Happy Fall Everyone! Hope you all had a great summer!

As many of our CCWs are getting back into meetings and activities, I thought I could provide some information about bridging the gap between generations. Hopefully this information can help us all communicate with other generations, as well as making our CCW meetings, activities, and community appealing to all generations.

Some strategies to help bridge the Gaps:

Open Communication – Different generations have different communication styles. Some prefer Face to Face and Phone calls, while others prefer Electronic communications. Discuss within your CCW and even with members of the Parish, what their preferred communication styles are and find some options to get the communication to more people. In meetings and gatherings, emphasize the importance of clarity in communication to try to avoid misunderstandings or conflict. Create a safe environment for all to be able to share their ideas. Encourage explanations and history of why

things are done they way they are, yet be open to new and different ideas. Don't get stuck in the "We have always done it that way" without offering why that is. Encourage flexibility and patience within the group.

Support learning from each other – Implement mentorship – and not always the older generation mentoring the newer, reverse it, have the newer generation mentor the older. This helps facilitate knowledge exchange across generations. Younger can share expertise in technology and innovation, while the older can share their experience and wisdom. I know getting volunteers can be challenging, however try to pair up different generations as "chairs" or "leads" for different projects, activities, etc. Having some one-on-one interaction can help bond and build deeper relationships to form. Avoid stereotyping and generalizing of generations. Each person is an individual and shouldn't be lumped into a generation stereotype. Although may not be popular at first, maybe do seat assignments, have people count off and set people of a number at a table or moving people before meeting starts, just to break up the groups who always sit together,

Planning cross-generational activities – Look at varying schedules for meetings or activities. Try some daytime, later evening, weekends to try to increase participation. Find ways to incorporate your CCW members with the girls/young women in the Confirmation Class or youth group and vice versa. Talk with the CCW about maybe having some other groups started – an exercise group, Mommy group (include some mentor Moms), Craft group, Book Club. Freshen up your publicity and use multiple media forms – Posters, Announcements at Mass (more impactful if done by a woman from the CCW), webpages, texts, emails, Facebook, Instagram, etc. Keep changing things, don't get stuck in the same old rut. Try reversing the agenda, different themes for the meetings, try new activities and fundraisers, different speakers and topics.

Service - Christine Corley

It has been my experience that most women, and particularly those in a community who are actively looking to serve God by serving others, are already aware of where the needs are. We may or may not know everyone's names, but we see the parishioner coming in on crutches, the notice of an upcoming funeral in the bulletin, and the new names added to the list of mass intentions. We pass along prayer requests as members of our councils go through struggles. And as we pray for all of those in need, sometimes we feel called to do more. But, as you may have experienced, that can get overwhelming quickly.

At our last meeting, I mentioned that I see my role as Service Commission Chair not just as a person who points out needs and opportunities for service, but as someone who helps you to find the tools needed to meet those needs. To that end, I would like to suggest pre-made care packages that can be passed out as needed – at mass, at your meetings, or while delivering someone a meal. To make things simpler, your council might consider starting with a number of base care packages that can be customized according to the occasion. Just determine how many you would like to make and either purchase the items as a council or ask your members to donate them, then take a meeting to assemble and label the packages (perhaps in ziptop bags for easy storage, with gift bags and tissue paper to transfer them to as needed). Some suggestions follow:

Basic Catholic care package:

- Prayer card
- Rosary
- Guide to the rosary book or pamphlet
- Miraculous medal
- Mug
- Tea assortment

For a medical patient:

- Puzzle book (crossword, sudoku, wordsearch, etc)
- Deck of cards
- Lotion

For a new parent:

- Small baby items
- Coupon for babysitting or house cleaning
- Holy Family print or statue

For someone grieving:

- Book about grief from a faith perspective
- Information about local support groups
- Perpetual mass card

We know that we can serve Christ by serving the people He loves (spoiler alert: that's everyone!) and we know that we build our community when we provide support to one another when it is most needed. That doesn't mean that it needs to be a last-minute rush each time to gather items or get funds approved. Life will continue to happen, and we can plan ahead to be there for our community members when it does.
