River Care 2015 by Jim Anderson

The Upper Manistee River Association (UMRA) has been busy this past summer with river and access site projects. Crews from SEEDS were busy completing fish habitat work in the 2nd year of UMRA's \$50,000 Habitant Improvement Account (HIA) grant. During the summer the crews worked on the 43 sites in the area of the Tree Farm and Yellow Trees Landing. Approximately 30 of the identified sites were completed. The access site at Rogers Landing was completed in the Fall. This project was funded through generous donations from various sources, including the Mason Griffiths Founders Chapter [MGFC (001)]. Also, during October, two sand traps were cleaned out in the Deward area. The UMRA has had 5 traps to maintain for years. Currently, there is only a need to monitor and clean four of the original 5 traps.

The UMRA was awarded a HIA Grant for access work at two sites for 2016. The two access site upgrades will be at Three Mile Bend and the Tree Farm. Three Mile bend is below the CCC Bridge and the Tree Farm is located between Hole in the Fence and Yellow Trees Landing. At the Three mile site a boat slide will be incorporated with the steps and dock that are already in place. The Tree Farm site has nothing for putting boats, canoes or kayaks in. Currently, river users are using a natural slope which exists and the bank is being damaged with vehicle traffic.

The Fall Volunteer Water Quality Monitoring Event on the Upper Manistee was held on Saturday, October 3rd. The thirty-one citizen scientists that met at the Kalkaska Eagles Club were greeted with a chilly morning that was a welcome break from the normally wet bug sampling weekends. After a brief introduction and orientation the teams of volunteers dispersed to the five sampling sites. The groups returned at noon, samples in hand and enjoyed a hot lunch on the Eagle's back porch.

The use of river bug surveys to gauge water quality is widely accepted within the scientific community. Michigan Clean Water Corps (MiCorps) has developed a protocol for evaluating rivers such as the Manistee River. Teams of volunteers capture and sort river dwelling bugs (mostly benthic macro invertebrates) to determine both the diversity and density of the various critters. The information helps to monitor long term trends and overall health of the river environment, serving as "canaries in the mineshaft." The amount and variety of bottom dwelling river critters provide one of the best indicators of water quality. The information gained through the volunteer monitoring process is then available to agencies such as the MDNRE for scientific evaluation and resource decision-making. Thanks to the diligent efforts of Bruce, Dave and Christina all of the available sampling data was recently uploaded to the MiCorps site and will be maintained for future reference.

The 2015 Fall session closed out the 7th year of the project on the Upper Manistee and the volunteer support continues to be amazing. "Bug" collecting is a very fun and educational event that is ideally suited for both the young and old and everyone in between. I hope that you have an opportunity to join us at a future event.

The 2016 Spring event will be held on Saturday June 4th, 2016, starting at 9 AM at the Kalkaska Eagles.

As of December 2015, our year-to-date income is \$43,405. This amount is includes approximately \$25,000 in Habitat Improvement Grants, through the State of Michigan. Our expenses amount to \$49,750.00. Thus, our net income is -\$6,345. Nearly 90% of our expenditures funded River Restoration Work done in 2015! Additional funding went to portable toilets for 9 access points on the river.

As of October, the Upper Manistee River Foundation had a balance of \$73,850. Undistributed earnings in the Foundation totaled \$13,500. Many generous Foundation donations have been received with dues payments, and memorials for and from those who have shared a passion for preserving our Manistee River. We appreciate your continued support.
