A Lecture on the Sacred Sites of Ireland by Dr. Catherine Carter

The history of a place and the history of religion in that place are inextricably entwined. This is true world-wide but especially so in a place like Ireland, where holy sites dot the landscape. These sites, some prehistoric and some medieval, attest to the religious culture that was dominant in Ireland for thousands of years. This talk begins at the beginning to describe some of the pagan sites in the north of Ireland; it will end with a look at the magnificent medieval cathedrals in Dublin.

Catherine Carter is a curious mix of academic, scientist, and artist. She holds a Ph.D. in Geography, a Master of Divinity, a Master of Science in Computer Science, and she is on the verge of completing a Master of Photography. In her geography research and her photography, she works with Sacred Space and often uses



historic processes to print her photographs. She also photographs documentary stories about people as well as conservation projects. Her work can be seen at <u>www.catherinecarter.photos</u>.

Bucket List Filled: The Shermans Go to Ireland (Part 2)

[Editor's Note: On August 28th, 2017, IAS members Natalie Sherman and her husband Ash arrived in Dublin for their first-time-ever visit to the Emerald Isle. Ash kept a journal of their daily adventures, and I'm including here—and in subsequent newsletters—some of his particularly interesting observations of Irish life and culture. Also please note that after their return on September 8th, Natalie's cancer came back big time and she is now in hospice but hanging in there (as of this writing), and really appreciates your good thoughts and prayers.]

By car to the Rock of Cashel, Tipperary, Mt. Shannon, and Ennis

[Natalie's cousin] Chris met us at 8 AM, loaded our luggage into her

little car and we set off for Tipperary. More rolling hills in infinite shades of green to see, and I slept. We arrived in Cashel for breakfast, and were able to tour the Rock of Cashel. This is a major attraction that we had earlier cut because of the complications of visiting while traveling by Irish Rail that doesn't come closer than 20-30 miles. This is the traditional Capitol of Ireland from the 12th century when Brian Boru was dealing with Norman invaders. It is a ruin now perched atop a craggy summit. It was a steep walk up, but worth the effort. The medieval construction has sort of survived; survived enough to appreciate what it once was. Outside the main buildings, the Rock is surrounded by green, and in the green are buried local dignitaries from ancient times right up until the mid-20th century. Some stones have weathered so long that their inscriptions are faded and difficult to read. From the outer walls, one can see long distances of rolling green hills divided by hedgerows and rock walls ranging from a few feet in height to over ten feet. The sun shone down, and the temperature was comfortable. I took a whole lot of photos and video clips of the Rock of Cashel, but the memories of that place will not soon fade from our memories.

Further down the road we came to Tipperary and met more cousins. Kernan, Anne, and their daughter had lain on a memorable lunch. They live in an upscale suburban house that one might see anywhere in the States. Windows and skylights made the interior bright and comfortable. The dining table was formally set to a standard far above almost any restaurant. Carrots and parsnips were a featured side dish, with several versions of potatoes as sides to the side. Wonderfully cooked ham and chicken made up the mains, and were moist and flavorful. I loved their lemonade, though it was simple. Kernan was the chief cook, and his *mise en place* would have made any Michelin chef proud. After lunch, the cousins yakked and I enjoyed their grounds. They have a half acre edged with a 12-foot boxwood hedge and banks of flowers. Everywhere we went in Ireland the profusion of flowers and decorative, exotic plants filled the view.

Chris had to return to Waterford, so we took some pictures and piled into the various cars. Kernan and Anne drove at least 30 miles out of their way so that Natalie could visit the old family farm. The original



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building looks ancient, but was built in 1933. The farm is still run by another cousin, who seems at least semiprosperous. (Prosperous farmers in Ireland are as rare as successful family farms in the US.) We were given a small bag of soil from the farm as a memento.

The farm is quite near Mt. Shannon and looks out over a large body of water. It looks like an estuary, but is in fact a fresh-water lake that feeds into the sea near Galway. Kernan and Anne have a motor launch berthed there, but we didn't go out onto the water. On our way to Ennis we drove over some hills that opened wide prospects. We stopped for some photos, and I sat down on the rail of a rock fence. Kernan joined me, and what appeared to be rock turned out to be reinforced concrete made to look like rock. The rail broke under our combined weight, and we tumbled backwards in the lush field of clover that covered the hill top. Laughing, we tried to hold our poses until photos were taken to commemorate the event, but unless Anne was faster than Natalie nothing exists but the memory. It was early evening when we arrived at our hotel, The Temple Gate, and bade farewell to a most enjoyable company.
