We lost John Brahaney at nationals this year. I knew John as a big hearted Irishman, always friendly and never a harsh word. ARTISAN'S FAIR

Several years ago for convention I arranged a gun maker's fair. Expanding on that idea, and as a tribute to the many talented folks who are the Members of the WSMLA, we are going to have a room set up at the 2008 Convention to display your handcrafted items. Please bring a couple of items you have made for everyone to see and enjoy. I will have tables set up in one of the meeting rooms. There may be some room for a few larger stand-alone items but check with me before you lug over a full sized totem pole or full-sized bronze buffalo you made last winter!

Items to display? Items that fit in with muzzle loading, buck skinning, or the historic period we are interested in. Some examples that come to mind include muzzle loading firearms of course, but also accoutrements like powder horns, shooting bags, tools, pistol presentation cases, etc. Hand crafted buckskin or leather items such as clothing articles, moccasins, bags, par fleche boxes, equestrian accessories, etc. would be great. Hand or loom woven textiles, dresses, moccasins, sashes, would be fine too. Beadwork, jewelry, knives, scrimshaw, antler art, hand forged tools, pottery, and wooden items are good too. Fine art such as oil paintings or water colors would also be most welcome if the subject matter is time period appropriate, an outdoor landscape, a portrait, or animals for example. Anything that would be of general interest to our members "fits" what to bring. Uncertain about the appropriateness of an item? Not only is this an opportunity for all of us including the general public to enjoy seeing something you have proudly crafted, this fair will hopefully stimulate some latent creativity and sharing of ideas on how to fabricate or make various items. Here is the only rule: It is not the place to display your items to sell; no visible price tags will be permitted. If you want to display things to sell, buy a trade table for the weekend. If someone expresses interest in buying an item, you can certainly do that at the end of the convention when the fair is finished.

There will still be a photo contest so bring your photography for display in a separate area. We will use the same categories as in previous years; scenery and wildlife, hunting and shooting, camp life, and humorous. Photos can be B & W or color and should be $8" \times 10"$ and mounted. Photos can also be matted but should not be framed.

WYOMING BLACK POWDER SHOOTERS FORM STATE ORGANIZATION

Representatives from the Wyoming muzzle loading clubs and other interested shooters held a meeting in Casper, Wyoming on January 21, 1978 for an all out attempt at uniting the black powder sportmen of the state.

In past years the muzzle loading clubs around the state have scheduled matches for the shooting season only to discover others have picked the same weekend. Attendance was down at all the shoots, so it was decided that a joint effort was in order.

From this meeting THE WYOMING STATE MUZZLE LOADING ASSOCIATION was born. The first officers of the newly formed organization are Bill Jennings of Buffalo - President, Travis Bennett of Riverton - Vice President, and Donald J. McCandlish of Laramie - Sec.-Tres.

The W.S.M.L.A. recognized eleven major muzzle loading matches and events around the state for the 1978 season, and proceeded to make up a calendar of events, which will be sent to all clubs, members, and interested persons. The high light of the 1978 season will be the first two day shooting event designated as a Wyoming State Match. The match will be July 15th & 16th. The match will be held in the vicinity of Casper, Wyoming, with the exact loaction given at a later date.

An appointed committee is presently designing membership cards which will be issued as soon as possible. Dues for the Wyoming State Muzzle Loading Association are \$2.00 per year and will be required to participate in the Association's activities. Membership cards will be issued on a "first-comebasis" and will be numbered accordingly. Anyone wishing to join the State Association is asked to send two dollars along with their name and address to Donald J. McCandlish, 164 N. 3rd., Laramie, Wyoming 82070.

Funeral services for Edward N. Green, 66, of Sheridan were held September 6, 2007, at St. Peter's Episcopal Church with the Rev. Kevin Jones officiating. Burial will be in Sheridan Municipal Cemetery with military rites by the American Legion and Wyoming National Guard under direction of Champion Ferries Funeral Home. Sheridan Elks Lodge 520 will host a celebration of life reception following the services. Viewing will be 11 a.m.-7 p.m. Wednesday at the funeral home. Mr. Green died Sept. 2, 2007, in Billings Clinic Hospital. He was born Oct. 4, 1940, in Sheridan to Harry and Louise (Johnston) Green. He graduated from high school in Sheridan and enlisted in the Air Force. He was stationed in Korea and returned to Sheridan after his service. He married Vikki Jones on June 20, 1964, in Sheridan. He worked as a barber for several years before joining the Sheridan Fire Department. He rose to the rank of captain before retiring in 1995 after 26 years of service. He then drove a school bus for several years. He was a member of St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Sheridan County Sportsmen's Association, Wyoming Muzzleloading Association, Sheridan Bull Shooter's Club, National Rifle Association, National Muzzleloading Association, the YMCA, and International Association of Firefighters Local 276. An avid NASCAR fan, he also enjoyed playing cribbage, cooking, riding his Harley, horseback riding, hunting and other outdoor activities, and being with his grandchildren. COPPER LADY'S VITTLES

Raspberry Shrub

Want to try a new refreshing drink? Try Raspberry Shrub, described in Home on the Range, by Cathy Luchetti.

Place red raspberries in a stone jar; cover them with good cider vinegar, let stand overnight. The next morning, strain. To one pint of juice add one pint of sugar. Boil ten minutes and bottle while hot.

Elk Roast

Elk meat is a precious commodity and makes a grand dinner. A delicious way to prepare your elk is described in *the Old Fashioned Dutch Oven Cookbook*, by Don Holm.

At home before you set out, you might want to prepare a barbecue sauce of 1 Cup tomato catsup, ¼ Cup vinegar, 2 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce, 1 pat of butter, 2 slices lemon (or 1 Tbsp. lime juice), 1 chopped onion, 1 Tbsp. salt, ¼ tsp. cinnamon and allspice.

A couple of hours before you plan to eat, preheat your Dutch oven and fry up some bacon to use as drippings. Lay the elk meat in the over to sear and cover with your barbecue sauce. Cook for 1-2 hours over moderate heat.

Mohawk corn

A good compliment to the elk roast would be Mohawk Corn prepared according to *The Book of Buckskinning III*.

While the elk cooks, cut 4 Cups fresh corn from the cob and place in a saucepan to cook gently until the corn is tender.

Drain off most of the liquid, and add 2 Tbsp. lard, ½ Cup shelled black walnuts and ¼ Cup Maple (or brown) sugar. Stir until lard melts, and sugar coats the corn.

Baked Apples

Round out the meal with a piece of fruit. Bury the apples in the embers and let cook until tender which may take up to an hour. These may be mud packed, rolled in foil, or baked in their skins. A delicious touch is provided by a bit of butter and brown sugar spooned into the center of the apple cut open after it is cooked.

The Aggregate was one by Bruce Schwindt with a 141



Dear Sir:


I am writing in response to your request for additional information in Block 3 of the accident report form. I put 'poor planning' as the cause of my accident. You asked for a fuller explanation and I trust the following details will be sufficient.

I am a bricklayer by trade. On the day of the accident, I was working alone on the roof of a new six story building. When I completed my work, I found that I had some bricks left over which, when weighed later, were found to be slightly in excess of 500 lbs. Rather than carry the bricks down by hand, I decided to lower them in a barrel by using a pulley, which was attached to the side of the building on the sixth floor. Securing the rope at ground level, I went up to the roof, swung the barrel out and loaded the bricks into it. Then I went down and untied the rope, holding it tightly to ensure a slow descent of the bricks. You will note in Block 11 of the accident report form that I weigh 175 lbs. Due to my surprise at being jerked off the ground so suddenly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope. Needless to say, I proceeded at a rapid rate up the side of the building.

In the vicinity of the third floor, I met the barrel which was now proceeding downward at an equal, impressive speed. This explained the fractured skull, minor abrasions and the broken collar bone, as listed in section 3 of the accident report form. Slowed only slightly, I continued my rapid ascent, not stopping until the fingers of my right hand were two knuckles deep into the pulley. Fortunately by this time I had regained my presence of mind and was able to hold tightly to the rope, in spite of beginning to experience a great deal of pain. At approximately the same time, however, the barrel of bricks hit the ground and the bottom fell out of the barrel. Now devoid of the weight of the bricks, that barrel weighed approximately 50 lbs. I refer you again to my weight.

As you can imagine, I began a rapid descent, down the side of the building. In the vicinity of the third floor, I met the barrel coming up. This accounts for the two fractured ankles, broken tooth and several lacerations of my legs and lower body. Here my luck began to change slightly. The encounter with the barrel seemed to slow me enough to lessen my injuries when I fell into the pile of bricks and fortunately only three vertebrae were cracked. I am sorry to report, however, as I lay there on the pile of bricks, in pain unable to move, I again lost my composure and presence of mind and let go of the rope and I lay there watching the empty barrel begin its
