On that note there were 4 fire calls using 37 man hrs. and 1 ambulance call using 10 man hrs. in April. All hoses and fire extinguishers have been tested, and working equipment serviced. Our Fire/Rescue Boat is at Chic's Marine for engine service, and should be back in its moorings by this mailing. Speaking of boating, our Safety Officer Jon Hanna reminds us that there is a lot of debris in the Lake and that the water is still very cold. LGLC HONORS PEGGY DARRIN

The Lake George Land Conservancy (LGLC) is honoring Mrs. Margaret A. Darrin with a dedication ceremony at its shoreline property in Hague, June 12, 2011 at 4 pm. The ceremony will include the unveiling of a new road front sign, brief historical overview of the property and an introduction to the land's new Friendship Garden. Refreshments and a celebratory cake will also be provided.

The 1.9-acre property, to be named "Peggy's Point" after Mrs. Darrin, was donated by Mrs. Darrin to LGLC in 2005. With 315 feet of Lake shoreline, it is a popular destination for anglers, as well as an alternative picnic location to the town's beach, located just south of the Point.

Mrs. Darrin and her family have been long-time residents of Hague and supporters of the Lake George Land Conservancy. Her son, David Darrin, and granddaughter Hannah Darrin will also be at the ceremony, as well as other members of the Darrin family.

LGLC will be installing a Friendship Garden on the property, with a walking path leading to a circular flower bed, the Friendship Garden. The Garden is intended to provide a location for local residents and other Lake George visitors to memorialize or honor a loved family member, friend, memory or event with the planting of a native perennial. Plants may also be marked with small identifying plaques.

Those attending the Dedication Ceremony are invited to bring a plant to add to the Friendship Garden. To limit the possibility of introducing harmful invasive or site-inappropriate plants, LGLC will prepare a do-not-plant list with sources for where to buy some native plants for those interested in participating. HOLD OFF ON THAT FERTILIZING!

The LGA is reminding property owners in the Lake George watershed about lake-friendly actions they can take this spring to protect the Lake's water quality. Emily DeBolt, LGA director of education said, "We generally do not recommend fertilizing at all until the fall, and then, we urge people to use only phosphorus-free fertilizer, no matter where a property is located within the watershed."

HAGUE MEMORIAL DAY CELEBRATION SATURDAY, MAY 28, 2011

For this year's **FUNFEST**, **PARADE AND MEMORIAL SERVICE** please refer to page 1 of this issue for the Schedule of Events. You will find that we will have many fun activities for you all to enjoy during the entire day. Plan to come to the beach early where you can enjoy the shows on stage and have lunch. Then browse the park to see all the other attractions and test your skill at the games.

The GOD BLESS AMERICA PARADE will begin promptly at 2 pm rain or shine. When you hear all the Baptist, Wesleyan and Catholic Churches ringing their bells simultaneously, that means the march will begin in 5 minutes. The ringing of the bells is reminiscent of the end of World War II. When President Roosevelt announced over the radio "The War is over!", the people of Hague were seen walking up the village street to their churches to give thanks. We are honored this year to have DAN BELDEN as our "GRAND MARSHALL". This gentlemen is someone you all know. He was born here in Hague and spent most of his life serving the people of Hague. For the past 20 years he has proudly served as the Town Supervisor and just recently announced that he will retire at the end of this term. During the parade as he passes you by, please give him a 'big hand of applause" in thanks for a job well done.

For **VIEWING THE PARADE** it is suggested that you plan to set up your chairs all along the village street. There will be 'no car parking' brookside along Rt 8 so there will be plenty of room. The Judging Trailer is located in the Baptist Church parking lot which is where units often stop momentarily to perform, therefore the closer you are to that area will enable you to observe more.

TRAFFIC CONTROL is under the direction of the Hague Volunteer Fire Department who will be assisted by volunteers from other Fire Departments (Ticonderoga, Bolton Landing and Warrensburg). Please give them your full cooperation. ROAD CLOSINGS will be as follows: West Hague Rd. from Fire House to Hague Town Shed at 1 to 1:45 pm for Parade lineup. The units will then be moved down Rt 8 to be at the March Point by 1:45 pm. Parade motor units are requested to be at the lineup as early as possible. Rt 8 will be closed from Decker Hill to Rt 9N at 1:45 pm once all units have cleared. Rt 9N at Dodd Hill and at New Hague Road will close at 1:50 pm.

PARKING areas are available at 1) the Darrin lot across from the beach, 2) the former Lakeshore Garage lot on Rt 9N, 3) between the Baptist Church and Juniper Gift Shop, 4) East of the Wesleyan Church, 5) the Community Center and 6) the Catholic Church. There will be Parade Parking signs at these areas. If you are coming for the parade, please take note of road closing times and plan to come early.

BOATERS TAKE NOTICE that the Hague Boat Launch will be closed from 12 noon to 4 pm as a safety measure during the Memorial Day Celebration.

TOWN BOARD MEETING - 5/10/2011

Supervisor Dan Belden and Board members Dick Gladu, Rudy Meola and Edna Frasier were present. Mark Martucci was out of town for medical reasons.

A moment of silence was held for Mrs. Johnson.

Chris Bowcutt, Event Manager for the Lake George Open Water Swim gave the Board an update on plans and requested \$2,500 for promotion of the event. The Board approved the request from \$10,000 still unallocated in bed tax revenue.

A public hearing was set for June 14, 2011 at 6:15 pm on the request by Hagg [12.18-1-50] for a wastewater variance.

Al Rider asked the Board, "What is your position on banning phosphorus based fertilizers?" The Board wants individual neighborhoods to monitor it and Supervisor Belden will get information from the LG Waterkeeper to give to the associations.

Councilman Gladu reported that he has worked with the HVFD to track their progress on the issues of recruiting, training time and response time.

Supervisor Belden asked Highway Superintendent Smith to check on the condition of the road to Jabes Pond. The DEC wants the Town to keep it cleaned if the area is opened to the public. The Supervisor will set up a meeting with the DEC.

Don Smith, Superintendent of Highways, reported that they had completed the sweeping of the roads and collected 75 yards of sand which will not get into the Lake.

ZEO Cathy Clark reported that the Low Impact Development Seminar in Lake George was exceptionally good and was attended by Clark, Mike Cherubini, Maureen Cherubini, EJ Siwek and Pam Peterson.

Supervisor Belden suggested that the Hague Commons homeowners, who are most affected by the accumulating sand in the Hague Brook delta, should get a letter to him about the situation. The buildup has prevented normal use of their docks.

Supervisor Belden reported that they are still waiting for the figures on funding Sewer District #2 from the State. The information will probably be available in early July.

Councilman Meola noted that the new playground equipment will be installed around June 1. He also reported that the Town has a new permit to trap geese from April 20 – August 31

Councilman Gladu reported that he will meet with the management of the Transfer Station since the contract expires on June 1. He noted that if you purchase a new TV, the deliverer is required to take the old equipment and dispose of it properly. He also wants to address the issue of electronic waste.

The Board accepted a bid from Simplex Grinnell for Kitchen Suppression System inspection, required by NYSDOH, twice a year at \$175.44 each time.

After repetitive discussion, the Board approved a motion made by Councilman Meola, to give the Supervisor the authority to act for the Board to approve additional hours for the parttime employee during May, June, July and August if needed to complete required work. Mr. Meola made the point that the decision should be made by the Board unless the responsibility was delegated.

The Board approved a proposal from Swift maintenance for cleaning of the Community Center. They will clean the windows once per year for \$300 and do inside cleaning of the building twice a week for a total of \$4,800 annually.

The Board rescinded a motion regarding payment to the Hague Chamber of Commerce for material for a video box and are requesting the money be returned. The Board made a mistake in giving the money to them since they are not allowed to pay for a project until the work is done.

The NYSDEC conducted a SPDES Comprehensive Evaluation Inspection at the Hague Wastewater Treatment Plant on March 18, 2011 and the facility received a satisfactory rating. The inspection cited "good operating conditions and productivity and a visually good quality effluent." The Board agreed that Paul Belden is doing a good job running this facility.

The Board authorized payments totaling \$5,700 to the contractor for work done on the new Veterans Memorial Park. A dedication of the new Park will take place on June 18, 2011 at 11 am. The Supervisor generously said that he, personally, will host a reception afterward at noon for sandwiches and soda.

Permission was given to the Cub Scouts for a fundraiser at the Town Beach on May 21, 2011 from 9 am to 12 pm.

The Supervisor reported that the County cannot make its budget due to health insurance if the 2% tax cap is put into effect. He also noted that employee retirement contributions from Hague will increase by over \$30,000. A reduction in mandates is needed. Supervisor Belden is chairman of the County DPW and noted that they are paying \$1 more per gallon for fuel this year than last.

Chairman Robert Goetsch, Jon Hanna, Bill Pittman, Chris Navitsky, Lyndsay Mydlarz and Maureen Cherubini were all present. The Board approved a two year extension on the Rizza 2009 variance approval.

LARAC MEMBERS SHOW

From May 20 - June 23, 2011, the Lower Adirondack Regional Arts Council (LARAC) at 7 Lapham Place, Glens Falls, NY, will hold its popular annual show featuring works of art by LARAC Members.

PLANNING BOARD - 5/5/11

Present were Chairman EJ Siwek and Board members John Brown, Pam Peterson, Mike Cherubini, Richard Frasier, Bruce Clark. Martin Fitzgerald, Sr., was absent.

During the course of the meeting, ZEO Clark clarified that we have given control over stormwater regulations to the LGPC but the Town has responsibility for wastewater treatment regulations.

WILSON/FLOOR (25.1-1-17 and 18) Summit Drive and Route 8 (OCI)

The Board reopened a public hearing on the application for a Major Subdivision of two parcels equaling 148.8 acres. If approved 10 new residential lots will be created. Lot lines have been reestablished so that no lot line crosses into or through a wetland and will maintain a 200 ft. setback from the wetland. The project is a Class B regional project.

After discussion of a letter from the Lake George Water-keeper, the Board voted to require a site plan review for lots if there are any significant modifications from the approved plan with regard to septic, stormwater, location of driveway and percentage of clearing. Voting aye were Brown, Frasier, Peterson, Siwek and nay were Clark and Cherubini. The LGPC permit is still needed and the public hearing will be continued at the June meeting.

<u>LTP HOLDING, LLC – UPTOWN STORE (43.5-1-5) 9819</u> <u>Graphite Mt. Rd.</u>

The Board approved an extension to a 2009 approval, for use of this property as a restaurant with wine service, requested by owner Lauren Parlin to allow for time, if necessary, to complete work needed for the Warren County CO.

BRAUNER (60.13-1-7) 39 Red Fox Lane (TR-1)

In a clarification of our report last month, ZEO Clark said, "No Town of Hague permit was issued for the current two bay garage built by the previous owners." The Town of Hague permit to the previous owners was for a 10'x10' tool shed with an attached one bay garage. The design was changed to a two bay garage before submission to Warren County which issued a permit.

Researched by the Hague Historical Society



There's nothing like a good fishing story and here's one from a March 1935 Ticonderoga Sentinel: "Here's the latest fish story and it does not deal with the big one that got away. It seems that Dan Davis, one of the most patient and skillful fisherman around these parts, was doing a bit of angling for perch on that famous fishing place called the middleground. Leaving his fish box for a time unnoticed, he moved off to prospect for another school of fish. On returning to the box he was astonished to find a large sea gull busily engaged in pulling a free meal of perch from the hard-won results of a fishing trip. During the summer it is customary for fishermen to throw small fish to the gulls, but this is the first time the writer has ever known one of these birds to help himself in this manner. In fact, gulls are seldom seen around here until the ice has left the lake." Chances are pretty good that Danny Davis was ice fishing when he was visited by a gull.

Speaking of "middleground", a journal written by Jack Henry years ago, about good fishing spots, gives these hints for finding middleground: "Get the third window of the Rising House, from the North, on a line with the chimney. Get the west side of Waltonian Island on the divide in the mountain behind it."

"There is a good rock reef off the little island in back of Col. Mann's Island close to its rocky outer edge and just off it, about 20 feet deep."

I'm not a fisherman, and of course the Rising House is long gone, but it gives me pause to wonder if the middleground is still a good fishing site for local anglers. ... Pat McDonough

Mid April 2011— May13, 2011

Mother Nature is once again telling us that she has control over all aspects of natural activity. Melting snow pack and heavy rains have caused Lake Champlain, Schroon Lake, the Hudson and Schroon Rivers, and numerous small streams to overflow their banks. Although water levels have receded from earlier high levels many roads in Port Henry/Moriah remain closed. There have been flooded conditions at the following local sites:

- Fort Ticonderoga Ferry landing and boat launch.
 On Sunday, May 8, most of the parking lots for the boat launch was under water. Lake Champlain is at the highest level since the 1930's.
- 2. Bicentennial Falls and Park in downtown Ticonderoga.

 The LaChute River has flooded the park but the falls are a beautiful sight.
- 3. Follow the LaChute River from the Lake George outlet down Lord Howe Street.
- 4. Hudson River at Riparius.
- 5. Schroon Lake and Schroon River.

We received 4 inches of rain from April 26th to May 4th. A beautiful rainbow was observed over Wal-Mart on April 28th at 5 pm. The week of May 8 – 13th was perfectly delightful; sunny days, at last, with temperatures in the upper 60's to 70 degrees. Tulips, daffodils and forsythia have quickly opened. The tree leaves are budding out along with the black flies. Shadblow trees are in full bloom.

Snow was reported on April 23 and a frost occurred on May 6 at 6 am. Sunrise is 5:33 am. Sunset is at 8:08 pm. The next full moon is May 17.


