Thank you to everyone who attended the 2019 Royal Ridge Neighborhood Association annual meeting on Oct. 1 at the Royal Ridge Clubhouse. As is our tradition the meeting coincided with our National Night Out.

We had a fairly thin turnout of 55 people, including our SAFFE representative from **SAPD Officer Dennis Quinn** and two Explorer cadets, plus four representatives from San Antonio Fire Department Ladder 40 crew. Yet we still got a lot accomplished.

First, thank you to **Janet Latiolais** for her faithful service as secretary of the Royal Ridge Neighborhood Association board for more than a decade. **Janet** has hung up her pen for the board, although she remains a faithful contributor to the Royal Ridge Recorder as the Garden Homes II reporter and as the coordinator of the monthly ladies luncheon.

Stepping into her shoes as the new secretary will be **Sue Hassell**, who has been very active in the neighborhood and with Patio Homes II. Thank you **Sue** for volunteering to take on this duty as the new board member.

Also joining the board to fill the vacant vice president position is **Mario Lockwood**, who also is a very familiar presence in the neighborhood. Our past president **Lee Mays** remains a valued counsel to the board. I look forward to working with our new board members.

For those of you who did not attend, here are the meeting minutes as taken by **Janet Latiolais**:

"Meeting was called to order by **Dan Calderón**, President of the HOA at 6:30 PM. The Pledge of Allegiance was said by the residents. **Dan** called **Dennis Quinn** of the San Antonio Police Department to come forth to address the audience so he could go to other neighborhoods. He gave a shout-out to **Bob Robbins** who has been in charge of the neighborhood COPS for 20+ years. **Officer Quinn** also introduced two high school students who came who are interested in police and are in their student program.

Old Business: **Janet Latiolais**, secretary, gave the minutes to the 2018 meeting and it was approved by those

attending. The treasurer was not there so there was no report. It was reported that approximately \$1,500 is in the treasury.

Diane Luna gave an update on the pool and the club activities. The membership for 2019-2020 is 125 members. She also mentioned **Cindy Manes** and the good response from residents using the pool in the mornings for adult swimming only. She also gave the dates and information concerning the upcoming Boo Bash on October 19th.

She also mentioned the dates and time for the semiannual Rummage sale for the neighborhood. A spaghetti meal for \$6 will be available. She thanked the people helping with the clubhouse and pool while she's been out sick. She spoke about her illness and we all wish her well.

Dan then asked for decision concerning the newsletter. Jeanette Gittinger told the residents the steps for getting the physical copy of it to the doorstep. The question was presented whether or not to keep the letter as is, reduce it to online only or eliminate it completely. Discussion followed and the matter was tabled until January after another two issues are produced. This allows for more time for the newsletter discussion to reach more residents.

Bob Robbins gave an update on the neighborhood COPS program. He's always needs more volunteers. Records show a strong COPS help to keep a neighborhood much safer. The phone number to reach SAPD: 210-207-SAPD.

Anna Lou Eisner, a civilian volunteer with the San Antonio Police Department, addressed the group. She wants people to know there are many departments where volunteers are welcome to help the police as a civilian.

Dan also spoke about the upkeep of the landscaping at the entries. He would like to see a set schedule of date/time to be set bi-monthly to keep the entries neat. He feels if the schedule is set in advance, more volunteers will come out to help.

Lee Larson spoke about a new program that came to the swimming pool this summer through a shop in Universal City. The shop, Duggan Diving, rented the pool once a month to use for training. This brought in additional monies to help the pool/clubhouse. The owner hopes to be able to use the pool again in 2020.

There were five firefighters from station 40 who stopped in for NNO and to take questions.

Elections were called for president. **Dan Calderon** will remain president for the next two years. The empty vice president slot was filled by **Mario Lockwood**. And the secretary position was filled by **Sue Hassell**. These positions are two-year commitments.

Door prize drawings were given out throughout the meeting. Forty-seven residents attended with eight guests. Dan adjourned the meeting at 7:45 p.m."

Thanks again to everyone including Bob Robbins, who wrangled the door prizes for the meeting from our sponsors El Folklor Bakery, Walgreens, Lowe's, Wal-Mart and the Royal Ridge Recreational Club.

First, a big thank you to all who helped prepare for, conduct, attend and participate in the October 1 RRNA Annual Meeting and city-wide National Night Out gathering. Fewer people attended than in prior years for the second year in a row but the meeting was well attended nonetheless, and we got to know one another better as we dialogued with neighborhood and civic leaders. Thanks to all involved for your interest, support and engagement.

Second, I'd be remiss if I didn't once again plead for greater participation in the RR COP program. Without new members we cannot continue as we have in the past, i.e. someone patrolling our neighborhoods an average of two hours each day. We announced the last opportunity to attend the required four-hour SAPD training this year with the early November class by email and via NextDoor but I can't know if anyone will attend as I write this. Here's hoping!

SAPD COP classes will resume again in January. The 2020 schedule has not been announced yet but the first class is usually held the first Saturday in January, i.e. January 4, 2020. We'll get the exact date out as it becomes available but plan now on attending from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. It's fun, informative and there is no quiz or exam. Participation also entitles you to a ride-along with a patrol officer, which you can schedule at a mutually agreeable time. Attend the class and join us in patrolling our neighborhood as an extra set of eyes and ears for the SAPD. We need several more neighbors to join us in assisting the SAPD and us in our safety and security efforts!

And lastly, a reminder to refresh ourselves and our families of holiday safety in and around our homes, in our neighborhoods, while shopping, entertaining guests, traveling, etc.

We still see reports of several thefts and burglaries, including vehicle and mail thefts, in our neighborhoods each month and that sometime heightens during the holiday season with decoration thieves, items stolen from unsecured personal and quest vehicles, porch pirates etc.

Watch out for yourselves, your loved ones and your neighbors. Let the ne'er-do-wells know they are not welcome here and arrange a meeting between them and the SAPD. **Call SAPD on their non-emergency number**

P.S. We heard of one mail thief arrested in mid-October where the victims were notified by SAPD. We also learned a new Texas statute effective September 1 allows SAPD to now file charges for mail thefts instead of referring them to federal officials. That is a welcome change, and we're told it came as a surprise to this career criminal.

Bottom line: Report all crimes no matter how small or whether you think the criminal may be found out. That information may well produce the lead that results in an arrest and prosecution.


