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
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THE KENNEDY MOMENT Peter Adamson

Moving between Oxford, New York, Washington, Geneva and Burkina Faso, *The Kennedy Moment* is astory of ordinary people from different countries drawn into a global conspiracy.

Out of their forgotten ideals and mid-life frustrations comes the audacious idea. Suggested in the first instance as a joke, it is a joke that none of them can forget. At a second get-together, this time in New York, they devise their plan. The aim is a great humanitarian advance; but the method is fraught with risk.


Driving the plot is the conventional, mild-mannered American physician Dr. Michael Lowell who is still in love with one of his co-conspirators, Seema Mir – the serene young woman from Karachi who rejected him twenty years earlier because he was 'just a little bit too dull'.

This is a gripping thriller about ordinary people caught up in an extraordinary turn of events. It is about having the courage of your convictions – in love as well as in life. The plotting is ingenious and richly informed by an impressive career that has put the author at the heart of international affairs.

THE HEIGHTS Juliet Bell

Wuthering Heights meets This is England, The Heights is set in a northern mining town during the Winter of Discontent of 1978-79, the miners' strike of 1984 and the years leading up to the global financial crisis. It's a tautly written, commercial reworking of Emily Bronte's classic, timed to tie in with the 200th anniversary of the author's birth in July 1818.

In 2008, the unexplained death of a teenage boy brings DCI Nelson Lockwood back to the former mining town of Gimmerton in Lancashire, where he is caught up in a decades-old story of obsession and tragedy. *The Heights* is set against the backdrop of Thatcherism, the 1984 miners' strike and the decline of a once proud pit community, and explores the destructive power of obsession: Heathcliff's obsession with Cathy, Cathy's obsession with status and wealth, Lockwood's obsession with a moment from the past – and how the ghosts of those obsessions echo through the generations.

This pacy and seamless rendition of *Wuthering Heights* will please fans of the original as much as a new generation of readers. While it deals with serious subjects it's very commercial and gritty, and the setting, blend of characters from contrasting backgrounds and elements of detection and domestic suspense are bound to appeal to readers who love Mel Sherratt, Angela Marsons and Dreda Say Mitchell.


A charismatic teacher tries to teach the boys about what is happening in the world around them – including racial inequality and the Cuban Missile Crisis — and they become suddenly aware of life beyond the school boundaries. The pupils sense hidden dangers looming, Paul's parents hear of the house-arrest of a left-wing friend, the far-right is in the ascendant and South Africa is no longer safe. Added to this sense of unease, the growing realisation of his sexuality and the part he has unwittingly played in the drama unfolding sets Paul still further apart from his peers.

Now a man in his sixties and living abroad, Paul is drawn back to Pretoria to revisit his boyhood home. It has taken him most of his life to grasp and make sense of his past: the other boys, the masters, his own and du Toit's parents who so puzzlingly populated and controlled his world.

And although for centuries it was eclipsed by Christian thought in the mainstream, Stoic influences appear in unexpected places: the Serenity Prayer, the underlying principles of cognitive behavioral therapy. Pigliucci finds in Stoicism a rational, science-friendly philosophy, which also allows room for a spiritual metaphysics: that is, a practical philosophy eminently open to revision—in stark contrast with so much of the dogma we face today.

In practising Stoicism, Pigliucci offers a reconsideration of this ancient philosophy for modern life and reveals why its popularity is now on the rise. In a world fraught with difficult moral issues, he shows that Stoicism may be our best path forward for structuring our life, achieving tranquility of mind, and maintaining our integrity—in other words, for shaping a life well lived.

Early astronomers spent much of their time devoted to our local celestial neighbourhood. They aimed their telescopes at our Solar System and prominent stars in the nighttime sky. Armed with Newton's law of gravitation, they were able to predict the motions of the Moon, planets and comets and detect new and unexpected objects such as asteroids. They found rings around Saturn and canal-like features on Mars. Could that mean there is water on the red planet? Is their other life in the Solar System or even on planets circling other stars? And what about those stars?

Astronomers then moved outwards. They traced how galaxies are uniquely arranged through the cosmos and evolve over time. They learned what elements reside in both stars and interstellar space, and realized that regular matter is not the major component of the Universe. Instead, some unknown 'dark matter' is five times more abundant. Meanwhile, Einstein's theories recast our vision of the Universe as violent rather than serene, powered by objects with amazing energies. New tools arrived for exploring the cosmos – and recently even allowing us to detect the ripples generated in the very fabric of spacetime as black holes collide more than a billion light-years away.

After learning that the Milky Way is accompanied by billions of other galaxies, cosmologists were astounded to find out that spacetime was expanding, with galaxies surfing outward on the wave. It didn't take long for them to imagine that ballooning in reverse, leading to the conception of the Big Bang – a prediction not firmly proven for nearly two decades. Since then, we have added new details to the story of our cosmic creation. The Universe may have begun with a brief moment of super-accelerated expansion, called inflation. What's more, parallel universes might be generated in a similar way, meaning we live in a 'multiverse', side-by-side with other universes. But to prove that, theorists must first wrestle with the nature of time.

A good cartoon captures the important features of a face or behaviour, but there is no guarantee of this. It can easily miss much that matters. Indeed, it can easily miss the most important things. Big data is like a cartoon simplification. Although it's meant to represent and describe the world, its abundance can mislead people into thinking they know everything. In *Dark Data*, the eminent statistician David Hand explores the implications of what we might be missing. He shows, through many real examples, just how serious things can get – how missing data can lead to death and disaster, failed economies, and ruined lives.

Hand lays bare the ubiquity of dark data, what causes it and where it is likely to manifest itself. It can arise for many reasons, which themselves may not be obvious – asymmetric information in wars, time delays in financial trading, dropouts in clinical trials and deliberate selection to enhance apparent performance in hospitals, policing and schools. What is clear is that measuring and collecting more and more data are not guaranteed to lead to more relevant information or to better understanding.

But there's also a more positive side to dark data. When approached from the right angle, it can lead to insights that cannot be obtained any other way. Counterintuitive though it might seem, deliberately obscuring some of the data can lead to improved predictions and better understanding – providing, of course, the right data are obscured in the right way. The modern world of big data holds huge potential for improving the human condition as well as for misleading us. *Dark Data* shows how to achieve the first and avoid the second.

What is it about videogames? Despite their ubiquity—you can always find a handful of subway riders playing Candy Crush on any commute—there's something embarrassing about admitting to enjoying them. 
Nikola Tesla died in poverty as a recluse, after contributing to the development of alternating-current electricity – a contemporary of Edison but derided and fell foul of his funders.

The apparent uniqueness of human language has led to the widely held belief that language must have been the result of a big-bang moment, whether a gift from the deity, a fortunate genetic mutation, or a by-product of simply having a large and complicated brain.

In *Outspoken*, Michael Corballis shatters this view. Drawing on decades of experience at the forefront of cognitive science, he makes sense of the complexity of human language with the help of just one powerful idea: that language evolved as a gradual process, governed by natural selection. In an original synthesis of psychology, neuroscience, genetics and anthropology, he reveals how we learned first to speak with our hands, not our mouths, and why our advanced language skills depend not on a universal grammar or on the inherent wordiness of our thoughts, but on our ability to imagine the past and future and to understand what others are thinking. Language, in other words, is a device for sharing our thoughts, not thought itself. What's more, Corballis argues that by understanding the stepwise progression of our capacity to tell stories and converse with others, we can see that the possibility of animals 'crossing the Rubicon of language' may not be as farfetched as we had thought.



THE FEAR OF DOING NOTHING Notes of a Young Therapist Valery Hazanov



What Hazanov eventually realizes is that these patients achieve in psychotherapy not a complete transformation of their lives, but rather a more truthful way to exist.

'What is the meaning of life?' asks Lily Briscoe in Virginia Woolf's *To the Lighthouse*. She proceeds to answer: 'The great revelation had never come.... Instead there were little daily miracles, illuminations, matches struck unexpectedly in the dark; here was one.' In *The Fear Of Doing Nothing*, Hazanov illuminates the intimacy, vulnerability and messiness of the therapeutic encounter. These moments are – ultimately – his best answer to the question of what psychotherapy is and what it can achieve. Struggling together with his patients, Hazanov discovers his own sense of purpose and in doing so overcomes his biggest fear: the fear of doing nothing.

Valery Hazanov was born in Moscow in 1982 and raised in Israel. He received his PhD in clinical psychology at Columbia University and trained at Columbia University Medical Center, Weill Cornell Medical College, St Luke's Hospital and Columbia Psychoanalytic Center, among other institutions. 

WONDROUS TRANSFORMATIONS A Maverick Physician, the Age of Hormones and the Transsexual Phenomenon Alison Li

The story of hormone therapy told through the fascinating life of Dr Harry Benjamin, who pioneered the use of hormones to assist in gender transitions.

Today it's unexceptional to think of ourselves as hormonal beings. We hold hormones responsible for making our bodies morph through our lifetimes and for sparking quixotic changes in temper. We blame 'raging hormones' for the tempests of puberty and midlife and spend our days 'running on adrenalin' in 'testosterone-fuelled' workplaces. Yet this view is relatively recent.

In *Wondrous Transformations*, Alison Li tells the fascinating history of the rise of hormones through the life of one of its foremost pioneers. A daring explorer in the areas of sex and ageing, as well as a celebrity doctor in 1920s' New York, German-born physician Harry Benjamin (1885–1986) first became acquainted with the science of hormones in 1916. He then devoted his life to using this new technology to help people transform themselves – from old to young, in his famed practice on Central Park West, or, decades later, from male to female. Benjamin's sympathetic work with those who wanted to transition from one biological sex to another was groundbreaking in mid-century America, when homosexuality and any behaviour that crossed gender lines was not just pathologized but criminalized, too.


Li shows how, over the course of the twentieth century, Benjamin helped pave the way for our understanding of ourselves as chemically malleable, exquisitely receptive to hormone manipulations as subtle as the tweaks needed to dial down the symptoms of menopause or as radical as the reshapings undertaken by body builders. In doing so, she traces the development of the influential concept of biological control and the then-revolutionary idea that we can transform our bodies to match our minds. It's ultimately a tale not only about the chemical transformation of our bodies but also about the transformation of the very concept of identity and self.

Alison Li is an historian of science and medicine. The author of the biography *J. B. Collip and the Development of Medical Research in Canada*, she has lectured at universities as well as to the public, presented papers at numerous conferences and appeared in a television documentary about the discovery of insulin. 



We are marching towards a future in which three-quarters of humans live in cities, more than half of the landmass of the planet is urbanized, and the rest is covered by farms, pasture, and plantations. There was once a fashionable theory that history was determined not by individuals, but by economic and geo-political forces. Recent years have not only proved that idea abundantly wrong – but also demonstrated that most of the individuals who do indeed guide our destiny are massive tossers.

From William the Conqueror to Donald Trump via (inevitably) Vladmir Putin, our lives have been governed, endangered and thrown into confusion by a pack of incompetent, angry men. It's nearly always men. Men whose ambition is inversely proportional to their ability – and stability. This book will look at 50 of the ones who have had the worst impact on our times. Candidates include Steve Bannon, Silvio Berlusconi, George W Bush (don't you feel nostalgic for the days when he was our worst worry?), Marine Le Pen, Vladimir Putin, Donald Trump, the McDonald brothers (the obesity-generating founders of evil empire McDonald's), Rupert Murdoch, Josef Goebbels, Princess Diana, Jeff Bezos, Mel Gibson and Pepe the Frog.

As well as all this cathartic finger-pointing, the book will also provide a useful and informative guide to some of the underlying ideas, theories and - indeed – conspiracy theories that have been misshaping our world. It will help explain the emergence of Fake News, the malign influence Ayn Rand has had on modern economics, the way the UK Leave campaign targeted the old and uneducated. It will set out the case against its subjects like a prosecution crime file, bolstered by nuggets of trivia and self-damning quotations. It will also, in its final chapters, provide a useful guide for what the heck we can do about it all.

Giuseppe Verdi remains the greatest operatic composer that Italy, the home of opera, has ever produced. Yet throughout his lifetime he claimed to detest composing and repeatedly rejected it.
