PUT ON THE SPLENDOR OF GOD'S GLORY

Baruch 5:1-9; Psalm 126:1-6; Phil. 1:4-6, 8-11; Luke 3:1-6

On the first Sunday of Advent Prophet Jeremiah exhorted the Hebrews who were exiled and oppressed in Babylon not to despair because "The days are coming, says the Lord, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and Judah." God's promise for us is that of hope for "a better future," not despair. On the other hand, today's readings call us to repentance and new beginnings. Advent is a time of grace that presents us with an opportunity to spiritually 'start over' our lives. It invites us to true conversion.

You and I are often caught up in a web of anxieties. We are often confronted with trepidation and despair when we are faced with challenges or difficult situations. When we are overwhelmed with the demands of daily lives, we sometimes resort to various forms of *escapism*. We often distract ourselves with hobbies that we like and those that we do not like - we go drinking and get drunk - we go shopping needlessly - we take the children to numerous recreational activities - we just float around like a boat in the sea tossed about by the wind. The demands we sometimes make of ourselves in life can often be overwhelming and stressful. They can eventually leave us feeling empty, and tempted to fill in the *vacuum* with unwarranted desires.

The people of Israel were in a similar situation! They were faced with challenges after the Babylonians had destroyed Jerusalem and took many of their people captive. They lost hope that Jerusalem would ever be rebuilt, and were fearful that the exiles would be spending the rest of their lives in a foreign land. They had lost hope of true happiness, which comes from Almighty God alone. Thus, they wandered aimlessly, pursuing other gods in idols and material things. They were inadvertently trying to escape from the challenges they were facing, distancing themselves from God Who had promised to bring to fulfillment the covenant He has made with them through their ancestors. Their trust in God was waning, thus, Prophet Baruch exhorted them to "take off your robe of mourning and misery; put on the splendor of glory from God forever."

As Christians, you and I must be different - we ought to be people of hope! Advent is a time we are exhorted to wait with greater anticipation for peace, joy and happiness, when the Lord appears. This is not the time to grieve or be sad. It is not the time to doubt or be anxious, but it is time for you to "stand upon the heights...and see your children gathered from the east and the west at the word of the Holy One, rejoicing that they are remembered by God." Rather than being anxious and despondent, and wondering whether the Lord will return, and how it will affect you; rather than employing various forms of distractions and means of escapism, you and I must abide by what the scripture urges us to do, if we truly want to receive the Prince of Peace worthily into our hearts and souls. You and I must "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight His paths." With much anticipation and hope for the coming of the Lord, we must ensure "every valley to be filled in, and every mountain and hill to be made low; and the rugged land to be made plain ... " This, we must do by minimizing the time we spend fulfilling the demands of our social and corporate life. We need to spend more time with God in prayer, meditations and confessing our sins. Advent urges you and me to trust and believe that "the One Who began a good work in you will continue to complete it" if you sincerely trust in Him. I am very much thankful and indebted to these parishioners for their generosity, and I pray God to bless and reward them abundantly.



IT'S TIME TO CONFESS YOUR SINS IN THIS YEAR OF FAITH



Once again as we enter into the final period of preparation for Christmas, the Church offers us a unique opportunity to examine our hearts and minds and cleanse our souls in the Sacrament of Penance on Monday, December 17th.

Almost every parish has set aside that afternoon and evening to welcome all the faithful. Because it is a universal experience in our Archdiocese we can stop by any church and be assured that

there will be a priest present to assist in reconciling oneself to God and to the Church. If you harbor any doubts about its effectiveness in raising our spirit and giving greater meaning to the season I ask you only to return to those days of our youth. As the priest gave us our penance, we recited the Act of Contrition and received absolution, was there not a great weight lifted from us? Did we not experience a joy that we felt at no other time? Before going any further let us put our cards on the table. If it has been some time since receiving the sacrament, then realize the form of the ritual has not changed substantially. The priest will guide you. And yes, if you forgot the Act of Contrition, you can bring a cheat sheet. There might even be one in the confessional itself.

But what should I say? What sins did I commit? I can't remember them all. Let us take each issue. When we sin we can do so by committing or omitting certain actions. We should reflect on both sides of the coin. Did we do something that was wrong that injured our relationship with God or man or was there an opportunity in witness or charity that I failed to fulfill? We are told by the Church that to make a good confession we must admit to all mortal sins and be conscious as well of venial ones. If one has been away for some time, it is very possible that we will miss some of both kinds of sins. We must make a good faith effort to recall those offenses which are more serious. This is where a good examination of conscious is necessary. We must spend some time prior to entering the confessional reflecting on our life and its pitfalls. If one forgets and later remembers a serious or less serious sin, we need not run back to the confessional. It has been forgiven as long as we did not make a conscious attempt not to mention it.

Time and space only permit us to look at the first three commandments to begin an examination of our lives. We are not to have any strange gods before the Lord our God. I think most of us are safe from any golden calf adoration, but what about gold itself? Do we pursue material gain without any reference to the fact that we are denying God a proper place in our lives? Does the dollar in our pocket motivate us more than the divine spark which gives us life? Do we take the name of the Lord in vain? Do we swear to something false asking God to be complicit in our moral failure? Do we let fly with blasphemous tones at the Jets, politicians, our spouses, especially in front of young people? Do we acknowledge that the obligation to attend Mass on Sunday is just one part of maintaining the Lord's Day? Do we on that day and every day praise God for His providential care? Do we offer prayer frequently during our day using the scripture as our touchstone? These are just a few thoughts to start us on the path to the 17th. Give your priest a great gift: keep him busy reconciling his people to God.
