

March 10, 2019 First Sunday of Lent Lk 4:1-13

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

Happy Lent! Right? For us in the church, Lent is our spiritual version of 'spring conditioning'! We tone up our souls with spiritual practices of prayer, fasting and charitable works. I love the plan of the Church in rolling out Lent for us! After the initial push and excitement of Ash Wednesday, the readings of this first Sunday of Lent honestly set in front of us what we are truly up against when it comes to spiritual change: The Devil and Temptations! Getting real, the Church is warning us that if the Devil is bold enough to tempt Jesus in the desert, then we can count on Him trying to pick us off! How does it happen? With Jesus, the Devil tries three times to prey upon human weaknesses, by appealing to Jesus' 1) human hunger, 2) a power trip to his ego, and worst of all, 3) puffing up his spiritual pride with desires for flashy miracles and holy spectacles.

Among the rocks in the rough desert, the Devil tempts Jesus using physical comforts. With a mountain high-view of glorious kingdoms, he tempts with power/control over others. And finally on the steeple's tip at the Temple, the Devil tempts with offers of miraculously holy spectacles, appealing to spiritual egotism. In all of these, the Devil tried to draw Jesus away from the Father's Will. The Devil wanted to infect Jesus with vain and selfish comforts, and prideful egotism. Yet, Jesus deflects each blow, keeping His focus upon the kingdom of God and his relationship to the Father (Like Jesus had said, earlier, "Did you not know that I must be about my Father's business?" Luke 2:49). I love how every response of Jesus to the Devil is not his own eloquent words, but simply a quotation of Scripture (God's word) as His justification of keeping the Father's Will. Jesus quotes Deuteronomy 8:3 (we don't live on bread alone) in response to the first temptation, and Deuteronomy 6:13 (we worship and serve God above all) in the second temptation. For the third temptation, Jesus quotes, Deuteronomy 6:16 (we are not to tempt God by forcing His hand to help us). It seems like Deuteronomy is Jesus' favorite bible book, but Jesus actually quotes more times from the Book of Psalms (Deuteronomy is second-most). But, Deuteronomy is so appropriate for this scene in the desert because Deuteronomy retells the story of Moses and the Hebrews being formed as a Chosen People in the desert (after Exodus). So Jesus' own 40 days in the desert makes me think of Him undertaking an intense bible study (good idea!) in the desert as a personal retreat of prayer. So we, His disciples have Lent as a 40 day period of deepening our faith!

But, back to the Devil. Notice how the Devil is 'crafty and cunning' (Gen 3:1). He catches on to Jesus' biblical response style and tries to trip him up the third time, by quoting even quoting God's Word himself. But, the Devil is a cheater! He throws at Jesus two quotes (Psalm 91:11 and Psalm 91:12). But he is padding his account and requoting the same psalm (just repeating himself-sign of desperation). He acts like it is two freestanding quotes, like he is building a case with multiple sources. Like he is accumulating many sources, but it is all the same psalm. The Devil is a 'deceiver' and he is twisting and distorting the truth. Jesus says in John 8:44 that the Devil is the 'Father of lies' and 'there is no truth in him'. St Paul in Acts 13:10 confronts an enemy in league with the Devil, calling him an 'enemy of all that is right, full of every sort of deceit and fraud' who is 'twisting the straight paths of the Lord?' That is the Devil's approach, twisting everything to his own will and advantage. So how do we deal with the Devil? First, we admit what we are up against. And secondly, we stay close to our strength and shelter which is Jesus-His word and example. A group of early Christians called 'desert monks' had a great defense strategy against these unholy temptations. They let God, in a bible quote, speak back to the Devil!

These Early Church monastics, who lived in desert retreat areas themselves, defended against the Devil's distractions, by constantly reading and meditating upon God's word. Then when the Devil approached, they would simply pray a suitable quote-passage of God's word as a defense. Some of the monks even came up with handbooks of ready-passages for every occasion of temptation or sin (that would be a neat Lent project-to develop one's own spiritual-war manual by first identifying one's own weaknesses through examining one's conscience and then arming oneself with 'ready tactical quotes of protection'!) Such an approach is practical genius because it amounts to replacing a bad thought with a good thought. The monks called it 'guarding one's heart against the Devil' and they compared it to a watchman at the city gate, who would question each person entering the city. Before we allow a thought into our heart, we examine it and question it. So, deny access to negative thoughts and admit in good and uplifting thoughts. Lent invites us to keep a close watch on what rolls around in our minds. How do we spend our precious thought or prayer time? What do we let into our hearts? What thoughts do we feed or cultivate? What kind of tapes play over and over in our minds? Are we filling ourselves with good messages, or being pulled down and away from God by unhelpful messages? Jesus shows a way in the desert of repeating God's good words to ourselves as a 'shelter and refuge of peace' in a chaotic and swirling world! Psalm 119:105 says that God's Word is a 'lamp unto my feet' and a 'light in the dark'.
