"They swarmed around me like bees."

I had my first taste of beekeeping last month.

I learned so much in such a short amount of time.

Standing by one of the beehives, I was taken by the sound of around 25,000 bees working together as one. As Tim, the beeman, lifted each section from the hive we were working on, the sound of buzzing, in complete and harmonic unison, grew louder and louder. I thought the hive was going to take off!

Tim explained that there are bees for working in the nursery, bees for guarding the entrance to the hive, worker bees and bees to keep the queen - well you know – and then, of course, there's the Queen bee. The whole mood of the hive depends on the Queen's mood! In summer there could be 50,000 bees in each hive. My word, I thought, one lady, has so much power!

In last month's letter, I referred to the story about a river and a droplet in that river. You may recall this phrase; "Let go, let go, and follow the flow, let go and follow the flow".

I wrote about our life and identity being part of the whole. On my beekeeping day, I was struck by the way the hive works in unison. The bees have a purpose; if you like a 'mission'.

How does this reflect our way of being Church?

We are a Connexional Church. We do not exist on our own, we are part of something much larger; we share a purpose, a 'mission'.

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As a Circuit in this Connexion, we are searching for new ways of being connected together. We await to see if we have a new Presbyter joining the staff team and from September 2018 we are planning to work together as a cluster within the Circuit. Almost like beehives, each one independent, yet working together, as part of a much larger 'mission'.

We aim to move together, each church working within its context and community, yet forming a larger cluster, united in a Circuit, and held Connexionally as ONE. Like a beehive, each one of us has a purpose, a role, a 'mission'. We join together our hopes, our plans, our common purpose, our imagination. What a powerful force we can be in each community if we all focus and work together.

In her opening address at this year's Methodist Conference, the Revd Lorraine N Mellor urged us all – the people called Methodist – to be risk takers in our 'mission'.

Gareth Powell, the Secretary of the Methodist Conference, calls us to put 'the work of God' back on our Church Council agendas.

The Methodist Conference was asked to consider that each Church Council be called upon to create a 'Growth Plan' and, if we find we have no appetite for that, then to create an 'End of life plan'. Exciting or what!?

In the highs of summer, a single beehive can give a home to 50,000 bees. During the winter months, this can be as little as 500 bees. But, even then, they have a common purpose, a 'mission'. To enable the Queen to survive so that they will grow again.

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Sometimes our doubts and fears about its future can 'Swarm around us like bees', as the Psalmist wrote of our enemies (Psalm 118 v 2). But let us gather around the gospel, the peace and assurance of Christ, and let us move forward – together as one in 'mission'. But let us not carry the mood of only one! May we heal where we need healing; rejoice where we witness life; lament where we need to grieve; listen to each other, dare to dream of something much greater, and grow together.

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CHRISTIAN AID AND SOUTH SUDAN

Recently I was fortunate to attend an evening at Christian Aid's headquarters behind Waterloo Station, where a panel of speakers described their experiences of working with Christian Aid and its local partners in South Sudan - the world's newest country but sadly one which has been torn apart by a brutal civil war for the last few years.

This has resulted in the internal displacement of over 3 million people, who consequently now face hunger and hardship. We learnt about the situation and the charity's response, essentially supporting local organisations, sometimes, but not exclusively, church-based.

In addition to relieving the immediate dire situation in which many people find themselves, Christian Aid looks to the longer term - working to enable management of future risk, with preparedness, disaster risk reduction, advocacy and development an increasingly significant part of their approach. The discussion ended with a Youtube clip (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=G3-dwZFpm4E) from 81 year old Bishop Paride Taban of South Sudan, with his 28 word prayer for peace, which he recites each day whilst doing his morning exercises:

'Love; joy; peace; patience; compassion; kindness; sympathy; truthfulness; gentleness; self-control; humility; poverty; forgiveness; mercy; trust; friendship; unity; purity; faith; hope; I love you; I miss you; thank you; I forgive you; we forget; together; I am wrong; I am sorry'. He believes that these words if recited by everybody, and combined with understanding, discernment and vision, especially amongst the country's leaders, would result in peace. This certainly gave me something to think about.

HELP NEEDED PLEASE


On Friday 24 November 12 young people and 4 adults will be heading to the national Methodist Youth weekend 3Generate in Southport.

UPMINSTER METHODIST CHURCH WAR MEMORIAL

November is the month of Remembrance and a time in particular when the people of this country especially remember those who have died during the wars.

At the back of the church, between the two big windows, is our War Memorial recording the names of five young men who were associated in some way with this church who we will be remembering when we place our wreath on Remembrance Sunday.

The present church was, of course, only built in 1923 but because Methodism had a presence in Upminster from at least 1910, it is possible that some Upminster Methodists may have been killed during the course of the First World War.

If this was the case then their names will most probably have been recorded on the village war memorial that is down by the side of the Parish Church. Therefore, our church war memorial records has only the names of those young men who were attached in some way to this church, and who were killed, with one exception, while serving in one capacity, or another, in the defence of this country in the Second World War, during the period 1939 to 1945.

None of the people whose names are recorded on the Memorial have relatives who were members, or were attached to the church in 1995, fifty years after the end of the Second World War. It was then that the older members of the church, at that time, as well as others, were asked for any details that they knew about the people on the list in order that we should all be able to appreciate them as people and not just names.

The following information was compiled from those sources.

Peter J Ellis:

Peter, who lived in Eversleigh Gardens, was a member of the scout troop attached to the church when he was killed, at the age of 16, in a road accident in 1938 while cycling home, one dark night, along the Southend Arterial Road. This was from an ARP post where he had been assisting with the issue of gas masks. As it was during the "Munich Crisis" and he was engaged in civil defence work at the time his death was counted as being "on active service" although it took place before the outbreak of hostilities.

Derek Goss:

Derek, who lived in Deyncourt Gardens, was a member of the Young People's Fellowship, the youth club and of the Regnel League as well as being a former member of the scout troop. He served in the R.A.F. from 1941 – 1944 and died in Canada while involved in aircrew training.

Austin Hughes:

Unfortunately, we were not able to find out much about Austin, and it is only known that he was a former member of the Young Peoples Fellowship and the youth club before he was killed in action while serving with the R.A.F.

Donald McDonald:

Donald, who was killed while serving with the armed forces, does not appear to have been attached to the church himself. His mother, and his aunt, Mrs.Tillinghurst, were, however, active members of the church "Woman's Own" Fellowship, while his brother Ken was a member of the Young People's Fellowship as well as the youth club, and later became a well-known opera singer.

John Rees:

John was a personable and attractive young man; a member of a prominent Methodist family in Lincoln. He came to Essex to work at the Brentwood branch of the Midland Bank but spent most of his weekends here in Upminster where he stayed with the Warnes family in Champion Road and sang in the Church Choir. He served in the Royal Navy and was lost at sea in November 1941 when the battleship HMS Barham was sunk by a torpedo.

So with holidays over our next focus is Christmas!


It has become a tradition that on the first Saturday of the Christmas Tree Festival we hold a mini market with craft stalls, charity stalls and refreshments.
