Brothers and Sisters,

May God's grace give us the necessary joy, peace, and patience to love our neighbors.

We continue the five-part Beacon article series on the 'Theories of Atonement.' All Christians believe that the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus saves us from our sins and reconciles us to God. However, there are many explanations as to **how** the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus does this. We call these explanations 'theories of atonement.' Last month (April), we discussed the 'Ransom theory'. This month (May) we discuss the 'Christ as Victor theory.' In June,



we will discuss the 'Satisfaction/penal substitution theory'; in July, the 'Recapitulation/Divinization theory'; and lastly, in August, the 'Moral example/Scapegoat theory'.

During sermons, I often say something like, "Jesus willingly experienced death so He could defeat death on our behalf." This is a reference to the 'Christ as Victor' theory of atonement. This theory emphasizes the victory of the resurrection. According to it, the resurrection provides two cosmic size victories.

The first victory that the resurrection provides is the triumph of the Kingdom of God over the worldly kingdom. The Kingdom of God triumphs, not with might, power, and oppression, but with sacrificial love. Jesus went to the cross out of love for us.

When Jesus died on the cross, the Roman Emperor, religious leaders, Satan, and all the forces of evil thought they defeated God and God's kingdom. But, when Jesus rose from the dead, he showed that no one could defeat him or his kingdom! Let's remember this the next time we face a crisis or feel the weight of oppression. We may sometimes lose a battle, but we'll never lose the war!

The second victory provided by the resurrection is the defeat of death and this guarantees our eternal life. To understand this, we must first realize that we are all sinners. Every one of us has thought, said, or done something that is unloving. Sin separates us from God, who is the originator & sustainer of life. Therefore, the consequence of sin is death. The Lord, however, still loves us. It's God's nature to love us. First John, chapter 4 states that God literally is love. Our loving God does not want to see any of us get what we deserve – death. So, God offers us forgiveness and destroys death. Jesus, as fully God and fully human, allowed the religious leaders and Roman authorities to murder him so he could face death and defeat death on our behalf. With death defeated, we can receive God's forgiveness and enjoy an eternal and loving relationship with God. To take advantage of Jesus' victory over death, we must receive God's freely offered forgiveness and repent of our sins. Once we receive God's forgiveness, we begin an eternal, loving relationship with God. Repentance is the Holy Spirit empowered decision to change. We open our hearts to God's grace so that God's grace can change the attitudes, desires, and motivations deep within our hearts. In this way, we become more like Christ and God uses us to spread God's love and proclaim God's kingdom.

The following Bible passages emphasize "Christ as Victor." Take the time to slowly meditate on these passages: 1 Corinthians 15:1-58, Hebrews 2:9 &14-15, Romans 6:9, 1 John 5:4.



Our six-year journey to the new brand unveiling included a period of discernment, a Covid disruption, and going through the process of identification and selection. It is reflective of a time-tested ministry that has long enjoyed a strong connection with Methodist churches around the state. Our commitment to these longstanding partnerships remains steadfast.

In selecting a new name, we wanted a name that reflected the organization we have become while staying true to our history. It also reflects our steadfast mission as a faith-based organization: *Empower children and families to experience the transforming love of Christ through evidence-based care and holistic services*.

The word *Hope* is commonly used to mean a wish or desire. But in the Bible, hope is the confident expectation of what God has promised and the strength of His faithfulness. *Residing Hope* defines us both figuratively and literally, as the place where hope lives and grows. Our new logo thoughtfully demonstrates who we are and reflects our mission and values. Each component tells part of the story of Residing Hope.

The *cross* in the logo represents our commitment to our faith-based values and recognizes our rich history as a methodist organization.

The *residing heart* reflects the love and care provided through all of Residing Hope's services.

The *sunrise rays* are indicative of the hope found in a new day. It also speaks to the hopeful futures that our children and youth are able to find at Residing Hope.

The *uplifted hands* in worship demonstrate hope and the promise of transformation that can be found through faith and prayer.

Pentecost: A Birthday Celebration

Brothers and Sisters,

May God's grace give us the necessary joy, peace, and patience to love our neighbors.

IMAGINE!!! You are part of a small Jewish sect called 'The Way'. It is the day of Pentecost but, instead of celebrating, you and your fellow believers are confused, anxious, and scared. Fifty-three days ago, the Romans brutally crucified Jesus, whom you believe to be the Son of God. You believe this because of the many eyewitness accounts of the risen Jesus. Ten days ago, the Apostles saw the risen Jesus ascend into heaven, leaving you and your fellow believers alone to face the skeptical religious establishment and cruel Roman government.



Then, suddenly, a sound like the blowing of a violent wind comes from heaven and fills the whole house where you and your fellow believers are sitting. You see what seems like tongues of fire come to rest on each person. It is the Holy Spirit filling and empowering all the believers! You all begin to supernaturally speak in foreign languages and hundreds of Jews from all over the Roman Empire can understand you.

The Christian Church calls this event 'Pentecost,' and you can read about it in Acts 2. It is the Birthday of the church because, on this day, the Holy Spirit started to empower the body of believers to be the church.

This year Pentecost is Sunday, May 19, 2024. After worship, we will have a birthday party in the fellowship hall. The birthday cake will have 2,000+ candles on it. (Just kidding).

Since it is the Church's birthday, we should all give a gift to the church. From now until May 19, there will be a birthday box in the sanctuary. Each person will receive a birthday card to fill out and place in the birthday box. On the birthday card, each person will write what gift(s) they will give to the church.

The following are some gift suggestions:

- 1. Commit to pray for BMUMC everyday at 2:13. (Why 2:13 PM? That's when Pastor David prays for BMUMC. In military time, 2:13 pm is 14:13 and John 14:13 says, "And I [Jesus] will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son."

- 3. Volunteering at the Food Pantry.
- 4. Volunteering at the Child Development Center.
- 5. Building a compost for the church.
- 6. Volunteering to help Betsy in the office.
- 7. Making a monetary donation to the church in addition to the tithes you already give.
- 8. Contribute money to build a closet around the fellowship hall air conditioning units.
- 9. Asking the Trustees what minor repair/clean-up work they can do.
- 10. Volunteer with children ministry or re-start youth ministry.
- 11. Donate yarn for the knitting group
- 12. A morning of yard work at church
- 13. Trying a new spot in church
- 14. Hosting a covered dish or the after church social time.
- 15. Be a liturgist for the first time.
- 16. Purchase music in memory or honor of someone.
- 17. Underwrite the permit fees for the new bathrooms.
- 18. Start/join a small group.

- 19. Volunteer to cook in God's kitchen.
- 20. Give towards our apportionments.
- 21. Anything else you can think of to help the church.

The first and second gift suggestions are the most powerful gifts you can give. At the very least, commit to giving one of those two gifts.

After Pentecost, we will distribute the birthday cards to the right people so they can help you with your gift.
