Meet the Presenters

Kim Marxhausen

Keynote 1: Seeking the Faith Quotient

Faith is vitally important for learning. Socio-emotional skills such as self-regulation and empathy are showing themselves to be more important than IQ for learning. Participants will gain understanding of aspects of teaching the faith and how that supports socio-emotional learning, which in turn supports learning, which in turn affects children in our centers and schools.

Keynote 2: Resilience

Perhaps when God tells us to be strong and courageous He is referring to the characteristic of resilience. Children with resilience can weather struggle and disappointment. They can learn from mistakes and build a social network to make them even stronger. When we teach the faith we support the character of resilience and this reaps benefits for children over their lifetime. Let's talk about God's plan for creating a resilience-nurturing environment for the precious learners in our classrooms. Participants will be able to develop action plans for centers and schools and help in engaging others in reflective practice. This will ultimately aid students in greater resilience through participation in better environments.

Breakout Session 1 and 2: We MUST Play

It was bad enough when kindergarten was declared the "new first grade." Now we find this academic push has reached pre-school. Parents are worried that their children will not learn soon enough or fast enough. What they need to understand is that replacing play with inappropriate academic learning, now, will create problems for children, later. We will discuss how to answer parent concerns with good research and how to teach parents to value play at home and at school. Participants will gain understanding of the building blocks for learning developed through play which will benefit all families in their centers.

Plan Healthy Meals and Snacks without Losing Your Mind!

Come get healthy meal and snack ideas that kids will actually like! Learn about some quick, healthy snacks you can make in your classroom or child care center that will not break the bank. Many of the children eat the major of their daily food while in childcare. It is essential that you understand their dietary needs including, food groups, serving sizes and nutritional guidelines. Find out some creative ways to have children happily eating healthy foods. What you choose to serve them now will have an effect on their choices and attitudes about food throughout their life.

Behavior Management: Expanding our Bag of Tricks!

Think about behavior as a developmental process shaped by life experiences that impacts an individual's beliefs and expectation of themselves, the adults whom care for them and the world. Looking at situations through the lens of child development and life experiences allows us to be proactive vs. reactive when managing behavior. Punishment doesn't consider a child's life experiences, social, emotional, and developmental needs. Identifying what the child is struggling to handle allows us to respond in a way that helps teach children how to self-regulate and respond more appropriately as they grow and mature. In this session, we will identify reasons why children act out as well as share some strategies for preventing and de-escalating challenging behavior. We also will consider how life experiences and trauma play in the developmental process. This session will provide you with a different way to think about behavior as well as provide a variety of techniques to use in your classroom. We can never have enough good "tools" to help us manage behavior!

Samantha George is a special education teacher at Hortonville Middle School. She has earned a Bachelors of Science from the University of Wisconsin-Stout and Masters of Science in Education from the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh. In addition to her degrees she has participated in and presented trainings on trauma and the impact that it has on children. Samantha is also a wife and the mother of two. She hopes to share information that will provide you with insight and positive behavior approaches.

What Happens When Our Interventions Aren't Enough?

Participants will have many tools and ideas to take back to centers and classrooms to assist in making learning easier, appropriate and meaningful for children. Chrissy is especially appreciative to be here with you today to briefly share regarding:

- *Grow your bag-o-tricks!* Implementing strategies and tools for kiddos with unique sensory needs or challenging behaviors

Power Struggles and Preschoolers (AM Only)
