AT THE ACADEMY OF MUSIC REV. CHAS. F. PARHAM OF THE COLLEGE AT BETHEL TO CONDUCT REVIVALS IN AN UP TOWN HALL. Mr. Parham is the leader of the Topeka sect which has started out to induce the world to return to what it exponents. call the early Apostolic Faith. Mr. Parham and several of his followers claimed to have confered upon them the GIFT OF TONGUES, and of other powers the early desciples were said to have had, among them that of healing. And are expecting that the millennium will be hastened by their preaching, its advent being, in their opinion a matter of only a short time. SIX PRAYERS HOURS OF PRAYER PAR-HAM AND STUDENTS HOLDS SERVICE AT SHELLY PARK. C. F. Parham, with seventeen students from Bethel College Bible school at Topeka, Kans., held a session of prayer yesterday in a tent at Shelly park. The session lested Six hours. From 9 A. M. to 3 P. M. during which time over one hundred persons offered praver, including many of the students, who prayed in foreign tongues by means of the "gift". Last evening the Evangelist held a regular prayer meeting which was attended by bout seventy-five people. Several different languages were used by the people. The Bethel B'ble School, according to its founder and present head, is the only religious institution in the world to the students of which has the "gift of tongues" been given from God. "We are not working for money" said a student last night. Te do not ask for money from anyone. The Lord will provide. If we are worthy, we will have plenty to eat and plenty to wear. If we are not worthy we will starve.

The workman is worthy of his hire. We are well fed and receive considerable sums of money from those whom the Lord moves to give. "When asked to explain the gift of tongues" a student said, "It came to the students Jan., 1st last, direct from God. We could none of us speak any other language beside the English. When gift came from God we could speak twenty-one different languages, and by the grace of God, we touch nothing that is not proven by the Bible. Our religions is the religion of truth, not the religion of fashion, as practiced by the churches. We do not preach comeoutism or come in-ism, but recognize all good Christians anywhere we met them. Ours is the religion of God.

SAYS THEY ARE PERSECUTED

Rev. C. F. Parham tells of his followers, hardships.

The Rev. C. F. Parham, of Topeka, Kans., who teaches the gift of tongues thru inspiration, began a series of meetings at 1675 Madison Ave., last night. He spoke of the persecutions that have always attended every great reform, which he and his followers were experiencing in some degree. We believe, that ours is the last reform and the second coming of Christ is close at hand. Our work is set for the restoration of faith and power and unity among believers and the speedy evangelization of the world. Topeka, Kans., Jan. 25th. The Rev. Chas. F Parham who lately attracted much attention in Kansas City, is at the head of a company of enthusiasts who have founded what is called the College of Bethel, Gospel school in this city. There are about 40 in the school. They pray for what they want and get what they pray for, they have plenty to eat and wear, they say the Lord provides. In conversation with a times correspondent recently Mr. Parham said, that on New Years day one of the students. Miss Ozman became suddenly gifted with a new and strange tongue and spoke in a language un-

known to herself and to the others. The next day, said Parham I went to town and on my return found many of the students talking in unknown tongues, no two talking the same language, and no one understanding his or his neighbors speech. From that time on spiritual development was marvelous. He asserts that the students—Americans without education in foreign languages—have lately spoken in French, German, Swedish, Bohemian, Chinese, Japanese, Hungarian, Bulgarian, Russian, Italian, Spanish and Norwegian.

We teach that part of our labor will be to tell the churches the uselessness of spending years in preparing Missionaries for work in the forcome. All things come thru faith, we ask God for Power and then have faith that power will All things come thru faith, we ask God for food and raiment and we receive them. I have started out many a day without a cent and returned with \$25 in my pocket, my prayers had been answered. There was nothing supernatural about it, I needed the money for the Lords work, God knew it, and put it in the hearts of men who had money to supply my needs. We wanted power from on high to help save the world; we prayed for it; we received When the unknown tongue is disputed Parham always cites the 17th verse, 16th chapter of Mark, which says: "and these signs shall follow them that believe, in my name shall they cast out devils; they shall speak with new tongues.

Nichols, a student of the Kansas City Methodist College says he received the Gift of Tongues. He believes it was the Assyrian Tongue. I began talking and talked so fast he could not stop, I could not articulate at all and my words went faster than I could understand. but I know and believe it was the Pentecostal blessing, I am being led by God. At the close of the service, eleven knelt for Salvation, the students all kneeling talking and praying with the Penitents.

CHAS. F. PARHAM AGAIN IN KANSAS CITY HOLDS TWO MEETINGS, IN THE INTERIM GOES AMONG THE SICK, ANOINTING WITH OIL AND CURING BY PRAYER, TALKS OF HIS WORK.

Chas. F. Parham the Evangelist of Topeka, Kans., spent last night and yesterday in Kansas City, holding meeting and effecting cures and performing all the acts of an old time Apostle, during the interval of the meetings he visited the sick and healed many, merely by anointing with oil and by prayer. On the walls of the Hall were a pair of crutches thrown away by a woman who was cured. "Do you claim any virtue for the oil", asked, the reporter after the meeting last night. None whatever the Evangelist replied. It is prayer that cures, we treat all diseases alike. It was a wonderful meeting that we just closed in Lawrence, Kansas at the end of three weeks, between 12 and 15 persons received the Gift of Tongues three of them were negroes, (these were the first negroes to receive the Gift), one spoke Spanish and a man who was present and who spent his life among the Spanish said that it was as pure Spanish as he ever heard, and other spoke German not merely the high and low German, but the dialects of the different section of the country, and

others spoke the Osage Indian language.

"The Lawrence World" A GREAT WORKER

CHAS. F. PARHAM WILL HOLD A SERI-ES OF MEETINGS IN LAWRENCE.

Chas. F. Parham, who has won an international reputation since leaving Lawrence five years ago will return and hold a series of meetings in Music Hall.

Mr. Parham is not the founder of any new church or creed. He insists that his mission is to have people return to the Apostolic Faith. His views are referred to as strange and yet he claims that the country ought not to regard the first principles of the Christian Religion as strange. He will bring about 20 of his students to this city and will take no collections, will not ask any man for a cent but will be well fed and supplied with all the necessities and many of the luxuries of life. Mr. Parham does not impress one as being a peculiar man. Indeed he is a right good fellow and is earnest in his lifes work. Whatever may be said about him he has attracted more attention to religion than any other religious worker in years.

The most peculiar thing about him and his work is the gift of tongues. His students can speak in languages they never heard before it has been demonstrated that it is not gibberish but real languages and can be understood by foreigners.

Mr. Parham believes that the world is ready to return to the Apostolic Faith and is going about preaching the word and asking people to enlist under this banner. He is not representing any church and will not perfect any organization, but will preach the word of God as he has the light. Two meetings will be held daily. Not only does his converts speak in many lang-

uages, but they cast out devils and heal the sick This speaking in tongues is some thing new. It came to them with the present century (Falling on Watch night 1900—1901) since that time it has been extended far and wide, Mr. Parham claims this is not remarkable. It is simply a witness of his relation to the true Faith. Mr. Parham has an interesting personality.

He was for a number of years a preacher in this city and country about and had great power in revivals. He is essentially a revivalist. He left the regular ministry about five years ago and since that time has been doing evangelistic work. He will be in the city for about ten days and the meetings will give those interested in the man and his work a chance to see for themselves what manner of work he is doing to attract such world wide attention.

WONDERFUL CURES IN KANSAS

Galena, Kans., Jan. 27, 1904.

It is doubtful whether in recent years anything has occurred that has awakened the interest, excited the comment or mystified the people of this regions as the religious meetings being held here by Rev. C. F. Parham familiarly termed "The Divine Healer."

Almost three months have elapsed since this man came to Galena and during that time he has healed in his meeting over one thousand people and more than 800 converted. Rev. Parham first began to attract attention he was holding meeting in a large tent, and soon the streets in that vicinity were crowded nightly with people who were anxious to see the wonderful man who was healing the sick the mained and the blind without money and without price. When it was found that the tent was utterly inadequate to accommodate the crowd who assembled a large double store room that would shelter 2000 people was procured. A platform was built at one end, stoves were set up, rough pine boards were installed to be used as seats. Here for the past six weeks Parham has preached to crowded houses, and the interest shows no sign of abatement. In this rude temple cures that are looked upon almost in the light of mirsc'es have been performed. During the services there have been as many as fifty people at the alter at one time seeking to be restored in soul and body. Here people who have not

walked for years without the aid of crutches have arisen so straightened that they were enabled to lay aside their crutches to the astonishment of the audience.

CURED BY FAITH

These cures they claim were affected solely by faith through prayer and faith. Nothing else is done, though Rev. Parham often lays his hands upon the afflicted ones while the devotions are going on, with the result that some say it is due to his own magnitism that so much is accomplished.

Parham and his followers do not advocate Christian Science or Spiritualists, but their belief condensed is that God is able to overcome all, cure diseases of both soul and body and will do so if they live a consecrated christian life and depend on Him for all." The healer" makes no charges and takes no credit upon himself, saying that he was only teaching the people the "True Way". He takes no collections, but not with standing has had the needs of himself and family well supplied for by donations from a grateful public.

Rev. Parham is a slight built spare man extremely delicate looking in fact he has said that he was an invalid and badly crippled until he was healed through prayer. His face is pale and earnest looking, while masses of brown hair covers his remarkably shaped head, Parham is the posseser of such a remarkably personality that some have accused him of hypnotizing his followers. Others go so far as to term him a fanatic, but all regardless of sect or prejudices, agree that he has brought about conditions that were never before witnessed in all these parts of the country.

ALL NATIONS REPRESENTED

Here women who have formally lived for society and gaity kneel beside some fallen sister and endeaver to paint her heavenward and the "Followers" receive what they term the "Pentecost", and are enabled to speak in foreign tongues. Languages with which they are free from this power, they are utterly unfamiliar. This alone is considered one of the most remarkable things of the meetings. Last week a woman rose during the meeting and spoke for 10 minutes no one apparently understanding her, and Indian who had come from the Peoria nation in the Territory that day to attend the meeting stated that she was speaking in the

language of his tribe and that he could understand every word of her testimony. Others have spoken in Latin, in Hebrew, in Chinese, and various other tongues, and while such manifestations have filled the public with wonder some are of the opinion that the religious demonstrations of this band are carried to extremes.

One night this week over four hundred remained at the meeting all night singing, praying and speaking in other tongues. Not until the broad day light did they disperse, and it was a strange sight they presented wending their way homeward in the morning. On another occasion hundreds congregated on the banks of Spring River during one of the coldest days of the winter and witnessed Rev. Parham immerse almost one hundred people in its icy waters, not one of whom however contracted even the slightest cold, but of all the wonderful things which has transpired in connection with these meetings nothing has attracted the attention of the people as has the "Healing", which have not been confined to an ignorant uneducated class of people on the contrary, some of the most conservative, intelligent persons, not only here but within a radius of one hundred miles have visited "The Healer" with wonderful results. Mrs. E. L. Arthur, wife of one of most prominent and influential man in Galena. was one of the first to be healed though Mr. Parham's agency. She was almost blind, her visits to some of the most noted occulists in the United States have according to her own words done her little good, under "the Healers" instructions she removed her glasses and went forth entirely healed and has never had even the slightest return of her affliction, the high social standing and exellent reputation of Mrs. Arthur has done much in bringing Parham before the public in a favorable light, following close upon this was the restoration of Mrs. C. O. Frye of Joplin, Mo., whose husband is one of the best known mine operators in South West. Mo. Mrs. Frye has been a constant sufferer for years, but states that now is in excellent health though the prayers of Mr. Parham and his band. Mrs. L. C. Anderson of this city has been healed of cancer. Mrs. L. B. Hinckley of a tumor, she also has been given the power of hearing in one ear deaf for 42 years. Mrs. James Pond had three cancers tumors that have completely disappeared. Clarence Rawland a

14 year old boy, was cured of stammering, his speech was formally almost unintelligable. Mrs. M. A. Boyd, whose lower limbs had been paralyzed for four years, at which place she experienced not the slightest senations when electric needles were inserted in her flesh, was completely restored. Children born deaf and dumb have been brought out of their afflictions. Others who have met with accidents have been healed. Such a case occurred recently when the 2 year old child of Mrs. L. Love a widow fell from a window a distance of 18 feet to the stone walk below. Physicians were summoned who pronounced the injuries internal and extended no hope. A friend prevailed and the minister was sent for in two or three days the little one was well.

The list of those who have been benefited by Rev. Parhams visit to this section is indeed a large one and cases like the preceding have done much to cause the people to regard the man with almost superstitous awe, but when one meets him in every day life he is so quiet, so unostentatious so sympathetic that he invariably win confidence. His wife, is in every sense a home woman and heartily in sympathy with her husband's work, although on account of little ones in the home is not necessarily taking an active part in it. However her sister Miss Lilian Thistlethwaite is a close attendent at the meetings and an earnest worker.

The Parham home or "stopping place", as they call it is always full of visitors, some of whom have come many miles to consult the Minister, others are objects of charity, whom the couple are befriending. In the last two weeks branches of the Parham meetings have sprung up in the different mining camps all of which are attracting large crowds and it is difficult to enter a company where the wonderful results of these meetings are not the chief topic of conversation.

MAKE IT PLAIN

On the sixteenth day of the battle of Gettysburg. I entered the room where a young wounded colonel was apparently near to deaths door. As I entered, he beckoned me to his bedside, and threw his feeble arms around my neck.

"Oh my Father, how glad I am to see you.

I was afraid you would not come till it was too late. I am too feeble to say much, though I have a great many things to say to you; you must do all the talking. Tell me all about dear mother and sister."

I soon perceived by all the appearances of those in the house, that there was no hope enter tained of his recovery .But as I could no longer endure the agony of suspense, I at last inquired of the doctor, "Doctor, what do you think of my son's case?" "Entirely hopeless." "But is there nothing more can be done to save him?" "No sir. Every thing human skill and kindness can do has been done. Your son has been a brave and successful officer; has been a great favorite in the army; has won the highest esteem of all who know him, but he must die. Immediately after the ampytation the gangrene set in, and defies all efforts to arrest it. "Well Dr., how long do you think he will live?" "Not more than four days. He may drop away any hour. We are constantly fearing that an artery will give way, and then it is all over with the colonel. What do you wish to do in reference to his death, you had better do at once." "Have vou. or has anyone, told him of his real condition?" No, we have left that painful duty for you to do, as we have been expecting your arrival for several days."

As I entered the room with the dreadful message of death on my heart, the eyes of my son fastened on me. "Come, sit by my side. father; have you been talking with the doctor about me?" Yes. "What did he tell you? Does he think I shall recover?" There was painful hesitation for a moment. "Don't be afraid to tell me just what he said." "He told me you must die." How long does he think I can live? "Not to exceed four days, and that you may drop away any hour-that an artery may slough at any moment which you cannot survive. With great agitation he exclaimed. Father is that so? Then I must die, I cannot, I must not die. Oh, I am not prepared to die now. Do tell me how I can get ready? Make it SO PLAIN that I can get hold of it. Tell me in a few words, if you can, so that I can see it plainly. I know you can, father, for I used to hear you explain it to others."

'Twas no time now for tears, but for calmness and light, by which to lead the soul to Christ, and both were given. My son I see you

are afraid to die. "Yes I am." "Well I suppose you feel guilty." "Yes that's it. I have been a wicked young man. You know how it is in the army." "You want to be forgiven, don't you?" "Oh, yes that's what I want. Can I be, father? MAKE IT SO PLAIN that I can get hold of it."

At once, an incident which occured during the school days of my son, came to my mind. I had not thought of it before for several years. Now it came back to me, fresht with its interest, and just what was wanted to guide the agitated heart of this young inquirer to Jesus.

Do you remember while at school in--- you came home one day, and I having occasion to rebuke you, you became very angry and abused me with harsh language? "Yes father, I was thinking it all over a few days ago, as I thought of your coming to see me, and felt so bad about it that I wanted to see you, and once more ask your forgiveness." Do you remember, how after the parozysm of your anger had subsided, that you came and threw your arms around my neck, and said "My dear father, I am so sorry I abused you so. It was not your loving son that did it, I was very angry. Wont you forgive me?" "I remember it very distinctly." "Do you remember what I said to you as you wept upon my neck?" "Very well." you said, "I forgive you with all my heart, and kissed me. I shall never forget those words." "Did you believe me?" "Certainly, I never doubted your word." "Did you feel happy again?" "Yes perfectly, and since that time I have loved you more than ever before. I shall never forget how it relieved me when you looked upon me so kindly, and said I forgive you with all my heart."

Well now this is the very way to come to Jesus. Tell Him you are sorry just as you to'd me. Will He forgive you? He says He will. then you must take Him at His word for it, just as you did mine. "Why father is this the way to become a Christian?" I don't know any other. "Why father, I can get hold of this. I am so glad you have come to tell me how."

He turned his head upon his pillow for ret. I sank into my chair and wept freely, and committed the case to Christ. He too, I was soon assured had done His. The broken heart had made its confession, had heard what it longed for. "I forgive you," and believed it. It was but a few moments of silence, but the new creation

had taken place, the broken heart had made its short simple prayer, and believed, and the new heart had been given. A soul had passed out from natures darkness in marvelous light, and from the power of sin and Satan unto God, I soon felt the nervous hand on my head, and heard the word "Father", in such a tone of tenderness and joy, that I knew the change had come.

"Father, my dear father, I don't want you to weep any more, you need not. I am perfectly happy now. Jesus had forgiven me. I know he has, for he says so, and I take His word for it, just as I did yours. Wipe your tears. I am not afraid to die now. If its Gods will, I should like to live to serve my country, and take care of you and mother, but if I must die, I am not afraid to now, Jesus has forgiven me. Come Father lets sing—"When I can read my title clear." And we did sing. "Now father, I want you should pray, and I will follow you." We did pray, and Jesus heard us. "Father I am very happy. Why, I believe I shall get well. I feel much better."

From that hour all his symptons changed—pulse went down, and countenance brightened. The current of life had changed. The Dr. soon came in and found him cheerful and happy—looked at him—felt his pulse, which he had been watching with intense anxiety. and said,—"Why Colonel, you look better." "I am better, Doctor. I am going to get well, my father has told me how to become a Christian, and I am very happy. I believe I shall recover, for God has heard my prayer. Dr., I want you should become a Christian too. My Father can tell you how to get hold of it."

In the evening three surgeons were in consultation, but saw no hope in the case, and one of them took his final leave of the Colonel.

Next morning the two surgeons, who had been in consultation came in and began as usual to dress the wound. On opening the bandage, they suddenly drew back, and throwing up their arms, exclaimed,—"Great God this is a miracle" The gangrene is arrested, and the coloned will live' God has heard your prayers'."

"Why Dr.," replied the colonel. "I told you vesterday, that I believed I should live for I asked Jesus that I might live to do some good. I knew he heard my prayer, and now you see he

has. Bless the Lord with me Doctor."

Meanwhile, "Our son must die", had gone over the wires, and made sadness at home. Next day, "Our son will live, and is happy in Christ", followed, and joy came again to the loved ones.

After his recovery, the colonel returned to the people whose sons he had led with honor through fifteen hard fought battles. They in return, gave him the best office in the gift of a loyal and grateful people. Among them he now lives in prosperity and honor, he is a member of the Church of Christ, and the father of a happy family, growing up around him, and consecrated to the service of His Redeemer. I too was made a better man and better minister by that scene, where this dear son, struggling with his guilt and fear of death, was led to Jesus, and found the pardon of his sins. I there resolved never to for get that charge he made me, in his extremity: "MAKE IT SO PLAIN THAT I CAN GET HOLD OF IT." I have made this my Motto of every sermon I have preached, and God has blessed the effort.

"LOVE COVERETH"

Recently a sister asked me to write an article answering the question why those professing godliness so constantly criticize Christian workers and pass on evil reports. There is only one nawer; they lack the perfect love of God that covers.

Under the old covenant and under the new we have the statements, "Love covereth." (Prv. 10:12; 11 Pet. 4:8) And "the Love Chapter," emphatically confirms this, as the Greek for "Love covereth all things with silence." (1 Cor. 13:7.)

Early in Bible history we have a record of God's appreciation of the love that "covereth."

Blessings were given to Shem and Japhet because, when they heard of their father's chame, they walked backward and "covered" him, and "saw not the nakedness of their father." (Gen. 9:23-27.)

The Holy Spirit writing through Moses must needs record Lot's worldliness for our warning. (Gen. 13: 10-13.) But the Holy Spirit, writing through Poter, overlooks Lot's sin. long since forgiven and tells us. "God...delivered just Lot vexed with the filth conversation of the wicked; for that righteous man... in seeing

and hearing, vexed his righteous soul from day to day with their unlawful deeds." (2Pet. 2;7-8)

A true history must mention Rahab's falsehood, but love covers the heathen woman's sin of ignorance and only recalls her faith when she hears of Isreal's God. (Josh. 2: 8-16; Heb. 11: 31.)

Jesus was unsparing in His denunciation of the Pharisees to their faces, and He sent a strong, characteristic word to the sly, cunning, deceitful Herod; but He never personally spoke evil of any individual behind his back. He reproved Peter to his face severely, but He did not tell John privately that Peter was influenced by Satan. He openly and publicly rebuked Simon, but He did not go into the home of Mary and Martha and talk over how uncourteous Simon had been.

With God, a forgiven sin is "covered." (Psa. 32:1.) There is not a hint of David's transgression in the New Testament, though his name occurs fifty-seven times.

If we forgive "even as" He, we never speak of an injury done to us. (Eph. 4:32.)

A high standard? Yes, but the overcomers reach it. The sons of God are perfect in love "even as" their Father. (Matt. 5:44-48.) They reprove those whom they believe are wrong but they put away all "evil speaking," and "take account" only of the "lovely" things. (Eph. 4:31; Phil. 4:8.) They never mention a true, vile report nor pass on an evil story, that possibly after all, may be much exaggerated or altogether untrue.

Years ago. when I was a babe in Christ, somebody stabbed me. It was my rule never to tell anv human being of a wrong perpetrated against me. But this time I said to myself, as I lay on my couch thinking it over: "I must just tell Tom." But the Spirit whispered. "Love covers." and I saw that I must not even tell my husband.

Then I opened my lips to talk to the Lord about it in prayer, and more decidedly than before the Spirit said. "Love covers." I was ready to weep. "Why, Father," I cried, "may I not even tell Thee about it?" Very tenderly He said, "Love covers." I rose instantly and went to my writing. Perhaps a week, perhaps a month, elapsed before I even recalled that I had been wounded, and then could not remember who or what had caused my pain.

The years went by whenever the Spirit said,

"Love covers." He wrought in me the obliteration of bitter wrong, until one midnight I found myself wholly sleepless as the surges of a cruel injustice swept over me, and the love which covers seemed to have crept out of my heart. Then I cried out to God in an agony for the power to obey His injunction, "Love covereth."

Immediately the Spirit began to work in me the power that brought the forgetfulness. Mentally I dug a grave. Deliberately I threw up the earth until the excavation was deep. Sorrowfully I lowered into it the things which had wounded me. Quickly I shovelled in the clods. Over the mound I carefully laid the green sods. Then I covered it with white roses and rapidly walked away. Sweet sleep came. The wound which had been so nearly deadly was healed without a scar, and I know not today what caused my grief.

More years went by and there came into my life a succession of daily trials small and stinging that I seemed utterly unable to forgive and forget. Again my agonizing cry to God was answered. In vision. I dug another grave down in the swamp at the side of the house. Into a casket I put the noxious things, and lowered them, and covered them and put upon the earth the weeds and rushes, and waited for the roses, but none came. I cried out, "Father, aren't you going to give me any roses?" And then up from each corner of the rough mound there sprang a tiny evergreen tree, that grew slowly toward heaven. I had my victory

Last week, opening a letter from a dear friend I read the words "For your eyes alone. Read and burn." So I walked down the roadway out of human sight, and sat in a breach in the stone wall and read the letter three times over with much blessing. Then I tore it into bits and threw them into the crevices beside me. Then I covered every crevice with small stones until not a single trace of the letter could be seen.

Then I sat and prayed intensely for such a knowledge of God's thought of "Love covereth" as would make it utterly impossible for me ever to "see evil any more." (Zeph. 3:15; Isa. 33:15)

A DEEPER DEATH TO SELF, A MOST IMPORTANT MESSAGE

By G. D. Watson

There is not only a death to sin, but in a great many things there is a deeper death to self a crucifixion to and in detail, and in crucifixion to self is the unfolding and application of all the principles of self renuncition which the soul agreed to in its full consecration. Job was a perfect man and dead to all sin but in his great sufferings, he died to his own religious life-died to his domestic effections, died to his theology; all his views of God's providence: he died to a great many things which in themselves were not sin, but which hindered his largest union with God.

Peter. after being sancitified and filled with the spirit. needed a special vision from heaven, to kill him to his traditional theology and Jewish high Churchism. The very largest degree of of self-renunciation, crucifixion, and abandonment to God, take place after the work of heart purity. There are a multitude of things which are not sinful. Nevertheless our attachment to them prevents our greatest fulness of the Holy Spirit and our complete cooperation with God. Infinate wisdom taken us in hand and arranges to lead us thru deep, interior crucifixion to our fine parts, our lofty reason, our brightest hopes,

our cherished affections, our religious views, our dearest friendship, our pious zeal, our spiritual impeteousity, our narrow culture, creeds and churchism, our success, our religious experiences, our spiritual comforts; the crucifixion goes on till we are dead and detached from all creatures, all saints, all thoughts all plans all tender heart yearnings, all preferences, dead to all troubles all sorrows all disappointments, equally dead to all praise or blame, success or failure, comforts or annoyances, dead to all climates and nationalities, dead to all desire but for Himself. There are innumerable degrees of interior crucifixion in these various lines. Perhaps no sanctified person in ten-thousand ever has reached that degree of death to self that Paul and Madam Guyon and similar saints have reached.

In contradistinction to heart cleansing, this finer crucifixion is gradual. It extends thru months or years, the interior spirit is mortified over and over in the same points, till it reaches a state of divine indifference to it, A great part of believers have gone thru all sorts of (Dying daily) to self before they found that calm, fixed, union with the Holy Ghost, which is the deep longing of every child of God. Again in contradistinction to heart cleansing, which is by faith, this deeper death to self is by suffering. This is abundantly taught in the scriptures and is confirmed by the furnace experience by thousands.

Joseph was a sanctified man before being cast into prison, but there the iron entered into his soul (Psalm 105-18 margin).. and by suffering he reached the highest death of self. There are literally many scriptual passages like Psa. 71 19-21 teaching that the upper ranges in the sanctified state are wrought out thru suffering. Perhaps the most remarkable passage of the word on this subject is in Romans 5th chapter. The first verse teaches justification by faith, the second verse teaches full salvation by faith and verses three to five teach a deeper death and fuller Holy Ghost life by tribulation.

When the soul undergoes this deeper death of self, it enters into a great widness of spiritual comprehension and love; a state of almost uninterrupted prayer; of boundless charity for all people; of unutterable tenderness and broadness of sympathy; of deep quiet thoughtfulness; of

extreme simplicity of life and manners and of deep visions into God's plan of the coming ages. In this state of utter death to self, suffering sorrows, pains, and mortifications of all kind are looked upon with a calm, sweet indifference. Such a soul looks back over its heart-breaking trials, its scalding tears its mysterious tribulations with gentlesubduedness, without regret, for it now sees God in every step of the way. Into such a soul Holy Spirit pours the ocean current of His own life; its great work henceforth is to watch the monition and movements of the Spirit within it, and to yield prompt, loving, unquestioned co-operation with Him. Such a soul is at last in deed and in truth, reached the place where there is "none of self and all of Christ".

It is all painted white from the top to the bottom. There is a large spare tire on the side with the words "JESUS THE LIGHT OF WORLD", on the rear "GET READY JESUS IS COMING SOON".

Every Monday night we hold street services. Thousands have heard the full Gospel from this car and heard the message of His soon coming.

The church also has a printing plant and prints all of the church tracts and song cards. God has spoken to us that He is going to give us a larger printing plant so we can get out our own paper as before.

We have just bought the ground to build the temple on, adjoining the church property, which is on Middle Street, a newly constructed Boulevard, the main thoroughfare in and out of the city around the Island.

Hard labor this for flesh and blood! too hard for most it seemed, so, turning they the tree derided, as mere bramble, that could bear no fruit of special taste; and so set out on upon ten thousand routes to seek what they had left behind.—POLLOCK.

My dear Mrs. Montgomery:

A group of members of the Episcopal Church in this Diocese who have been associated with the Pentecostal Movement believe that praying groups scattered about in the world be glad to unite with Christians of many other names in prayer for the success of the World Conference on Faith and Order.

This Conference meets in Lausanne, Switzerland. during the first three weeks of next August. There will be representatives of almost every considerable Christian communion which acknowledges Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord, coming together for the purpose of discussing the barriers now separating the Churches and the way in which they may be removed so that all the followers of Our Lord may be united in their common faith. It is a vastly important gathering for the future of Christianity.

Some years ago it was my great privilege through the interest of the few active members of our Church to whom I have referred to come into some slight touch with the life of the Pentecostal groups. It was my special privilege to symbolize our common faith by holding a Communion Service at St. Clement's Church in

Berkeley at which a number of Christians, leaders in the Pentecostal Movement were present and joined with us. There are diversities of gifts in the Church but the same Spirit and it was my hope to symbolize in this service the fact that we have a real underlying unity. There is one Spirit and at some future time the Church which will have grown out from the Churches will be big enough to recognize the wide diversity of gifts within the same body. At the time of that Communion Service and since, I have known how deeply and how rightly you and your associates depend upon proyer and I was not surprised when a member of this group suggested to me that this longing to serve Christ's purpose in the world would. she felt sure gladly express itsself in widespread prayer for God's blessing upon this Conference. I make bold therefore to ask you to make this appeal which I am sure will be answered. Since you have been with the Pentecostal group here from its beginning, will you not print this letter in your next issue of the "Triumphs of Faith"? Then I will send marked copies to other magazines asking their editors to copy and thus unite in the spiritual fellowship of this call to prayer for Christian unity.
