QUILTS for the COMMUNITY 2020 REPORT

The First Friday, Lighthouse and Rainbow Quilters donated a total of **154** quilts in 2020 recorded by Barbara Vallone! I am sure more were given by many of you as well as more have been stored by many of you!!!

- 51 NICU, All Saints, Racine, 36x36 Isolet Covers
- 17 NICU, Kenosha hospital
- 14 Union Grove Veterans Home
- 1 Local Quilt for a Soldier
- Racine Foster Children! Four MORE than 2019! Way to go during a pandemic!!!
 - 1 To a local fundraiser
- **148 TOTAL GIVEN** out in 2020 which only leaves SIX waiting for delivery to all the places we could not send quilts to after March 2020!

The estimated total of 148 given quilts is over \$55,500!!! This total includes fabric used and time served! Pretty amazing!!

We hope that we can fill the needs for 2021 for Racine Foster Kids Program, Camp Serenity, Wounded Warriors and local veterans so keep making quilts in sizes 36 x 36 to 60 x 70!


