

'Jesus proposed another parable to the crowds, saying: "The kingdom of heaven may be likened to a man who sowed good seed in his field. While everyone was asleep his enemy came and sowed weeds all through the wheat, and then went off. When the crop grew and bore fruit, the weeds appeared as well. The slaves of the householder came to him and said, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where have the weeds come from?' He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' His slaves said to him, 'Do you want us to go and pull them up?' He replied, 'No, if you pull up the weeds you might uproot the wheat along with them. Let them grow together until harvest; then at harvest time I will say to the harvesters, "First collect the weeds and tie them in bundles for burning; but gather the wheat into my barn."" He proposed another parable to them. "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that a person took and sowed in a field. It is the smallest of all the seeds, yet when full-grown it is the largest of plants. It becomes a large bush, and the 'birds of the sky come and dwell in its branches."' He spoke to them another parable. "The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed with three measures of wheat flour until the whole batch was leavened." All these things Jesus spoke to the crowds in parables. He spoke to them only in parables, to fulfill what had been said through the prophet: I will open my mouth in parables, I will announce what has lain hidden from the foundation of the world. Then, dismissing the crowds, he went into the house. His disciples approached him and said, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds in the field." He said in reply, "He who sows good seed is the Son of Man, the field is the world, the good seed the children of the kingdom. The weeds are the children of the evil one, and the enemy who sows them is the devil. The harvest is the end of the age, and the harvesters are angels. Just as weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all who cause others to sin and all evildoers. They will throw them into the fiery furnace, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Whoever has ears ought to hear."

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families, 16th Sunday Ordinary Time Year A Matthew 13:24-43 A couple of years ago I gave away a couple of pots of plants that I remembered being eggplant seed. It grew into a small, strong stemmed plant enough to give away, & share with others. A week or two later I was so embarrassed and had to call back those friends I gave plants to, and had to tell them 'Those are zinnia flowers, not eggplants!' I somehow mixed-up different pots of plants or their seed packs! Not until the leaves came out fully, did I realize 'Wrong plants'! No matter how much Miracle Gro they put on those plants, no edible vegetable was going to come out on that plant-Only Flowers! As a consolation prize, I did tell them that Zinnias are a great butterfly and hummingbird attractor! It would support good pollination of their other plants! But what a mistake I made not being patient to see the plants fully leave out to that I could recognize best what plant it was! I have heard of people eating pansy blooms or whole dandelions (root, leaf & bloom), but never Zinnias!

Well, Jesus' parable is a similar story, except worse because it reveals the devil's actual mischief of intentionally sowing weeds into the fields of wheat to sabotage the crop. What the enemy does in Jesus' parable would be like a neighbor intentionally blowing dandelion blooms across the fence at night in the breeze, or an evil rancher dropping thistle or hemlock seed from a drone over a neighbor's pastures at night. Joseph Campbell (researched lots of parable-like stories) liked to tell about the character in many origin myths of the 'Trickster'. This oppositional figure mischievously caused division among people. Joseph Campbell tells one story of the Trickster (pictured with harlequin colors like a jack/jester in the deck of cards) who walked down the fence row between two farmers' fields as they worked their ground. He trotted down the row, with his large, two-sided colored hat on. Walking the whole length of the path, he turned his hat around to keep the same color side flashed toward each farmer again, to make sure they registered his presence. That night as the farmers ate dinner together, one remarked to the other, "What was that fellow's business today walking down our fence row with that big black hat on?" Of course, the other farmer contested such a claim, saying, "I don't know what you are trying to pull, maybe the heat of the sun has got to you, I only saw a guy with a huge white hat on- saw him twice in fact!" An argument ensued between them, that broke out into a brawl, sending each of them home angry toward the other! The evil trickster succeeded in dividing the good souls through deception and division. We see a similar 'trick' in today's parable, as the 'enemy' sows potential division between the owner and the workers. The workers could suspect the owner is making their jobs harder, and the owner could suspect that his workers are creating problems for him (cutting his profits down). But good patience overcomes all problems. The wise owner cautions 'reserve' and calls the workers not to rashly jump in to root out the weeds. Simply watch and wait for harvest, so the weeds and wheat will be easily seen to be different and then the proper separation of good from bad can occur! Sometimes our hasty response to an 'evil scheme' can perpetuate or worsen the bad intent from the other person. Patience is the rule, and sometimes the 'waiting is the hardest part' (as Tom Petty always sang). In case we doubt the wisdom or the real strength involved in waiting until 'harvest'. Just give it a try next time you are confronted with opposition or difficulty. Of course, in our Christian spiritual tradition, we know that when we refrain from outward action, it does not mean 'nothing' is going on. Instead, a lot can be going on out of view. We are actively praying about the situation, and seeking its good outcome by God's intervening grace (working unseen). The time also focuses our souls on truly constructive responses to evil. Such prudent restraint saves not only us, but also the fruit from spoil.

And this is only the first parable Jesus shares with us today. He goes on to share two more about the mustard seed and the leaven of yeast in dough. Notice that both of these stories teach patient forbearance through the work over time of the small seed rooting deep underground unseen just as the yeast-leaven takes time working unseen as it rises in/through the dough. I like to point out that another word for gentle patience and calm restraint is 'Faith': keeping work at something, even though you do not see its fruit. That is quiet discipleship in Christ!
