New outdoor play equipment donated to Nurturing Center

Big people with big hearts showed up at the Nurturing Center to do something good for little people, now with happy hearts. Volunteers last week assembled much-needed outdoor play equipment for the kids at the group home.

The work party included John and Kathy Schmid, Lockley Joe Bremner, Wendy Bremner Running Crane, and Custom Harvesting Crew Jon Detweiler, Curran Howell, Katie Schmid, Kate Wenger and Kirsten Detweiler.

The commercial-quality play equipment should last for many years and was a gift from the American Indian Partnership (AIP), who raised the money through their Blackfeet Children's Christmas Fund. The purchase was made possible by a large donation from Tony Sitzmann, whose donations over the years have provided hundreds of gifts for Blackfeet children.

A spokesman for AIP said Sitzmann has

made major contributions every year since the Blackfeet Children's Christmas Fund began in 2009 and never specifies how his donations are to be spent. But this year unbeknownst to him, his contribution covered most of the cost of the outdoor play equipment AIP had hoped to purchase for the Nurturing Center. So, thank you, Tony!

AIP also recently ordered a climbing dome for delivery in November. This Christmas they hope to raise enough money in addition to their usual annual gift giving to purchase more toys, play and activity equipment and electronics for the kids at the Nurturing Center, as well as for other group and foster homes and households with large numbers of children.

AIP also wants to thank Wendy and Lockley who, for three years in a row, have volunteered and done much of the planning and legwork to ensure donor money is spent in a way that brings the most joy, fun and positive impact to the neediest Blackfeet children on the reservation.
