time to serve seven terms as Supervisor of the Town of Hague and on the Warren County Board of Supervisors, two of those terms as that board's Chairman. He also served as a member of the Lake George Park Commission and Chairman of the Glens Falls Transportation Council.

In Hague, he had served as a Commander of the American Legion, President of the Hague Fish and Game Club and as a Charter Member of the Hague Volunteer Fire Department. He had also been active in the Hague Chamber of Commerce, the Warren County Conservation Council, New York State Region 5 of the Fish and Wildlife Management Board, and as a Vestryman of the Episcopal Church.

Richard loved the game of golf and played for well over 50 years. His accomplishments include being the club champion at the Ticonderoga Country Club and Cypress Bay Country Club in Little River, SC. In 1992 he won the gold medal in golf at the Empire State Games in Albany, NY. In 1995 he finished third in the World Amateur Championships held in Myrtle Beach, SC beating over four thousand amateur golfers.

He is survived by his sons, Richard Jr. and his wife Sharon and their children, Collin, Erin, and Haley; Stephen and his wife, Jennifer; Terence and his wife, Pamela and his daughter, Katherine; and his daughter, Elizabeth Slycord and her husband, Frank and their children Corinne and Joseph Maxwell.

Richard will be buried alongside his loving wife of 64 years, Penelope, in the Valley View Cemetery in Ticonderoga, NY at the convenience of the family.

DIED: Beatrice (Fish) Jordon, 79, on March 2, 2015, at Heritage Commons Residential Health Care of Ticonderoga.

Beatrice grew up in Hague and lived there for many years. She later moved to Glens Falls, and worked for her brother in-law at his restaurant. She was married for many years to Arthur Jordon, and they had five boys together and a baby girl who died at birth. She was predeceased also by her eldest son, Bruce Jordon, who passed away in 2005.

She is survived by her four sons, Bryan, Barry, Jay and Joel Jordon; 13 grandchildren; 12 great-grandchildren; her two sisters, Annie Perkins and Gladys Pinchin; her brother, Clifford Fish; along with several nieces, and nephews, cousins and friends.

DIED: John Walter Baker, 74, of Hague, peacefully at home on March 9, 2015, after battling Alzheimer's disease.


