- CIWI has delivered 82 internships,
- 100 percent of the internship positions have been secured by students of color, first-generation college students.
- CIWI has designed and implemented several innovative initiatives, including:
 - Innovative Partnership with SF PUC. Four years of collaboration with the PUC's PLG and Project Pull key stakeholders.
 - **Site Tours.** Thanks to our many sponsors and key stakeholders, there has been no shortage of amazing site tours.
 - Community Development and Affordable Housing. CIWI has been successful in placing interns with affordable housing developers (including TNDC, BHC, Mercy, and TCDC). As well, CIWI has developed a unique and collaborative partnership with YCD, to maximize opportunities for D10 young adults.
















CIWI INTERNS: BY THE NUMBERS

In partnership with our community based partners, CIWI has created targeted and grass-roots outreach programs to maximize our engagement with a diverse group of young adults. As well, CIWI has developed its annual program to achieve realistic and sustainable growth.




Community Based Partners

CIWI has established strong partnerships with several grass-roots partners including: College Track, East Bay College Fund, Juma Ventures, Lighthouse Community Charter HS, and CCSF (Ocean Ave.).



Ethnicity

Since 2012, CIWI has achieved strong diversity. We have created specific outreach strategies to maximize our efforts in San Francisco and in Oakland. 100 percent of our 82 internship positions have been secured by students of color.



Gender

Working closely with our key CBO partners, CIWI continues to work toward gender equity in our placements, with 39 internships secured by young women and 43 internships secured by young men.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW AND COMPONENTS

Program Components

CIWI developed its program to include the following core components and strategies:

Program Schedule	12 week program (June 2019 through August 2019)
Primary Market Area	CIWI operates in two Bay Area markets: 1. San Francisco. Emphasis on District 9 and District 10 and, 2. Oakland. Emphasis on West/District 3, Central and East Oakland.
Outreach	Extensive grass-roots outreach with community-based educational programs, local schools, including 1. College Track 2. Juma Ventures 3. City College of San Francisco 4. Oakland Promise/East Bay College Fund 5. Lighthouse Charter School 6. Young Community Developers (YCD) 7. Laney College
Program Scope	 Technical Training Scope: On average, trainee positions will deliver 240 hours, or 20 hours per week for the 12-week period, of targeted technical training, including: Assist in Project Management/Document Control/CM Attend weekly design team coordination meetings, with Architect, Engineers, and other consultants Participate in Project Site Visits and Inspections Conduct Project Due Diligence/Research Secure Specialized Software Exposure: Civil Design (AutoCAD), and Excel (financial modeling) Civic Engagement/Leadership Development Scope: A series of civic engagement events with key industry stakeholders, averaging 30 hours of community and economic development exposure over the 12-week period. 2019 program events included: SFPUC/LEED+Sustainable Infrastructure Program (L+SIP). In partnership with SFPUC, CIWI developed L+SIP to provide our interns with a solid understanding of the following: Project Specific LEED Training + Sustainability Analysis + Project Due Diligence





Since 2016, CIWI has designed and implemented our innovative Civic Engagement program in partnership with the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SF PUC). As well, CIWI is a community-based program that has secured four years of funding through the *PUC's Project Learning Grant* (PLG) program.

With PUC funding, CIWI created its LEED+Sustainable Infrastructure Program (L+SIP), an innovative program that focuses on project-based learning model to provide greater awareness, access and exposure to the Environmental/Sustainability world.

Without a doubt, L+SIP has partnered with several firms and other key stakeholders that are industry leaders to understand best practices/industry trends regarding sustainability, LEED and related programs, new technology, and local Bay Area developments that are on the cutting edge of incorporating new best practices to solve building, environment, and community needs.

2019 L+SIP Milestones:

- Delivered Project Specific LEED training;
- Participated in six workshops targeted to Sustainability and Infrastructure Systems; and
- Conducted three (3) site tours, including Potrero Power Station, 525 Golden Gate Ave. (PUC Hdqts), and 181 Fremont.











Potrero Power Station Multi-Year Partnership + Collaboration

SUMMERS 2018 and 2019

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Back in 2017, who knew what started as an inquisitive trip (by CIWI's Program Director) to an early Potrero Power Station community outreach event, would lead to a fantastic two-year partnership with Associate Capital. Over this period, CIWI not only received a substantial investment from Associate Capital (which we used to underwrite interns working for non-profit housing developers) but approximately 60-70 interns (CIWI and PUC's *Project Pull*), toured the approximately 28-acre site, participate in an amazing presentation regarding the history and future of this unique site and culminated in the interns making their way to the top of the power plant for some absolutely amazing San Francisco views.
