**First Reading:** Jer 20:7-9

*The word of the Lord God has meant derision for me.*

You have seduced me, Lord, and I have let myself be seduced; you have overpowered me: you were the stronger. I am a daily laughing-stock, everybody's butt. Each time I speak the word, I have to howl and proclaim: 'Violence and ruin!' The word of the Lord has meant for me insult, derision, all day long. I used to say, I will not think about him, I will not speak in his name any more. Then there seemed to be a fire burning in my heart, imprisoned in my bones. The effort to restrain it wearied me, I could not bear it.

Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. 'Heaven preserve you, Lord,' he said. 'This must not happen to you.' But he turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle in my path, because the way you think is not God's way but man's.'

Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it. What, then, will a man gain if he wins the whole world and ruins his life? Or what has a man to offer in exchange for his life?'

### The Cost of Following Jesus and its Blessings

Scripture readings for this Sunday call upon us to embrace the discipleship of Jesus not as a religion of devotion and self-satisfaction, but a discipleship of commitment and self-sacrifice. The more Jeremiah condemned corruption, shifting alliances and oppression, the more he was attacked. In the end he remained faithful to his mission, showing what it meant to live as a person of integrity, to have the moral courage to walk the long road of fidelity.

Jesus also expects such courage and commitment of the disciples. "If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me."

Christian discipleship consists of walking the path of "the Son of Man who came not to be served, but to serve and to give his life for others." And surely this was the path Jesus walked, putting his own comfort and security aside to identify with the suffering of others, listening and comforting the sorrowful and the fearful, embracing those considered unclean and outcast, healing the afflicted and personally witnessing to God's all-embracing mercy, that nothing can separate them from the love of God.

This does not mean that suffering is something followers should actively seek for its own sake. As his grief in Gethsemane made clear, suffering was the price he and his followers would pay for acting justly, loving tenderly and walking humbly with our God. Addressing openly, harsh and unjust practices in the world that exclude and oppress to reframe an alternative vision of hope, love, solidarity and service in union with Jesus for the benefit of others.

On this Social Justice Sunday, the readings call us to a deeper understanding of discipleship. It is not about seeking out hardship. Faithfulness to the Gospel and to the Christian mission will bring enough challenge on their own. Within this, all are invited to put on the mind of God. We are invited to enter into the paschal mystery with Jesus where suffering is not the end, and power and authority are not markers of success. Authentic discipleship shares the daily joys and sorrows of people, especially those most in need. People who suffer mental ill-health and those who walk with them are assured that God is not absent, but is present in the loving words and actions in people's lives when times are hardest. Nothing can take away their inherent dignity and worth in the eyes of God, their Loving Father.

Happy are they who hunger and thirst after justice; the kingdom of heaven is theirs.



### Social Justice Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> August 2020



The Bishops' Annual Social Justice Statement, "To Live Life to the Full: Mental Health in Australia Today", encourages faith communities, governments and individuals to make mental health a priority.

Bishop Terry Brady, Bishop Delegate for Social Justice, has called on all Catholics to take up the message and challenges of the Statement. "This is a timely message in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic. The pandemic is affecting many members of our parishes, schools and communities," Bishop Brady said.

"The personal feelings of anxiety and despair we all share at this time provide an opportunity to become more aware and active in fostering the mental health of all. Understanding mental health will help us to be aware of those who most need our support."

The Statement encourages parishes and local communities to be places of welcome and inclusion, overcoming the barriers and stigma often faced by people experiencing mental ill-health. It demands the commitment of governments and policy-makers to prevent so many people falling through the cracks of the mental health system. It also calls for the nation's commitment to address those policies that exacerbate the already precarious circumstances of First Australians and refugees and asylum-seekers.

"Our society tends to push away or draw away from those who confront us with our frailties and limitations. This is not the way of Jesus," Bishop Brady said.

"Let us follow him in drawing near to those who are experiencing mental ill-health and acknowledge that they are members of the Body of Christ - 'they' are part of 'us'. Only then can we say 'we are all in this together'. Only then can we 'live life to the full'."

Think about it: we are living through a moment in history when, in every parish and diocese around the world, the domestic space is the only place where most Catholics can be fully present to one another in celebrating their Catholic traditions. In fact, the terrible necessity of enforced home isolation has opened up an extraordinary opportunity: to call the faithful, family units of every kind and configuration, to rediscover their power to 'be' church, each within their unique domestic context.

It is time to move beyond the initial crisis management period (focused on online Masses), to intentional lay empowerment. Our conversations can be less about the pros and cons of 'virtual' Mass attendance, and more on filled with talk of 'home-based spirituality'.

The resounding message from the ecclesial leadership, surely, has to be: Now is the time for the lay faithful to step up. Your home is a holy place, you are 'priest' in your own home; your meal table is your 'altar', your family is the church in miniature, the domestic church.
