Playing Musical Chairs of Change

------With Pastor Eric

Jesus said, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, then I am there among them." Matthew 18:20

I used to love to play musical chairs at parties because I never sat in the same chair twice. I thought about that game the other day. I was reading an article by the Alban Institute about "promoting effective change" in a congregation. I read the article as a part of my continuing education course on congregational leadership. You might agree that change is a fact of life whether you like it or not. I prefer to respond proactively to change and embrace it as a healthy part of a maturing life. In this article I came across the "three chair" dynamic of change. One chair is for those who are for a particular change. They see the need for a particular change and are informed enough to perceive the benefits over the cost. Another chair is for those who are resistant to a particular change. They are not convinced that the change sought is necessary, or worth the risk over against whatever benefits it might generate. There will always be people sitting in these two chairs for every change even if "me" is in one chair and "myself" in the other. I think that these chairs are important when addressing any type of big decisions in the community. Many times the dialog that should be happening between these "chairs" does not happen well. People talk passed one another and little listening occurs.

Now the third chair comes into the conversation. Who will sit in this third chair? The people who sit here are the curious ones. They ask questions of the other two chairs like "what would it be like if..." The third chair might serve to help clarify the needs of everyone concerned and imagine a process or an outcome that might meet those needs. The "three chair" dynamic involves conversation to which I would add prayer and yes, the Holy Spirit.

Jesus said, "Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven." Matthew 18:19

I have learned that over 70% of change failures are due to organizational issues and only 14% are attributed to budget or inadequate resources. Jesus was so right when he taught that when the community of faith comes together in agreement then anything is possible. Let's keep the lines of communication open and have our town-halls and our round tables. Let's keep having the leadership retreats and Bible studies. Let's keep asking questions, praying the whole way and engaging in actions that promote effective change for God's glory as the music plays on...

Let us pray. Heavenly Father, open my spirit to prayer, my minds to share, and my heart to care as I enter into times of change within my community and in myself. May I always seek and find unity in you and your purpose for me. Amen.

Sunday morning ADULT REFLECTION TIME

Jesus lived with the awareness that God is doing something, right here, right now, and anybody can be a part of it. He encouraged his listeners to search, to question, to wrestle with the implications of what he was saying and doing. He inspired, challenged, provoked, comforted, and invited people to be open to God's work in this world. Wherever he went, whatever he did, Jesus started discussions about what matters most, because for Jesus, God is always inviting us to open our eyes and join in. NOOMA is a series of short films that explore our world from a perspective of Jesus. NOOMA is an invitation to search, question, and join the discussion. NOOMA films are created and produced by Flannel, a nonprofit organization. We are a group of people committed to giving everyone a fresh and compelling look at the teachings of Jesus.

We will have prayer, a 12-14 minute short video, and 30 minute discussion about the topics. Handouts will be provided via email and before the class for consideration.

Participants will choose from the following topics to study this Summer after church – survey available in Fellowship Hall or online with a brief explanation of what these questions will explore.

- 1. Where's God when life isn't going like we want it to?
- 2. Could love be the most misunderstood and misused word in our vocabulary?
- 3. Do our lives even matter?
- 4. Do we get so wrapped us in religion that we miss out on what's important to God?
- 5. Why are we so afraid of silence?
- 6. If God really cares about us, why don't we have what we want?
- 7. Why is it sometimes so hard to forgive?
- 8. What does God see in us?
- 9. Can we really love God without loving others?
- 10. What do we do when our past catches up to us?
- 11. Are our lives in tune with God's plan for the world?
- 12. How do we deal with the pain we suffer when we lose someone we love?
- 13. Is it possible that God has blessed us so that we can be a blessing to others?
- 14. Is our physical breath actually a picture of a deeper spiritual reality?
- 15. Do we get so hung up on debating and defending our faith that we miss out on the point of it?
- 16. Is anger the issue, or is the real problem what you get angry about?
- 17. Can we become so consumed with the past that we can't see the beauty of today?
- 18. Are we so concerned with what others think that we missout on being who God created us to be?
- 19. Does prayer really help?
- 20. Are we so busy that we miss out on what we're supposed to be doing?
- 21. Do we try so hard to be something we are not, that we miss out on how to truly live?
- 22. Why do we often feel empty even when we get what we want?
- 23. What do we do when there aren't nice, neat answers?



Unfinished Business:

- 1. Property Committee. Mike Larson has agreed to chair the committee
- Special Offering for Southeast Iowa Synod. In the past the Synod has designated special offerings for specific areas. This year the special offering will be designated for general ministries of the Synod. It was decided Palestine will hold an offering for this on Sunday May 8th, with Pastor informing congregation on Sunday May 1st.
- Choir Director. Worship Committee met and approved the hire of Mindy DeVries under expectation of the current job profile. The plan will be for Mindy to start at the end of August on a six month trial period.

- Motion by Mark Doty to approve the hire under the above circumstance. Second by Nels Dovre. Motion passed unanimously.
- Motion by Mark Doty to amend the Council Meeting Agenda to state Choir Director, vs. Music Ministry/Director. Second by Nels Dovre. Motion passed unanimously.
- 4. Membership Status List Cynthia stated has been updated from all feedback.
- Video screens-update. The screens will be installed no later than three weeks, in time for VBS
- Tim Wilson motioned to approve spending up to \$4,000 for project, taking first from the Technology Fund, and then General Fund. Jeff Van Pelt Second. Motion passed unanimously.
- 6. Parsonage Update. After much discussion, it was decided to form a Parsonage Committee to continue the direction for use of the Parsonage in our mission. It was decided the committee would consist of one council member, (Tim Wilson) one Property Committee, one Evangelism Committee, and one Mission and Outreach Committee. It was also noted there may be a potential need for the new Fjeldberg Pastor to need temporary housing, and our Parsonage would be a potential.
- Motion by Bruce Hartman to give the newly formed Parsonage Committee direction to investigate requirements for a short term lease, for the new Fjeldberg Pastor. Second Mark Doty. Motion passed unanimously.
- 7. Kitchen Committee Update. Committee has yet to meet, but need to get something on the calendar.

- Town Hall Meeting. Next town hall will be planned for May 22nd. Planned topic will be reviewing our Vision/Mission Statement.
- 2. Sound Proofing Mitigation Nels Devore will be looking into options and report back.

PALESTINE WOMEN OF ELCA

Monday, June 6, 2:00 p.m. Bible Study.

In the June issue of the Gather magazine we begin a 3 session Bible study *The Heart of the Matter—Conflict, Forgiveness and Reconciliation* by Angela Shannon. Session 1 is *Treasure in clay jars*. The scope of this Bible study is broad. We are dealing with expansive topics such as love, forgiveness and reconciliation in light of the fact that we are earthen vessels or clay jars. In community we learn practical ways to live out our baptismal covenant to "live among God's people."

Practical tips for clay jars engaging in the ministry of reconciliation in daily life:

- 1. Remember God is love, active and present (1 John 4:16b).
- 2. Know that you are a Child of God.
- 3. Act as an ambassador for Christ and minister of reconciliation (2 Corinthians 5:20)
- 4. Ask God for a spirit of humility. Outdo one another in showing honor.
- When you feel fear rising, stop, pray and breathe. The breath is God's constant gift to us. A good breath oxygenates the brain and brings clarity. When we are angry or fearful, we tend to breathe and think shallowly.
- 6. Remember that God's majesty is present in the messiness of conflict ordering our chaos, much in the same manner as God brooded over the waters at the dawn of creation (Psalm 46, Genesis 2:1).
- 7. As angry as you are at a person or a group of people, remember God created and loves them just as God created and loves you (1 John 4:7, 1 John 4:20-21).
- 8. Speak the truth in love, but speak the truth. Set ground rules for respectful communication. Each person must take responsibility for their words and actions (Proverbs 15:1).
- 9. Cultivate curiosity. Ask questions. Ask, "How did we get to this point?"
- **10.** Pray for one another in sincerity.
- 11. Remember wisdom is conflict's shadow gift. Experiencing a conflict and emerging from it teaches us how to disagree in love.

The theme for the June 2016 *Gather* magazine is **TREAURE IN CLAY JARS**. From Adam and Eve to Jacob and Esau to Paul's interactions with the early church, conflict has always been a part of our human story, allowing us to be receptacles of God's healing grace.

In July – Session 2: Seeking God. Next session we look at how congregations can seek healing and reconciliation in the midst of conflict.

Building Confidence from Legos

Once a week Beloit becomes an imagination station of Legos, robotics and computer programming. That's what happens when the passions of LSI mentors and LSI clients align.

Tom first learned about LSI's Beloit Residential Treatment Center through a mission event at his church. Together, he and LSI's volunteer staff began exploring the idea of creating a robotics group at Beloit.

"You're playing, but you're also learning," said Tom. "I enjoy helping them experiment and learn what is or isn't interesting to them. It's a great opportunity to match up their interests and passions."

As a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) activity, the group also helps youth practice problemsolving skills they can use in the classroom. Many schools now offer robotics as an extracurricular activity. LSI hopes this activity helps youth at Beloit feel a sense of belonging with their peers when they are introduced to STEM subjects in the future.

"Our kids love going to this program," said Angie, an LSI caseworker. "They like it because it is out of the ordinary, and they get to use their imagination, too. It's something they are able to create and see the end result."

On this day, Daniel, age 14, has just learned how to make his "robot" move.

"I built that," he says with a huge grin.

And thanks to LSI donors and volunteers, he's building a bright future, too.
