The Curator's Corner has another opportunity to thank a constant donor in Norma Bushman for some incredible contributions: a box of ambrotypes and tintypes dating to before and during the Civil War of her relatives from the Barney and Stevens families, including one of Paul Stevens in his uniform of the 12th NH Volunteers, Co. G. Also from Norma: a childhood dress of her mother's (Verna Stevens), two family diaries from 1866 and 1877, an album of vibrantly colored Victorian cards, photos of the 1928 Franklin Centennial parade, and a sampling of miniature books published in the 1960's by Hillside Publishers, a Franklin company.

This month's photographic contribution is a winter view of the "Headwaters of the Merrimack River", better known as Daniell Point (behind the High School), or where the Pemigewasset and Winnepesaukee Rivers join to form the Merrimack.
