Food pantry receives Iowa County Community Foundation Grant

The Iowa County Community Foundation (ICCF) announced its 2022 grant awards distribution to 13 projects of organizations serving Iowa County through its 2022 grant cycle.

One such grant in the Human Service category went to the Amana Church Society, Amana Food Pantry Facility Renovation, \$8,500

Decisions on grant awards are determined by a local committee, which consists of volunteers from Iowa County.

Grants are awarded through ICCF's competitive grant process to projects in the program areas of arts and culture, community betterment, education and youth development, environment and animal welfare, health and human service.

Grant applicants must be a 501(c)(3) designated organization or government entity serving Iowa County in order to be considered for funding. The 2023 grant cycle opens January 1 with an application deadline of April 1. The grant guidelines and application can be found at www.iowaccf.org.

EXPANDED COMMUNAL KITCHEN OPENS

The Amana Heritage Society (AHS) is opening the newly-expanded Communal Kitchen Museum, one of the most historically-significant properties in the Amana Colonies—National Historic Landmark. This 1863 structure served as one of over fifty communal kitchen feeding a communal-era population peaking at 1,800 members around 1890.

The Ruedy Home and Communal Kitchen Museum is significant in several ways. The property retains all of its original structures—residence, communal kitchen, wash house, woodshed, and chicken house. During modernization in the Amanas, many wash houses and woodsheds were demolished. Today, visitors can see a new, historic print shop and book bindery that tells the story of Amana's two centuries of print history.

The most interesting feature is the original communal kitchen and dining hall that remain intact as they were from 1863-1932. In 1955, the kitchen and dining room opened as a museum to a public eager to learn about communal life. The AHS leased the Communal Kitchen Museum since 1983. Over the past decade the Ruedy family has been generously donating its extensive artifact collection to be kept with the site.

Owning the entire property now allows AHS to offer a wider range of interpretation of Amana's culinary heritage, how the kitchens functioned, and the high degree of organization in this highly-successful planned community. Authentic communal dinners have been a major part of programming for many years, along with sampling opportunities that will expand.

The Communal Kitchen Museum (along with the cooper shop, historic print shop & book bindery) is open to the public Mon-Sat 10-5. Admission is \$10 to see it and two other museum sites, the Amana Heritage Museum and the Homestead Village Church.

COLONIES IN BLOOM

The colonies are exploding with flowers as the gardeners of Amana show off their work at the 7th annual "Colonies in Bloom" this summer on June 25 and July 23. Everyone with a green thumb will love this opportunity to view specially selected private gardens that will be open to the public on these two days.

The Amana Colonies have long been known for their beautiful flower gardens. These gardens have become an Amana tradition since the end of the communal era in 1932.

One of the gardens that will be open to the public has been featured in Midwest Living. This impressive garden is just one of several extensive gardens/yards highlighted by "Colonies in Bloom". You'll see a variety of gardening styles and plants. Some yards feature very traditional Amana Colonies plantings and others more unusual plants. The gardeners will be present at each home to answer questions.

Colonies in Bloom will be held on two dates giving visitors a chance to see the changes that take place as spring moves into summer and each variety of flower hits its peak.

MY AMANA EXPERIENCE

Last weekend saw another annual event here in the Amana Colonies- Wurst Fest. To find out what sort of preparations were required to feed all those folks I spoke with Tim Blattner, Production Manager at the Amana Meat Shop, and Jamie Scott, Manager of the Amana RV Park & Event Center. Jamie handles the second most important item on the menu- the beer.

Tim told me that the Meat Shop prepares for Wurst Fest by making and stockpiling approximately 2,000 brats throughout the year. An arsenal of meat, if you will. There were four flavors of brats this year- traditional, Hawaiian (with Canadian bacon and pineapple), cheddar jalapeno, and bock wurst.

Meat Shop team members not only work the grill at the Meat Shop's Market Barn booth, they also keep the shop open during its regular hours for those who would like to bring a taste of the Amanas home with them. I have it on good authority that there was a line out the door on Saturday morning. Kudos to the Meat Shop staff for their hard work and dedication, it does not go unnoticed!

On the beer side of the equation, Jamie showed me the beer trailer used for events, which can hold up over 50 kegs when necessary. Among other beverages, Millstream Brewing's Lime Pilsner and Peach Kolsch were featured as well as the "Wurst Beer." According the Jamie, when it gets hot it's good to have lighter beers available.

Volunteers are critical to "staff the beer taps" since the majority of the RV Park staff is needed at the park. Many local nonprofits such as Miracles in Motion in Swisher volunteer for Wurst Fest as well as Oktoberfest. Several volunteers reported to me that they always enjoy coming out to Amana.

Wurst Fest also included live music, the Dachshund Derby, and a stein holding contest. Jamie says the record for stein holding is seven minutes. Doesn't sound very long? The stein weighs approximately 5 pounds when filled with the 35 oz of beer! Not surprisingly, the Wurst Fest is pet-friendly, although Jamie tells me that one year someone brought their pet goat! I'm sorry I missed that year.

You know, the success of an event like this is really dependent on the staff who get out there and work and have fun with the crowd. I think one of the reasons visitors come Amana for Wurst Fest as well as other festivals is because of the people.
