The Reverend's Ruminations - October 2024

HAPPY AUTUMN! It seemed to arrive as scheduled on Sunday, September 22, with temps nearly 20 degrees cooler than the previous day, so let's hope that the same will not be true when the first day of winter rolls around in mid-December!?!

With an extra-wet late spring and early summer, the area fields are not turning golden brown as uniformly as they do many years—some even have very green areas of replanted soybeans right in the middle of acres nearly ready for harvest (or already picked in several areas). The range of crop maturity may be worrisome as the fall days march on, but let us trust that God still has the final say amid the changing seasons. As always during this hectic time of year, we pray for safe farming operations and a productive harvest for all our area farm families.



I was asked recently, "What are the [insert other local denomination name here] doing that seems to fill their parking lot so much more regularly than ours on a Sunday morning?" That is a question not so easily answered. If it were simply a matter of offering a certain Bible study, style of music, or time of worship, we would certainly make adjustments in hopes of returning to the "glory days" of packed pews and a Sunday School program bursting the seams of a dedicated education wing. Unfortunately, that is not the community we live in anymore. Church membership in some sense does historically run in cycles, but a sad statistic I recently read from the researchers at Gallup indicates that "Two decades ago, an average of 42% of U.S. adults attended religious services every week or nearly every week. A decade ago, the figure fell to 38%, and it is currently at 30%. This decline is largely driven by the increase in the percentage of Americans with no religious affiliation — 9% in 2000-2003 versus 21% in 2021-2023 — almost all of whom do not attend services regularly." (www.news.gallup.com, March 25, 2024)

To be clear, none of this is meant to scare you or serve as an excuse not to work at being a more vibrant and welcoming church. Quite the contrary: may it serve as a challenge to prove those national averages wrong in our community! One of the most basic things ALL of us can do is endeavor to attend worship more regularly ourselves. We don't need to live into the Gallup statistics; rather we need to try to increase those slumping percentages within our own congregation. And while challenging yourself to attend church more regularly, why not ask a friend, neighbor, or family member to join you? Having an accountability partner can be beneficial for both parties! Adult Sunday School is also available after worship to help you dig deeper in your faith.

As promised in last month's "Ruminations," the upcoming week's lectionary scripture readings are now listed in the worship bulletin right after the "Partners in Ministry" volunteers, so that you can read ahead and contemplate what you'll be hearing the following Sunday. As an overview, our epistle readings during October and most of November will all be drawn from the Letter to the Hebrews, while our weekly gospel readings over the next two months will all be drawn from Mark. During our October worship services, my sermons will examine selections from the book of **Job** — specifically chapters 1, 23, 38, and 42. Suffering and grief seem to be ever-present in our world, but If you find yourself wondering why bad things seem to be happening to you, or how to make it through your personal struggles, take a few moments to read about the challenges overcome by one faithful and upright Old Testament character with the ironic-looking name of Job (pronounced with a long O)!

I hope to see you in worship soon, where we can all glorify and praise God together!

The Council met in Heritage Hall at 5:45 PM. Past Moderator Abigail Anderson called the meeting to order, and Pastor Cory led devotion and prayer. We celebrated generosity in the church, naming several recent events for which we are thankful; Donations for the furnace, choir, Sunday School, Free pantry use and those stepping up to lead our upcoming fundraisers.







Hy-Vee & Fareway Report as of Report as of 22 September 2024

During the last 4 weeks, \$11,118.55 (556%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were received. After 42 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$157,228.02 (78.61%) toward the 17 th goal which is now \$200,000.

During the same time, \$1,583.22 (1.06%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 77 weeks, Fareway is at \$85,590.29 (57.06%) toward our 5 th \$150,000 goal. This program started the first of March 2011, so any slips from then until now can be used. Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip can be used. Even slips from Hy-Vee Fast & (Gas), Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal. Delivery slips/sheets can also be used. Thanks to all who bring/mail the slips to the Church, or mailing them or dropping them off at my house.





After a summer break our adult Sunday School class has started examining **The Book of James** with the help of author, teacher, and preacher Francis Chan. If you haven't joined us in the chapel after worship yet, or have missed a session, perhaps you'd like to check out the series to see what we've been discussing:

True faith produces fruit. A faith without action and without life change is ultimately a dead faith. The book of James speaks to the realities of a living faith in Jesus—the kind of roll-up-your-sleeves and get-your-handsdirty discipleship that is borne out of an authentic relationship with the risen Lord. Through 12 sessions, Francis works through James verse-by-verse, challenging followers of Christ to move beyond a private, intellectual knowledge of God and His Word, to a vibrant faith that impacts every square inch of life.

With the kids back in school, you may be looking for a wholesome break between school, extra-curricular activities, supper, and bedtime. How about including a different form of Bible study that will both entertain and educate? Check out a few short episodes offered in **The Garden**:

The Garden follows the adventures of **Lenny the Lion** and **Lucy the Lamb** who live and work in a miraculous garden where anything can grow! They work for GOD (who they call 'The Boss') and do different fun tasks for Him as they sing original songs and learn more about Jesus Christ. You'll love the songs and all the fun they have as your kids – and YOU – learn even more about the Word of God. 'The Garden' is a place where the Gospel grows!

2 c. flour

l tsp. cinnamon

l tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. salt

l c. coconut (optional)

l c. chopped nuts (walnuts or pecans)

3 c. diced, peeled apples

2 tsp. vanilla

Combine eggs, brown sugar and oil. Add flour, cinnamon, baking soda and salt. (Mixture will be very thick.) Add remaining ingredients and mix well. Place in a greased 9×13 " pan. Bake at 350 degrees F for 45 minutes to 1 hour until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

Ingredients for Topping:

l c. brown sugar l stick margarine

½ c. milk

Combine and boil for 4 minutes. When the cake is done baking, punch holes in the top with a fork and pour topping over the hot cake. Cool completely.



34 stick butter

/4 Stick Dutter

l Tbsp. cream or milk

l tsp. vanilla

4 c. powdered sugar

Beat cream cheese, butter, vanilla and milk together until soft. Add enough powdered sugar until it is spreadable. Frost the cake.

Serves 16. Freezes well.
