

HARDWOOD ENDURO RESULTS

Hardwood Enduro

Chadwick MO., Oct 15 '95

The 28th Annual Hardwood Enduro belonged to Steve Leivan on his Surdyke Yamaha of Marionville/ M/C Stuff/ Pro-Action Suspension/ Answer/ Sprocket Specialist/ Dunlop/ Mike's Machine/ Camelbak/ Scott/ RK Chain sponsored WR-250 Yamaha.

The second to last event on the Black Jack Enduro schedule featured dusty conditions under clear skies and grueling special test sections in tight, off-camber, extremely technical terrain. Rusty Reynaud (BJEC Hall of Fame member from the early '80s and Six-day rider from that same era) came out of retirement to challenge Leivan on his Surdyke Yamaha of Marionville/ Wayne Beindorf sponsored WR-250 Yamaha, coming up one point short at the end of 65 miles with 12 points to Leivans 11.

Dwight Maggard also on a Surdyke Yamaha of Marionville WR-250 turned in a 13 for the day which was good enough for third Overall and Overall A. Surdyke Yamaha of Marionville owner, Steve Underwood carded a 17 in the hotly contested A-Open class for the win, besting Mike Shown, owner of Mike's Machine by one point.

The Hardwood Enduro Team presented an event that featured several speed changes with relatively easy transport sections broken up by special test sections that had everyone dropping points. Vincent Davis ('95 Junior Team Six-day rider) showed up unannounced, for the first time since breaking his back several months ago in a local Hare Scramble to work the second tie-breaker check bringing smiles to many riders faces to see him up and getting around.

Leivans win at this event takes the BJEC year end Overall honors to the last event provided by the Tulsa Trail Riders and puts the pressure on Steve Travis and his Green Country Honda/ Fox Racing/ Steahly Products/ FMF/ Mike's Machine/ Acerbis backed Honda CR-250 to hold him off.

The "Clean Scene"

The biggest news in the trials scene is that the Mid America Trials Team (MATT) will host a national event in 1996. It will be a two day event held sometime in September at their usual riding grounds at the quarry near the Kansas City airport.

Dale Malasek (MR. Gas-Gas) will be the trials marshall. Dale is the Gas Gas importer and National Trials competitor from Kansas City.

New from Gas Gas is a dual Sport bike that is a cross between a true trials machine and an enduro bike (enduro type seat, wide ratio gearing, passenger pegs, and a claimed weight of 187 lbs.) It also promises the option of switching the seats at will for trials competition sounds COOL! This dual sport, known as the Pampera 250, could be the perfect answer for the wife and/or pit bike, allowing quick conversion for some quality trials stuff by guess who "You!"

Ozark Mountain Trials (OMT) holds a monthly trial at the Eagle Ranch (formerly Brushbusters) on the first Sunday of every month. All are welcome to come and ride.

Hard Rock Enduro/Qualifier?

The last event on the '95 BJEC schedule was held at Camp Gruber (Muskogee, OK) and while billed as a European Enduro, looked, felt, and therefore was (at least to me) a qualifier. The Tulsa Trail Riders and Trail Boss, Tim Haslet did an outstanding job of picking some very good trail including, short, but technical, special test sections.
