Community Friendship, Inc. (CFI) is a nonprofit comprehensive provider of recovery-based mental health services assisting adults in Metropolitan Atlanta. Originating in 1962 as a dropin social center for adults with chronic mental illnesses, CFI incorporated in 1970 and has grown to offer a comprehensive array of services in the psychosocial rehabilitation approach. For over 48 years, CFI has been committed to supporting an individual's recovery from mental illness so that each person can lead a contributing, integrated, and self-directed life.

The mission of Community Friendship, Inc. is to provide a supportive community for people whose mental illness prevents them from participating in community life, employment and relationships.

The vision of Community Friendship, Inc. is to provide the supports needed for full access to community life through achievement of one's potential and removal of barriers.

A LETTER from OUR CEO

2017 was a year of transition, resiliency, and perseverance for Community Friendship, Inc. (CFI). CFI continues to expand our services, our partnerships, and our visibility in the philanthropic community, both locally and nationally. In 2017, we provided services that equipped the consumers we serve with the skills needed to be self-sufficient and independent. At the foundation of all we do, we instill hope; assuring that every person receiving services from CFI understands that life is not over, but a new chapter indeed begins every day. CFI is committed to employing staff that understands the importance of our core values, especially the value of hope. CFI staff will continue to assist those we serve in their recovery journey offering whatever support is needed for their success.

In 2017, CFI provided services to over 775 consumers, with 96% reporting an increase in their quality of life. We assisted 75 consumers obtain and maintain employment, with an average monthly earned income of \$831. We assisted consumers in our Psychosocial Rehabilitation Program (PSR) in acquiring over 12,000 resources. Additionally, we enrolled over 200 homeless individuals in PATH services through homeless outreach and assessments. We also provided over 130,000 MARTA Transportation Assistance Cards to help consumers obtain and maintain employment and access needed community resources and activities. CFI continues to move the needle forward in recovery oriented mental health services and programming.

We welcome 2018 with open arms, embracing possibilities, new collaborations, and the opportunity to enhance existing partnerships and relationships. Thank you for your continued support of our organization, as we move forward to open the window of opportunity for those we serve. Each journey of recovery presents a new path and your support makes all the difference in helping transform the lives we touch at CFI. We look forward to another successful year!






