Bio: Brian McLaughlin joined the Center for Advanced Operational Culture Learning in June 2014. He is a U.S. Marine Corps Veteran, who served as a Russian Crypto-linguist, Infantry Officer, and Foreign Area Officer. His key assignments include Marine Corps Attaché at the U.S. Embassy in Kyiv, Ukraine (2011-2013); Eastern European Regional Planner at U.S. Marine Corps Forces, Europe in Boeblingen, Germany (2008-2010); Foreign Area Officer at the U.S. Embassy in Zagreb, Croatia (2003-2004); and Russian Linguist at 2d Radio Battalion at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina (1996). Additionally, Brian deployed twice in support of Operation IRAQI FREEDOM to Al Anbar Province, Iraq (2005-06 and 2007-08), conducted one deployment to Okinawa, Japan (1998-99), and traveled to nearly 40 countries. He holds an M.A. in National Security Affairs from the Naval Postgraduate School (2003) and a B.S. in Business Administration from The Citadel (1991) and is a graduate of U.S. Marine Corps Command and Staff College (2010) and Amphibious Warfare School (2003). He is the recipient of the Provost's Award and a two-time awardee of the Faculty Book Award from the Defense Language Institute in Monterey, California.

Over the past year, Brian has developed operational culture training materials for those countries and regions within the EUCOM area of responsibility where U.S. Marines deploy to execute security cooperation missions. Notably, he delivered pre-deployment operational culture training to more than 6,000 Marines and Sailors from II MEF and supporting units to prepare them for NATO exercise Trident Juncture and for the Marine Rotational Force – Europe mission. His collaboration on the "Russian Culture and the Cognitive Dimension" project has set the groundwork for the development of related projects focusing of key adversaries to include China, Iran, and North Korea.
