

Chanukah A Spiritual Victory

24 - 30 Kisley till one Tevet 2021

Hanukkah celebrates the military victory of the Maccabees who were loyal to Jewish law, over the Syrian Greeks and their Jewish allies. Antiochus, the Greek ruler did not want to destroy the Jewish people; he wanted to destroy the Jewish religion. He wanted the Jews to assimilate to the idol worship of the Greek religion and his way of life.

Jason, who at that time was the High Priest of Israel, promised the king money if he was permitted to build a college and a physical gym. Antiochus finally agreed to this as he had been reassured by the priests of Israel that the Jewish people no longer held first place in their hearts to Judaism. The priests told him that the Jews were only waiting for him to place a Greek idol in the Temple.

Rebellion One priestly family that remained loyal to Jewish law and the religion was the Hasmoneans, or Maccabees, as they were later called. Mattathias and his five sons knew that Jews had sinned greatly in adopting the customs of the Greeks which were so contrary to Jewish beliefs.

"Whoever is for G-d follow me", Mattathias shouted and he and his sons fled to the mountains. There he raised a small army. He planned to free the Jews from the Greek influence and the rule of Antiochus. They won a number of great victories led by his son Judah Maccabee who replaced his aged father and his family returned to Jerusalem.

When they saw the Temple desecrated by the Greek idols their hearts bled, but they did not lose courage. They threw the Greek idols out of the Temple, cleaned it, and replaced the old vessels, with new ones. As a final touch, they had to light the "Menorah".

By law the Menorah was to be kept burning in the Temple continuously. When the Maccabees looked for the special oil they found only a small cruse good for only one day. As they put it into the menorah they hoped for the best. The oil lasted for eight days. The rededication of the Temple occurred on the 25th day of Kislev in the year 165 B.C.E.

Not only did the Jews win a victory over Antiochus but they won a victory over themselves. Mattathias taught them that the right way is the way of the Torah. For only the Torah has preserved the Jewish people. It was the example set by one family that influenced all the people. This is the lesson taught by Hanukkah.

Menorah As a symbol and a reminder of the miracle of the oil, we light and display a model "menorah" each night of the holiday (24 - 30 Kislev till one Tevet 2021). We begin with one candle and add one candle each night, bringing it to a total of eight candles lit on the eighth night of Hanukkah. The menorah is lit by a special lighting candle shamash. It is placed a little higher in the menorah, separate from the regular Hanukkah candles.

The candles are put into the Menorah from right to left. On the first night (24 Kislev which is 28 November on the USA calendar), the candle on the extreme right is put in on the first night. Each night a new candle is added on that side. In lighting the menorah however, we go from left to right. The newest candle is lit first, and followed by the second newest and so on.

The menorah should be lit in the evening after the "Ma'ariv" service. They should burn for at least half an hour. The entire family should be present during the "mitzvah". Prior to the candle lighting three blessings are read as follows: The first blessing indicates the fulfillment of the "mitzvah", the second thanks G-d for enabling us to reach this holiday season in health and happiness. After the first night, only the first two blessings are recited by each household using its own model menorah.
